### THREE EVENTS OF BIG IMPORTANCE

MATTER AFFECTING AGRICULTURE OF UNITED STATES TO BE DISCUSSED.

### MEET IN OCTOBER

In Connection the Great Elephant Butte Dam Will Be Dedicated by President.

By Associated Press. El Paso, Tex., Sept. 25.—Three important events of an international character that will have a direct and lasting influence on the agriculture of the United States will be held here from October 14 to 19 inclusive. They are: The International Irrigation Congress, the International Congress and the International Soil Products Exposition which lasts until October 24.

In connection with these meetings there will be the dedication on October 14 by President Wilson of the great Elephant Butte Dam, one of the greatest irrigation structures now in progress in the world. Immediately after these ceremonies which are to take place at the dam, President Wilson comes to El Paso where he probably will speak at the congress that night.

This will be the twenty-third annual meeting of the international irrigation congress and it will be the second time that it has met here. The tentative program begins with the dedication of the Elephant Butte Dam. The congress has before it for discussion many important subjects regarding irrigation in both the United States and Mexico. It is probable that one of the meetings will be held across the international border at Juarez, Mexico.

All of the foreign countries have been invited to send delegates, but owing to disturbed conditions in Europe it is not believed likely that many delegates from there will participate. From other countries, especially the western hemisphere, usually large delegations take part in the meetings and it is believed that this year's congress will not prove an exception.

In its discussions the congress will give much attention to irrigation districts, practices, legislation and engineering. Two of the important questions planned to be discussed are rural credits and markets and marketing. The rural credits discussions are regarded of special importance in view of the recent passage of the Federal Farm Loan Bank Act and the present efforts of the farm loan board in directing the country and establishing the proposed farm loan banks.

"The work of the Irrigation Congress," says Arthur Hooker, secretary, "with respect to colonization and settlement, irrigation methods and results, and irrigation financing is to be continued and broadened at the El Paso meetings. The real aim of the congress is well expressed in its motto: 'Make Easy the Path of the Home Builder.'"

Besides President Wilson, many prominent men, leaders in the agricultural and irrigation extension movement are to take part in the congress. Among them probably will be the following: Franklin P. Lane, secretary of the interior; David F. Houston, secretary of agriculture; W. R. Motherwell, minister of agriculture of Canada; G. P. Hunt, governor of Arizona; Hiram P. Johnson, governor of California; George A. Carlson, governor of Colorado; E. M. Ammons, ex-governor of Colorado; Moses Alexander, governor of Idaho; Arthur Capper, governor of Kansas; S. O. V. Stewart, governor of Montana; William C. McDonald, governor of New Mexico; R. S. Williams, governor of North Dakota; James E. Ferguson, governor Texas; J. B. Kendrick, governor of Wyoming; Ernest Lister, governor of Washington; and Dr. T. N. Carver of Harvard University.

The International Farm Congress concerns itself chiefly with dry farming methods in connection with the congress and under the management of its officers is to be held the International Soil Products Exposition where are to be agricultural exhibits from the United States government and many of the individual states and foreign governments. It is understood that even some of the warring nations of Europe will not be unrepresented this year.

Secretary John W. MR. CRAVENS DISCUSSES NEW INSURANCE RATES

To Editor Wichita Daily Times:
While the question of fire insurance rates on property in our city is being discussed I hope you will give such space to a short statement from me as the result of a careful investigation and comparison of present rates with those formerly applied.
Last June a competent inspector was sent here by the State fire insurance commission, without any request from or connection in any way with any local agency.
This inspector went over in detail every building in the city except dwellings and barns and rated them in accordance with the state law—applying charges for conditions that existed at that time—just as has been done in Dallas and Fort Worth and many other important cities in the state.
As a result of this work a new rate book was received by all local agents on September 15th to replace former books and applying to all policies written or dated on or after that day, ONLY.
I have tabulated the present and former rates on 120 representative buildings, consisting of brick mercantile, factories, schools, churches and public buildings and find that rates are reduced on about 25 per cent, about the same number are not changed and the remaining are increased—the average increase on the whole being a little less than one cent per hundred—or a little less than 7 per cent. An analysis of the charges applied to make up the final rate shows that in most cases conditions existed which should have properly applied before—

The most rapid, uncompromising organ in the United States, the Boston Transcript, has said: "All the good legislation of the Democratic administration can be written on the back of a postage stamp with a whitewash brush." We doubt very much if that kind of political argument convinces anyone. It ought, indeed, to make Democratic votes.
We repeat—if the Republican party should be returned to power in the coming election, what would it do?
No platitudes in reply, if you please.

