German resistance to the British of fensive along the Somme front took the form last night of strong counterattacks which at two points made dents in the line established by General Haig's forces. Heavily reinforced, the Germans made a determined drive at the British right, some ground was gained by the German columns.

There has been notable activity in the Verdun weeter. The troops of the crown prince, after their success of yesterday in Fumin wood and at the Damboup battery, where they gained a footing, struck at the French in the vicinity of Dead Man's Hill, west of the Meuse. The attacks were repulsed.

To the east of the Meuse the French report having reoccupied some of the ground lost in the Fumin wood region: They also drove the Germans out of frenches near Reilion in Lorraine and carried out further successful surprise

LLINOIS LAWS ATTACKED BY LAWYERS OF STATE

The lawyers of Illinois have opened bitter attack upon its laws. They were members of the Illinois Bar association, spoke State Bar association, spoke at its fortieth annual meeting at the Hotel

Chief of laws singled out for at tack were those which admit of endless delays in the trial of criminal cases. Probation and parole laws and those governing child labor were also stripped of their cloak of reverence and their faults laid bare.

Judge Albert C. Barnes of appellate court, in the opening address to the criminal law and criminology section, revealed many of the defects of the present system of criminal procedure in his paper. "Causes of Delay in Criminal Cases" Judge Barnes said.

HE ROBERTSON INSURANCE:

A Question Of Vital Importance To Every Citizen In Texas To Be Voted On At The Coming July Primary

Eight years ago seventeen life insurance companies of the North and East voluntarily withdrew from our State, rather than meet the reasonable requirements of our law, which only required them to loan or invest in our state about forty per cent of

ness in Texas for many years and taking out of Texas an average of about Six million dollars per year, yet all of them combined had loaned to Texas farmers less than one

million dollars.
In 1905, Texas passed a law which required all companies to invest or loan in Texas securities about forty of each one hundred dollars collected from Texas people, and while these seventeen companies refused to many of the foreign companies which met the requirements of the law, and are here today doing business and prospering and making loans in Texas as the law requires

And, there has been built up and established thirteen Home Companies, which have complied with this law, and today our Home companies and the forty foreign companies doing business in obedience to the Robertson Insurance law, have loaned and invested in Texas more than forty million dollars, ever forty times as much as the seventeen companies, which withdrew, had invested in all of the years they were here and doing busi-

Do you see any real reason why these Companies, which are not even operating under our Texas laws, and which are not citizens of Texas and have no interest in people of Texas as to what kind of laws they should have? Do you not think it would be a very dangerous policy for the people of Texas to allow the big corporations of the North and East to force them to repeal a good law, just in order that some special law for their benefit might be passed?

The people of Texas should not be de-caived. There is no demand for the repeal of this law upon the part of the people. It is a well known fact that the substance of the Gibson Bill, which the foreign comp ies have sought to have passed to take the place of the Robertson Insurance Law, was promulgated by attorneys employed and paid by these foreign companies, and practically every argument which has been advanced for the repeal of the Robertson Insurance Law and the passage of the Gibson Bill, cas

be traced to these sources.

The sworn statements of certain New York life Insurance Companies were introduced before the last legislature and became a part of that record, and these sworn statements contained items paid by New York Life insurance Companies amounting \$5,000.00 to one attorney in Austin and \$2,000,00 to a law firm in Dallas, and showed the payment of other sums of money to ments, made by these companies to the State Insurance Department, as the law requires, specifically stated that these items were paid "on account Robertson Insurance possession and if contradicted will be pub-lished in full. We hope our good people will not be deceived. There is no demand upon the part of the people for the repeal of this

For the purpose of misleading our people it has been held out to them that if this law is repealed that these companies would come back to Texas and lend large sums of money at low rates of interest. Suppose it could be admitted as true they would voluntarily loan a little money in Texas, if they could get the Robertson Insurance Law repealed, when the agent's brokerage of two per cent is added it would be no cheaper; in fact, not as cheap as the loans which are now being made in Texas, because this brokerage, which runs for the life of the loan, is all charged up in the first note and usually paid in advance, For instance a \$10,000.00 loan is made for five years at a rate of six per cent and two per cent; that is, the lender gets six per cent and the loan agent two per cent for a period of five years, which equals ten per cent of the loan; or on a \$10,000.00 loan, the agent's commission is \$1000.00, for which the borrower gives a second lien and pays it usually at the end of the first year, and very frequently this commission is deducted from the face of the loan and the records show a \$10,000.00 loan, when in fact the farmer who borrows the money actually gets only

\$10,000.00. You only have to step across the line of Texas into Oklahoma to find where these conditions actually exist and the farmers of Oklahoma are glad to find money that can be borrowed at straight eight per cent, be cause they are accustomed to paying six per cent and two per cent, which is higher than eight per cent, and frequently pays addi-tional bonus and inspection fees to get it at that rate, and yet they tell you interest rates are cheaper in Oklahoma than Texas. Ask the man who lives in Oklahoma what he pays for his money.

