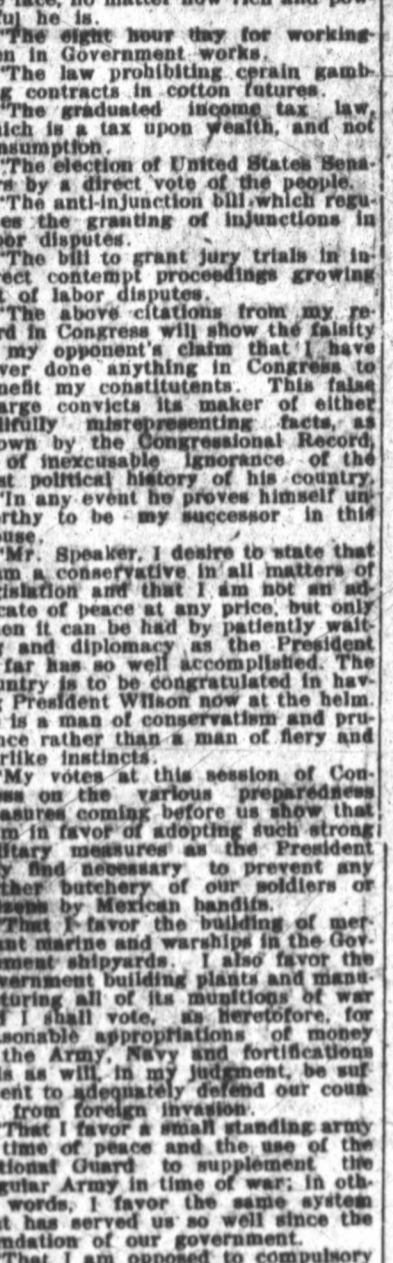

## GERMAN RESISTANCE TO BRITISH DRIVE INCREASES

### REGAIN SOME GROUND LOST IN OFFENSIVE

#### MAKE DENTS IN NEW BRITISH LINE AT SEVERAL POINTS AFTER HEAVY ATTACKS—STILL ACTIVE IN VERDUN REGION.

#### ITALIAN SUCCESS

Continue to Drive Austrians Back at Many Points—German Submarine Raids British Coast Town, Doing Little Damage.

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: German resistance to the British offensive along the Somme front took the form last night of strong counterattacks which at two points made dents in the line established by General Haig's forces. Heavily reinforced, the Germans made a determined drive at the British front. At Mametz and Trones woods in the Monastuban sector of the British right, some ground was gained by the German columns.

The French have not resumed their offensive in the Meuse region. There has been notable activity in the Verdun sector. The troops of the crown prince after their success yesterday in Fumin wood and at the Douleux battery, where they gained a footing, struck at the French in the vicinity of Dead Man's Hill, west of the Meuse. The attacks were repulsed.

To the east of the Meuse the French report having recaptured some of the ground lost in the Fumin wood region. They also drove the Germans out of trenches near Reillon in Lorraine and carried out further successful surprise operations in the Champagne.

The Italian offensive has been pushed recently not only in the Trentino where the Austrians have been driven back long distances from their former points of advance but along the Isonzo where Gorizia is the objective. In the face of this latter movement the Austrians, according to an unconfirmed report through Paris are said to have evacuated Tolmezzo.

German harrying of the English coast was continued last night with the bombardment by a submarine of Seaham harbor near Sunderland. One woman was killed but no damage of consequence was inflicted, says the British official announcement.

Berlin announces a raid by two German aeroplanes on the English channel of Calais Monday night, when the port was bombarded, together with army encampments.

## CARGO OF BRITISH VESSEL IS SEIZED

Boat is Fined as Result of Action When About to Leave Manila.

Manila, July 12.—The collector of customs seized the steamer Chinese Prince as she was about to depart for Vladivostok yesterday and imposed a fine of 1000 pesos for 2000 missing packages considered local merchandise. The packages were confiscated by the British authorities when the vessel stopped at Penang. It was alleged that the cargo consisted of British goods consigned to black listed dealers in Manila and also to the bank of the Philippines, under order.

## PLAN MANY DEPOTS TO EQUIP MILITIA

One Such Institution in Each Congressional District May Be Decided Upon.

