

GERMAN RESISTANCE TO BRITISH DRIVE INCREASES

REGAIN SOME GROUND LOST IN OFFENSIVE

MAKE DENTS IN NEW BRITISH LINE AT SEVERAL POINTS AFTER HEAVY ATTACKS—STILL ACTIVE IN VERDUN REGION.

ITALIAN SUCCESS

Continue to Drive Austrians Back at Many Points—German Submarine Raids British Coast, Doing Little Damage.

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: German resistance to the British offensive along the Somme front took the form last night of strong counter-attacks which at two points made dents in the line established by General Haig's force. Heavily reinforced, the Germans made a determined drive at the British front. At Mametz and Trones woods in the Monastuban sector of the British right, some ground was gained by the German columns.

The French have not resumed their offensive in the Somme region.

There has been notable activity in the Verdun sector. The troops of the crown prince continued their success yesterday in Fulin wood and at the Danneberg battery, where they gained a footing, struck at the French in the vicinity of Donat Man's Hill, west of the Meuse. The attacks were repulsed.

To the east of the Meuse the French report having recaptured some of the ground lost in the Fulin wood region. They also drove the Germans out of several positions held in Lorraine and carried out further successful surprise operations in the Champagne.

The Italian offensive has been pushed recently not only in the Trentino where the Austrians have been driven back long distances from their farthest points of advance but along the Isonzo where Gorizia is the objective. In the face of this latter movement, the Austrians, according to an unconfirmed report through Paris are said to have evacuated Tolmino.

German harrying on the English coast continues last night with the bombardment by a submarine of Seaham harbor near Sunderland. One woman was killed but no damage of consequence was inflicted, says the British official announcement.

Berlin announces a raid by two German aeroplanes on the English channel port of Calais Monday night, when the port was bombarded, together with army encampments.

CARGO OF BRITISH VESSEL IS SEIZED

Boat Is Fined as Result of Action When About To Leave Manila

Manila, July 12.—The collector of customs seized the steamer Chinese Prince as she was about to depart for Lladivostok yesterday and imposed a fine of 1000 pesos for 3000 missing packages consigned to local merchants. The packages were confiscated by the British authorities when the vessel stopped at Penang. It was alleged that the cargo seized by the British was consigned to black listed dealers in Manila and also to the bank of the Philippines, under order.

The British steamer Chinese Prince left New York April 6 bound for far eastern ports.

PLAN MANY DEPOTS TO EQUIP MILITIA

One Such Institution in Each Congressional District May Be Decided Upon

Washington, July 12.—A proposal that an army quartermaster depot be established in each congressional district to hasten equipment of national guard troops called into federal service in an emergency probably will grow out of the mobilization of state forces for border duty. Delay in supplying the men with clothing and camp equipment, Brigadier General Henry Sharp, acting head of the quartermaster's corps here today, is due to the present depot system and not to a shortage.

SECOND REGIMENT OF NEW YORKERS IN TEXAS

Texasians, Tex. July 12.—The second regiment of the New York National Guard passed through here this morning on a special train en route to the border. It was reported they would detain at Mission.

SAYS FOOTPRINTS SHOW ORPET'S GUILT

State's Attorney Uses Tracks in Snow in His Argument to Jury Today

By Associated Press. Waukegan, Ill., July 12.—The footprints in the snow in Helms' woods, made by William H. Orpet, were the principal subjects of the argument to the jury trying Orpet for the murder of Marian Lambert, by Ralph H. Dault for the state today. By a blue print Mr. Dault traced the footprints as they appeared February 10 the day after Marian's death. The tracks led to a cluster of four trees. Here the tracks show how he walked up and down, waiting until he thought she was dead. Then he went back. There is no other explanation for these tracks. He and Marian were absolutely alone in the woods and the tracks were still distinct when Fred Wendam traced them the next day.

INSTRUCTIONS AS TO NEGOTIATIONS

Arredondo Gets Communication From Mexico City—Latin-American Diplomats Watch

Washington, July 12.—A communication from Mexico City reaching Elisbo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador designate today, is understood to contain instructions as to the form of negotiations by which settlement of differences between the United States and Mexico will be undertaken.

The ambassador made an engagement for a conference with Acting Secretary Polk at the state department.

Arredondo says that he has been instructed to declare that Latin-American intervention but declared all South and Central American countries were interested in keeping in touch with developments.

Americans Wearing British Flags in Mexico, Says Report

Columbus, N. M., July 12.—Americans living in Chihuahua and other cities in northern Mexico are wearing small British flags to protect themselves and their nationality according to a report brought here from Mexico today.

