"I had my choice of prosecuting the miners in the criminal courts for violations of the Lever act or of proceeding against them in the civil courts," raid Paimer.

PILGRIM FATHERS

NEW YORK, Dec.—The 300th anniversary of the Pilgrim Fathers, tentative plans of which have just been announced here, will include celebrations in England, Holland and the United States and will continue from May to December, 1920.

May to December, 1920.

A four-day program in Leyden, Amsterdam and Rotterdam, whence the Pilgrims sailed three centuries ago to the American wilderness where they might find "freedom to worthip God," will start on August 30, when committees from the United States and England will be received at the University of Leyden. Addresses commemorative of the occasion will be delivered by scolars from the three countries, including the rector of the university; Dr. Rendel Harris of Manchester, Eng., Viscount Bryce and a famous American, who has not yet been designated.

The next day, August 31, the birthiday of the queen of the Netherlands, will include, beside a congress in the town hall, a religious memorial service in the Pieterskirk in which the Rev. John Robinson, who led the separationists from the Church of England (the Pilgrims) to Holland in 1609, was buried.

One of the features of the holiday at Amsterdam on September 1, will be a meeting in the Rijksmuseum, the unveiling of a memorial window in the Bagijnekerk and a reception. The next day there will be an aquatic pageant in Rotterdam, the visitors traveling in the morning from Leyden to Delitshaven, if possible, by boat along the way the Pilgrims went. Then there will be trips to the religious havens of Rotterdam, a me morial service in the church at Delitshaven and at 7:00 p. m. the Englishaven and American contingents will depart for Southampton.

The celebration in England will start in May, 1920, with meetings in Scrooby, the home of Robinson, Austerfield, Boston and Sheffield. From August 4 to September 20 there will be ceremonies in Cambridge, Loudon, Southampton and other places, culminating in the sailing of the new Mayflower, which will carry the returning American committee and British and Dutch delegations who are to participate in the program on this side of the Atlantic.

Main events of the American celebration will be in Plymouth, Massand Boston, where historical pag.

bration will be in Plymouth, Mass and Boston, where historical pag-ants will be held, followed by a bi-reception in New York. 


This has been disclosed by a canwas of the 78 living exponents of German culture who signed the manifesto. This has just been conducted by Dr. Han Webberg.