Washington, July 12.—A proposal that an army quartermaster depot be established in each congressional district to hasten equipment of national guard troops called into federal service in an emergency probably will grow out of the mobilization of state forces for border duty. Delay in supplying the men with clothing and camp equipment, Brigadier General Henry Sharp, acting head of the quartermaster's corps said today, is due to the present depot system and not to a shortage.

## SECOND REGIMENT OF NEW YORKERS IN TEXAS

Texas, July 12.—The second regiment of the New York National Guard passed through here this morning on a special train en route to the border. It was reported they would detain at El Paso.

## SAYS FOOTPRINTS SHOW ORPET'S GUILT

State's Attorney Uses Tracks in Snow in His Argument to Jury Today.

Washington, Ill., July 12.—The foot prints in the snow in Illinois woods made by William H. Orpet, were the principal subjects of the argument to the jury trying Orpet for the murder of Marian Lambert, by Ralph H. Dady for the state today. By aid of a blue print Mr. Dady traced the foot prints as they appeared February 10, the day after Marian's death. The lawyer said the foot prints spoke plainer than words of the tragedy in the woods.

"At the Three Oaks," he said, "he persuaded Marian to take the poison. He was unable to stand the sight of her death throes and his tracks led on alone for 144 feet to a cluster of four trees. Here the tracks show how he walked on and down, waiting until he thought she was dead. He went back. There is no other explanation for these tracks. He and Marian were absolutely alone in the woods and the tracks were still distinct when Fred Wendam traced them the next day."

## INSTRUCTIONS AS TO NEGOTIATIONS

Arredondo Gets Communication From Mexico City Latin-American Diplomats Watch.

Washington, July 12.—A communication from Mexico City reaching Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador for designate today, is understood to contain instructions as to the terms of negotiations by which settlement of differences between the United States and Mexico will be undertaken. The ambassador made an engagement for a conference with Acting Secretary Polk at the state department.

