

STRIKE SETTLEMENT NOW QUESTION OF FEW HOURS

PRESIDENTS AGREEABLE TO 8 HOURS

IN RETURN THE YASK, HOWEVER, ASSURANCE THAT FREIGHT RATES WILL BE INCREASED BY INTERSTATE COMMISSION.

ASK FOR BOARD

Want Labor Commission to Handle Differences—Report is Communicated and Men Apparently Regard Them Favorably.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—After continued conferences today between President Wilson and the select committee of railroad executives the situation surrounding the threatened strike was described as having narrowed to the following:

The railroad presidents, at least the select committee of eight, are willing to accept the eight-hour day insisted upon by President Wilson and the trainmen.

In return they ask that they be assured as fully as possible that proper support be given and proper means be used to assure them freight rate increase from the interstate commerce commission.

They ask also that congress create a permanent board or commission similar to the Canadian commission to handle such differences. A committee of this character would be empowered to investigate when labor troubles threaten and no strike could be called or a strike vote taken pending its investigation, a full report of which would be made public at its conclusion.

At the end of the investigation arbitration would be suggested, but if not accepted opportunity would be given to take a strike vote. The balloting would be secret.

These proposals were communicated today by Commissioner Chambers of the federal board of mediation to the representatives of the men who apparently regarded them favorably. Judge Chambers then reported to President Wilson and a sub-committee of railroad executives was summoned to the White House.

DEVELOPMENTS FAVOR AN EARLY SETTLEMENT

Washington, Aug. 24.—Renewed optimism on prospects of averting a railroad strike is prevalent today among representatives of the employees and at the white house. Commissioner Chambers of the federal mediation board, according to reports received by President Wilson carried a message to the brotherhood leaders. It was supposed to be some form of proposal made to the president last night by the sub-committee of the railroad employees. It was kept secret but A. B. Garretson, spokesman for the employees, said "it certainly was not depressing." Other leaders indicated it was very satisfactory.

The executives met and heard the report of the subcommittee which had been working on another proposal and it was expected that President Wilson's answer would be given today or the latest tomorrow.

Signs of unrest among the men so apparent yesterday disappeared today and there were signs that the railroad men were in some proposal to include the 8-hour day in a manner satisfactory to the employees committee and then bring about an investigation of the collateral issues.

After conference with the employees and employers representative, Commissioner Chambers of the federal mediation board discussed the strike situation with President Wilson and made arrangements for a group of the railroad presidents to see Mr. Wilson immediately. There were reports that settlement was imminent.

Hale Holden of the Burlington, Daniel Williams of the Baltimore and Ohio and F. Lovett of the Union Pacific, the sub-committee which has been dealing with the president for the last two days, arrived at the white house shortly before one o'clock and refused to make any statement before seeing the president. After the conference it was said the outlook was "more hopeful if anything."

The president sent for the executives to acquaint them with the progress made by him in dealing with the problems suggested in previous conferences.

FIRST MEETING OF COMMISSION IS IN NEW YORK

Mexico City, Aug. 24.—James Lynn Rogers, the American representative to the Carranza government, formally made it known to the foreign office here today that the preliminary conference of the representatives of the United States and Mexico for the settlement of international difficulties will be held at the Biltmore in New York City on Monday, September 4. The Mexican representatives will probably leave here on Saturday. The final conference it was said, will be held at some place on the New England coast.

KING LUDWIG III NEAR DEATH'S DOOR

Stricken With Apoplexy, His Condition is Considered to Be Serious.

Paris, Aug. 24.—King Ludwig III of Bavaria has been stricken with apoplexy and his condition is grave, according to a report from Switzerland, says a dispatch to the Petit Parisien.

King Ludwig III, is 71 years old. He married Arch Duchess Marie Therese of Austria and ascended the Bavarian throne in 1913. He was appointed a field marshal of the Bavarian artillery last year and visited the Bavarian troops on battle lines since January last.

DANES REJECT PROPOSAL TO SELL ISLAND

London, Aug. 24.—The Danish Landsting has rejected the proposal to sell the Danish West Indies to the United States, says a Reuters dispatch from Copenhagen.