SPANISH RAILROAD STRIKE UNDER WAY

General Labor Movement in Symptomatic—Soldiers at Stations

Madrid, July 12.—The railroad strike begins at midnight. All passenger trains will be stopped. Troops have occupied the principal railroad stations and railroad men liable to military service have been notified that they must keep work but only express and mail trains will run. The National Union of Spanish Workmen today discussed the advisability of calling a general strike of all trades. A special meeting of the cabinet in view of the gravity of the situation has been summoned for tomorrow.

GENERAL BLISS TO VISIT SAN ANTONIO

Will Discuss Militia Affairs—Sanitary Conditions in Camps Declared Good

San Antonio, Texas, July 12.—All the official information at Fort Sam Houston today relative to the coming to the border of General C. H. Bliss, assistant chief of the army, was contained in a brief message to General Funston, stating that he would be here Thursday to consult with General Funston on questions affecting the militia.

Reports received from border stations and concentration camps indicate that the sanitary conditions have been maintained at a high standard and the health of the troops generally is good.

Robert Easton, one of the directing board of the Red Cross, arrived late last night. He will make some investigation of the work the Red Cross is preparing to undertake.

PROHIBITIONISTS MEET IN ST. PAUL JULY 18 TO NOMINATE CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENCY



St. Paul, July 12.—Seven aspirants for the presidency of the United States will present their views and qualifications to 1,254 delegates to the Twelfth national prohibition convention in St. Paul, July 18-21. They are William F. Sulzer, former governor of Indiana; Eugene N. Foss of Boston, formerly governor of Massachusetts; Sumner W. Hayes of Portland, Ind.; Francis E. Baldwin of Elmhurst, N. Y.; William F. Ferguson of Franklin, Pa.; and Frederick F. Wheeler of Los Angeles, Cal. The first three are widely known. The others long has been active and forceful in prohibition ranks, but are comparatively little known without. Mr. Hayes is an attorney, Mr. Baldwin makes more bottles, it is said, than any other person, none being used for intoxicants; Mr. Ferguson is a publisher of party publications and Mr. Wheeler is a financier. The general outline of the convention follows: Young people's day and intercollegiate contest, banquet in evening, Monday, July 17; "Five Million" club conference Tuesday; keynote address and formal organization of convention.

RECRUITING FOR NATIONAL GUARD

Steps Taken to Bring Militia Up to Full War Strength

MEANS 160,000 MEN

Officers Will Be Assigned to This Duty at Once to Fill in Many Gaps

Washington, July 12.—Immediate organization of an extensive national guard recruiting service was authorized today by the war department to bring regiments on border duty up to war strength of about 160,000. With nearly 50,000 regulars on border duty, the government would have 210,000 or more engaged in protecting the line. Three officers will be assigned to the recruiting service for each regiment ordered to the front. Each separate battalion, company, battery or other unit will have one officer. The adjutant general of the respective states will supply the names of officers for this duty.

Recruiting has been made necessary by the fact that all unit men and those with dependents to support are to be discharged from the guard regiments as rapidly as possible. While the work of filling the gaps is in progress, however, it was determined to go a step farther and attempt to fill regiments to full war strength.

IMPROVEMENT IN EPIDEMIC TODAY

Fewer Cases and Deaths in Spite of Worst Heat Wave of Season

By Associated Press. St. Paul, July 12.—Despite the worst heat wave of the season the infantile paralysis epidemic took a turn for the better today. During the 24 hours preceding 10 o'clock this morning only seventeen deaths were reported in the five boroughs. There were 162 new cases.

BIG SUBMARINE PREPARING FOR RETURN VOYAGE

CARGO IS BEING UNLOADED—OFFICERS BELIEVE STATE DEPARTMENT WILL RULE THAT BOAT IS MERCHANT VESSEL

MUST DODGE ENEMY

Boat Will Probably Go to Mouth of Bay and There Await Opportunity to Put Out to Sea

Baltimore, July 12.—Feeling secure in their belief that the state department at Washington will sustain the findings of the treasury and naval officials that the Deutschland is a merchant ship and therefore entitled to all privileges due to belligerent owned freighters under international law, the agents of the super-submarine today went aboard with their plans for disposing of the vessel's cargo and preparations for the return voyage. It is known that the Deutschland will take aboard a cargo of rubber and nickel and the captain in his declaration to the local customs officers said he expected to sail "within ten days."

