## PRESBYTERY TO MEET AT TULIA

SELECTION OF NEXT MEETING PLACE WAS MADE YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

### ADJOURNMENT TODAY

Last Night Furnished the Feature Program of a Most Interesting Session.

Cutting short the program which was scheduled to continue through tonight, the delegates to the annual meeting of the First Presbyterian Church held a business session this morning and took their adjournment at noon. The next semi-annual meeting of the Presbytery will be held in April at Tulia, Texas, the selection of the place being made at the conference yesterday afternoon.

Wednesday night was the feature night of the presbytery, the program on young people's work offering a fitting close to the afternoon program which had dealt with Sunday school work. The speaker of the evening was Dr. R. Thomsen of Amarillo, one of the ablest and most profound thinkers of the state and a man with an appeal to his audience. He spoke on the growth and development of character and temperament in young people and his hearers characterized his address as the finest heard in some time and as very inspiring.

The morning outside the regular presbyterial business routine the ministers and elders heard the report of the foreign mission committee, given by Rev. John T. Price of Childress. The newly elected moderator.

With the business of the morning finished a discussion and debate on evangelism was held. The debate was on the merits of evangelistic methods for the pastors, the affirmative side being defended by Rev. N. F. Graf of this city, who was for several years an evangelist, giving up his outside work only to assume the charge of the local pulpit. The negative side was presented by Dr. J. L. McKee, former pastor of the First Presbyterian Church here. Both sides of the question were discussed at length by the ministers present.

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Strangely superstitious are these people. Great numbers of them are kindly and respectful, their life is epitomized in the verse:

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A grotesque dummy figure is paraded through the town, followed by the jeering and cheering crowds, who have risen early to give witness to the execution of the betrayer. After circling the city the procession halts. Judas is promptly yanked by the ropes from the bearers and, standing in the street, is ordered to kneel upon, cursing and cursing, constrained to everlasting purgatory to which place, at sunset, he is sent by the explosion of dynamite concealed in his carriage. For and night falls on an exhausted though happy people. What matters if the prison is overcrowded, that night or that the any of the police or medical is depleted almost to the degree of exhaustion?

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The Mexican soon knows that he is born to serve. He did the old southern boy, and caste or class distinction is emphasized on all occasions. The mule driver sits behind the long, narrow, narrow box on his head as the mule passes; in the plaza on Sunday evenings, when the melody of martial music fills the air, the upper classes parade in one direction while the lower classes parade in the opposite direction. As a class they are industrious and skillful if the time element is eliminated.

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## OLD PLAYERS ARE TO BE PLACED

New Faces Will Probably Be Seen in Places of Recognized Stars.

New York, Sept. 7.—New faces probably will be seen in many places held down for years by recognized stars in baseball next season. Young blood is going into the major leagues, and there is nothing so true as the old saying that youth must be served.

There are a number of brilliant young ball players, sitting on the benches in big league parks, and a great many of these, together with new ones dug up in the bushes, doubtless will be regulars in the coming year for another season to start.

Among the most prominent of the old heads who seem destined to fall by the wayside is Larry Lajoie. The veteran infielder, probably the greatest second baseman who ever lived, while he has been playing a great fielding game, and has been hitting well this year, already has announced his intention of retiring from the game at the close of the 1916 season.

Sam Crawford still dangerous as a batter, is showing up, and it is probable he will be out on the skids by Hugh Jennings. Oscar Stange is another of the Tigers who likely will feel the call of the minors.

Clyde Milan, having been going well for the Senators, and while there is little likelihood that he will get out of the American league, it is accepted as fact in the Ban Johnson circuit that Clyde will experience a change of scenery.

Rumor has it that Bob Groom and Jimmy Austin will be dispensed with next year by the Braves.

John Collins and Jim Scott are two veteran members of the White Sox who have failed to display their former class this year and they may be dropped.

Jack Lapp, former pitcher, is starting the minors or retirement in the face.

Harry Hooper and Duffy Lewis have not been doing well, but it is probable that to surprise these two players will be dropped by the Red Sox. However, Larry Gardner, the veteran third baseman of the Boston club, may have some trouble in holding his job, for Fred Thomas of the Red Sox are getting an infielder of considerable class.

Forest Gandy already is surplus weight.

Chick Gandil, after a brief season with the Indians, may be sent to pastures new.

The Boston fans are becoming disgusted with the tactics of Johnny Evers, captain of the Braves, and it is hardly probable the Braves' Trojan will be among those present in the Braves' training camp next spring. Also manager Stallins is more or less disappointed with the showing of his outfielders.

The Cub fans and Joe Tinker seem to have placed the skids under Heinie Zimmerman, who, in spite of his greatness as a ball player, seems intent on doing mainly as he pleases.

Cactus Cravath probably has played his last season with the Phillies, unable to help out much this year with his fence-busting blows.

John McGraw probably will clean house wholesale. He is said to be ready to drop the axe on the necks of Larry Doyle, Fred Merkle, Honus Lobert, and one or two others.

### ROAD BOOSTERS ORGANIZE CLUB

Meeting Is Held at Altus to Promote Highway From Lawton to Wellington.

