It is estimated that about 80,000 scres will be embraced in district No. 2.

The bonds voted for district No. 1 are to be sold in the market. These bonds will care for the entire costs of the project as bonds based on the values in District No. 2 could not be marketed except at a heavy discount. It is planned however that bonds will be voted in district No. 2 and that they shall be held in the treasury of District No. 1.

You can rest assigned that your private affairs will not be aired because all employes of the census bureau are jiable to a fine of \$1,000 and imprisonment for aclosing census information. This information will not pe available to anyone except to those duly authorized by the United States government.

Most of the questions which have been mentioned refer to persons living in cities and towns. For the persons living in rural sections there is a number of questions referring to livestock owned and to the business of farming and livestock raising. Animals are also counted in the census.
























AMERICAN CHICKENS

MAKING FRANCE GAYER.

BOISSONS, FRANCE, (By Mail.)

"American chickens make life a livite gayer in France," the peasants here say, regarding the efforts of the American Committee for Devastated France to aid the stricken people of the Aisne district.

And they meant it, too, for the proud clucking of hens and the lordly growing of roosters are the first sounds that greet the atourist when he visits the war-torn villages of the Aisne, valley. For the American committee has really carried out its slocan to "re-chickenize" France.

American dimes and quarters received here daily are going into the fund to put "pep" in the poultry business in France. In the last three months women wearing the French blue uniforms of the Committee for Devastated France distributed 8,451 chickens throughout the 100 towns in their charge. In addition they have established two chicken farms in the interior of France, capable of producing 2,000 chickens a month for use solely in the devastated regions.

Following the policy of the American committee to aid and not to pauperize the people of the Aisne, the chickens are sold at half-price, the present rate of sale being 10 francs. Money sent from America makes up the remainder of the cost price, incubators, moreover, are installed in a number of towns down



It was found that most of ndustries could resume operation in part, at least, immediately. Belts and other accessories of the industrial plants had in many cases been removed, but the deliberate wrecking of plants was shown to have been narrowly confined. The Germans had need of the output of various industries during the occupation and these had been carefully preserved. The greatest handicap was found in the

Inasmuch as Helgian steel and fron manufactures and other allied iron and steel products comprised over 12 per cent. of the total pro-war export trade of Belgiam, it is necessary for these industries to resume operations as soon as possible. Furthermore, as textile and other manufacturing plants have been sary for new snachines to be installed and it is desirable that the Belgian steel works should assist as much as possible in refitting these plants. Although the Belgian steel companies were in a very bad way, due to the destruction of most of their property, several mills could operate at the time of the Armistica and others have since been put in order. Some 10 or 12 of the largest steel companies in Belgium have undertaken the formation of a large steel corporation similar in plan to the United States Steel Corporation. Each of the plants, it is understood, will specialize in some particular branch of the steel industry. German prisoners have been used to advantage in clearing away the debris of ruined buildings and in other work. Many carloads of machinery and fatures taken away by the Germans have been freturned and set in operation. Recomployment of the workers at high wages has resulted in the withdrawal of public aid from nearly all of the 800,000 persons who were being assisted in November, 1918. Official reports indicate that the yield of this year's crops will not be much below that of normal pre-war years.

In the Beigian Congo there is an asset which will prove of increasing importance in the future development of Beigium's industries. In area the colony is eighty times as large as Belgium it-self. Although situated in equatorial Africa, its chinate is, on the whole, much more valubrious than that of most tropical countries, because the greater part of the country is a computatively

high plateau.
Among the surest evidences of a wise praparation for the juture development of the Congo is the official recognition of the fact that the foundation of a stable economic life and of enduring general prosperity there, must be found in agriculture. In 1910 the Government began a comprehensive program of agricultural education and experimenta-tion. Quite naturally, the development of the transportation system of the colony began with the utilization of the Congo River and its tributaries, the world's second largest river system, with about 10,000 miles of navigable water. In January, 1916, there were 1,165 miles of Congo railways in operation. Important additions to this mileage have been made.

The vast mineral weblih of the Congo includes copper, tin, gold, diamonds, iron, and coal. The chief mining interests are the copper properties in Ka-Only a small proportion of the total deposits are being worked, but the estimated output in 1918 was 40,000 tons. The colony's exports and imports in

1913 had a value of approximately \$25,000,000, and in 1916 the foreign trade exceeded \$38,000,000.

The depletion of man-power in Belgium during the war was not as great

proportionately as was experienced by most of the beligerent nations, for the sudden rush of the invasion made it impossible to mobilize a large number of the men of military age.



Possibly it was because at least one of the merging banks held the oldest national charter in the city and that the bank was, in point of size and importance, the first national that the award was made.

UNTIL GERMANS FINISH SWEEPING MINE FIELDS SHIPPING IS DANGEROUS

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Until the Ger-mans complete the sweeping of mines rields they laid in the North Sea there will be considerable danger to ship-ping in waters adjacent to the British ping in waters adjacent to the braisles, say British and American naval authorities. Even after that work has ended, which will not be earlier than next summer, there will be some danger which, they predict, will gradually diminish.