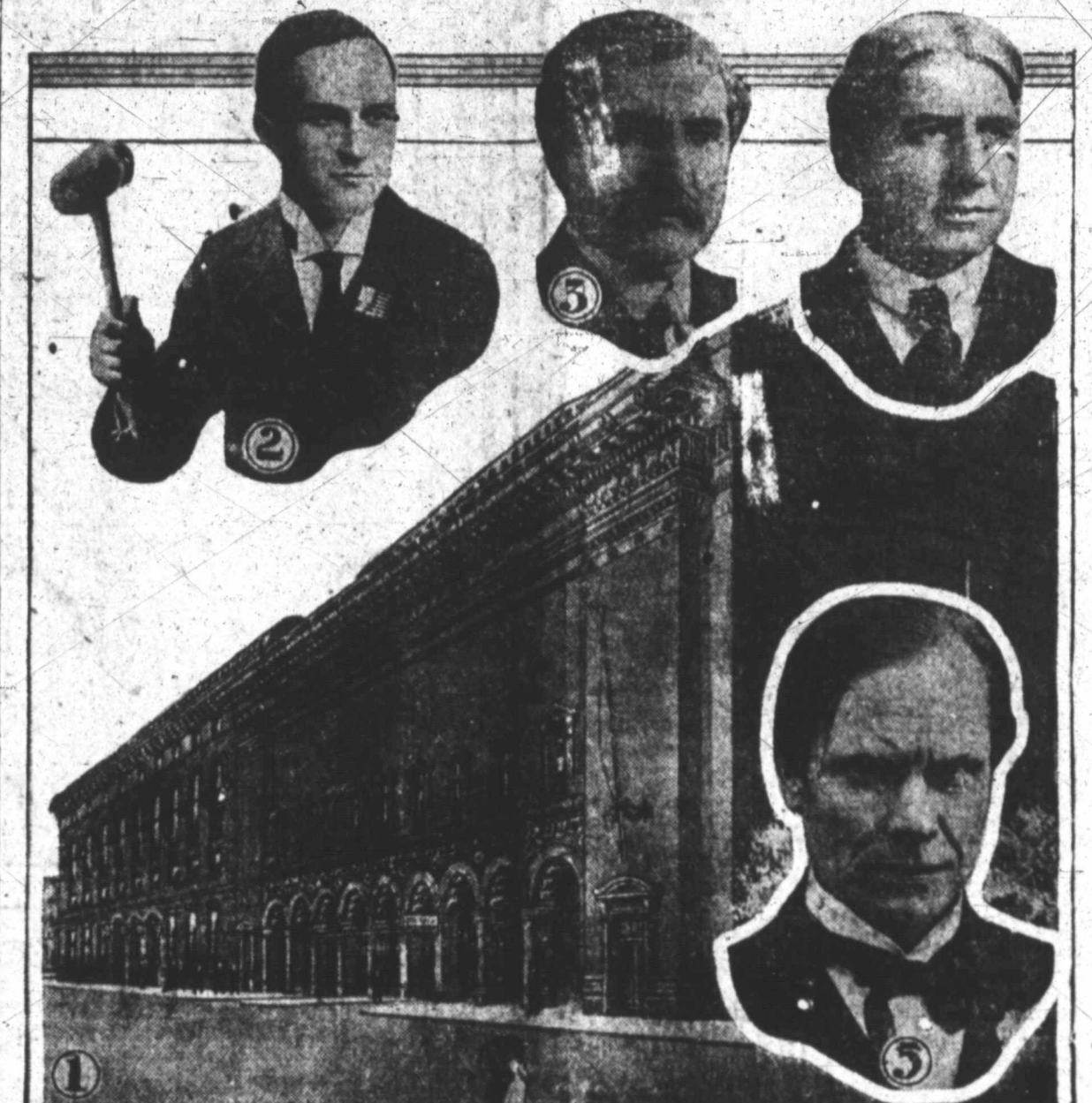

## CITY TO AD IN BAG WORM FIGHT

COUNCIL APPOINTS SPECIAL POLICEMAN TO HELP ERADICATE TREE TREE PEST.

## INSPECTION OF MILK

New Health Ordinance Passed in Spite of Opposition Expressed by Some Dairymen.

An inspector with the power of examining and ordering the spraying of trees will be appointed in an effort to eradicate the bag worm, which is threatening the trees of the city as a result of action by the city council at last night's session. The council has appointed a special policeman and will have police powers. The action on the bag worm eradication was taken as a result of a report from the Civic League composed of Mrs. W. M. Boger and Mrs. R. G. Schaefer which appeared before the council. The ladies were accompanied by J. L. Downing who has had considerable experience in fighting the bag worm.

It was pointed out that unless some measure were taken right away the bag worm would kill every shade tree in the city and trees representing considerable expenditures of money and several years care would be lost. Mr. Downing said that the spraying must be done while the worms are still feeding on the foliage, which went on for some time after they began building their cocoons. He indicated the necessity of being very efficacious, but said that he had found Paris green very effective also. The Paris green must be mixed in the proportion of a teaspoonful to two gallons of water, and enough lime added to make the composition milky in order to keep the composition from burning up the foliage.

## GLASS FACTORY TO CLOSE TOMORROW

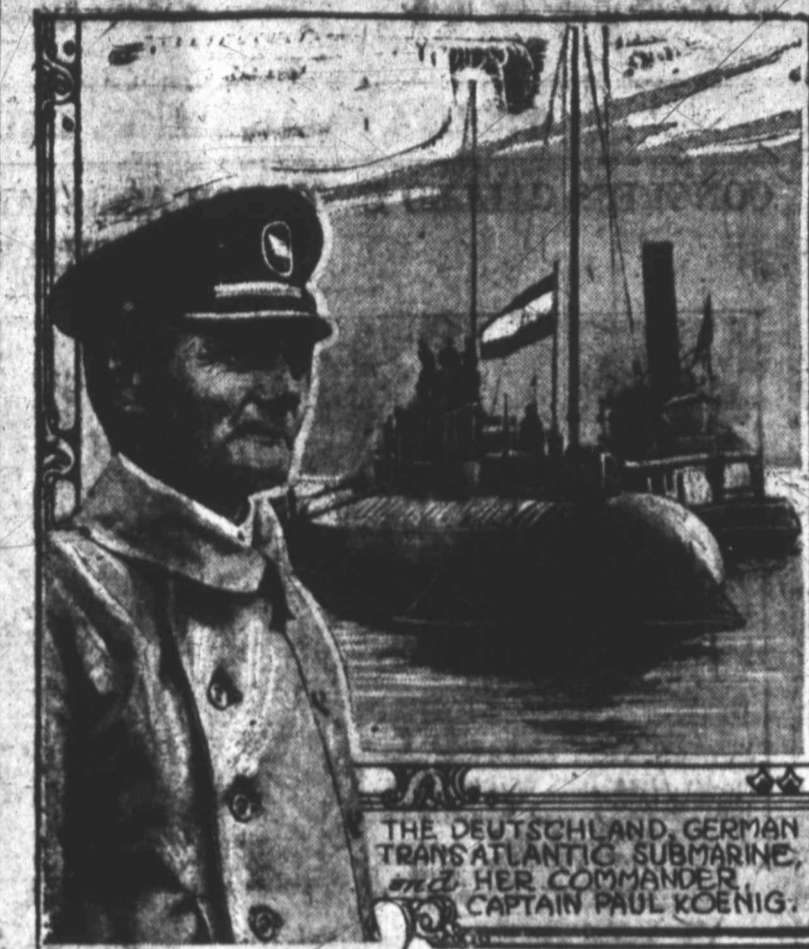
Will Shut Down For Six Weeks in Order to Make Repairs

