LITTLE PEACE DOVE FLAPS WINGS OVER AMERICAN LEAGUE

NEW YORK, Dec. 30.—Once again the little peace dove has flapped his wings away from the American league yard.

The crumbs which were strewn about by Chicago parties several days ago attracted the little feathered one, but he lingered only a minute, being snatched away by a loud "no" from the quarters of the New York Yankees.

Some good angel with the interest of the game at heart, succeeded in getting Judge Landis to consent to act as mediator in the battle between President Johnson and the Ruppert Committee.

The insurgents were just about to agree to a peace meeting and submit their grievances to Judge Landis when Johnson cut loose with all his interlocking Chicago connections, several discourses in court that he had attempted to enlist the aid of the New York clubs in getting the Yankees out of the league.

Johnson, it will be remembered, maintained that instead of making an effort to have the Giants close, the gates of the Polo grounds to the Yankees, he made an effort to get a long lease from the National league owners.

This, he added, was impossible as the giant owners were displeased over an alleged statement from Colonel Huston that the National league was not doing its bit.

That statement of Johnson's caused a roar in the ranks of the insurgents and fanned the war embers to a blaze again.

Colonel Ruppert, part owner of the Yankees, charged that Johnson is straying into new paths and making an open effort to align the Giants against the Yankees.

The insurgents then came out with new grounds for mediation. They will allow anyone to "umpire" if, after the story is heard, the umpire will pass upon Johnson's fitness to reign.

If the umpire is not satisfied with the result of this demand, then the war will go on, the "rebels" claim.

HARVARD FOOTBALL TEAM IS ROUNDING INTO SHAPE

PASADENA, CALIF., Dec. 30.—Three daily periods of vigorous practice in exceptionally warm weather have removed what was considered superfluous weight carried by the Harvard football team when it arrived here to train for the game on New Year's day with the University of Oregon, and a change in its training program was looked for today.

Oregon's coaches are expected to devote its attention to defense tactics, which has been considered a possible point of weakness in the western team.

It has been pointed out that in only one game during the past season did the Oregonians prevent their opponents from scoring and that all of their victories were the result of superior attack.

Harvard players are hoping for cooler weather on New Year's day than has prevailed here for several days. They say even a rain would increase their chances for victory, though the Oregon team is notoriously familiar with muddy fields.

ODDS IN FAVOR OF THE HARVARD TEAM

PASADENA, CALIF., Dec. 30.—An influx of Harvard fans here today shifted odds slightly in favor of the Harvard football team in its New Year battle with Oregon university.

Both teams complained of the heat today and in anticipation of a hot afternoon Jan. 1, the time for the game was set back an hour. Neither team has seen the other in practice, but reports have leaked from both camps. As a result there were rumors of a last minute change in tactics for both squads.

This afternoon was to see the last night strenuous workout for the two teams. Light signal work was to be the program for Wednesday.

BULL FIGHTING IS AGAIN THE POPULAR SPORT IN MEXICO

CITY OF MEXICO, (By Mail).—Bangles, blades, eighteen thousand Mexican throats tested the full capacity of eighteen thousand pairs of Mexican lungs, a gale swung up on one side of the pit and a snorting bull, its head reaching five or six feet, rushed out into the full glare of an afternoon sun. The bull fight had returned to Mexico City.

Back in 1915, the Carranza government barred the bull fight from the federal district, in which the Mexican capital is located. And for four years the public had been clamoring for its revival. The authorities finally relented. A proposition time for its return, they decided, was during the visit here of the marines and naval officers from Argentina, Uruguay and Cuba, who came to Mexico with their warships as an escort to the body of the Mexican poet, Amado Nervo, who died while on a diplomatic mission to South America. So the bull fighting, in a way, was in their honor.

But more than that it was to appease the demand of the Mexican public. The public, however, has not been appeased. In an effort to be humane, the authorities ruled that the bulls should contain all the trimmings of a regular finish fight—except that the bull should not be killed. And anybody knows that to spare the bull means all the thrill from any torero. Anyway, the bull escaped the slaughter house, but in their crusade for humanity the authorities overlooked the fact that the bulls, pitiful victims of a bull's-eye, were killed during the afternoon. But that's part of the game, and always has been.

ATTRACTIVE PROGRAM FOR GUN CLUB SHOOT

Secretary Nabb has an attractive program of 100 targets arranged for New Year's Day, shooting to start promptly at 9:30 a. m. There will be five events of 20 targets each, with an entrance fee of \$2.00 for each event, targets additional. The two dollars in each event will be divided 50, 30 and 20 per cent. The total entrance fee for the 100 target program will be \$12.00, which will include targets and money and prizes.

For high gun the club will give a fine big gander, and for some lucky shooter the squawking mate of the unfortunate gander. Just how this goose will be awarded will remain a mystery until the morning of the shoot, but suffice to say that the award will be fairly made, and that all will have an equal chance to win, as luck will determine the winner—not shooting skill.

JUDGE GARY INTIMATES THAT HE IS NOT IN ACCORD WITH SUGGESTIONS OF COMMISSION

NEW YORK, Dec. 30. — "Comprehensive laws, rather than voluntary arbitration, are necessary to absolutely protect every one against imposition on the part of capital or labor," Judge Albert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, declared in a statement today.

Judge Gary plainly intimated he was not entirely in accord with the recommendations made yesterday by President Wilson's industrial conference for settlement of disputes between capital and labor. He was a member of the previous group that attempted to make recommendations for solution of the industrial problems.

