THERE were two important developments in the long-standing controversy over the best route for the proposed waterway from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic. The joint engineering commission of Canada and the United States made public his report indorsing the St. Lawrence plan. It urges harnessing of the St. Lawrence river for development of about 2,500,000 electrical horse power for ap portionment between States and Canada and the opening up of the river and lakes to permit the commerce of the world to penetrate to the head of the Great Lakes. The cost is figured at \$509,000,000. Of this total \$275,000,000 is set out as chargeable to the navigation project, which, from the standpoint of the Middle

West, is the big feature. On the other hand, the Mississippi Valley association declared itself in favor of the so-called all-American route from the lakes to the seaboard at New York city. This was the recommendation of the resolutions committee headed by Thomas F. Cunningham of New Orleans.



The Mexican government is expected to stand pat on its suggestion to Secretary Kellogg that he base his protests on concrete cases of retroactivity and of confiscation.

OF ALL the dominions of the Brit-ish empire, only India and North Ireland seem dissatisfied with the decision reached by the imperial conference-that the empire shall henceforth consist in theory as well as in fact of an alliance of independent British nations under one king. 



Frozen Fruit Salad.

Cut into small bits the fruit from a can each of pineapple, white cherries, pears and peaches. Mix the fruit with the juice from the cans; add two oranges, one-quarter of a grapefruit, cut into bits, two cupfuls of mayonnaise and a pint of whipped cream. Freeze, turn the crank slowly, then pack when chilled into molds. Cut in slices and serve on lettuce.

Belgian Hash.

Take one-half cupful of prunes, onehalf cupful of currants, one-half cupfui of sugar, one have go salt, pepper to taste, three-fourths o. a cupful of vinegar and one-fourth cup-

ful of water. Soak two pigs' feet and cook until tender (after chopping) in the above mixture until all the liquor is absorbed.

Corn Meal and Prune Pudding.

Bring one quart of milk to the boiling point, sprinkle in three-fourths of a cupful of corn meal and cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Add one-half teaspoonful of salt, onehalf cupful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter, two eggs well beaten, and one and one-half cupfuls of steamed prunes cut into pieces. Pour into a well greased baking dish and bake until firm. Serve with a lemon. hot cream, or hot milk sauce.

Chain Stores for Japan

It is proposed to establish a chain of 7,000 drug stores in Japan, according to a report to the Department of Commerce from Assistant Commercial Attache H. A. Butts at Tokyo. Two thousand of these stores will be located in the large centers and 5,000 in the rural communities.

In preparation for the opening of the chain system a school for salesmen has been established at Gotanda. More than 5,000 salesmen already have been graduated and are working throughout the country. According to present plans the architectural layout of the stores is to be uniform and each store will carry 2,000 kinds of articles stock.

H. G. Shirley, president of the Amer-ican Road Builders' association, in announcing the completion of a comprehensive survey of the highway field, said that the nation-wide adoption of the good roads program has completely revolutionized motor transportation.

"The first modern transcontinental highway will in all probability be com-I teeth for a di'mond and yet you go pleted before the end of the present countin' the di'monds you ain't got, season," Mr. Shirley said. "It will be an important moment in the history of this country. Already a little more than 99 per cent of a highway extending from New York to San Diego, Calif., has been improved. This great road extends by way of Washington, St. Louis, Texarkana, El Paso and southern California. Its length is a little more than 3,400 miles.

"The road system in the United States is so enormous that few laymen can really grasp its meaning. There are enough roads in this country to completely girth the earth one hundred and twenty times, or estimating the average width at 18 feet to make a single highway around the world 2,160 feet in width.

Mr. Shirley said that the immediate goal of the highway industry is the completion of the 182,000-mile federal ald system. Approximately 140,000 miles of this system has already been improved to some degree, he said.







NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Schemes to Grab Rumanian Throne Are Foiled by King Ferdinand.

E VEN though he be sick almost unto death, King Ferdinand of Rumania has no intention of permitting the former crown prince, Carol, and his friends, or any other clique to seize the throne or otherwise get control of the government. The king, whose death was rumored several times, issued an edict to the nation warning against any attempt to interfere with the regency established after Carol eloped with Magda Lupescu and renounced his rights to the succession in favor of his little son, Michael. Ferdinand said he felt his strength was returning, and undoubtedly his condition is much improved for the time being.

Meanwhile Queen Marie reached Paris, had a long private conference with Carol, and left hurriedly for Bucharest, abandoning her plans for two days of shopping because Ferdinand sent a pathetic plea for her quick return home. Decision as to an operation on her husband was post-poned until after her arrival.

In Bucharest Foreign Minister Mitil-Ineu deplored the rumors of the danger of a revolution or military coup d'etat, with Prince Carol attempting to seize the throne at the king's death. He said it is not true that the military hierarchy supports the ex-crown prince. Nevertheless, the newspapers hinted that there was likely to be a great shakeup among the high army commanders as a safeguard to prevent treachery or a sudden shift to the support of Carol. It was said Premier Averescu and Bratiano, generally considered dictator of the country. had agreed on a coalition cabinet.

DESPITE charges of excessive campaign expenditures, Arthur R. Gould, Republican, was elected senator from Maine to succeed the late Senator Fernald, and the control of the senate was thereby assured to his party. With Gould in, the upper house will have forty-eight Republicans, forty-seven Democrats and one Farmer-Laborite. The last, Senator Shipstead of Minnesota, is expected to line up with the Republicans because he formerly belonged in that party and the Farmer-Laborite party of Minnesota has now dissolved. Senators Brookhart of Iowa and Frazier of North Dakota, who supported LaFollette for President two years ago, have been taken back into the fold of regularity.