## ESTIMATE PRIMARY VOTES AT 478,428

Believed Morris Will Receive 120,000 Former Contestants of Kind Recalled.

Special to The Times.  
AUSTIN, Texas, July 14.—In the primary election held July 12, the estimated total of the expected maximum based on the percentage of increase in the number of voters was 478,428. This total is based on the percentage of increase in the number of voters since 1912. A man who has analyzed the vote studied existing conditions and kept in close touch with the trend and ratio of political sentiment gives as his opinion that the total vote will be approximately 478,428. The size of the total vote will depend somewhat on the determined character of the contest. The fact that local officials of all grades are to be nominated will have a decided tendency in boosting the vote generally speaking, there are candidates and their friends are aggressively active.

The general primary law under which nominations are made in Texas became operative in 1909. A study of the vote cast for candidates for governor in the contests for the period beginning with the first year of the primary and ending with the nomination of James E. Ferguson is an interesting one and throws direct light on the 1916 contest.

In 1906 there were four candidates for governor: Campbell, Colquitt, Bell and Crockett. The total vote was 294,106 and Campbell won. Several acts of the first administration of Governor Campbell caused a great deal of dissatisfaction and brought about aggressive opposition to his reelection. These acts included the full rendition law, the taxing of corporations and the exercise of the veto power in dealing with appropriations for state institutions. R. L. Williams, known as the "Blacksmith of Cumbry," was selected to oppose him for re-nomination and without making a speech in the furious campaign he was waged that year he succeeded in polling 119,378 votes against the "Sage of Palestine" Campbell received 205,028 votes. The total vote polled was 324,406 and Colquitt was the winner. Two years later Colquitt was opposed by W. F. Ramsey, who resigned from the supreme court bench to make the race. After one of the most aggressive campaigns of recent years Colquitt received 217,919 and Ramsey 176,423 votes. The successful candidate's majority being 41,496. The total vote jumped in two years from 324,406 to 394,352.

In 1914 the recorded democrats of the state had increased to 435,299, of which Ferguson received 237,082. Bell 191,558 and Leopold Morris 6675. Ferguson's majority over his two opponents was 35,535, while he received 45,504 more votes than Bell.  
It readily will be seen from the foregoing figures that the vote from 1906 to 1914 has increased constantly at a rate of a little more than 19 per cent each successive two-year period. However, there is one exception, for the vote of 1914 showed an approximate increase of 15 per cent as compared with that of 1912. This is attributable to the unusual campaign conducted by Ferguson and Bell. If Governor Ferguson should receive the same number of votes he did in 1914, plus 16 per cent he would have a total of 250,768. If Morris should receive the same as Ramsey in 1912 his total would be 176,423. This would make Ferguson's majority 54,345. It is not at all probable that Morris will poll within many thousands votes of total Ramsey strength. For the reason that Ramsey received a general vote throughout the state. He had attained prominence as a member of the supreme court, had an extensive acquaintance over the state because of his public service and naturally at-

SERBIAN ARMY IS NOT YET THROUGH

Has Been Brought to Saloniki, 100,000 Strong, Reequipped and Ready To Fight

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. London.—The Heuter correspondent at Saloniki writes of the successful transport of the Serbian army from Corfu to Saloniki:

"The allies have another wonderful feat to their credit. Over a hundred thousand men have been brought through seas infested with submarines with never a single mishap or the loss of one man. It is an astounding performance especially if we take into consideration the means employed. Undoubtedly possessed of knowing staffs about every departure and the zeal with which the Austrian U-boats particularly must have sought the prize of a transport. But in spite of their vigilance and their daring and their ruthlessness they have not been able to interfere with the steady flow of troops which has poured into Saloniki regularly, methodically and unceasingly for the past four weeks.