Already there is discussion concerning the return cargoes for the under water liner which are expected to follow the Deutschland to American shores. These vessels, it was reliably stated, will carry back the most essential foodstuffs that Germany and Austria-Hungary need. Coffee was specifically named as one of the needed commodities. It was also declared that the Bremen, constructed by the same company that built the Deutschland and reported last night as about to sail, will carry drugs that are much needed in this country and which cannot be obtained from other than German sources.

The North German Lloyd has received from persons in all parts of the country offers running as high as \$50,000 for the privilege of taking messages on the submarine on her return trip.

"These have all been refused," said a representative of the company today.

The unloading of the Deutschland was being hastened today and may be completed tonight. Included in the cargo entered at the customs houses is a quantity of scrap iron which it was necessary to bring as ballast. The space thus occupied will be replaced with nickel on the return voyage.

The fact that the tug Thomas F. Timmons went into dry dock today for repairs gave rise to rumors that she was getting ready to return to the Virginia capes to convoy into the Chesapeake, as she did the Deutschland, the submarine Bremen, which is reported on her way.

It was thought on the other hand that the tug's first duty would be to escort the Deutschland back to the capes. It was intimated today by the North German Lloyd office that the Deutschland might drop anchor several days at Norfolk and await a favorable opportunity to slip by enemy cruisers which might be waiting for her.

MOVEMENTS OF SUBMARINE MAY BE KEPT SECRET

Washington, July 12.—If news of the departure of the German underwater liner Deutschland can be regarded as military information of value to Germany's enemies the United States in the interest of neutrality will take steps to prevent such information reaching them. State department officials today admitted they were considering the question of how to protect the government's neutrality in the matter.

WILSON WILL LET GOETHALS RETIRE

Agrees to Accept Resignation When Canal Zone Governor Insists Upon It

WILSON WILL URGE RELIEF FOR POLES

Promises Delegation to Take Matter Up With Nations to Secure Distribution

Washington, July 12.—President Wilson today told a large delegation of representatives of Polish organizations that he would make personal efforts to get relief to the starving in Poland. It is understood he is considering a personal appeal to the rulers of the nations involved to allow distribution of food. The state department already has made one such appeal to the governments.

\$2,000,000 APPROPRIATION FOR MEXICAN RELIEF PROPOSED

Washington, July 12.—A bill to appropriate \$2,000,000 for relief of destitute Mexicans by providing them with food and clothing to be expended by the war department under the direction of the secretary of state, was introduced today by Representative Randall of California.

CARRANZA'S MEN WAGING BATTLE WITH VILLISTAS

HEAVY FIGHTING IS IN PROGRESS TODAY AT CERRO BLANCO, BELOW PARRAL, ACCORDING TO REPORTS AT CHIHUAHUA.

RUSH MORE TROOPS

Government Reinforcements Being Sent—Rodriguez Gets Letter From Villa Urging Him to Desert Government Forces

By Associated Press. Chihuahua City, July 12.—Heavy fighting is now proceeding between Carranza's forces and a large Villa force at Cerro Blanco, some miles below Parral, according to dispatches received today by General Jacinto Trevino.

General Garcia reported that he was engaged in holding the bandits back from the town of Parral. General Carranza and General Domingo Arrieta, which now are proceeding up the railway from Chihuahua, arrived at Cerro Blanco today. General Carranza, one of the Villa leaders, who joined Cuatro Reyes in surrendering to the government a few months ago, has informed General Trevino that he received a personal letter from Villa in which the bandit chief urged him to return to his old allegiance and to join him against the "yankee invaders." This letter was dated June 15 at San Juan Bautista.

In his communication to General Trevino, General Rodriguez stated he had no sympathy with the efforts of Villa to divide his country and was determined to help the Carranza authorities restore order.

GREAT BRITAIN APPROVES ECONOMIC RESOLUTION

By Associated Press. London, July 12.—The British government has approved of the resolution adopted by the Paris Economic conference of representatives of the entente allies, according to a statement made in the House of Commons this afternoon by Premier Asquith.

DEFEAT RUSSIANS ON STOKHOLM RIVER

Berlin Says Effort to Cross Stream Was Blocked By German Attack

By Associated Press. Berlin, July 12.—Russian troops which attempted to establish themselves on the left bank of the Stokholm river in the advance toward Kovel were attacked by German troops and defeated, the war office announced today.

TURKS ANNOUNCE FURTHER SUCCESS

Claim Repulse of Counter Attack By Russian Forces in Caucasus

Constantinople, July 12.—The Russians have attempted to check the Turkish troops in the Caucasus by means of counter attacks, but the war office announced today these onslaughts were beaten off in Mesopotamia a small body of British troops was put to flight.

