Leading Progressives declared Roosevelt would be nominated by the Progressive convention regardless of what was done by the Republicans. William Allen White, of Kansas insisted that Roosevelt would be nominated before midnight tonight and that Governor Johnson would be nominated for vice president.

However, the word went out that a peace conference between responsible leaders in both parties might be begun before nightfall. The menu was planned scientifically, Mrs. Fine says it is just as easy to do things scientifically if one knows how and it's a whole lot easier on the stomach, especially in summer time. There was a meat loafnamed in the recipe "Filipino Loaf" served hot with a tomato seuce just piquantly flavored enough to make it tempting to the summer painte which is somewhat faded.
