

Fire Threatens Adjacent Lumber Yard But is Confined to Warehouse After Hard Fight—Large Amount of age Goods Lost.

Fire starting about 9;30 this morning, gutted the warehouse of the McFall Transfer & Storage Company at Sixth and Indiana and destroyed practically all contents.

### RESCUERS KILLED

Several Lives Lost In Futile Efforts to Save Others Work of Saving Lives Is Delayed By Lack of

Cleveland, Ohio, July 25.—Twenty two men are dead and a haif dozen others dying as a result of the explosion of gas in the waterworks tunnel five miles from shore under Lake Erie late last night.

The dead included workmen who were trapped in the tunnel when as exploded and members of two rescue parties who attempted to save the trapped men. Of the dead eleven were in the force trapped by the explosion. None of these escaped. The first rescue party consisted of seven men. Four of them perished and three were saved.

### GERMAN PARTIES UNDERGO CHANGE

INTERESTING POLITICAL DEVEL-OPMENTS AT LAST SESSION OF REICHSTAG.

#### OPPOSE CHANCELLOR

His Overtures to Loyal Socialist Ele-ment Meets With Conserva-tives' Disapproval.

Tives' Disapproval,

Berlin. — The Reichstag session just closed was marked by interesting developments in the relations between the government and the various policial parties. One result was to bring out more sharply than hitherto the opposition of the, Conservatives to Chancellor-Bethmann Hollweg.

The Conservatives represent the old aristocratic traditions of Prussia, and their social and political influence is so great that they usually succeeded under previous chancellors in shaping the sourse of the government. They have ever taken the lead in opposing all socialist and democratic tendencies in the state; and before the war one of their chief lines of policy was war upon the Socialists as an element dangerous to the monarchy and the present order of society. Since the war has been in progress, however, the government has quite changed its attitude toward the Socialists. The chancellor has steadily acted in the spirit of the emperor's declaration, made just as the war was about to begin that henceforth he knew no parties but only Germans.

The loyalty with which the Socialists have stood by the government and helped to fight the country's battles has been more than once recognized by Bethmann Hollweg in his speeches in the Reichstag, and he has clearly admitted this fact mast lead to some political readjustments after the war is over. This has never pleased the Conservatives. But the chancellor has gone on his way making friends or the Socialists and inviting their support for government measures. The Conservatives looked on coldiy at all this, for they saw that their best argument for keeping the government rigidity conservative was being wrested from their hands.

Besides this, the Conservatives have taken oftense at the government's taxaation policy. They are fully committed to the view that the empire must

taken offense at the government's tax-ation policy. They are fully commit-ted to the view that the empire must collect its revenue taxes through indi-rect taxation, like customs duties, and rect taxation, like customs duties, and internal revenue taxes of various kinds. Especially do they urgently insist that direct taxes—income, general property, and inheritance taxes—should be reserved for the federal states. The huge problem, however, of raising revenues to pay interest on the war debt to pay pensions, and meet other expenses growing out of the war, cannot be solved without resorting to direct taxation—there are not enough indirect taxes in reach to meet the requirements of the situation. Hence along with the various indirect taxes proposed this spring by the gov-Hence along with the various indirect taxes proposed this spring by the government was a direct tax on war profile. In working out the details of collecting this tax, however, it was found by the budget committee that it would be practically impossible to distinguish between profits due to the war and profits not due to it. Hence an all-round property tax of one mill on the dollar was proposed by the committee and accepted by the government. Some of the Conservatives finally voted for the tax; but their two

### RESTRICT FOREIGN CAPITAL IN MEXICO

Carranza Plans Series of Decree Covering Operations in Republic

By Associated Press.

New York, July 25.—Radical changes in the laws governing foreigners doing business in Mexico are about to be made by General Carranza in a series of decrees which later will be included in a new constitution, according to recent arrivals from Mexico City.—The new regulations, it is said, will provide that a'l foreign investors before entering business in Mexico, must agree not to have recourse in any case to any other law than that of Mexico and that they will not be entitled to any privileges not enjoyed by Mexicans. It will also provide that foreign capital already invested in Mexico may enjoy the right to be considered foreign and be entitled to the protection of its own government until the expiration of the occasion or agreement that it may have entered to provided it is not for a very long period. in the laws governing foreigners do-
