

The meeting with the committee from the Dairymen's Association, at which time it is expected that all matters in controversy in regard to the new milk ordinance will be settled in a manner satisfactory to all, will be the most important matter to come up before the city council at tonight's session. All parts of the ordinance had been practically agreed upon before, with the exception of the one dollar fee per head for the tuberculin test, which the dairymen held to be excrbitant. They have prepared statistics which show that the actual cost of the test is between a fourth and a tenth of that. They will also probably cite the fact that the fee for similar inspection in Fort Worth is only twenty-five cents.

Another matter that may be in shape for presentation to the council will be the plans of the Pivare.