The vote was taken in committee by Landsting, the upper house of the Danish parliament. The treaty was rejected by 39 votes.

CONFIRM ARRIVAL OF DEUTSCHLAND

Traveled 4200 Miles on Return Journey From the United States

London, Aug. 24.—Reports of the return of the Deutschland to the United States are corroborated in a telegram received at Amsterdam from Bremen forwarded by Reuters. According to this information the Deutschland traveled 4,200 miles on her homeward journey.

The first part of the voyage was stormy and tempestuous, the report says, but later the sea became morose. The Deutschland proved to be able to navigate the stormy seas excellently and her engine worked faultlessly.

BREMEN HELD FOR NEWS OF THE DEUTSCHLAND

By Associated Press. The departure for America a week ago of the German submarine Bremen is reported in a dispatch from Sweden and forwarded from The Hague by the Exchange Telegraph Company. It is said the owners of the Deutschland and Bremen received word seven days ago of the progress being made by the Deutschland on her return voyage and it was not until they had obtained this information that they permitted the Bremen to depart.

KAISER CONGRATULATES CAPTAIN OF SUBMARINE

Amsterdam, Holland, Aug. 24.—According to a dispatch received today from Berlin, Emperor William has congratulated the following telegram to the owners of the submarine Deutschland: "With sincere pleasure I have just received news of the successful return of the submarine liner Deutschland. I heartily congratulate the owners and builders of the vessel and the brave seamen under Koehnig's command."

The message also expressed the intention of the emperor to bestow decorations on members of the Deutschland's personnel.

LINER REMOVED TO ANOTHER PORT

North German Lloyd Ship Slips Out of Boston Harbor Early Today

Boston, Aug. 24.—The North German Lloyd liner Wilhelm, which has been in refuge here since the outbreak of the war, slipped out of the harbor early today presumably for New London, Conn., for which port she obtained clearance papers last night. Officials of the line asserted the change was made to reduce dock charges and deny reports that there was any connection between the Wilhelm and movement and the expected arrival of the German merchant submarine Bremen.

OF COURSE THERE'S MUCH UNEASINESS

Navy Department Has Scare in Connection With Training of Volunteers

By Associated Press. The navy department had a spy scare today. It was entirely theoretical however, and was based on the fears that information concerning the location of Rear Admiral Helm's "Troop Blue" fleet ascending the Atlantic coast against a tactical assault by Admiral Mayo's "Red" fleet might reach the invaders by wireless from foreign merchant ships clearing from American ports.

This information it was pointed out might be gathered by "foreign agents" from incoming ships which had sighted the "Blue" fleet and given to outgoing vessels for transmission after the three mile neutrality limit was passed. It was considered entirely probable that officers of the invading fleet before the war, came actually started did not overlook the opportunity to establish an espionage system similar to that which American authorities might have to cope in time of war.

For this reason details of the "Blue" fleet's tactics were guarded at the navy department as carefully as if the nation were actually in danger.

Even the chances of leaks within the department were admitted as theoretically possible. Amateur wireless stations are in censorship and those in charge of supervising the amateurs are taking precautions to avoid dissemination of military secrets through those sources.

Considering the location of the invading fleet when first reported and the speed of the vessel which was out to meet it an encounter might have occurred yesterday.

STORM DID GREAT DAMAGE TO CROPS

State Department of Agriculture Issues Bulletin on Conditions in the State

By Associated Press. Austin, Tex., Aug. 24.—The storm that swept south Texas Friday 18th inst., wreaked incalculable damage to crops. This storm covered the territory severely from Brownsville on the extreme south to Uvalde on the west and hit the coast, doing damage to the crops before reaching Austin. Worst of storms as to crop damage seemed to center around Cottle, La Salle counties. Feed crops were largely damaged and cotton suffered in greater proportion. Open cotton bolls cut and green bolls beaten off. Stalks damaged so that new growth doubtful. A heavy rain accompanied the wind over most of territory.

Crops in Kendall county badly injured by hail early in season; never recovered. All crops in Kerr above the average and all stock in prime condition.