S MEMBERS of congress gath-A ered in Washington for the short ession, now opened, there was general agreement that nothing in the way of farm relief legislation could be enacted this winter and that the problem would be left for the next congress to tackle. Leaders of the corn and wheat belts, still insistent on the passage of the McNary-Haugen bill to force up the domestic prices of farm produce, found its prospects at this time were poor, owing to the fact that the Southern Democrats still refuse their support. The Democrat leadership opposes this bill and all similar plans because the underlying principle, they think, is a scheme for making the protective tariff on farm products effective. Furthermore, it is asserted by corn belt Republicans, the Democratic leaders are determined to kill any farm relief legislation before the Presidential election of 1928 on the theory that the failure of all such legislation would prove exceedingly embarrassing to the Republican party in that contest. Senator McNary has prepared a revised bill which will ake it optional with the farm marketing board to buy the surplus outright or to advance funds for this purpose to the co-operatives. FTER trying for nine years to en-A force its prohibition law, the traffic under government control. the next session of the legislature in 112, about 80 of the new legislators are pledged to take this action. It was a great victory for the Conservative government headed by Premier G. Howard Ferguson. Only one cabinet member, Dr. David Jamieson, was defeated. Sinclair and Raney, respectively the Liberal and Progressive dry leaders, won by narrow margins, William Nickle, until recently Premier Ferguson's attorney general, who left the government to support the drys, was beaten in Kingston by a majority of more than 2,000. His downfall was a demoralizing defeat for the drys. Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are the only provinces of Canada that still cling to prohibition.

FOREIGNERS in Foochow, China, who are numerous, were in dire peril for some days while the Cantonese and northern troops were fighting for control of Fukien province. However, calls for protection were speedily answered and Japanese, British and French gunboats were burried to the scene. To protect American lives and property the mine detachment vessel Hart was sent from Manila to Foochow. Latest reports of the fighting indicated that the Cantonese were having the best of it and would soon entire province.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, British foreign secretary, told the house of commons that the government opposed armed intervention in China and had taken all the steps it deemed necessary to protect British nationals in the war zone. As opposed to the recent pronunciamento of the Cantonese commander is the report of the international commission headed by Silas H. Strawn on extraterritoriality in China. After eight months of study the commission recommends that extraterritorial rights be retained by the powers for the present, being progressively abolished only as changing conditions warrant, and that the administration of the laws be entrusted to a judiciary independent of the executive or the military authorities,

S ECRETARY OF STATE KELLOGG has devised and formally proposed a plan which he believes will settle the age-old dispute between Peru and Chile over Tacna and Arica. He suggests that those provinces be ceded to Bolivia, now shut off from the sea, and that Peru and Chile receive compensation for public works constructed there. The provinces, under his plan, would be maintained as a perpetually demilitarized zone, the city of Arica would be made a free port and the Morro promontory would be established under international control as a memorial to the valor of both Chile and Peru with a monument on the headland commemorating the friendly settlement of the question.

Prompt resumption of diplomatic relations between Chile and Peru would be expected under the formula, which, Secretary Kellogg explained, "does not call for a moral surrender or anything that can be so construed, by one country to the other." Further, he sald, its acceptance would embody "a settlement which South America as a whole would welcome as one insuring permanent peace and stability."

NICARAGUA'S troubles are not over by any means. Last week General Sacasa, the former vice president who was supported for the presidency by the revolutionists, landed at Puerto Cabezas with men and arms and announced his cabinet. He expects that Mexico and Guatemala will recognize him as president. The press of San Salvador is protesting against the American recognition of President Diaz. Sacasa arrived with two schooners from Puerto Barrios, Guatemala, and was escorted by a Mexican gunboat. General Moncada, commander of the rebels, has rejected the government's surrender proposals transmitted through Admiral Latimer.

ERBERT HOOVER, secretary of commerce, says in his annual report that the year has been one of unprecedented progress for American industries and never has been surpassed to the volume of production and consumption, in the physical quantity of exports and imports, and in the rate of wages. There has been practically no unemployment. He adds: "As in the preceding year there were a few points where conditions were less satisfactory, as in the New England textile industry, two or three sections of the agricultural industry, and the bituminous coal industry.

"On the whole, however, the coup try was able to maintain the highest standard of living in its history, a standard far above that in most other countries of the world at this or any other time. This represents a remarkable recovery from the great losses incurred by the nation in the World

Agriculture still lags behind other industries, Secretary Hoover concedes. "The steady advance in prices of agricultural commodities from the time of the great fall in 1920-21 up to the crop year 1924-25 has contributed to the restoration of agriculture, although there are still weak spots," says Mr. Hoover.

O NE of the most important attacks yet made on the Volstead act was repulsed by the Supreme court of the United States in an opinion that upheld that section of the act which limits to one pint in ten days the amount of spirituous or vinous liquor a physician may prescribe for a patient Five of the justices held that this restriction is clearly valid under the power granted congress in the eighteenth amendment to enforce prohibt tion by appropriate legislation. Justices Sutherland, McReynolds, Stone and Butler in a dissenting opinion asserted that not only is the restriction an unlawful interference with the medical profession and the right of individual states to control medical practice, but that it is plain, from a reading of the eighteenth amendment, that congress and the states which ratified the amendment, sought only to prohibit the manufacture and sale of liquor for beverage purposes.
