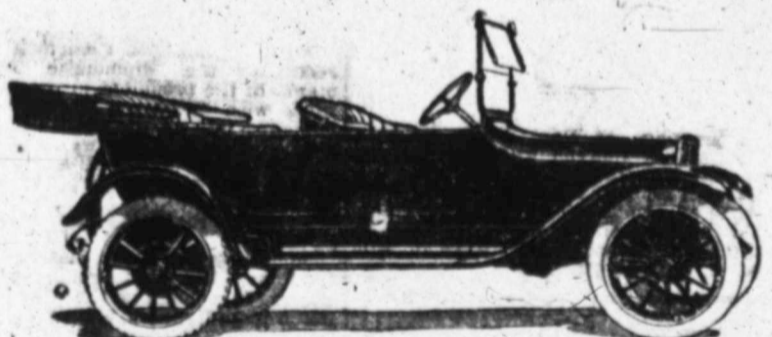

## HARD WINDSTORM DOES SOME DAMAGE

Rain Falls Throughout This Section—Haskell Oil Mill Hit By Lightning

Wichita Falls and surrounding country was visited by a hard rain of about an hour's duration last night. The rain was accompanied by a vivid electrical display and a hard wind-storm, with some hail, but so far as known this morning no damage was done locally. The precipitation at this point amounted to half an inch. That the rain was of a general character is attested by reports of rain from points all over north and central Texas. Rains at all points along the Denver from Dalhart to Fort Worth, along the Katy from Whitesboro to their northern terminus, on the Newcastle branch of the Katy and throughout the Wichita Valley were reported this morning. A high wind prevailed at several points in Oklahoma, but no damage is reported except at Frederick, where considerable damage is reported, but the extent is not known.

At Haskell the oil mill was struck by lightning resulting in the loss of the mill house, several other outbuildings, and also the burning of four cars that were loading there. The company has about 1000 tons of cotton seed meal, cotton seed and hulls. While the monetary loss has not been estimated, yet it will amount high into the thousands.

Besides Wichita Falls, hail is also reported from Goodnight, Washburn, Anson and Abilene. No damage was incurred on this account according to the dispatches.

The storm was very vigorous locally and some folks did not hesitate to make for their storm cellars when the wind was at its worst. Clouds of dust preceded the rain.

Some derricks were blown over in the oil fields, but the damage was not extensive.

## GALLOWS BUILT IN FOR DEATH PENALTY

Jail Already Equipped For Executions—Movement to Commute Thompson Sentence

If, as now seems more probable than before, the negro Charles Thompson has to pay the death penalty, the execution will take place on the gallows in the county jail, placed there when the jail was built for just such an emergency. On the north side of the building, between the second and third floors, is a trap door with a hook in the ceiling to which to attach the rope.

The trap door is so situated that only a few persons could witness the hanging, the room being out of sight of the prisoners' quarters. The contrivance was built into the structure when the building was put up, for although Wichita county had never had a legal hanging up to that time, the possibility that there might be need for a gallows in later years was not overlooked.

It is not yet certain, of course, that Thompson will be called upon to pay the extreme penalty, as his attorneys, Mathis & Somerville, will make an effort to have the sentence commuted to life imprisonment. They are planning to go to the governor if it is expected that the matter will be referred by him to the board of pardons, which would investigate the case to determine if there are any elements to justify setting aside the death penalty. The fact that no one actually witnessed the killing of the framed woman, whose death resulted in the murder charge against Thompson, is expected to be a strong point for those urging commutation.

Baseball will be a feature of the Fourth of July celebration at Lake Wichita, with the team from Anson, Texas, coming here for three games. The Anson team is captained by Bobby Myers, well known to local fans, he having been a member of the team which landed two championships in the old Texas-Oklahoma league.

The Ansonites will play Burkhardt on Sunday, July 2, a picked local team on July 3 and Electra on July 4, all the games to be at the lake park. The local team will be made up of the best players from the several nines now organized here.

The baseball games will be just one part of the July Fourth observance at the lake. Starting at 10 o'clock and continuing until late at night there will be a special attraction every hour and arrangements are now being made for some real stunts for the occasion. Fireworks at night will be provided.

Colonel Roosevelt's statement that he is "out of politics" hasn't altogether stopped conjecture about what his next political move will be.

Delegates to the democratic national convention Wednesday walked through a "golden lane," made by 8,000 suffragists dressed in yellow, on their way to the convention hall. It is not recorded whether Reporter W. J. Bryan reached the hall by a side street or not.