The steel magnate referred to the present labor union disputes as "disputes between labor union leaders and managers of business." He declared: "The public must know that labor unions have 'decreased production' added to costs and raised the expense of living. It ventures the assertion that if the public is disposed to absolutely protect every one against imposition on the part of capital or labor, it should not depend upon voluntary arbitration, but should establish an administrative law which will have complete jurisdiction over both groups of citizens," he said.

"The public could then rely upon the continuance, without interruption of the enforcement of law and order, so that every individual or interest shall be protected in freedom of action or non-action, so long as there is no opposition to the status in force."

"The employers and the body of the employees clearly recognize that it is for the pecuniary interest of both to maintain peaceful and friendly relations, and every honest minded person admits this will redound to the benefit and comfort of the general public."

"At this time I think it essential that the general public be given the opportunity to clearly understand the great labor situation. In the United States it is not so hard as it is made to appear by some of the public speakers and writers, particularly those who are not by experience or otherwise qualified, to testify or to express opinions."

"There have been instituted in the past year a good many strikes and there have been in place, disorder, riot and injury to person and property. These strikes did not represent antagonism between capital and labor, so-called; in most if not all instances they were precipitated by union labor leaders acting on their own initiative. The differences, disputes and contentions have been between labor union leaders and the managers of business."

"In few, if any cases have there been any serious trouble between the managers of industry and the employees generally, or any reasonable claims on the part of the majority of the employees for higher wages or more favorable living conditions, which were promptly and mutually adjusted. In fact, for a long time the employees in this country have been receiving larger compensation and better working and living conditions than ever before. The large majority of the employees of this country, probably not less than 85 per cent, are not members of labor unions and are satisfied with their working conditions."

"If any have good reason for complaint, the employers, when informed, must and will furnish a prompt and adequate remedy. I do not wish at this time to discuss the merits or demerits of labor unions. The public generally must know in the past they have, in proportion to their influence,

decreased production, added to costs and raised the expense of living."

Judge Gary, in his only direct reference to the industrial commission's suggestions for a tribunal to arbitrate disputes and 12 regional boards to investigate labor differences, said:

"I have little to say at present concerning the plan for settlement of labor disputes," reported by President Wilson's conference. "I shall endeavor to take time to go over it carefully before reaching a final conclusion. It is to be hoped that whatever organization shall be agreed upon it will be made up of competent, disinterested and unprejudiced men who will secure the confidence of the entire public, and that serious industrial disputes may be avoided as the result."

GOING INTO SILENCE POPULAR IN ENGLAND.

LONDON. (By Mail).—"Going into the silence is becoming a popular indoor sport in the United Kingdom. The game is played usually between married couples who find themselves chafing under the heavy yoke of matrimony. It is a game which has not yet reached the divorce court stage."

Since the introduction into court of the silence in the case of Mrs. Florence Hill against her husband, G. J. Hill, in which it was held that the couple had lived three years without mutual conversation, cases of speechless matrimony have multiplied.

Someone with a good memory brought out the fact that Daniel Defoe maintained the silence in his home for something like a quarter of a century while he wrote Robinson Crusoe and some of his other works.

Other cases have been recalled in which couples who found the daily strain of a breakfast-table conversation too much for them have resorted to the "in response to yours of the 29th ultimo" form of communication.

IRELAND GENERALLY ACCEPTS THEORY OF LIEUTENANT'S DEATH

DUBLIN, Dec. 30. — Ireland today generally was inclined to accept the verdict of the coroner's jury that Lieutenant Boat, shot in a fight on the grounds of the vice regent's lodge early Sunday, was killed by his own men.

The public also expressed indignation at the killing of Laurence Kennedy, agreeing with the verdict of the coroner's jury, which said:

"We find Kennedy was killed while on his way home, by a military patrol. We tender our deepest sympathy to his relatives."

Late testimony in the inquest indicated a possible attempt at attack upon the lodge of Viscount French, lord lieutenant of Ireland, but testimony was so conflicting that many persons were inclined to doubt that any movement of importance against the lodge was under way.

The Boat verdict presumably was reached because no revolver was found near Kennedy's body to substantiate the soldier's statement that Kennedy fired on Boat before he was shot down by the guard.

Soldiers who accompanied the lieutenant clung to their story that they came upon a group of six men while patrolling the grounds. Corporal Rolleston said that while he did not actually see Kennedy fire at Boat, he saw the civilian put his hand in his pocket and that a flash of fire followed.

Two other soldiers swore they saw Kennedy draw a revolver and fire at Boat. One soldier said Kennedy fired at him before he was killed.

Three civilians, arrested on the grounds soon after the fight, established their innocence and were released.

ITALIAN SENATE VOTES CONFIDENCE IN THE CABINET

ROME, Dec. 30.—The Senate late today voted confidence in the cabinet; 117 to 13. The vote followed a lengthy explanation of the recent London conference by Vittorio Scialoja, foreign minister, and a speech on the international situation by Premier Nitti.

When Premier Lloyd George of Great Britain informed him of the contents of the allied memorandum to Italy, the foreign minister said he replied: "I refuse to accept it."

The British premier then agreed he would not press Scialoja for acceptance. Scialoja added:

The memorandum may or may not

turn out to be of importance, the foreign minister added, but he said he considered "the verbal assurance which accompanied it as minimizing its importance."