The vessels have been entirely French transports and great praise is due to skippers and crews for the manner in which they have accomplished their duties, but both French and Serbians gladly and gratefully recognize that their achievement would not have been possible without the British navy; that only the constant vigil and unceasing patrolling of our warships has made these Mediterranean seaways clear and safe.

COUNCIL BARRED ENFORCEMENT OF MILK ORDINANCE

Old Ordinance is Found Recalling Notorious Publication of Last Century. Dr. Traylor Says Board Will Be Liberal, But Wants Dairyman to Help.

An old ordinance prohibiting the distribution and sale of the "Sunday Sun" on the streets of Wichita Falls and imposing a jail sentence for violation of the ordinance was found the other day by City Attorney Horace Nutt in going over the old ordinances of the city. Although he did not find any evidences of its having been invoked, the very existence of the ordinance was a source of amusement at the city council had no power to regulate a matter of that kind, much less impose a jail sentence for its violation.

The "Sunday sun" was an institution of the old ordinance of the West and Southwest about 25 years ago. Every breath of scandal, or any escapade of prominent and well known citizens which would be likely to prove embarrassing to them it made public was sure to find its way into its columns. The paper was printed in Kansas City, and a correspondent in each city wrote the stories that gave the edition for his own particular city its local flavor. The papers were delivered to the local newsboys each Sunday morning, and it is said that they sold like hot cakes, he who felt safe in buying a copy to see what it had to say about his bosom friend down the way, and others having a guilty feeling making them expectant of publicity through the columns of the Sun, buying as many papers as they could in a desperate effort to reduce the circulation.

The local writers for the Sun managed as a rule to keep their identity safely concealed, but that some of the gentlemen were not so fortunate as the majority of their brethren is instanced by the fate of the Wichita Falls correspondent, who, tradition says, was tarred and feathered and ridden out of town on a rail by a surprise party, among whom were many immigrants whose fame had been materially enhanced by the efforts of their victim.

Nutt says that the ordinance in its present form is in effect that the breath of scandal wafted through the columns of the unspeakable publication of their law-making activities were being aimed at had its effect probably close to some of their most prominent citizens, hence the laudable intention on the part of the city fathers to relieve them from this source of danger. Probably the council got its authority for this ordinance from the constitutional guarantee to everyone of the right to enjoy life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. It is said that those deriving any publicity from the Sun could not at least be said to enjoy the latter.

A statement in which he was borne out by the mayor and council, Mr. Kemp said that it was his duty to see that the ordinance was passed and he wished to correct the report. He said that just because he had instigated a sanitary dairy himself it should not be taken that he was interested in forcing anyone else to do likewise.

SICKNESS CHIEF DANGER TO TROOPS ON BORDER

(From Pittsburgh Gazette-Times.) Going to war is no joke. Indeed, an army of jokers, or of men going forth as to a picnic, wouldn't be worth the transportation. There is no great danger of being killed, hardly more than staying at home. The greater danger lies in the men not knowing how to take care of themselves. The men who were in the Civil War, their army lost in killed and mortally wounded about ninety thousand, while 235,000 died of sickness, a large part of which was preventable. Those who are surviving at present were mainly those who knew how to care for themselves.

SCARLET FEVER ALMOST CAUSES TROUBLE IN PEKING

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. Peking.—Scarlet fever broke out among the two hundred American Marines stationed in Peking as a guard at the American legation. In an effort to prevent the spread of the disease, Colonel Neville, commandant of the guard, ordered the men to move out of the barracks and placed them under canvas with only two men in each tent. The tents were pitched on the recreation ground adjoining the legation compound and outside the compound where all Chinese could see them plainly.

ORGANIZATION REUNITES OVER 85,000 FAMILIES

Associated Press Mail Correspondence. Paris.—The "Information Bureau for Dispersed Families," organized by French Women's Society, has succeeded in locating separated members of 85,000 families. The national committee of the French Women's Society, just closed adopted a resolution fixing Strasbourg, Capital of Alsace, once more as the place of meeting for 1917.

