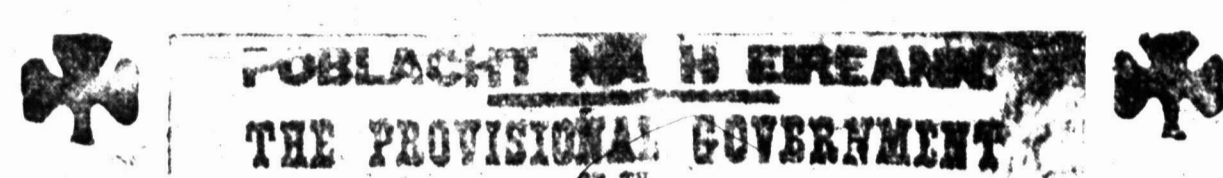

SCHOOL AND PAVING BONDS TO BE VOTED

Elections Will Be Held Tomorrow And Large Majority For Issues is Expected

Bonds for two important public improvements, paved streets and school buildings, are to be voted upon tomorrow by the taxpayers of Wichita Falls and the Wichita Falls Independent school district. The paving bond issue is \$40,000 and that for the schools is \$25,000.

While no opposition to either bond issue has been apparent, and there is little doubt that both will carry by the substantial majorities that are usually recorded in such elections, officials are anxious for as large a vote as possible. It is easier to sell bonds where the majority is large and an endorsement as nearly unanimous as possible is desired.

Neither bond-issue will result in any increase over the present tax rate. It is pointed out that the polls will open at 8 o'clock and close at 7; the saloons will remain closed throughout the day.

There will be two voting boxes in the paving bond election, but all voters in the school bond election will cast their ballots at the city hall. Taxpayers who vote at the court house box and wish to vote for both bond issues, must vote for the paving bonds at the court house and then go to the city hall box to vote for the school bonds.

COUNTY OFFICIALS HAVE "MOVING DAY"

Are Going Into Quarters in Temporary Structures—Little Time Being Lost

The haunts of county officials for county seat of government for so long today, as the county officers moved their desks and effects to the temporary court house on the north side of the court house square on Wednesday or Thursday it was expected that the structure which has been this county's seat of government for so many years, practically ever since the county was organized, would be empty and ready for the razing process. The offices were being moved to-day as expeditiously as possible and every effort was made to prevent interruption of duties. In the temporary building some of the officials will have rather cramped quarters, but all are willing to undergo passing inconvenience under the circumstances.

EXAMINATION WEEK IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Session Now Nearing Its Close. Seniors Await Results of Their Examinations.

Examinations are the order of the day in the public schools this week, classwork having ended for the session. The schools will close Friday for the summer.

At the high school, the prospective graduates have already had their examinations and are awaiting announcement as to their fate. Some of the 28 who are scheduled to receive diplomas next Monday night may not do so as a result of the examinations, some of which were said to be particularly severe.

A large number of ward school pupils will "graduate" to the high school at the close of the session and unless the contemplated addition is completed by the beginning of next term, the problem of finding room for them all will be a serious one.

BELIEVE CAPTURE OF VERDUN CERTAIN

Most Germans Confident Fortress Will Eventually Fall, in Spite of Setbacks.

Berlin, May 22—Germans regard the fall of Verdun as one of the certainties of this war. They have, however, no extravagant ideas that the taking of the French citadel will result in the collapse of the allies.

Despite announcement of Paris and London that the German offensive at Verdun has ended definitely in defeat the German lines continue to draw more tightly about the fortress. No such rapid gains as in the early days of the offensive have been made, nor are they expected. But the steady nibbling process is slowly wearing away the French defense northwest of Verdun.

It is confidently believed here that the whole of the French works centering about Hill 304 and Dead Man's Hill will be in German hands before long.

Exactly how many men are now engaged on each side at Verdun is at present a mystery. Seven weeks ago the French strength was estimated at about 350,000 by Argentine and Swiss military observations with the Crown Prince's army. The size of the German army could not be estimated, but it was stated that it was perhaps two or three times as large as the proposed new American standing army.

Everything is moving systematically. There is less excitement at the front than in the cafe-debating societies in Berlin, where some ardent conversationalists can figure out just how Verdun's capture will be the turning point of the war. They may believe it, but they would be unable to vaccinate that idea on the Crown Prince's army who are doing the fighting.

While well-informed Germans do not believe that Verdun's fall will by any means bring the end of the war, they are convinced that such constant hammering at the French, while the Austrians are pushing their way into Italy and the British and Russians are being held firmly by the Germans, is bringing them nearer a final victory.