Recent events are proving that about the most unhealthy thing a Villa bandit can do is to attempt to make a raid across the border. There is now a different state of preparedness along the border than existed several months ago and the bandit who crosses the Rio Grande is taking a desperate chance of not getting back.

Speaking about preparedness, it appears that the Associated Press was a whole lot better prepared for the Columbus, New Mexico raid than was the United States army. The "Service Bulletin" of the Associated Press tells the story of how the raid was covered by it and explains how it was that the Associated Press carried, not only the first news of the raid but a detailed story within a few hours. It appears that the Associated Press representative stationed at El Paso received reports of the movements of the Villa bandites toward the border he was led to believe that they intended to strike at Columbus. The day before the raid this representative of the Associated Press, accompanied by his own telegraph operator, reached Columbus and arranged for the use of a wire in event of a raid. The next morning when the raid was actually attempted the Associated Press man and his operator helped repair the Mexicans and succored the wounded and then opened the wire to El Paso and began to send their story. Had the troops stationed at Columbus been as well prepared as the Associated Press it would have been a different story that the wires carried from Columbus that morning.

The Texas delegation to the national democratic convention at St. Louis selected Judge Poindexter national committeeman over Tom Love by a vote of 23 1/2 to 16. Love will carry his appeal to the new national committee. It has been pointed out by Poindexter's partisans that the action of the state democratic convention at San Antonio was merely an endorsement and that the delegation to the St. Louis convention actually selected the committeemen. This situation raises an interesting question. Suppose that the national committee finds that Love did receive a majority of the votes in the San Antonio convention. It will then be up to the Texas delegation to back up on its selection of Poindexter or to be prepared in the attitude of disregarding the endorsement of the San Antonio convention. While the officials of the convention might have failed to record Love votes at San Antonio, as it is charged they did, it is hard to believe that they would dare public opinion in Texas by refusing to accept the endorsement of the state convention.

A reader of the Times has submitted the following, clipped from the National monthly, and written by Senator

James A. Reed, as being most timely and to the point:

"Anything to regain power." This is to be the republican slogan! To party success everything is to be subordinated. Principles are to be sacrificed; funds expended; enemies forgotten; branches healed and resources mobilized. The fire is to be centered on Wilson. The policy is to be one of mooning on everything he does or proposes the republican managers vote "no!"

If he invades Mexico, he is denounced for an unjustified attack. If he does not make war upon Mexico, he is indicted for permitting the murder of American citizens, and is characterized as pusillanimous.

If his European diplomacy becomes militant, they shout lustily, "He is about to plunge us into the vortex of the great conflict." If he strives for peace, he is charged with the surrender of national honor.

Thus, whatever is done is met with criticism.

No President has ever been confronted with problems so difficult as those Mr. Wilson has been obliged to meet. The most delicate and intricate questions of diplomacy have daily arisen. We are not dealing with nations acting coolly and deliberately, but rather with powers engaged in a contest so desperate as almost to dethrone reason and so circumstantially that they are often practically unable to comply with our just demands. Many of the circumstances involved, can not even be made public.

Under such conditions it would seem that every American citizen should feel called upon to give support to the government. Unfortunately, it is not so. Republican politicians are seeking to gain some sign of political vanity accordingly they prefer criticism to support.

About the cheapest and easiest thing in the world is to play critic. A dog sitting in the glorious light of the moon can bay the celestial orb; a cartoon crow can cast maledictions on the lark's sweet song; a barn-yard fowl greet with discordant cackling the people engaged in the battle fields of Europe; but because the Allies are fighting in the interest of humanity.

Shall we answer this question in the affirmative? Shall the American people plunge into the European war? Shall we enlist four or five million of the flower of our youth? Shall we send them to die by hundreds of thousands upon the battle fields of Europe? Shall we sprinkle the lintels of the doors of American homes with the blood of our slaughtered sons? Shall we fill the land with widows and burden the air with the lamentations of orphans? Shall we involve our country in a debt mounting high into the billions? Shall we paralyze our industries, destroy our trade, beggar our people, mortgage the future and arrest America's march of social and industrial empire? Shall we do all this for the mere quarrel of European monarchs? The alternative is that we shall continue to adhere to the ancient policy of the government, keep ourselves free from all foreign entanglements, protect and preserve our own liberties, extend domestic and foreign commerce, create new markets, conserve our energies, establish friendly relations with all countries, strengthen the ties of amity that bind us to the republics of the western hemisphere, and contribute to the final establishment of a world peace.

Above all, we shall preserve the lives of American boys—we shall not fill our land with crippled men and bereaved women.

constitutional amendment giving women the right to vote.