Altus, Okla., Sept. 7.—One hundred and fifty delegates from Lawton, Okla., and all intervening towns to Wellington, Texas, were in session here yesterday perfecting a permanent organization to be known as the scenic route of the Ozark Trail. The purpose of the organization is to have designated as the Ozark trail the state highway that connects in an airline from Lawton to Hollis and from there to Wellington, Texas, and thence to Amarillo.

The scenic route will allow tourists to visit Fort Hill, Medicine Park, the Indian Agency at Lawton and the United States game reserve in the Wichita mountains. It will afford beautiful mountain scenery and rich and well improved farms with ideal places for campers on any of the many streams crossed. The natural road bed is practically without grades and all towns and county commissioners have gone on record as being willing to construct any kind of a highway required which can be done at a small cost as compared to other proposed routes.

F. F. Nesbit and J. A. Walker, both of Altus, were elected president and secretary. Committees have been appointed to exert every effort necessary to secure the adoption of the scenic route as the official Ozark trail.

### VERNON CITY BONDS BRING A GOOD PRICE

Vernon, Tex. Sept. 7.—The \$54,000 bond issue of the city of Vernon was sold by the city commission Saturday to F. C. Hoehler of Toledo, Ohio, at what is said to be the best price obtained for a bond issue in Vernon.

## PICTURE OF LIFE IN OLD MEXICO

Native Habits in Guanajuato, the Treasure Chest of Mercurial Mexico.

Washington, Sept. 7.—A striking picture of native life in Guanajuato, the treasure chest of mercurial Mexico, is given in a communication to the National Geographic Society by Frank H. Probert, a part of which is reprinted today from the society's Washington headquarters. Mr. Probert reports the Mexican scenes at they are known only to the American who has lived among them.

"Leaving the wall enclosure of the railroad yards," says the writer, "one looks down on the apparently cramped and crowded city of Guanajuato, capital of the richest of the south-central states of Mexico. Hard by, to the north, is the bull arena where the Sundays and fiestas of farical combats between two-legged brutes and four-legged beasts.

"The sunshine of summer days the first vista of the city is striking indeed. Churches of magnificent proportions; ancient and modern architecture strangely blended in the same edifices; stately buildings; imposing market stores of all descriptions; and dwelling places, rudely bare, variously colored with gaudy tints of calomine. The great plazas are crowded with people exhibiting to all the sparsely furnished interior where bird, beast and human eat and live together. The sordid streets are the scene of a constant and noisy with the oppressive opulence of the few.

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## CELEBRATE WITH TRIP TO VERNON

BIRTHDAY OF CITY WILL FIND MANY CALLING ON HER NEIGHBORS AT FAIR.

### ASK FOR SPECIAL

Denver Will Be Requested to Make Provision to Carry Large Crowd From Here.

Wichita Falls will celebrate her birthday, September 27 by going calling upon her neighbors, especially the city of Vernon, where the Wilbarger county fair will be in progress at that time.

At a meeting this morning of the special committee of the Chamber of Commerce and a committee from the Automobile Club, it was decided to ask the Fort Worth & Denver to run a special train from the city to Vernon on that date, with a low rate so that everyone can take part.

The plans include stops at all intermediate points where parades will be held, with the 5th, 9th, 11th, 13th and 15th streets. Pennants, caps and other insignia will be worn by the Wichitans and it is hoped to organize a big delegation for the occasion.

A special invitation to the Wilbarger fair was extended Wichita Falls some time ago and was accepted, it being planned for a number to go up in automobiles. At this morning's meeting, however, it was decided that a special train would give a great many an opportunity to go who could not otherwise make the trip. The train will make stops at Iowa Park, Electra and Harrod.

September 27 is the anniversary of the opening of the townsite of Wichita Falls so that its dedication as Wichita Falls day at the Vernon fair is considered especially appropriate.

Those present at this morning's meeting were R. O. Harvey, E. Leopold, Marvin Smith, C. W. Reid, J. A. Kemp, D. P. Talley and P. H. Eugene Leopold was designated general chairman for the excursion.

### VERNON CASTLE DANGER, IS KILLED ON FIELD OF BATTLE

New York, Sept. 7.—Vernon Castle, of the foremost exponents of the modern dance on the American stage who spent about several months ago to join the colors under the British flag, has been killed in action in France, according to reports received here.

For several days past there has been a rumor along Broadway to the effect that Castle had met his end in the war, but it remained for a letter received by Miss Mildred Francis, a former actress, from Lieut. Lewis Sloden, in France, to confirm the report.

According to the letter from Sloden, Castle was killed two weeks ago while flying over the German lines. Both Castle and Sloden were members of the royal flying corps.

Upon the rise of the rumor that Castle had been killed, inquiries were at once lodged in the British war office to investigate the case, but although a search has been instituted, no trace of the young man has been disclosed to date.

