ADITORIAL.

Silk, properly speaking, is made not of yarns but of threads. The reason for this distinction lies in the fact that the silk worm produces a very fine filament, often hundreds of yards in length, in which it encases itself. This filament which forms the silk worm's cocoon is softened with others, in water. Then it is started to be unwrapped, and the filaments from several cocoons are recled together commonly, adhering to each other as they are wound ap. That is, the filaments from several cocoons are combined, becoming one strand of raw silk. As such, it is shipped to this country, where it is formed into the ordinary silk thread by throwsters. The "throwing" process consists of combining strands of raw silk and twisting it, to form thread of the desired size and weight. Organzine is slik used for the wark of fabrics, and is virtually several raw silk threads well twisted together. Tram is silk used for the filling of fabrics, and is made of raw silk doubled and twisted. It is hardly as strong as the orgazine or warp threads. The warp threads run lengthwise of a textile, and the filling threads run crosswise.