PENNSYLVANIANS SENT TO MARATHON

Orders Believed Due To Reports of Bandit Activity Near That Region

By Associated Press. El Paso, Tex., July 12.—Two battalions of Pennsylvania infantry one of the second regiment and one of the tenth, broke camp today and prepared to entrain for Marathon. It was announced that these troops have been ordered to reinforce the border patrol in the Big Bend district.

The orders followed closely reports from the district that Mexican bandits had raided the Lamula mine, an American property, about 100 miles south of the border and that residents along the frontier near Boquillas, Tex., as feared the outlaws were moving north.

BERLIN REPORTS 2100 FRENCHMEN TAKEN PRISONER

Berlin, July 12.—German troops on the right bank of the Meuse yesterday pushed forward to a point near Souville and the Luiké works, taking 23 officers and 2100 men prisoners, says the official statement today.

JUDGE MILLER URGES SUPPORT FOR CULBERSON

DECLARES SENATOR IS IN GOOD HEALTH AND SCORES ENEMY AS INGRATE FOR TRYING TO MAKE CONDITION AN ISSUE.

REFERS TO RECORD

Long Career in Public Service is Reviewed—Urges That Robertson Insurance Law be Retained on Texas Statute Books.

Speaking to a fair crowd at the Wichita Theater last night his presentation of the merits of the Robertson insurance law, and his eloquent effort in behalf of the Culbertson candidacy marked Judge Barry Miller of Dallas as one of the strongest speakers that it has been the fortune of Wichitans to hear in many years.

In discussing the Culbertson candidacy the speaker unmercifully scored E. Henry, accusing him of being a political hypocrite and charging that he had been willfully misrepresenting the state of Senator Culbertson's health. He said that he believed Henry was running neck and neck with his friend John Davis for last place.

He warned the anti and those prohibitionists who still believed in the old states rights doctrine that Senator Culbertson was the only man in the country who could lead a constitutional nation-wide wide prohibitionist and non-wide suffrage. At this point the speaker digressed for a brief discussion of the history of states rights, in discussing outrages the speaker declared that he was opposed to women suffrage, his thirty-two years' connection with politics having convinced him that it was hardly any place for a gentleman and certainly no place for a lady.

The speaker repeated the declaration he had made in former speeches to the effect that Senator Culbertson would be more influential for Texas under a republican administration than any of his opponents would be under a democratic one, saying that a new man has been elected to the Senate that a two negro world would exist at a democratic convention. He pointed out that Senator Culbertson is one of the most important members of the Senate, a position that it would take years for a new man to gain if he was able to attain it at all. Judge Miller pointed out in the beginning of his speech that the Robertson law that he was in a peculiar position in supporting Governor Ferguson and also the Robertson law, but said that he saw nothing inconsistent in supporting the discrediting with some of his policies.

The speaker stated that he had never supported one candidate in 25 years with another in the whole of his platform. That was when he was running for office himself. He declared that he believed the Ferguson administration had been at all times conducted for the best interest of the masses. He pointed out that he had supported the governor before and was very warmly supporting him today. His warning of the danger of a candidate did not deter him from vigorously making the governor for his stand on the Robertson law. He read the governor's endorsement of the Robertson law in his State speech of two years ago, opening his campaign for governor, and very pointedly commented on the change in policy made soon after his election.

The speaker was introduced by Judge J. T. Montgomery. He was commended to the voters of Wichita Falls as a man wholly disinterested himself, but appearing in behalf of his friend and in support of the Robertson insurance law which, in the opinion of the speaker, was one of the most vital laws that the state had been called to pass on in a number of years.

Judge Miller presented his arguments for the insurance law first before launching into a disquisition on the merits of the law he briefly and concisely traced the history of the measure. He said that all credit was due to Judge Robertson for his part in the passage of the law, but the agitation of the measure went beyond Robertson's time. First in 1897, when Governor Texas, Charles A. Culbertson in a special message to the legislature pointed out the necessity of a law, which embodied all the essentials of the Robertson law, as a measure to protect the interests of the people and clear business policy. On this occasion and several times later when laws of the kind had come up in the legislature the speaker charged they had been defeated by unscrupulous lobbyists of the insurance companies. Later when the law was introduced by Judge Robertson, the law partner Governor Hogg, it has been pushed through in spite of the most vigorous opposition from insurance lobbyists. The law simply provided that three-fourths of the insurance reserves of all insurance written in Texas should be invested in Texas securities, said Judge Miller.