DRAINAGE MAPS WILL BE PRINTED IN COLORS

Austin, Texas, Sept. 7.—At the request of Congressman Buchanan, the director of the United States Geological survey, upon a co-operative plan, has agreed to reproduce and print in four colors the many detailed levee and drainage maps recently made by the Texas reclamation department, according to advices received by State Reclamation Engineer Stiles. These maps cover many thousand acres of overflowed lands in the Trinity and its several forks, Little river, Brazos river and on Pilot Grove, Chambers and Brazos creeks in Dallas, Tarrant, Tarrant, Bell, Brazoria, Collin, Ellis, Fannin and Lamar counties.

ABANDONED BABY IS FOUND AT VERNON

Market Report

Local Wheat. Wheat was quoted at \$1.45 again today, the local market showing no change from yesterday.

Chicago Grain.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—Reports that Greece had joined the Anglo-French allies put wheat under selling pressure today and caused a weakening of prices. Opening quotations here which ranged from 1 to 1.4 lower with December at 1.52-2 to 1.53 and May at 1.53 to 1.54 were followed by a substantial further decline. Corn weakened with wheat.

New York Cotton.

New York, Sept. 7.—The cotton market opened fairly steady at a decline of 3 to 15 points today, and active months sold 10 to 14 points net above the price for the call. After a decline to 15.39 for October, 15.55 for December and 15.61 for January prices rallied 6 or 7 points from the lowest on covering. Reports that the farmers were beginning to hold their crop at the decline helped to check the break around 15.37 for December and 15.42 for January. Prices showed rallies of 2 or 3 points around midday covering. Cotton closed steady, October 15.19; December 15.33, January 15.40, March 15.56 and May 15.71.

Fort Worth Live Stock.

Fort Worth, Sept. 7.—Cattle, receipts 2,300, strong—steers \$6 to \$7. Hogs, receipts 3,500, fair to good—bulk \$10.50 to \$10.75. Sheep, receipts 2,300 steady; lambs \$9 to \$9.50.

A. J. TUCKER HAS BEEN APPOINTED JAILER

A. J. Tucker has been commissioned a deputy sheriff by Sheriff George Hawkins and has been assigned to duty as jailer at the county jail. Mr. Tucker was a deputy sheriff under former Sheriff R. Randolph and has been an officer part of the time as deputy sheriff and part of the time as United States deputy marshal for nearly 35 years.

LOCAL TIRE COMPANY DOUBLES ITS CAPACITY

For the second time within the past year the Para Vulcanizing Co. of this city have been obliged to double their equipment in their automobile tire construction department. They have installed this week in their building on Seventh street one of the largest, if not the largest vulcanizing plants in the State of Texas. This was made necessary by the rapidly increasing business of this concern.

The company has as superintendent of its construction department, B. O. Badgley, the only master artificer of caoutchouc in the state, and who until he was engaged by the Para Vulcanizing Co. was in the employ of the largest factory in the world manufacturing automobile tires. Although this plant is fully equipped to manufacture new tires only reconstruction work is done at present as the company is West Texas distributor of the world famous Firestone tires.

DALLAS COUNTY NOT TO HAVE PRO ELECTION

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 7.—Although a local option election has been ordered in Tarrant county there will be no election of this character in Dallas county until after the legislature has acted on the matter. PEASANT LIFE IN ROUMANIA

People Are a Peculiar One, Working Through the Summer and Idle in Winter.

Washington, Sept. 7.—A vivid picture of the Rumanian peasantry, whose country has been drawn into the destructive vortex of the European war after months of vacillation, is presented in a communication to the National Geographic society from James Howard Gore. The so-called article is a "year geography" bulletin which says: "A Rumanian village looks its best in the spring, when nature, awakened from the slumber of winter, is green and fresh. St. Easter the cottages have been white-washed and the doors and window frames freshly painted in brilliant colors. The thatched roof has been put in order, and its eaves the cottage calls to mind the black-eyed country girls, with their glistening strings of multi-colored beads around their necks.

The Rumanian peasant woman meets by the roadside are the fairest among their Balkan neighbors, and this natural gift is most apparent under conditions best calculated for its preservation. Their faces, carved and elaborate. The foundation is a sort of shift reaching to the ankle, the upper part embroidered with colored cotton, usually red or black. Over this is a petticoat, also elaborately and delicately worked. The lower part is a simple, unadorned skirt. The peasant woman wears a scarf of cotton, usually red or black. Frontier Farmers Make Agreement to Help With Harvest

The Hague, Netherlands.—A curious exchange arrangement has been made between Dutch and Belgian farmers on the frontier. Last year the German troops in the border territory made it exceedingly difficult for the Dutchman who owned or related land over the border to harvest their crops and, profiting by the experience they gained, many Belgians have this year at any rate in the province of Limburg entered into agreements with Belgians owning lands on Dutch territory under which the latter are harvesting their crops, and vice versa. The parties concerned do not always see their exact share, but the electric frontier barrier which runs along the entire Belgian frontier up to and along the river Meuse, has practically forced the respective owners to make arrangements whereby each can remain in his own country.

For nothing of any sort or kind is allowed over or through the fivefold border which stands about 7 feet high. So anxious are the Germans that a close railing is placed even in the little brooks that run over the border into Holland so as to exclude any possibility of parcels of letters or documents being floated down to the Dutch side.