Hriscoe, Swisher, Castro, and Heat Smith counties reported that heavy rains have fallen. All crops previously at about 60 per cent. Favorable prospects as to land scientifically prepared.

Delta and Lamar counties are needing rain. Cotton deteriorating; shedding and fast developing. Cotton 65 per cent; corn 75 per cent; peanuts 80 per cent; sorghum for molasses 50 per cent.

Fisher county reports cotton 25 per cent; sorghum 25 per cent; corn 5 per cent; stock water very scarce.

In Taylor, Mitchell and Nolan counties all crops are slightly below average, yet the country will not have to import any feed stuff. Cotton picking under way.

In Stonewall and Haskell counties all crops suffering for rain. No boll weevil. The early maize, kafir corn and, fetoria holding up well.

Hopkins and Hunt counties report corn 90 per cent; cotton 75 per cent; all hay crops 90 per cent. Hot and dry.

Wood and Rains counties, cotton 55 per cent; corn 100 per cent. Hgt and dry. Late fruits and gardens suffering.

In Eastland and Callahan counties cotton deteriorating, especially on hard lands. Peanuts are shedding badly. Fruit crops suffering. Sweet potato acreage growing.

PATROLMEN HAVE CHANCE TO RECOVER

Men Shot in Kansas City by Physician Are Improving and There is Hope

By Associated Press. Kansas City, Aug. 24.—Physicians attending Philip D. Ness and Glenn Marshall, the patrolmen who were shot last night in a drug store and slain by the slaying of Dr. Fred W. Larkin, declared today the chances of the two men to recover were good.

Ness was struck four times when Dr. Larkin fired at him at a distance of less than a foot. Marshall was struck three times before the physician who had become enraged, because he had been ejected from his apartment, received the wound from which he died.

EARLY MEETING OF COMMISSION

Will Discuss Border Problems at Some Point on New England Coast

By Associated Press. Washington, Aug. 24.—Word from Mexico City was awaited at the state department today before fixing a date for the first meeting of the American-Mexican commission to discuss border problems. It tentatively has been decided, however, by Secretary Lansing and Eliso Arredondo, Mexican ambassador designate, that the commission shall meet at some place on the New England coast during the first week of September.

With the season of the commission actually at hand there is much speculation on the procedure to be followed. There is no question in the minds of officials that the withdrawal of American troops will first be taken up with the drafting of a protocol covering future border operations. It has been stated that the commission agreements which have been reached separately to be acted on by the two governments.

Germany Is To Float Fifth War Loan on Sept. 4

INJUNCTION CASE POSTPONED TODAY

WILL BE HEARD BEFORE JUDGE BONNER AT ARCHER CITY NEXT WEDNESDAY.

MANY ARE PRESENT

Much Interest Is Manifested by Stockmen From Archer County and Other Localities.

The hearing of the application for an injunction asked by Archer county livestock men against the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission officers restraining the commission and its agents from carrying into effect the provisions of the dipping law in cases where cattle are now free from ticks was postponed this afternoon by agreement until next Wednesday when Judge Bonner will go to Archer City to hold the hearing.

Attorneys for the commission and for the livestock men were in conference this afternoon in an effort to reach an agreement, whereby the authority of the dipping law and the dipping rules mitigated. Many of the stockmen who came up from Archer county today say that although they are free from ticks now and they would be willing to keep on dipping if more rain would fall water is now scarce and they declare that heavy damage results from repeated dipping of their cattle under the conditions that prevail.

Nearly a hundred Archer county stockmen including the plaintiffs in the action and witnesses who had been summoned came up today in automobiles to attend the hearing.

W. R. Estill and about fifty other Archer county farmers and stockmen are plaintiffs in the action. A permanent injunction is asked against the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, its inspectors, the county attorney and other officials of Archer county. It asks that the inspectors and others be enjoined from attempting to enforce the dipping law and that cattle as long as they are free from ticks; that the defendants be enjoined from instituting criminal prosecution of the plaintiffs; that the plaintiffs be enjoined from further attempts or threatening to apply the law requiring the dipping of cattle.