Judge Miller then defined insurance reserves. When a premium was paid on a policy it was split into three parts, he said, and one of these parts was the reserve, which if properly invested would eventually pay off the policy. These reserves are not the property of the insurance company, but belong to the policy holders, and the speaker declared that it was nothing but right that the reserve should be invested where it would do the most good, as in Texas securities.

Judge Miller pointed out two infallible tests to insure their law. "First, is the purpose good? Second, has the law served that purpose?" The first had already been answered, the second was the question. The speaker stated that the best interest of the Texas policy holders to whom the money belongs. He quoted statistics of New York requiring New York companies to invest their reserves in New York except where they were to be invested elsewhere by laws of other states or foreign companies—recognition on the part of the financial powers as early as 1895.

HUGHES AND WILCOX TALK OVER CAMPAIGN WITH WOMEN SUPPORTERS

Charles E. Hughes, republican candidate for the presidency, conferred with some of his supporters at the country home of Mrs. Harry Payne Whitney, at Roslyn, N. Y. Several women, prominent in society and in sympathy with the republican candidate's cause, were present. Among them was Mrs. Charles C. Rumsey, the recently chosen treasurer of the Women's National Hughes alliance. The picture shows Mr. Hughes conferring with William T. Wilcox, chairman of the republican national committee and campaign director, and Mrs. Rumsey.

That such laws would come, declared as they would be by the soundest business judgment. He further referred to laws in Germany, Austria, and Canada requiring that all of the reserves be invested in those countries on the policies written there.

As to whether the law had accomplished good, the speaker quoted statistics showing that in all the 25 years of the Robertson law the combined investments of all the companies writing in Texas had been less than a million dollars, while in the nine years of operation under the Robertson law, with both foreign and Texas companies writing life insurance in the state, investments had grown to \$48,000,000.

Here the speaker launched into a vigorous answer to the arguments against the law being made by Governor Ferguson in his campaign for re-election. As to the governor's charge of the existence of an insurance trust in Texas, he asked why he as chief executive of the state did not prosecute them under the anti-trust laws of the state. He assured his auditors that if "Jim" even had a suspicion of the existence of an insurance trust in the state, Looney would have been whooping up the prosecution long ago.

They say that the repeal of the Robertson law will make cheap money in this state. For 25 years with no one holding them back, and when money was more sorely needed for the development of the state than it is today, it has been loaned a million all told, if that much. Why then are we to believe they will do more today without being compelled to? O, they say that they are prepared to loan millions for the state. That is not as much as the other companies have already loaned under the compulsory investment feature of the Robertson law. He believed the investment of five million a year would seriously decrease the rate of interest in Wichita county and I know it wouldn't in the city of Dallas. When you stop to consider that there is \$250,000,000 loaned on the farm lands of Texas alone you will see that this amount that they propose to invest will be merely a drop in the bucket, and will not affect the interest rate of the state at all.

The speaker traced Senator Culbertson's record from boyhood, through school, the practice of law, and later his public life, as attorney general, as governor, as senator, and to his present growth into an international figure. He spoke of Culbertson's appointing Henry as his first assistant attorney general when Henry had the shadow of a political defeat hanging over him, and now when the other assistants were supporting Culbertson, Henry, who held the highest position and drew the highest salary of all was turning on him—because he was sick. Judge Miller closed by asking for them to support Senator Culbertson for re-election as a matter of simple justice, and declared that he really did not entertain any fears that the same

—Quack! Quack!
Glorious! (Quack) Glorious! (Quack) All it does is pour on us.
Glory be to God when the sun comes out.
For then we'll all be home. Amen!
If all the world felt about soldiering like the "rookies" feel now, there would be no more war, nor rumors of war.

SOME WEEVILS ARE FOUND IN COUNTY

Agricultural Agent Urges Farmers to Keep Plowing White Ground

J. W. Campbell, government demonstration agent, has called to the attention of the Times the fact that a large number of the ornamental trees in the city are still infested by the bag worm, and that unless precautionary and remedial measures are taken the trees will be a loss. In discussing the matter Mr. Campbell suggested the use of a preparation which he considers the most successful in the fight against this pest, and advises tree owners to prepare a solution consisting of four ounces of arsenate of lead in fifty gallons of water, and to spray the trees with it late in the evening. Mr. Campbell in discussing conditions in the county, states that a few boll weevil are reported in some sections and he is co-operating with the farmers in every way possible to destroy this pest. His advice to the farmers is to use a brush on their cultivator heavy enough to knock off the punctured squares, and to keep plowing. The hot dirt, it seems has proven in a measure, destructive to the pest and Mr. Campbell believes this to be the most efficient weapon for their destruction. "The main thing, he says, is to keep plowing the ground while the dirt is hot."
