PRESIDENT HAS PUT SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE UP TO CONGRESS IN MESSAGE DELIVERED PERSONALLY

SUGGESTS SIX SUBJECTS FOR LEGISLATION

PRESIDENT ADDRESSES JOINT SESSION OF BOTH HOUSES OF CONGRESS THIS AFTERNOON ON EIGHT-HOUR CONTROVERSY.

EXPLAINS EFFORT

Assures Lawmakers That He Has Used His Best Endeavors to Secure an Agreement Without Success and Proposes Legislation.

President Wilson laid the railroad strike situation before congress at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon in an address to both houses in joint session. The president told of his efforts to bring the railroad managers and the men into some sort of agreement, and saying he is powerless to do more, asked congress to enact certain specific legislation to deal with the situation now and in the future.

NEGRO SHOOTS A WHITE MAN

W. H. NORRIS IS VICTIM OF SHOTS FIRED LAST NIGHT NEAR 11TH AND OHIO.

A BOLD HOLD UP

Norris Was Fired Upon When He Broke Away—Negro Makes Successful Getaway.

Another instance of the many outbreaks on the part of the lawless negro element here was afforded in the bold holdup and shooting of W. H. Norris, a Clay county farmer, near the corner of Eleventh and Ohio, within two blocks of the police station at a few minutes after ten last night. Mr. Norris, returning from a visit to a friend who was coming to town on Ohio when he was halted by a negro in front of Morgan's feed store and ordered to elevate his hands. The negro appeared on his left side and grasped him with his left hand as he ordered him to halt. Mr. Norris attempted to break away and the negro shot him in the left side of the neck inflicting only a flesh wound, but narrowly missing the jugular vein. The left side of his face was rather severely burned, succeeding in breaking away from the wounded man was probably ten feet from his assailant when the negro fired again, this time hitting him in the left forearm about half way between the wrist and elbow, the bullet passing between the two bones but not breaking either of them.

Constable Will Allen, Deputy Harold Buster and Night "Prof" McDonald who were at the station at the time of the holdup, ran immediately toward the sound of the shots and met Norris on his way to town, but the negro had executed a disappearance before the officers got there, and a quick search of the adjoining premises failed to show anyone. The officers returned to the station and questioned Norris about the appearance of his assailant, getting a fairly good description. Mr. Norris said that he got a fairly good look at the man on account of his being outlined in the light at the corner of Eleventh and Ohio. A rather tall, almost black and well built negro with light shirt, a dark hat, and dark clothes was the description given. Norris also said that the light shirt may have been a light checked jumper. The entire appearance of the man of the day force, reinforced by members of the sheriff's and constable's forces, made a thorough search of the negro section and closely watched all trains that left during the night taking up several suspects in connection with the robbery. However, they have not yet been able to locate the man whom they are most anxious to get hold of, and are keeping a close lookout for him.

Norris was given emergency treatment at the city hall by Dr. Mark Moore, city health officer, and was later taken to the General Hospital in Dr. Moore's car where his wounds might be more effectually treated. Reports from the hospital today said that Mr. Norris was doing nicely and rested quietly last night.

Mr. Norris lives east of town just across the Clay county line, and was a frequent visitor to Wichita Falls, being known well by a large number of people here. A son resides here, rooming at 404 Scott.

FEW BANKS CHARGE USURIOUS RATES

Washington, Aug. 29.—The charging of extortionate rates of interest by national banks in many sections of the country, especially in the agricultural districts, almost is a thing of the past as a result of the campaign waged by the United States treasury department. John Skelton Williams, comptroller of the currency, said last night.

Williams continues to charge usurious rates, however. Comptroller Williams made public a telegram from the cashier of a national bank in Texas, who said that he believed the cheaper rate of interest which his bank is charging will bring and is already bringing a large increase in business.

ARE RAISING FUND TO LOAN STUDENTS

Planned to Provide \$100,000 to Help Deserving Young People Without Money.

A movement to raise a \$100,000 fund to be used to make loans to young men and women who desire to attend the University of Texas, has been launched in this state recently, and Orville Bullington of this city is chairman of the committee which is in charge of the movement. Ex-students of the University in every section of Texas are interested in the movement.

Mr. Bullington has already raised \$1200 among business men of Wichita Falls, as a starter for the movement, and other committee members are expected to also secure subscribers to make up a nucleus for the fund. There is already about \$15,000 in a fund of this kind which will be taken care of by the committee which is organizing a benevolent corporation, and secure a charter in order to operate more freely.

The money would be loaned to deserving young men and women who would not otherwise be able to obtain funds to defray their expenses. Each borrower would be expected to repay the loan, with interest, so that the fund would grow as the need for it increased. It is believed that in the past the lack of such a fund has prevented many youths from attending the University.

In connection with ex-student activities here, it is announced that Dr. R. E. Vinson, the new president of the State University, will attend the banquet of the "Texas Exes" at the Wichita Falls district, to be held here February 22 of next year.

BAPTIST LADIES ADD \$150 TO FUND

This Amount Will Be Forwarded by the Woman's Alliance of that Church.