The application recites that the plaintiffs have dipped their cattle four times since the law was placed in operation in Archer county, under the direction of the inspectors for the alleged purpose of freeing them from ticks. It is claimed that the dipping injures the cattle in that it causes some of the cattle to lose their hair, kills some and causes all to lose flesh, etc. The plaintiffs claim that their cattle are not so infested with ticks as the county inspectors claim that they are, and that they are free from ticks, clean and healthy.

The petition charges that the commission exists under the constitution of Texas. It is further argued that the law is unconstitutional because it and attempts to delegate to the county inspectors the power to make laws and to deprive the plaintiffs of their property without due process of law and denies the right of trial by jury, and takes their property without compensation, and seems to create an exemption from damages.

Carroll, Drew, the inspector in charge, it is claimed, has announced that he will quarantine the premises of the plaintiffs so that they cannot move their cattle, which he carries into effect with a force of men, more than 125,000. R. S. Morrison, county attorney of Archer county, it is alleged, is threatening criminal prosecution of the plaintiffs.

The business contend that the dipping law is unconstitutional for the reason that the legislature is without authority to subject a local community for the purpose of determining whether ticks shall be eradicated, because no such authority exists under the constitution of Texas. ALLIES DEVELOP ADDED IMPETUS IN THE BALKANS

ADVANCE OF THE BULGARIANS ON THE ALLIED RIGHT FLANK OF SALONIKI, IS CONTINUING.

ZEPPELINS PAY VISIT

Raid Is Made Over England But London Reports Assert That Bombs Fell in Open Fields With Slight Damage Being Done.

The Associated Press summarizes the European war situation as follows: The drive of the Bulgarian army against the allied right flank on the Macedonian front apparently developed into a sharper clash with the enemy forces and greater losses to them than previously had been indicated, judging from the official report received from Sofia today.

A severe defeat was administered to General Sarrail's troops along the Struma river, northeast of Saloniki on August 21, the statement declares, the entente forces taking flight, leaving the field covered with dead and abandoned quantities of ammunition and supplies, including machine guns.

The Bulgarian forces now have entrenched themselves on the east bank of the Struma and along the highway to Feres, according to the French official report today. Their positions here lie in the way of an allied advance along the most direct route into Bulgaria.

The allied defense in the Balkans in developing added impetus, a dispatch indicates. Paris reports the Serbians on the aggressive along the western end of the front where they captured another village, about 10 miles northwest of Ostrovo Lake. The Bulgarians took this position in their initial drive on the "drier" left flank. The capture of this village is subject to attack but the French report they have been easily repulsed. No forward movement has been reported by the entente forces, including the Bardar allies upon which it has been thought probable the main offensive movement would be pressed, but the entente armies is notably active particularly in the Lake Dorian region.

The advance of the Bulgarians on the allied right flank, the center has been Saloniki apparently is continuing, an official statement issued yesterday at Sofia, repeating the defeat and flight of entente forces along the Struma.

Berlin dispatches indicate that Romania's attitude is still considered by the central powers as decidedly uncertain while views from other sources give no information on the subject.

Activity on the Somme front in Northern France seems to have slackened although the artillery is still being vigorously employed. The Germans made a grenade attack on the French in the afternoon, several of the river last night after a vigorous bombardment but according to today's Paris bulletin met with no success.

Constantinople reports Russian pressure in considerable force in Armenia but states that Russia failed to advance and losses were about 3,000 men in the Obnot sector alone. Petrograd announces the capture of two Turkish regiments in the fighting on this front.

REFLECTED FROM THE LAND

Mirage Frequently Seen by Travelers Through the Red River Valley of Minnesota.

