GERMAN TROOPS ON SOMME FORTS TO TAKE GROUND WON BY FRENCH IN LAST ADVANCE.

COUNTER ATTACKS

On the Verdun Front the French Were Also Attacked, But It is Said These Efforts Were Unsuccessful as Well

By Associated Press.
London, Sept. 8.—Rouminian troops have occupied Orsova, an important Hungarian town on Panube, according to a dispatch to the Times from Bucharest today.

The Associated Press summarizes the European situation as follows:
German troops along the Sommo front last night made repeated efforts to take back ground won by the French in their latest advance south of the river. The struggle over the ground between Verny and Chalmes was between Verny and Chalmes was marked with unusual violence. Paris announces officially that the assault of the Germans availed them nothing and the French everywhere held their grounds.

On the Verdun front also French troops were subjected to counter at tacks, the object of which was to reconquer German first like positions over a front of nearly a mile northeast of Verdun, which the French took yes terday. These efforts were unsuccessful, the official French report says. British troops on Somme front were comparatively inactive. Further north of Ginchy the British raided German trenches and London says, infilited severe losses on the occupants.







THE MEASURE THAT **AVERTED BIG STRIKE**

Following is the text of the revised eight-hour bill that was passed by the house and senate for the purpose of preventing a railway

"A bill to establish an eight-hour day for employes of carriers engaged in interstate commerce and for other purposes, Be it enacted, etc., that:

Section 1. Peginning December 1, 1916, eight hours shall, in contracts for labor and service, be deemed a day's work and the measure or standard of a day's work for the purpose of reckoning the compensation for services of all employes who are now or may here after be employed by a common carrier or by a rathroad which is subject to the provisions of the act of Feb. 1, 1887, entitled, "an act to regulte commerce," as amended, and who are now or may hereafter be actually engaged in any capacity in the operation of trains used for the transportation of persons or property on railroads, from any state or territory of the United States or the District of Columbia, to any other state or territory of the United States, or the Dis trict of Columbia, or from one place in a territory to another place in the same territory or from any place in the United States through a foreign country to any other place in the United States,

Sec. 2. That the president shall appoint a commission of three which shall observe the operation and effect of the institution of the eight-hour standard workday as above defined and the facts and conditions affecting the relations between such common carriers and employes during a period of not less than six months, nor more than nine months, in the discretion of the commission, and within thirty days thereafter said commission shall reports its findings to the president and congress; that each member of the commission created under the provisions of this act shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by the president. The sum of \$25,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be an i hereby is, appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the necessary expenses of members and employes and rent, furniture, office fixtures and supplies, books, salaries and other necessary expenses, the same to be approved by the chairman of said commission and audited by the proper accounting officers of the treasury.

Sec. 3. That pending the report of the commission herein provided for, and for a period of thirty days thereafter, the compensa-tion of railway employes subject to this act for a standard day's wage, and for all necessary time in excess of eight hours, such employes shall be paid at the rate of not less than the pro rata rate for such standard eight-hour work day.

Sec. 4. That any person violating any provision of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$100 and not more than \$1000, or imprisoned not to exceed one year-or both,
