WILL BE ESTABLISHED FOR USE OF PUPILS COMING SESSION

FACULTY ADDITIONS

Teaching Force Now Chosen as One of Much Experience and Ability.

A student lunch room at the high school will be one of the additions to the high school this coming term which will mark it as in line with the most progressive schools of the country.

Another new member of the high school faculty will be F. Carl Valdez, University of Texas graduate and former student of the Wichita Falls high school.

A year of progress in literary society and debating work will mark the 1916-17 session if there are students who are interested in the work as J. S. Williams, mathematics instructor, the board has found a man who has made a record in his work with literary societies and debating teams.

There will be nine new teachers this year, five of these being additions, as only four of the present faculty will not return, these being H. A. Baker, M. W. Lay, Miss Steuben and Miss Rita Alder.

Miss Louise Schmid, who will occupy the chair of German and Spanish, succeeding Miss Hermione Sieben, has a degree from the University of Chicago and has a record of splendid work from the Henrietta high school.

\$1.30 PER BUSHEL NEW WHEAT PRICE

Sensational Advance Is Recorded In Futures Market in Chicago Today.

Prices of \$1.30 per bushel for new crop and \$1.23 1/2 for old, were posted at local elevators this morning, marking further substantial advances in the price of the grain.

New York Cotton

New York, Aug. 9.—Relatively easy sales and rather more favorable crop advices from Texas and some eastern belt sections were followed by an opening decline of seven to twelve points in the cotton market today with December selling at 14.47 and January at 14.58 on the call. The market turned firmer later with December selling up to 14.49 and January to 14.68 or about one or two points net higher. Cotton closed barely steady. October 14.37, December 14.59, January 14.69, March 14.82 and May 14.95.

Chicago Grain

Chicago, Aug. 9.—Excited trading and advances of more than eight cents a bushel in the value of wheat resulted today from the United States crop report showing that the huge crop losses of late had been generally underestimated. Opening quotations which varied from 4 5/8 to eight cents higher with September at \$1.27 1/2, to 11.41 and December at \$1.42 to \$1.45 were followed by temporary setbacks, but in some instances 1 1/2 cent additional returns followed. Advices that the weather in Canada was foggy and that black rust damage therefore would be likely to increase led afterward to higher prices. The close was 1/4 cent higher at 11.53 to 11.55 net advance with September at \$1.44 1/2 to \$1.44 3/4 and December at \$1.48 to \$1.48 3/8.

The bill was to have been reported yesterday but a delay of a week was asked by one member of the committee, who wished to consult the attorney general about it. Inasmuch as Attorney General Gregory is not opposing the measure, it is thought the delay will not affect the bill's chances and that a favorable report will be submitted to the Senate next week.

**OKLAHOMA CONSUMPTION OF TOBACCO INCREASES**

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, Aug. 9.—More cigars, cigarettes and pipe tobacco were smoked in Oklahoma and more chewing tobacco consumed during the fiscal year just ended than during any previous corresponding period, according to a report of Herbert Bolton, collector of internal revenues, just issued. More than five hundred tobacco dealers paid special licenses for that period, the report adds.

## START USING NEW DALLAS TERMINAL SEPTEMBER 15

Dallas, Tex., Aug. 9.—The first trains will be operated in and out of Dallas' new \$5,000,000 terminal station on September 15, according to the present program. The formal opening of the terminal, with appropriate exercises at which President Wilson has been asked to be present, are set for September 19.

The terminal which is known as the Union Station, will be utilized by the eight railroads operating into Dallas. Until this time each has had its own station, with the exception of the Frisco-Rock Island lines, which use the Santa Fe depot facilities.

The new station is so situated that it is accessible to all railroads, east and west, and north and south bound, without much relaying of track. The belt line track is carried out to a large extent. There are eight tracks in the main shed section of the depot, making it possible to handle one train on each railroad at the same time.

The most handsome appointment in connection with the new building is the waiting room and concourse, which is over 200 feet square. In it are located all ticket offices. Headquarters of railroad and terminal company officials are on the third floor.

Entrance and exit to the train platform is made from the second floor of the station, through a long corridor which runs over the tracks. Individual stairways lead up and down to each track. Every effort has been made to avoid pedestrian crushes and to carry out the discharge and embarkation of passengers in an orderly and systematic manner.
