

MEXICAN CRISIS ENDS WITH RECEIPT OF NOTE ASKING AMICABLE ADJUSTMENT

DOES NOT MAKE REPLY TO LANSING'S QUESTIONS

Washington, July 5.—The crisis between the United States and Mexico virtually came to an end today when a friendly and conciliatory note from the defacto government was handed to Secretary Lansing and promptly communicated to President Wilson.

Formal statement of the attitude of the Washington government, must await the president's action but there is no doubt in the minds of officials that the way has been opened for an amicable adjustment of the dispute which brought the governments to the verge of war.

Secretary Lansing would make no comment but he gave the impression that General Carranza's suggestion that there is no pending question between the governments which can not be readily settled by quick negotiations meets with sympathy here. Secretary Lansing is known to share President Wilson's desire that hostilities be avoided if there is any possible way to safeguard border interests without a clash with the Mexican government. The new Mexican communication so plainly indicates a similar desire that a further interchange of views is expected to begin immediately, looking to joint efforts to curb border bandits and other irresponsible agencies that have worked to embroil the two governments.

REFUGEE SAYS NO INDICATIONS OF WITHDRAWAL

El Paso, Tex., July 5.—A refugee reaching the border today from the Matamoros district, denied rumors that all the troops of the expeditionary command had been withdrawn to Colonia Dublan. He asserted that three regiments of cavalry remain at El Valle the southernmost point which is approximately 200 miles south of Columbus, adding however, that there are evidences of a further northern movement.

MEXICO TRAINING MANY VOLUNTEERS

Following Example of United States in Bringing up New Troops

El Paso, Tex., July 5.—While the national guard organizations are being recruited, drilled and equipped to bring them to the highest point of efficiency the Mexican defacto government is taking similar steps with volunteer troops concentrated in some of the larger cities of the north, according to Mexican reports. Similar explanations to the activities to those advanced by the United States for border mobilization, asserting that they are merely "measures of precaution."

FIGHTING IN CHINA IN CANTON DISTRICT

Government Troops Are Attacking Those of Governor of One Province

He came in contact with the governor at Yangtze where a battle was fought July 2. Li Lieh Chun's troops, marching eastward from Kwang Si province took Sam Shui July 2.