Tersely interpreted, President Wilson's last note or reply to Germany reads something like this to us: "We will not mix our case of murder against Germany with our case of larceny against Great Britain, but will treat the two cases, separately. Responsibility in such matters is single, not joint, absolute, not relative, and so long as Germany conducts her submarine operations as she has during the past few weeks our relations will continue cordial. But the willful murder of another American citizen by Germany will be the cause of severing completely so far as possible, our diplomatic relations with that country." Of course, the President did not say it in just that language, but in language more diplomatic and perhaps more stronger. But Germany seems to have understood his meaning, and the indications are now that she is not going to insist or make it a condition that if she complies with the demands of the United States this country shall in turn require Great Britain to comply with Germany's desires.

It now looks like Justice Hughes is to be the Republican's choice for the presidential nomination at Chicago convention to be held on June 6th. According to a poll made by the New York Herald Hughes lacks only forty-one votes of having a majority of the delegates that are to compose that convention. Roosevelt, in the matter of instructed votes, comes next to Hughes. Therefore it is pretty safe to say that if it is not Hughes, then it will be Roosevelt. Of the two, Hughes seems to be preferred by the Republicans—not so much for what he has done, or the record he has made in politics, but for the lack of a political record, for it must be remembered that Mr. Hughes, since his elevation out of politics to the supreme bench, has not mixed in political matters for the past five or six years. For that very reason, Republicans high in the councils of the G. O. P. argue and contend that if they nominate Hughes the party will have a fighting chance to elect their ticket. And again, they contend, Hughes is about the only candidate the Republicans and Progressives can unite on. But should Hughes refuse to allow his name to go before the convention, which is hardly likely, then it is almost certain that Roosevelt will be the Republican nominee.

There are thousands of Democrats in Texas who are interested in the race for the U. S. senatorship but have not yet fully determined who they want

to support. A great majority, however, have made up their minds fully to vote against Ex-Gov. O. B. Colquitt, who has left nothing unsaid or done that would have a tendency to discredit the only Democratic President the party has elected since Cleveland. That Colquitt has a strong support, no one who is posted will dispute. And furthermore, it can be asserted with safety, that at least 90 per cent of the votes that will be polled for him in the July primaries will be the votes of men who have never been enthusiastic in their support of President Wilson. That he is entitled to this support no one will hardly deny. He certainly has said and done enough to solidify and bring over to his support all anti-administration Democrats, and so far as the Times is concerned, it is perfectly willing that he should have them. But the point The Times is trying to make here is that as between Culberson, Campbell, Henry and Brooks, the four candidates for the U. S. senatorship, who are strong supporters of President Wilson, the administration Democrats are considerably divided, while the anti-

administration Democrats are almost a unit in their support of Colquitt. That makes it almost certain no one of the half dozen candidates for the U. S. senatorship is going to get a majority in the first primary, and that being the case the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will have to run off in a second primary. This makes it almost certain that if Colquitt secures what he has so strongly played for, the combined supporters of all anti-administration Democrats, he will be in the run-off contest. But really, there need be but little cause for worry. What the Wilson or administration Democrats will do for him in the second primary will be sufficient to put him out of Democratic politics for all time to come.

The politicians are gathering at San Antonio today and at this distance it begins to look as if Governor Ferguson was not going to be allowed the privilege of dictating to the convention who it shall name for national committee man and at the same time have himself sent as a delegate at large to the national convention at St. Louis. So far as this paper has been able to make observations the Democrats of Texas are going to select their representatives to the national convention without consulting Governor Ferguson as to who they shall be, and they are going to select their representative on The National Democratic Committee in the same way. Governor Ferguson may be one of the delegates at large to the national convention, and perhaps is entitled to that honor. But if he should fail to have this honor conferred on him it will be due to his own acts in making an attempt to dictate who the

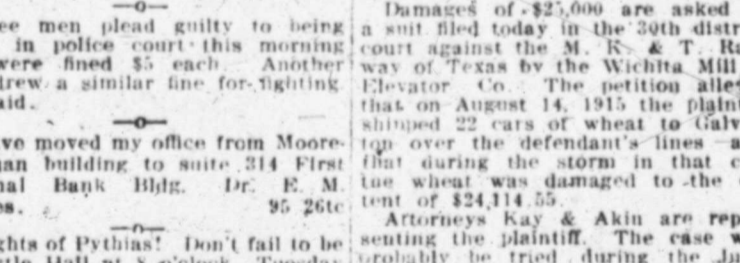
