NUMBER INJURED

GOVERNMENT MAKES BIG REDUCTION IN ITS ESTIMATE OF YIELD.

BACKWARD IN TEXAS

Condition in This State 78 Per Cent July 25, Compared With 81 a Month Before.

By Associated Press. Washington, Aug. 1.—Heavy damage to the growing cotton crop between June 25 and July 25 has caused a reduction of 1,350,000 bales in the prospective production. The August cotton crop report of the department of agriculture announced today indicated a production of 12,916,000 equivalent 500 pound bales compared with 14,266,000 forecast from the condition of the crop June 25.

The condition during the month dropped 3.3 per cent to 72.3 of a normal. The estimate compares with 14,266,000 bales forecast last month by the bureau of crop estimates basing its calculations on the condition of the crop on June 25 and with 11,191,820 bales last year's final production in 1915. In 1914, 14,154,486 bales in 1912, and 17,054,486 in 1912. The final output, however, will be larger or smaller than above forecast according as conditions hereafter are better or worse than average conditions.

Condition of the crop on July 25 as compiled from reports of agents and correspondents in the cotton belt was placed at 72.3 per cent of a normal, compared with 81.1 on June 24, 75.4 on July 25 last year, 76.4 in 1914, and 73.5 the ten year average on July 25.

During the month storms caused some damage to the crop. In the first week weather was favorable in most places and the crop made satisfactory growth but owing to earlier unfavorable conditions some fields were retarded and in places the plants were small and backward. Boll weevil were reported damaging the crop in Texas, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas and Louisiana.

50 YEARS SERVICE FOR THIS ENGINEER

HUGHES FAVORS SUFFRAGE PLAN

DECLARES FOR AMENDMENT GIVING WOMEN OF NATION BALLOT.

ATTACK ON WILSON

Speech of Acceptance Monday Night Contains Much Criticism of Democrats.

By Associated Press. New York, Aug. 1.—Charles E. Hughes today declared for an amendment to the federal constitution providing for woman's suffrage. Mr. Hughes' views on the subject were made public in a letter he has written to Senator Sutherland of Utah.

Mr. Hughes' letter to Senator Sutherland was in reply to a telegram received from the senator asking Hughes to define his personal position with regard to equal suffrage federal amendment. Mr. Hughes' reply said: "I think it to be most desirable that the question of woman's suffrage should be settled promptly. The question is of such nature that it should be settled for the entire country. My view is that the proposed amendment should be supplemented and ratified and the subject removed from political discussion."

In his speech of acceptance last night at New York, Mr. Hughes' expressions on suffrage were less emphatic. Mr. Hughes assailed the administration for the course it has pursued with reference to Mexico, maintenance of American rights in the European war, its unflinching maintenance of all American rights on land and sea, and for adequate naval defense, adequate protection both on Eastern and Western Coasts.

"We denounce all plots and conspiracies in the interest of any foreign nation," Mr. Hughes said. "It is a disgraceful thing that our own people are being betrayed by appointments given to 'deserving Democrats,' and the failure to continue Ambassador Herrick at his post in Paris after the war had started as a 'lamentable sacrifice of international impulse.'"

**SAYS COLQUITT FAVORED SECOND PRIMARY IN 1906**

(Dallas News)

In a statement issued yesterday Judge Barry Miller, campaign manager for Senator Culberson for reelection to the United States Senate, replied to the efforts of O. B. Colquitt to get voters to give the nomination because he had received a plurality in the first primary July 22, as follows:

"Oscar H. Colquitt is contending that he should have the nomination for U. S. Senator because he got a plurality July 22. The law prescribes that the nomination shall be by majority and that in no case reported in the Dallas News of Aug. 17, 1906, page 3, column 4, Mr. Colquitt took a position quite different from the one he takes in that respect, Mr. Colquitt said.

"I have said that I advocated a law which would have required the submission of the names of Thomas M. Campbell and myself to a second Democratic primary in this state. (Cheers.) I stand for that today, fellow citizens, even though it compromises my aspirations and carries me down in defeat. (Applause.) I want no public station over the prospects of an overwhelming expression of the people.