A fund of \$150 raised by the Woman's Alliance of the First Baptist church, will be forwarded by the latter part of the week to Buckner's Orphan Home at Dallas as the share of the Baptist women of the city in the Wichita Falls fund to aid in the typhoid epidemic fight. Previously the Baptist church and Sunday school have sent about \$200 in addition to the fund of more than \$100 raised last week, making in the neighborhood of \$500 sent from this city.

The Alliance has had an especial interest in the Home all along and earlier in the year sent a cash offering of \$150 and a box of clothing valued at \$285, so it will be seen that local Baptists have faithfully done their share for the Home.

EXPECT ROADS TO FIGHT NEW ORDER

Such is Opinion of Mr. Fontaine, General Freight Agent of Northwestern.

That the railroad companies will take up the gauntlet thrown down yesterday in cancelling all advances in freight rates during the last two years, is the opinion of C. L. Fontaine, general freight agent of the Northwestern. The railroads fought hard for the advance, which was a matter of life and death for them, and they can not afford to let the half million dollars of additional revenue get away from them, said Mr. Fontaine, who looks for the railroads to apply for a restraining injunction within the next few days.

According to Mr. Fontaine the action of the roads in adjusting their rates does not necessarily mean that the railroads recognize in the Interstate Commerce Commission any superior authority over the Texas Commission as regards interstate rates, but they are going on the theory that the commission was right in holding that Shreveport's geographical advantages might not be legislated away from them, and that the rates of the Texas commission affected an interstate rate which brought it within the jurisdiction of the Interstate body.

POLICE MAKING SPEED RECORDS

Hillsboro Negro Arrested in Few Minutes After Description is Received.

The night police force broke into the limelight last night with a piece of quick work that will compare with the work of the day men Sunday in locating a stolen car in twenty minutes. Last night the police station had a call from Fred Long of Hillsboro, sheriff of Hill county, giving a description of a negro by the name of Ed. Washington for whom he held a warrant for theft of under \$50, and in about twenty minutes the police, armed with this description, had arrested the negro and he was in the city jail. He was located at Mary Caruth's who runs a negro rooming house in the flats by Frank Burns.

Washington left Hillsboro Sunday morning for Wichita Falls, driving through the country in a Ford runabout with a racing body. His wife came in the car with him, but Sheriff Long informed the local officers that he was not after her and she was not arrested.

Railroad Official Finds Son After Ten Years Search

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Arthur J. Colligan, who surrendered himself on the street here last Thursday night with the allegation that he was wanted in Tulsa, Okla., for the murder of a woman, has been identified by Patrick J. Colligan, general freight agent of the Baltimore & Ohio at Pittsburgh, as his son, lost for ten years. The Oklahoma authorities have reported that Colligan is not wanted in Tulsa, as the murder was committed by another known man, and so far as known Colligan was never in Oklahoma. The police say young Colligan was injured in Pittsburgh in a railroad accident about ten years ago when he was 24 years old and disappeared from the hospital to which he was sent. His father heard of him two years later in Texas. The family has spent much money in search for the son, it is said. The name attracted the father's attention in the present situation and he came here today with his daughters and a lawyer. The party saw the detained man at the jail and identified him. The Buffalo police will recommend that the man be released in custody of his relatives.

LARGE FLEET LEAVES WATERS OF MEXICO

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 29.—Fourteen United States war vessels are in San Diego harbor. Five cruisers, seven destroyers, one submersible and a transport, comprising the largest fleet which has been assembled here in months. Most of the vessels have been withdrawn from Mexican waters, eight arriving from the south yesterday. PRESIDENT HAS PUT SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE TO CONGRESS

(Continued from page one) To reject my proposal in this matter upon the condition that they must, at any cost to themselves or to the country, stand firm to the principle of arbitration with the men have rejected. I have based my counsel on the indisputable fact that there was no means of arbitration. Earnest means at negotiation had failed to produce a settlement in the least. To stand firm in the principle of arbitration and yet not get arbitration seems to me futile and something more than futile because it involves inevitable, disastrous, and consequences worse than war and that in the midst of peace. I yield to no man in firm adherence, alike of conviction and purpose to the principle of arbitration in industrial disputes, but matters have come to a head in this particular dispute and the country has been taught unprovided without any practical means of enforcing that condition in practice by whose fault we do not stop to inquire. A situation had to be met, whose elements and final condition were indisputable. The practical and certain course to pursue, as it seemed to me, was to secure immediate peace by conceding the one thing in the demand of the men which would be self and easy arbitrators who represented public sentiment were most likely to approve and immediately lay the foundations for securing arbitration with regard to every other matter involved. The event has confirmed that judgment. I was seeking to compose the present in order to secure a permanent peace and friendly cooperation in which to be consulted with the representatives of the nation with regard to the best method for providing, so far as it might prove possible to provide, against the recurrence of such unhappy situations in the future, the best and most practicable means of securing calm and fair arbitration of all industrial disputes in the days to come. This is, I believe, the best way for studying a principle, namely having failed to make certain of its observance in the present to make certain of its observance in the future. If I could not get the men to accept the will of others who took an entirely different view of the circumstances of the case, who even refused to admit the circumstances of the case what they have done out to be. Having failed to bring the parties to this critical juncture to an accommodation, I therefore turn to recommending it clearly our duty as public servants to leave nothing undone that we can do to safeguard the interests of the nation. The president here made his recommendations to congress, as outlined in the beginning of this article.