STEPS TO PREVENT ARMS SMUGGLING

Vigilance of Department of Justice Agents Has Been Increased Lately

By Associated Press. Washington, July 14.—Agents of the department of justice today increased their vigilance to prevent shipment of arms and ammunition across the Mexican border as a result of reports of smuggling. All munitions dealers and railroads are required to report their consignments.

SOME EXAMPLES OF BUNGLING IN CANADA

(Toronto Globe.) What is perhaps one of the most distressing sights in the city is the procession of women, some with babies in their arms, others with young ones hanging round their skirts and quite a number with both, along the basement corridor of the city hall to the property department, taking aid in an endeavor to have the militia department take an interest in their appeals for their assigned pay and separation allowances. Payments in a large number of cases are as many as seven months behind.

These women have given their breasts to the great cause in Europe, that the women of Belgium, Northern France and Serbia may be avenged and the people interested in their welfare at home declared them to be the victims of "absolutely unwarranted neglect and indifference on the part of the government as to where they are to get the necessary wherewithal to keep house and home together.

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Immediately a rumor was circulated that the American legation had brought extra troops from the Philippines to protect foreigners against possible rioting which might result from the unsettled political conditions and the financial stringency brought about by the moratorium. This rumor grew, and added to it was a report that the Japanese were also to bring in thousands of troops from Manchuria and Japan for the protection of foreigners.

There is a persistent rumor current here that the contract has to do with the construction of a line of track connecting Newcastle and Clico. This report is extremely reasonable, as is the other, giving the Katy line a direct service through Waco to Houston and Galveston.

Should the report prove to be well founded and either line mentioned be built, it will prove a good thing for Wichita Falls, meaning as it will a fast through train or two on the Katy for this city.

Craycraft enters his room every afternoon between 5:10 and 5:15. In the morning he leaves his dreamland exactly at 6:30. And when he returns in the afternoon his door is never opened until the time of his departure the next morning.

When Craycraft enters his room after a hard day's work in a place which he says he despises he takes out his fancy work and embroidery and toils for hours by electric light. He lost his right arm while working in a grain elevator in Kansas before he was 20 years old. He was born in Sedalia, Mo., and is a big, robust fellow with a kindly face. He is about 60 years old.

**MILITIAMEN SEIZE BREAD AND FRUITS NEAR BROWNSVILLE**

Hungry New York Guardsman Held Refreshment Stand, But Are Restrained.

Eliz, Penn., July 14.—When the train carrying the 71st New York regiment to the border stopped here today, hundreds of the militiamen disembarked and seized the contents of a bread wagon and the fruit from a vendor's cart. Then they rushed across the street to a small bakery and rifled it. Officers and soldiers with rifles rounded up the food looters and hurried them back to their coaches after compelling the men to pay for everything taken. The soldiers complained they had not eaten since 10 o'clock yesterday morning.

**50,000 TROOPS NOW NEAR BROWNSVILLE**

Brownsville, Texas, July 14.—According to announcement at Fort Brown today, one additional division of state troops has been ordered into this district, bringing the total of American forces on this border to one full army corps of about 50,000 men. The additional troops, it was said, will include seven regiments of infantry, one regiment of field artillery, two squadrons of cavalry and auxiliary troops from Iowa, North and South Dakota, Louisiana and Oklahoma.

According to Fort Brown advice, it is considered probable that the entire force will be formed into three complete divisions, one to be used in event of entry into Mexico as a battle line and the third for occupation and guard purposes.

MAN WHO POILED SOUTH IS DEAD IN PITTSBURGH

Pittsburgh, July 14.—John M. Larimo, aged 94 who foiled the plot in 1860 to strip the Allegheny arsenal of ammunition and cannon in order to use them in Confederate territory is dead at his home here.

SHOTS WIFE AND SON, THEN COMMITTS SUICIDE

Chicago, July 14.—Theodore Wasserman, a cement contractor, killed his wife and eighteen months old son and then committed suicide today. Wasserman apparently had quarreled with his wife and baby before slaughtering them with a knife. He ended his own life by opening an artery in his wrist.

MANY GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS ARE CLOSING IN CHINA

Peking.—Lack of funds has resulted in the closing of many government schools. The Peking High Normal School for Girls has been closed by order of the government, and teachers in many of the colleges and secondary schools and colleges have not been paid for several months. Even the foreign advisers of the late government were not paid their salaries of last month.

The young woman claims to have heard plainly the individual salvo about 5 p. m. on May 31 at intervals of five to ten seconds.