"In view of the fact that Mr. Colquitt so ardently advocated the majority rule in 1906 and taking into consideration the fact that he got a little more than one fourth of the votes cast July 22, that is nearly three fourths of the votes being cast against him, I should think he would consider that an overwhelming expression of the people."

**FIRST AID LESSONS GIVEN HONOR GUARD**

Sixteen Members Receive Instructions in Bandaging and Nursing

Sixteen girls of the Honor Guard received their first lesson in first aid and practical nursing Monday afternoon at the home of Lieutenant Carver on Burnside. The first instructors being Drs. Everett Jones and A. D. Fattilo. Cutting and rolling of bandages and the scientific manner of applying the same, in addition to breaking one or all of their limbs, just as the necessity arises for practice.

For the majority of the girls the lectures and demonstrations were being given in first aid of any sort and all were extremely interested. Though the lessons are scheduled to last only 30 or 45 minutes a whole hour passed before either instructor or instructed were aware of the fact that Wednesday the second lesson will be given, also on the lawn of the Carver home and at this time an ambulance will be on hand and the girls will be instructed in ambulance service in addition to receiving additional instruction in bandaging. The lectures start at 6:30.

Monday Miss Carver went before the Chamber of Commerce and secured an appropriation towards defraying the expenses of the instruction of the Guard in swimming. Today she intends to make arrangements for a pool where the lessons can be given and this second class of instruction will be taken up shortly.

The beginning of the actual instruction of the Guard has resulted in an increased interest among the girls, several new members being out Monday afternoon, though not all of the charter members were in attendance for various reasons. Lieutenant Carver has issued an order that all members bring in new members Wednesday, including both girls and married women. It is expected with great pride that Wichita Falls is ahead of Dallas in the organization of the Girl's Honor Guard as the Dallas camp is just beginning to form. Miss Carver desires also that this city make as good a showing as possible in the membership, hoping to come up to the standard of Amarillo and other cities of the same period.

From present indications there will be about a dozen Wichita Falls girls to attend the state encampment at Fort Worth beginning August 14. Miss Carver, herself will go and there are several who have decided definitely to attend for the entire time of the encampment. Others have signified their intention of attending part of the time. At the encampment the girls will have every opportunity to put into practice the lessons in first aid and swimming which they have received. Also their instruction in swimming will stand them in good stead as water sports will form the principal diversion, the camp to be situated on the shores of Lake Worth.

**BETTER CAMP FOR TROOPS AT LAREDO**

City Enters Into Agreement With General Funston For Improved Conditions.

Laredo, Texas, Aug. 1.—The city of Laredo has entered into a business agreement with General Funston, commanding the southern department, to make this concentration camp one of the most healthful on the border.

Approximately 10,000 soldiers, regulars and national guardsmen, are stationed here now. Of the latter, the states of Texas, Maine, Missouri and New Hampshire are represented.

A thorough inspection of the various camps in this section was made by Colonel Edward J. Munson, chief sanitary officer of the southern department, and Major General Tanker H. Ellis, assistant chief of staff. As a result of this inspection, an agreement was drawn up between the army officers and Mayor Robert McComb for the following requirements, to become immediately effective.

- 1.—Agreement to accept and act upon the advice of a district sanitary inspector in regard to the abatement of nuisances.
- 2.—Appointment of two city sanitary inspectors to enforce proper sanitation within the vicinity of the camp.
- 3.—An efficient garbage collection service.
- 4.—Removal of all undesirable buildings in the vicinity of camp sites.
- 5.—Supervision to be maintained over slaughter-houses which occupy sites near the camps, and approved fly traps maintained.
- 6.—The main roads between and leading to all camps to be suitably oiled.
- 7.—Restaurants, lunch stands and places vending foods to be inspected daily and only boiled or properly distilled water to be used in any such places.
- 8.—All premises within 300 yards of camp limits to be cleaned and inspected daily.
- 9.—The city agrees to co-operate in securing effective and inexpensive disposal of sewage.
- 10.—Provisions to be made for effective drainage.
- 11.—Pipes for drainage to be provided at the cost of the city.
- 12.—The city water supply will be treated with chlorine for the purpose of sterilization.
- 13.—Strict enforcement of laws regarding the sale of liquors.
- 14.—Proper regulation of the residential districts and the tanneries thereof.