12 DEATHS RESULT FROM CELEBRATION

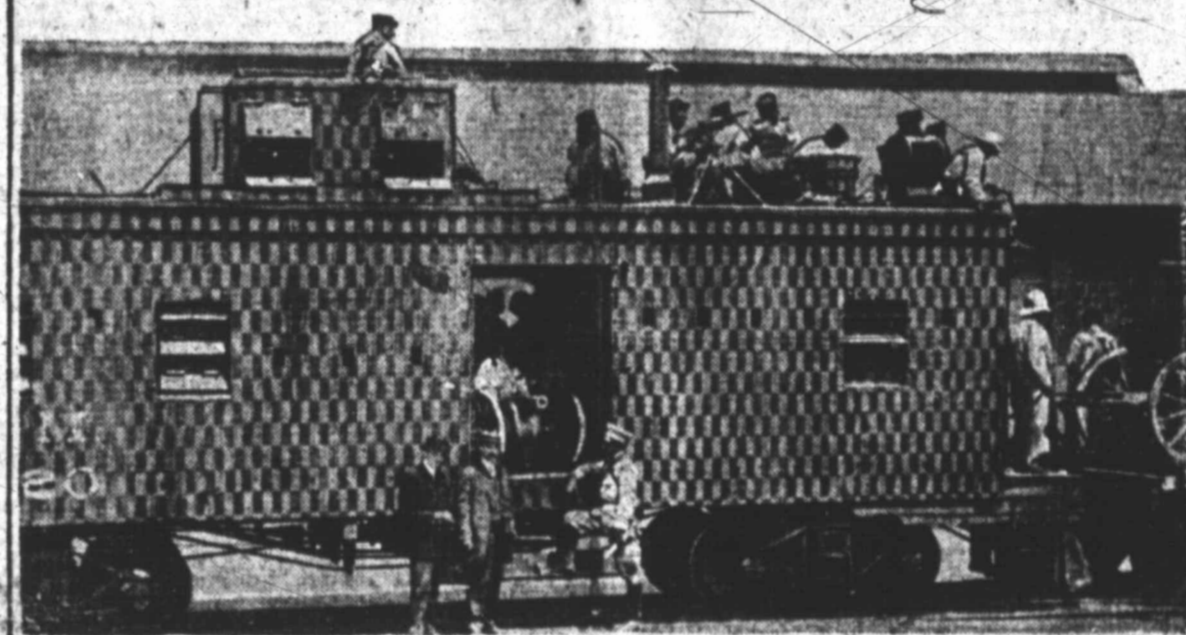
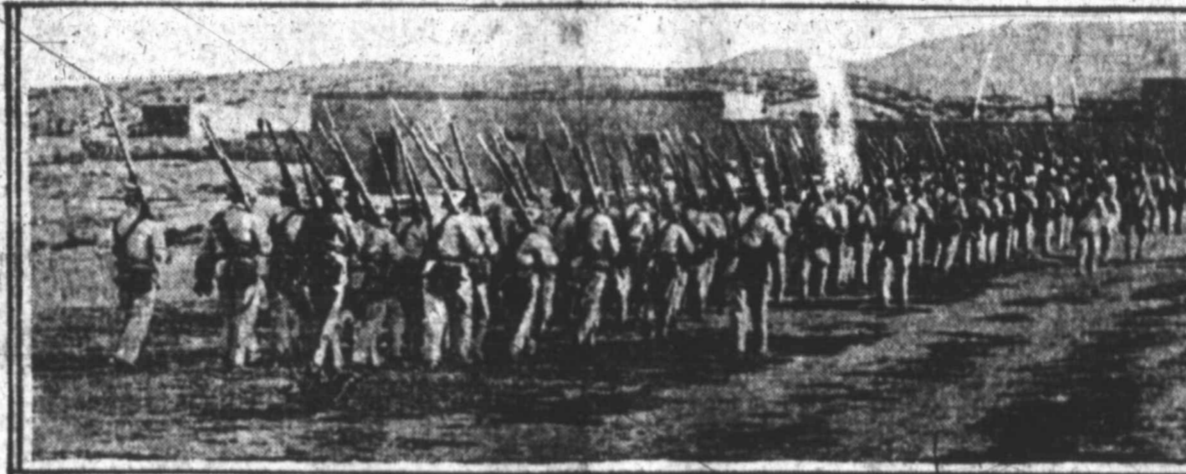
Total of 376 Injured This Year. Better Showing Than in 1915

In the event of war with Mexico the American authorities will place little reliance, it is said, on the possibility of serious trouble being raised for Carranza by his own people. It is believed the fact that the sovereignty and independent existence of Mexico are threatened by the "gringos" will unite all factions, even the bandits, behind the "first chief," Juan T. Burias, Carranza consul in New York, said he had received information to the effect that 1,000,000 Mexicans had offered to take up arms against the United States. However, these 1,000,000 men, if they have really volunteered—or even a much smaller number—could not be used effectively in war since there is not enough ammunition in Mexico for even 100,000 men to keep up a fight for one month; it is asserted on good authority. London, July 5.—Russian cavalry patrols have crossed the Carpathians and entered Hungary, according to a wireless dispatch received here from Bucharest. The dispatch says the patrols advanced from Kimpolung and entered Hungarian territory on Tuesday. They cut telegraph wires and blew up buildings in which food and munitions were stored.

75 MILES AN HOUR WIND IS REPORTED NEAR MOBILE

Mobile, Ala., July 5.—The tug Mary Wittich arrived here from Port Morgan at 10:30 today and reported a wind of 75 miles an hour is raging at the entrance of Mobile Bay in the gulf. The large carrier Morse and two schooners are dragging their anchors and despite efforts of tugs to hold them it is feared they will be beached.