While opinion is divided, there were predictions made that the democratic party would go at least as far as the republican party and probably a little further by making a strong declaration in favor of the principle of woman's suffrage. The suffragists expressed confidence in getting strong recognition for their cause.

There have been several tariff plank submitted to the resolutions committee and Representative Rainey has been asked to write what is expected to be the final draft. Consideration will be given to a plank favoring government aid for terminal warehouses for storing, grading, and weighing non-perishable farm products. It was said such a plank would benefit the farmers of the south.

Dried Fruit, Syrup and Canned Goods

Three wagonloads of condemned groceries were consigned to the flames at the city incinerator this afternoon after Dr. J. T. Taylor, city inspector, had found them unfit for human consumption. A large quantity of dried peaches and prunes, syrup and canned goods was condemned and ordered burned. Worms were found in the fruit, while the syrup and canned goods had fermented and otherwise become undesirable for eating.

The goods were found at the same place where state pure food officials a few weeks ago condemned over 5,000 pounds of dried fruit.

JAMES TELLS HOW WILSON KEPT PEACE

The delegates, still bubbling over with enthusiasm from his speech of yesterday, gave him a rousing reception. Archbishop John J. Glennau then offered prayer. The delegates joined with the archbishop when he closed his petition with the Lord's Prayer. The credentials committee then reported on the delegate contest from Washington, D. C., Porto Rico and Hawaii. The delegates from the District of Columbia and Hawaii were recognized as places on the rolls by the national committee. Porto Rico was divided between the contesting delegates. The report of the committee on permanent organization was adopted. The announcement of names of permanent convention officers was cheered.

JAMES IN DEFENSE OF WILSON'S FOREIGN POLICY

By Associated Press. St. Louis, Mo., June 15.—The achievements of the Wilson administration in enacting beneficial legislation and in keeping the country at peace without sacrifice of the national honor were pronounced epoch-making in American history by Senator James of Kentucky in his address today as permanent chairman of the democratic national convention.

"During three years of its national control," said Senator James, "democracy has enacted into law more progressive remedial legislation than the nation has ever had written upon its statute books since the Civil War. In former national contests in the last two decades our party came as a prophet. Today we come with deeds, not words; with performance, not promise. The democratic party kept its word with the American people. We have made good."

The chairman reviewed at length the legislative record of the administration and eulogized the president for his direction of foreign affairs. The democrats, he said, had enacted a tariff of law under which the country was curbed and unexampled prosperity attained; a banking law taking the money control out of the hands of an oligarchy and making panics no longer possible; and many reform measures of lesser importance.

He declared President Wilson's Mexican policy and his course in protecting American rights against the encroachments of European belligerents had shown all the world that the president "neither bullies the weak nor fears the strong."

In a concluding appeal for the triumph of patriotism above politics, Senator James said the renomination of such a president in partisan convention ought not to be necessary, and that to discredit him might pay the hand that could write the peace treaty of the world.

At the outset the senator referred briefly to "Prose" Wilson's campaign against lobbying in Congress and pointed out that under this administration the constitution had been amended for the first time since the Civil War when "we freed the Senate from the control of the great interests by making it elective by the people at the polls." He then eulogized the "understanding" tariff act as one of which the party was justly proud.

"Not a schedule in it fosters a monopoly," he said. "Our republican friends told us, it would close the factories, all the streets with idle men, produce a panic, create soup houses and distress would reign everywhere; but we rejoice today to point to an unexampled prosperity in the nation with labor more generally employed, at higher rates, shorter hours, and better conditions than ever before. Our republican friends told us, if we passed the war is over poor, stricken, prostrate, torn, bleeding Europe will take our home market from us. I have no such fear. America is going to take the markets of the world. But we shall cut from them the last hope of having even a false issue, for we shall pass a bill creating a tariff board to gather the facts created by new war conditions."

Turning to the federal reserve law, Senator James declared that it alone averted a panic at the outbreak of the European war.

"What would have been the result if the old republican system had been in effect? It would close the world's exchanges in every city in the world were closed. Europe poured its vast holdings in plethoric streams upon our shores. Who thinks that an old republican system of finance under the guidance of those patriotic guardians would have been able to withstand this mighty cataclysm? But what was the result? Not a bank closed its doors; not a laborer was thrown out of employment; not a business was forced into bankruptcy; but there stood strong, serving the masses of mankind, this great legislative achievement of the Democratic party. As the master achievement of Woodrow Wilson, to my mind, next to keeping a hundred million people at peace with the world, the historian will record the federal reserve law."