**SUPREME LODGE OF PYTHIANS CONVENES**

Twenty-Ninth Biennial Convention Opens Today at Portland, Oregon.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 1.—The twenty-ninth biennial convention of the Supreme Lodge, Knights of Pythias, opened here today with members present from all parts of the United States. The opening session was given over to a joint assembly of the Supreme Lodge and the Supreme Temple, Pythian Sisters, which was attended by friends and members generally.

Formal addresses of welcome were delivered by Governor James Withycombe and Mayor H. R. Albee. One of the responses was made by E. S. Young of Ada, Okla., supreme chancellor. Following the joint assembly the Supreme Lodge went into executive session. At the same time the Supreme Temple, Pythian Sisters, and the Grand Lodge of Oregon held the first sessions of their conventions in separate halls.

The principal parade of the convention is to be held this afternoon. The uniform rank, Knights of Khosroon, grand lodge and subordinate lodges generally are to participate. Tonight Walter B. Richie of Illinois, past supreme chancellor, will deliver his golden jubilee address on "The Pythian Lesson of Friendship."

National defense and the part the Knights of Pythias are to play in it is to be one of the main topics before the convention. The proposal to build a Pythian home is also expected to cause live discussion. Tonight thousands of Pythians from all over the United States were guests at a public reception at the national guard armory at which short addresses were made. Gus C. Moser of Portland, supreme representative, presided. The principal speaker was James E. Watson of Indiana, republican nominee in that state for the United States senate.

Portland was gallantly decorated along the principal streets and brilliantly illuminated in honor of the occasion. Ropes and clusters of multi-colored electric lights festooned nearly all the downtown streets. Banners and flags in countless number floated overhead.

Senator Walsh Says Action Worst Blown Ever Struck at Federal Judiciary.

Pittsburg, August 1.—In a speech on the Thomas institutional amendment to make federal judges ineligible to any elective office, Senator Walsh, Democrat, declared former Justice Hughes was nominated for the presidency by the republicans to save his party not to save the country, and charged that no more deadly blow ever had been aimed at the federal judicial system.

Senator Walsh said it was appropriate to defer action on the proposed amendment until a calmer time and that the election in November would serve as a referendum on the principle involved.

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 1.—"Spite fences"—those barriers erected to keep one's neighbors' chickens or children from one's garden—can not be built in Dallas more than five feet eleven and one-half inches in height. To build them six feet will incur a penalty of not less than \$200.

This new law was passed by the city commission recently, which raised the limit from five to six feet. The "spite fence" law as such is known, may be erected only to the rear line of any buildings on a street, the law provides.

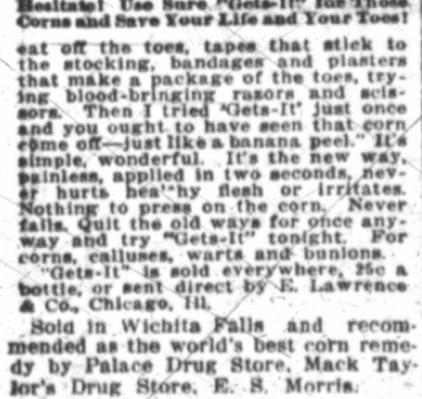

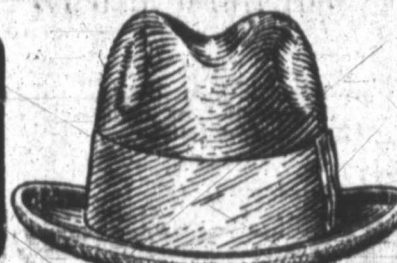