UNUSUALLY SMALL LOSSES BY FRENCH

Claim to Have Escaped With Few Casualties in Fighting in Placard

Paris, July 5.—The astonishing feature of the Placard battle so far as the French are concerned, is the small loss incurred. Reports thus far received show that one army corps which took a prominent part in the fighting lost just 800 men. The reports which took Placard did not lose a single man. All the wounded who have been brought to Paris hospitals speak of this extraordinary immunity.

ALLIED ARMIES STEADILY PUSHING GERMANS BACK

Both British And French Report New Progress And Repulse Counter Attacks

Yard by yard, the German lines are being pushed back by the entente allies under steady hammering in their offensive movement on the western front. New progress for both the French and British is reported today by both Paris and London.

While keeping up the work of clearing the southern bank of the Somme, the French are now pushing eastward from Curly north of that stream and have carried two lines of German trenches there.

The advance on the south bank includes capture of Sormont farm, opposite Clerly.

London is less specific in reporting the British gains, the official bulletin merely announcing "further progress at certain important points." The beating off of German attacks on the new British defenses at Thiepval is reported.

ANTI-MILITARISM ADVOCATES MEET

American and Mexican Delegates Convene to Discuss Present Situation.

Washington, July 5.—A conference called by the American Union Against Militarism for the purpose of finding a solution of the difficulties of the United States with Mexico was begun today. The delegation of the United States is composed of David Starr Jordan of Leland Stanford University, Wardell Story, Boston lawyer and Amos Pfoch of New York. The Mexicans are Dr. Atl, Mexico City editor, Luis Manuel Rojas of Mexico City and Modesto C. Rolland of New York.

LINER IS DAMAGED WHEN IT HITS ROCK IN FOG

Rotterdam, Holland, July 5.—The Holland-American line steamship Ryndam of the division of the command was damaged yesterday with a hole in her forepeak caused by hitting a rock near Kirkwall. The accident happened in a dense fog while the steamer was going very slowly. There were no casualties.

ARMY OFFICERS BELIEVE BREAK HAS BEEN AVERTED

San Antonio, July 5.—Failure of the war department to notify General Funston of the division of his command was regarded by some military men today as a reflection of the hope of the administration that an open break with Mexico might be averted.

ADDITIONAL SUCCESSSES CLAIMED BY ITALIANS

Rome, July 5.—New successes have been won by the Italians in their offensive in the Trentino, the war office today announced. They have occupied the summit of Monte Corno, northwest of the Passolo and captured the crest of Monte Sellugio.

CARRANZA GENERAL IS REPORTED AT MATAMORAS

Brownsville, Texas, July 5.—General Eugenio Lopez, commanding the second brigade of Carranza forces in Tamaulipas, arrived in Matamoras last night, according to reliable advice received at army headquarters today. Lopez, it is reported, brought with him a considerable body of men and a trainload of food supplies.

BERLIN CLAIMS REPULSE OF RUSSIAN ATTACKS

Berlin, July 5.—Russian troops are again attacking the German line from Zirin to the region southeast of Baranovich in Lithuania says the German official statement today. Stubborn hand to hand fighting is in progress and the Russians have either been repulsed or driven back from the places where they had broken into the German lines. The heaviest losses, it is added, were sustained by the Russians.

TOTAL OF 15,000 PRISONERS TAKEN IN ALLIES' DRIVE

Press Camp in France, via London, July 5.—The total number of prisoners taken thus far in the Anglo-French offensive probably has reached 15,000. Judging from these figures the German losses as a whole, it is estimated here, have been at least 60,000.

THOUSANDS GO TO LAKE WICHITA TO CELEBRATE

FOURTH OF JULY CROWD IS BELIEVED TO HAVE BROKEN ALL RECORDS FOR ATTENDANCE AT LOCAL RESORT.