Again, they try to deceive the people by claiming that Oklahoma, though a smaller state than Texas, has more money loaned on lands. Whether that's true or not, they fail to tell you that Oklahema has no homestead law. Every farmer can borrow money on his land regardless of how small the number of acres, while Texas he must tirs set aside two hundred acres as a homestead and can oply use the excess as collateral to secure loans; therefore, a great majority of the farmers of Texas do not have sufficient lands upon which to borrow money, which accounts for the fact that there are more land loans in Oklahoma and other states

To point out the folly and fallacy of their cry of a desire to lend cheap money in Texas it is only necessary to call your attention to

the fact that Art. 4790 Revised Statutes of the State of Texas provides that any life insurance company may obtain a permit to loan money in Texas without doing a life insurance business. Therefore, if these Eastern Companies are sincere in their desire, let them come on and lend their money and we are sure that no one will object to their making the rate just as cheap as they desire to make it, and if they also desire to write life insurance in Texas, all they will have to do is to comply with the law, just like more than fifty other companies are the ing, and come on into our State and do both

a loan business and insurance business.

In further comparison of the rates be tween Texas and Oklahoma, we call your at tention to the following: The Crop Report er, a publication of the Bureau of Statistics under the authority of the Secretary of Agriculture at Washington, D. C., shows that the average rate of interest paid by farmers in 1972 in Texas was 10.3 per cent; in Oklahoma 12.10 per cent. In 1913 the rate in Texas was 9.57 per cent and in Oklahoma 10.58 per cent, and we doubt not that if more recent statistics were available that the ra-

tio would continue to be in favor of Texas.

But you are told about how much the big New York Companies have loaned in Iowa, Indiana and other States, and that is true, and that is exactly why the people of Texas were justified in passing the Robertson In-surance Law and that is why they are justi-fied in keeping it in force. These Companies have always preferred to lend their money in the North and East and that is why they refused to obey our laws and withdrew our state.

You have heard it said that Texas has no more right to demand the investment of money collected for insurance premiums by foreign companies than it has to deniand the investment of money collected from the people of Texas for McCormack reapers or Standard cultivators, and this statement, like most all the other statements made by enemies of the Robertson Insurance Law, is without force and shows clearly that the party making it has no conception of the underlying facts, or else is willing to deceive the people who have had no opportunity to ascertain the whole truth for themselves. When you buy a McCormack reaper or a Standard cultivator, you get the implement, and all the money which you paid belongs to the party who sold you the reaper or cultivator and he has a perfect right to use it as he pleases, but when you buy an "old line" life insurance policy, the law requires that a part of the money which you pay for It shall be set aside as a reserve fund and this fund constitutes in a practical sense, the cash value which every "old line" policy has, and this cash value belongs to the policyholder and may be withdrawn by him at reserve on Texas policies, belongs not to the Companies, but to the policyholders, and they have a right, through their laws, to require that all or any part of it be invested in the securities of their own state so that the money which the officers of these life in-surance companies hold in trust for the peothe development of the resources of our own state. Furthermore the reserve on Lifte insurance policies is a trust fund, and the law requires that this trust fund be invested in certain classes of securities which are re-garded as a safe protection to the policy holder. This is not the case with farm impleclusively to them and must go their business.

Governor Ferguson recognized this great principle when he opened his campaign for Governor in 1914 and said in his opening speech at Blum, Texas: "Our present life in-surance laws are good, and should be re-tained. Under those laws our people are not only receiving the very best life insur-ance service, with ample facilities for insuring their lives, but also have the satisfac-tion of seeing their accumulations invested In Texas and used in the necessary work of developing the resources of this great State," and the Governor was right and no stronger argument can be urged now than the Governor's language for the retention of the Robertson Insurance Law, as it is now written on our statute books.

We believe this is one of the best laws ever written on the statute books of Texas, and if left as it is, will continue to serve its purpose to bring about a just and equitable distribution of the money of our country among those who produce it. As citizens of this state and county we believe that every citizen of Texas should go to the polls on July 22 and vote on this question by scratch-ing the bottom paragraph as follows:

"For the retention, without modification or change of the compulsory investment feature of the Robertson Insurance Law."