Declaring that "self defense and preparation for it is as necessary now as ever before," the speaker pointed to the administration's preparedness program as a proof that the party believed in "preparedness without militarism."

"In 1906," he continued, "I attended the great peace conference held in London. I thought that the millennium of peace had come and such a thing as the world's war was impossible, but that day when the Christian heart shall rule the world is not in sight. We must not mistake dishonor for peace. We can not make any peace for peace. Woodrow Wilson and the democratic party advocate an army big enough to make aggressive think twice before they strike a blow. Democracy wants an army and a navy in keeping with the dignity, preservation, and worth of this great republic. We do not want a foot of anybody else's soil, and, by the eternal God, they shall not take a foot of ours."

"During this administration we have done more to build up an army and navy in three years than the republican party did in forty years of its existence. More has been done to give the American people a navy and army in three months than Colonel Roosevelt and Mr. Taft did in eleven years."

Senator James spoke of the republican platform declaration for "a judicious policy of national defense," declaring that only two propositions for a continuous policy ever had been made in American history. One by the general board of the navy in 1903, which was pigeon-holed by a republican secretary of the navy, and the other by President Wilson in his address to Congress last December.

"But what happened when this matter was under consideration in the naval affairs committee of the House?" continued the senator. "Every republican member on the committee decided to oppose the president's continuous program and would vote for no program at all that next year. After sixteen years of failure, even to let the public know of the 'continuous policy' proposed by naval experts, and after the republicans on the house naval affairs committee, in June, 1916, unanimously opposed the president's policy, they say they favor the 'continuous policy.'"

The republican plank, declaring for "an effective system of rural credits as opposed to the ineffective law proposed by present democratic administration," was assailed by Senator James, who declared that almost every republican in the House and Senate had voted for the administration's rural credits bill and that none had charged that it was ineffective or had proposed a substitute.

The senator also replied to republican criticism of the administration's shipping bill which, he declared would have given the United States an adequate merchant marine by now had it not been killed at the last session of Congress by a republican filibuster.

"For the first time in the history of our country," said Senator James, "after reviewing present democratic legislation which he declared had made prosperity possible, 'the United States leads the world in exports. We are more prosperous than ever, and mills which have not turned a spindle for years are now busy. All the laborers of the United States are employed as never before. With the world-war raging, our country is the only neutral one that is not in distress and the only one that has not declared a moratorium. Every day the world of the stress of war, the democratic party has met quickly. We have freed business from the blackmail of the politician as we have emancipated it from the clutch of monopoly."

The senator likened President Wilson's Mexican policy to that of Lincoln, and quoted from a declaration of the latter to show that he had declined to intervene when conditions were much the same as now.

"It is a perfectly easy thing," he continued, "for the president of the United States to plunge his country into war if he is a politician before he is a patriot. He would seek his own re-election as he came upon horseback up the bloody highway of contending armies. Of course our army could invade Mexico and march in triumph to its capital, but after the war we would have an army of widows and orphans, an army of cripples and men broken in health, an army of pensioners, and an army of collectors gathering up the earnings of the people to pay the great war debt."

The president had acted quickly, the senator said, when there was an invasion of American territory, and the punitive expedition now was doing all that this country could do with honor in Mexico.

"No president during the life of this republic," said the senator, "has ever had to deal with so many delicate and dangerous problems as those which have confronted President Wilson. With more than half of the world in arms in Europe, with Mexico in revolution and complicating problems have confronted him almost daily, and he has handled them as becomes a patriot and a statesman. When the Lusitania was sunk the militant voice of Theodore Roosevelt cried out for war, and if he had been president of the United States at that time, today 500,000 brave American sons would be contending around the forts of Verdun in this mighty maelstrom of blood and ditches. Our president, patient, patriotic, far-sighted, the real statesman, handled this question with the greatest ability, and won for America its greatest diplomatic victory. There are happily two kinds of courage, the courage of the man who is willing to undertake the dangers himself and the courage of the man that sends others to the conflict. Woodrow Wilson has both kinds of courage—the courage to undertake the dangers himself and the courage to send others to the conflict when the lives of others—the fate of a nation—were at stake."

"Four years ago we seemingly called Woodrow Wilson the school teacher. Today he is the world teacher. His subject is the protection of American and American rights under international law. And without orphaning a single American child, without widowing a single American mother, without bringing a single gun, he has won the military and the peace that ever brooded above a battlefield, an acknowledgment of American rights and an agreement to American laws. He has devoted himself to that lofty but lowly endeavor, occupied by George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and Woodrow Wilson, the

three worst abused and best loved Americans the republic ever grew."
