





GROUP "A" shall include the following New Farm Machinery

#### GROUP "B" - Machinery and Equipment -

All other machinery not in Group A or in Group C, is included in Group B. This group is covered by WPB Limitation Order No. L-26, with which many of you are familiar.

To secure machinery under Order No. L-26, it is necessary for the purchaser to certify his need by his signature on one of these orders — but the Ration Board certificate is not required at the present time.

'Each farmer desiring to purchase machinery or equipment in Group A will file an application with his County Rationing Committee. The County Rationing Committee will consider each application or disapprove it. If an application is approved a purchase certificate will be issued to the applicant authorizing him to purchase the equipment. The purchase may be made from the dealer named in the application or from any other dealer.

### The County Rationing Committee is Authorized to Approve Applications Only if it is Evident that:

- 1. The Applicant's present equipment cannot handle the increased production or new production planned and needed as a contribution to the current agricultural need.
- 2. The applicant cannot meet his equipment needs by repairing his old equipment, by purchasing or renting used equipment, by custom work, by exchange or work or equipment, or by any other means.
- 3. The Failure to approve the application would result in a substantial reduction in the production of crops or commodities essential to the war effort, and
- 4. The machinery or equipment will perform more than one average service for similar machinery or equipment in the community.

#### The County Committee Shall Disapprove an Application for One or More of the Following Reasons:

- 1. The applicant is able to have repaired and made serviceable the machinery and equipment which he proposes to replace;
- The applicant refuses to turn in the machinery and equipment which he proposes to replace;
- 3. The applicant has not named in his application a dealer from whom he can purchase the new farm machinery and equipment;
- The applicant wants to change from horse power or mule power to motor power and has not given a satisfactory reason for the change: 5. The applicant wants to change from hand labor to machinery and
- has not given a satisfactory reason for same;
- 6. The applicant refuses to rent or let others use the new machinery and equipment on such terms and conditions as the County Rationing Committee may deem necessary.

If the application is approved, a non-transferable certificate for the purchase of new farm equipment is prepared in triplicate and two copies mailed to the aplicant. This certificate will be known as form MR-3. The equipment authorized must be purchased within 10 days after the date the certificate is granted.

No sales of machines listed in Group A may be sold or delivered after today (Sept. 17) unless purchaser has a purchase certificate. If a machine has been sold and has even been paid for but has not been delivered, it is understood that the purchaser must now make an application and be given a purchase certificate before the dealer will be permitted to make delivery of the order.

#### GROUP "C" included Hand Tools-----

Hoes, Rakes, Forks, Seythes, Shovels, and All hand operated and oneand two-horse drawn farm machinery end equipment not included in Group A.

There are no Restrictions whatever on Repair Parts . . . or on Items in Group C. Neither are there any restrictions on the sale of Used Farm Machinery and Equipment! However, this does not mean we can always get repairs without delay.
