## **BACKWARD IN TEXAS**

Condition In This State 78 Per Cent July 25, Compared With 81 a Month Before.

From 20 to 30 Are Hurt, None Fatally, in Crash—Engineer and Fireman instantly Killed When Cab Overturns.

July 25 has caused a reduction of 1,350,000 bales in the prospective production. The August cotton crop report of the department of agriculture announced today indicated a production of 12,916,000 equivalent 500 pound bales compared with 14,266,000 forecast from the condition of the crop June 25.

The condition during the month dropped 8.8 per cent to 72.3 of a normal.

The estimate compares with 14.266,000 bales forecast last month by the bureau of crop estimates basing its calculations on the condition of the crop on June 25 and with 11,191.

Speech of Acceptance Monday Night INVADERS LONG LINE Democrats.

New York, August 1.—Charles E. Hughes today declared for an amendment to the federal constitution providing for woman's suffrage. Mr. Hughes views on the subject were made public in a letter he has writ-ten to Senator Sutherland of Utah.

ARKANSAS COURTS IDLE SINCE STATE WENT DRY

(Memphis Commercial Appeal)
Reports reaching Little Rock from a number of cities of the state indicate that the statewide prohibition law passed by the legislature practically has destroyed criminal business in circuit courts. Sessions of grand juries held in several of the larger counties, where saloons flourished up to last January, were the dullest in years, according to final reports submitted to circuit judges. In several rities the juries reported that they did not have enough business to keep them in session for more than two or three days at a time and in consequence falls wirtually were empty. This condition prevailed in Little Rock to such an extent that the Pulaski county grand jury, in its final report, stated that the session which began last March and ended recently was the dullest ever held, and as a result business did not keep the inquisitors together more than two or three days at a time, and the number of indictments returned was o or three days at a time, and the nber of indictments returned was

about 65 per cent less than by any previous grand jury. Many of the members of the Pulas Many of the members of the Pulaski county grand jury, who always voted for license and signed petitions for saloons, refused to sign petitions circulated recently for the repeal of the statewide prohibition law, basing their refusal upon the ground that the closing of the saloons lessened crime to a very large degree and saved the taxpayers of the county large sums of money in the way of paying witness and prosecuting attorneys' fees in the criminal division of the circuit court.

A telegram from Texarkana the other day stated that for the first time in a number of years the Miller county jail was empty. This is another source of great economy to the cromity, because the sheriff receives 75 cents a day from the county for feeding each prisoner consigned to the jail.

The returns this year were gathered by the Texas Election bureau, composed of the leading newspapers of the State, which bureau was under the able direction of Charles H. Abbott, ormerly a well-known newspaper man, but in recent years in the service of the Southwestern Telegraph and Tele phone company. The success of the bureau resulted largely from the careful organization of the corps of cor-respondents covering the entire State. Mr. Abbott and a number of assistants spent thre months in selecting these correspondents from a list of several thousand eligible names and in organizing and instructing them:

No official reason could be ascertained for the delay but it was assumed that it was because the tide was not high at its flood stage. The next high tide occurs between seven and nine o'clock tonight.

Activities indicating the early departure of the Deutschland on her homeward voyage to Germany were noticed at her pier earlier in the day. The logs forming the outer barrier for the submarine were towed into midstream and anchored. Then the tug Timmons and a launch swept the channel from the dock out to the main channel with a heavy weight suspended under water from a line between the two craft. This was done evidently, as a precaution against possible obstructions in the path.

It was learned from a trustworthy source that Captain Koenig had asked for a pilot to guide the under water craft to the Virginia capes.

The United States coast guard cut. ter Wissahickon arrived from Philadelphia while those operations were in progress and took up a position off the end of the ship. Later the spar barricade was replaced just outside the line of covered barges which screen the Deutschland from view from the river.