CARS THROUG ROAD

Endless Procession of Machines For Many Hours While Street Cars Carry Many People—All Attractions Liberally Patronized.

One of the largest crowds that ever gathered at Lake Wichita celebrated the Fourth of July there yesterday. The throng is believed by some to have broken all records for attendance at the volume of street car business was not as large as on some former occasions, the thousands who went out in automobiles probably far more than made up for this.

The ball games attracted a big throng, while the swimming pool, merry-go-round and other attractions were liberally patronized throughout the afternoon and evening. In the pavilion the crowd was so dense that it was almost impossible to walk about and a large corps of attendants was kept busy serving cold drinks.

From early in the day until long past midnight the lake road presented one long procession of cars. So numerous were the machines that there was not sufficient parking space in the circle and cars were scattered about wherever there was room.

All street cars ran with two sections and usually one of these carried a trailer. They were thronged with outgoing passengers until late in the evening and when darkness fell the traffic was equally heavy coming back. It was long after midnight before the crowd was brought home.

At night the fireworks display in front of the hotel was viewed by a big crowd. Immense rockets, fountains, "shrapnel" and designs were provided and the display was greatly enjoyed. Thousands watched the moving picture performance while the swimming pool was extensively patronized.

Not only Wichitans but thousands of visitors from outside the city attended the festivities. The weather was decidedly hot, but this seemed to have no effect upon the attendance or upon the enjoyment of the crowd.

Several automobile accidents resulted from the crowded conditions, but there were no serious injuries; a few cars were wrecked.

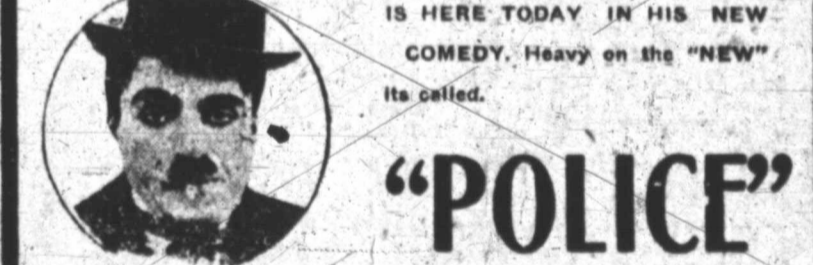

SWEDEN'S VIEW OF PEACE PLANS
THINKS WARRING GOVERNMENTS MUST CONSIDER SENTIMENT AT HOME.

PAY FOR SACRIFICES
Nations Want Peace But Feel That They Must Show Something For Losses.

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. Stockholm.—In Stockholm, where wafarers of all nations meet and mingle on neutral ground, but a few hours' journey from belligerent lands, it is possible to learn much that may be credited as to the views of governments and peoples concerning the possibilities and the problems of peace. This is particularly true with regard to the Germans and Russians, for at this time the nationals of these countries make up by far the larger part of the foreign population in Scandinavia. Officials and travelers from France and England are also constantly passing through Stockholm on their way to Petrograd, leaving behind their entirely informal and unofficial ideas as to what the future holds.

Whenever the prospect of any early peace seems bright, these problems cloud the skies of hope. The "official" views as to the conditions of peace allowed to drift out of Germany, Austria and the Entente countries have as yet offered no basis of agreement which takes into consideration the settlements to be made "at home" by both sides. At least that is the view taken here in Stockholm.

It is felt here that France occupies the best-difficult situation of any of the nations now at war. For France was invaded, Paris was threatened and the army was called into the field in defense of home and friends. France it is said here, can settle on any honorable terms and there will be little discontent among the people. But what of Germany? Can she, it is asked, give up all the occupied territory in Europe, return to her own borders with industries shattered, foreign trade to be rebuilt over again and yet make the people "at home" feel that their losses and sufferings were not in vain?

Many theories are discussed here as to how peace might be accomplished if it were but a matter of give and take at the conference table, but the greatest of all world wars has wrought such a havoc of loss to all engaged in it, that the mere settlement on paper is not to be compared with the problem of settling things right "at home."