That phenomenon known as the mirage has always been of interest to travelers. Sometimes even people on the train can get a glimpse of such an illusion. In the Red River valley of Minnesota are occasionally to be seen some of its effects. In a guide book issued by the United States Geological Survey Warren Upham says: "The mirage, typical of plains country or the ocean, may be seen in the Red River valley almost any sunny day in spring, summer or autumn. This queer phenomenon makes the high land at the sides of the valley and the tops of the distant trees and houses appear to be raised a little above the horizon, with a narrow strip of sky between. The more complex and astonishing effect of mirage may be seen from the highland on either side of the lake-bed floor. There, in looking across the valley from one and one-half to two hours after sunrise on a hot morning following a cool night, the groves and houses, villages and grain elevators loom up to two or three times their true height and places ordinarily hidden by the curvature of the earth are brought into view. Oftentimes, too, these objects are seen double, being repeated in an inverted image close above their real position and separated from it by a fog-like haze. In its most perfect development the mirage shows the upper and topsy-turvy portion of the view quite as distinctly as the lower and true portion. These appearances are due to refraction and reflection from layers of air of different density such as are often formed above a wide expanse of level country in warm weather."

It is worthy of remark that although the common clay pipe of England is entirely different in material and form from our original American pipe, it was used in nearly its present shape at the first introduction of tobacco, as though before approved for a similar use.

Clay pipes, supposed to be of a date anterior to this period, have occasion ally been found in Irish bogs. An engraving of a dozen, which was dug up at Brannockstown, striking between the teeth of a human skull, may be found in the "Anthologia Hibernica," together with a paper which, on the authority of Hieronimus, Strabo and other ancient writers, would prove that the northern nations of Europe, long before the discovery of America, were acquainted with tobacco, or an herb of similar properties, and that they smoked it through small tubes.

POISON MYSTERY HAS BAFFLED THE OFFICIALS

His wife, after having been once convicted and sentenced to die, pleaded guilty to second degree murder on a second trial, and is serving a twenty-year term in Auburn prison.

Now, according to physicians attending him, Elmer Buffum, 32 years old, who took over the Buffum farm, is suffering from arsenic poisoning, showing the same symptoms as did Buffum. He has been ill almost May. County officials have been secretly investigating the case for two weeks, but refuse to say whether they suspect that Elmer is poisoning. Other persons living on the farm have not been affected. Dr. Lesser Kauffman of Buffalo, who has attended Elmer, today expressed doubt that the man was suffering from arsenic poisoning.

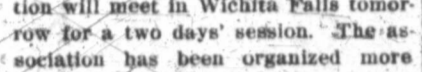

Care of Goldfish

A globe of two or three goldfish with a bit of green seaweed makes a pretty centerpiece, and they are inexpensive and easily cared for. They should be placed at some distance from stove and register and not in the rays of the sun. They endure extremes of cold rather than heat. In the bottom of the globe place some small stones, a bit of sand, a little charcoal and a spray of camomile, a fine water plant. Feed them a little at a time. Once in two weeks remove them to a pail of muddy water for an hour, clean the globe, replace the shells, stones, etc., and refill with clear, cold water.

274 TRAINS TO USE DALLAS DEPOT DAILY

Dallas, Texas, Aug. 24.—When the new union station for steam roads and the Dallas depot for electric traction are opened to the public, a total of 274 steam and electric passenger trains will arrive and depart from the new depot every 24 hours. These figures were ascertained by a careful check of all the operating schedules of the eight steam railroads and the four divisions of the three electric lines running into Dallas.

If there are no changes in the time of arriving and departure of steam passenger trains there will be sixty in and out of the big terminals on Houston street from 6 a. m. until 10 o'clock at night. There are theoretically eighty trains, accounting for through trains on trunk lines. The Northern Texas Traction company heads the list of electric trains, eighty cars arriving and departing during the day and night. Trains over the Waco, Corsicana and Denton divisions of the Texas Traction company and the Southern Traction company total 110. A few of these carry baggage and express.

It is estimated that during special occasions in Dallas, such as the State Fair of Texas and the state celebration days, the number of regular steam and electric trains will be increased more than 50 per cent. The capacity of the Union Terminal company's yards has not been tested, although it is believed from ten to twenty trains can be handled simultaneously in cases of emergency.

The interurban terminals at Jackson and Erowder streets will have a normal capacity of twenty-four cars. This number can be increased fully 50 per cent in emergency movements. It was estimated by the terminal superintendent.