"If in when we get to that phase of the situation that I feel matters are all but hopeless," said a man of outstanding prominence in the diplomatic circle of Stockholm. "The war has gone on and on, accumulating headway and drawing nations after nation into its grasp, until I confess I can not see how the end will come. Who will take the initiative for peace, I am convinced it can not come from the outside. It must come from one of the belligerents, but who of the belligerent parties has been so mortally hurt as to take a defensive position in the conference by first suggesting or accepting an offer of peace?"

It is nonsense to say that the nations at war do not want peace. But they all feel there must be some sort of decision in their favor. How can the various governments face their people with empty hands? There have been no suggestions thus far of a peace that would mean "peace" at home to all the countries now engaged in war and unless some one can suggest such a peace I for one do not see how there can be a settlement until there shall have been a more overwhelming military advantage than either side has gained.

It is difficult to find in Stockholm any one who believes other than that the war will eventually end with German troops occupying foreign soil on every front. This view has been expressed here by war correspondents accredited to Entente newspapers and who, fresh from the western front, have passed through Stockholm on their way to watch the Russian campaign of the present summer. They believe that a powerful, concerted move on all fronts by all the Allies at the same time might develop a weakness here and there in the German and Austrian lines which would give the Allies material military advantage. But they feel that an attempt to drive the Germans back within their own borders would mean losses not to be estimated, even by the standards of the last few months at Verdun.

There is of course to be considered the Allied hope that the pressure of the blockade may bring Germany to terms. But in the discussion of this phase of the war here in press and official circles a parallel often is drawn with the American Civil War. It is argued that if the Confederate states, with their poorly equipped army, lack of outside supplies and invaded territory, could withstand the northern blockade for four years and succumb eventually only after overwhelming military reverses, it is difficult to tell how long it would require to conquer Germany by a "starvation" campaign.

And yet, strangely apart from any "official" statements, that may emanate from Berlin, it can be said on authority of men recently come from the German hospital, that Germany expects to gain nothing from the war. According to no less than three of these men, whose reception here in the highest German circles left no doubt as to their standing, Germany will be content to exchange the conquered territory in France and to evacuate Belgium and Serbia in return for the German colonies overseas.

"There, admittedly, is the problem. Germany takes the ground that she has merely defended herself against aggression in this war. The emperor repeatedly has said so, and this must be the explanation to the people. I, for one, am not so sure that we will have serious political, social and economic disturbances after the war is over. But tell me if you can which of the belligerents will be free from similar problems?" The problems of the war have been great, but to my mind the problems of peace and reconstruction after the war will find us face to face with questions far more difficult to solve than any encountered upon foreign battle fronts.

In the further consideration of peace there is widespread discussion here as to how Russia shall be appeased for the losses she has suffered in the war. Russian sacrifices have been great and the Russian people expect material compensation. Sweden is particularly interested in seeing that Russia is appeased. Many claiming to know the Russian view have stated here that that country will be content only if given possession of Constantinople and the Dardanelles. With this natural outlet it is claimed Russia would forever be removed from the field of European politics; that her hold of development there would be westward and that only Japan would have to fear her activity and her competition. On the other hand, travelers from Petrograd insist that if Russia is denied this outlet she will not remain quiet for any great length of time and the peace of Europe can not be assured unless Russia is quiet. Such a settlement of course would mean that Turkey eventually would be called upon to make the greatest sacrifices nationally of all the nations engaged in the war. Bulgaria might encroach upon somebody, but naturally would be bound, as would Austria, by any terms of peace dictated from Berlin. So Stockholm views the situation.

Can Great Britain afford to give back to Germany all of her colonies after the sacrifices at Gallipoli, in East Africa, Mesopotamia, and in the fields and trenches of Flanders and Western France? Will Germany in these circumstances have been sufficiently "crushed" and will Great Britain's prestige in the world have been sufficiently increased to offset the enormous losses of British lives and make easy the burdens of the years to come?