such as rubber hose gas connections, accumulation of combustible rubbish in or exposing building, keeping of or using volatile in or exposing buildings, unsafe fire escape, use of unapproved sweeping compounds, floors treated with oil or change of occupancy or increase of number of occupants which were not charged for under old schedule. In other words if proper charges had been applied before the inspection by the state representative, the old rates would have been nine cents higher than they were, plus the four cents for key rate reduction previous to the time that our city council wisely eliminated it by increased fire protection.
It is very evident that many of these charges may be deducted by making proper corrections and at an insignificant cost. Any local agent writing fire insurance I am sure, will gladly assist his patron in the proper way.
It is not my purpose to criticize nor to defend in the least, any one by my statements but to endeavor to face the conditions as they actually exist.
The fixing of charges for deficiencies or for exceptional charges are the result of more than a hundred years of actual experience in the United States and the standards applied in this city are not discriminatory but are applied in every city in the state.
In this connection it is only just to call attention to the fact that reduction in the rates on all dwellings in the city on account of reduction in our key rate with any other first class city in the state.

A SOUTHERNER IN NEW YORK.

There he was the most popular man in the class. The Southern gentleman is never without his friends, and young McCombs numbered among his own all the leading spirits of his day. He was a student and he graduated with the highest honors.
From Princeton he attended Harvard law school where he attained distinction that is accorded only to those of remarkable merit. And from Harvard he went to New York there to carry out the success that has been his.

That was fifteen years ago. The time has passed quickly and busily for William Frank McCombs. Succeeding in the practice of law came and remained with him. His brothers of the profession honored him to an extent that is unusual. With it all he found time to further the interests of his Alma Mater. The opportunity committee (for assisting Princeton men to find positions was the child of his brain. He became a member of the board of governors of that institution and was an indefatigable worker for its welfare.
But it was by his management of the campaign of Woodrow Wilson for the democratic nomination and later for election to the presidency in 1912 that William McCombs attained national prominence.
His campaign proved his ability to such an extent that he was chosen chairman of the democratic national committee, a position from which he only recently resigned.
President Wilson has ever been glad to give to Mr. McCombs due credit for the work of those campaigns and to offer to him high place among the nation's honored men. In 1913 Mr. McCombs refused the appointment as ambassador to France, believing that he could be of more service to his country within its borders.
In 1914 he was chairman of the committee which drew up the democratic platform of the state of New York, and that able document reflected in no small measure the views and principles of Mr. McCombs.

### DEATH CLAIMS A POPULAR OFFICER

Deputy Constable Harold Buster Answers Summons Sunday After Short Illness.

Harold Buster, deputy constable, died at the general hospital at three o'clock yesterday afternoon after an illness lasting less than a week. Although he was known to be very near death Friday morning, when he was removed from his home to the hospital and physicians had given up hope for him, a distinct rally Saturday night and Sunday morning gave his friends and relatives high hope for his ultimate recovery, which were not dispelled until shortly before his death. Although Mr. Buster had been unwell for the past two months his condition was not thought alarming at all and no remained at work until Tuesday, when he was confined to his bed at his home, until his removal to the hospital Friday. The exact cause of his death has not yet been determined, but an examination of his blood showed his entire system to have been poisoned. At first the diagnosis of a physician was a bursted gall bladder, and later gall stones and uric acid poisoning. He was too weak to undergo an operation. Mr. Buster was about thirty-four years old and came here about nine years ago from Weatherford where he was reared. Immediately after coming here he was associated with John Gilbert in the livery and transfer business, and later was in the employ of M. Dickfall. Afterwards he was in the employ of the city police department until being appointed a deputy of Constable Will Allen two years ago. He was a courteous, affable man and an efficient and conscientious officer and enjoyed the esteem of a wide circle of friends and acquaintances among the citizenship of Wichita Falls.

Besides his wife and three children, Mr. Buster is survived by his mother, Mrs. W. B. Buster of Weatherford, whom he had visited recently. Mrs. Buster's health is such that she was not able to come to this place when notified of her son's critical condition. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Sallie Crawford of this city, and other sisters as follows: Mrs. B. Jenkins of London, Mrs. W. B. Allen of Amarillo, Miss Willie Buster, a student in the Dallas High School. Mr. Buster is also survived by five brothers as follows: W. C. Buster of Canyon City, Carl and Leonard Buster of Weatherford and Kendrick and Claude of Dallas, all of whom were at his bedside at death. The funeral was held at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the parlors of the Hill Undertaking Company and interment was at the Riverside cemetery.

### CAPE SAINT ELIAS LIGHT STATION, ALASKA

The Cape Saint Elias light station, Alaska, was placed in commission on September 6, 1916, and the temporary light discontinued. This station is located on the south end of Kayak Island, on a shelf about 45 feet above sea level. The tower is square and supports a cast-iron watch room and second-order lantern, whose focal plane is 40 feet above the base of the structure and 85 feet above sea level. The tower rises above the roof of the fog-signal building from its ends. On a terrace east and north of this building are located the cooling tanks for the engines, the fuel-oil and illuminating-oil tanks, distillers, the dwelling with quarters for three keepers (men only), and the boat and hoisting engine house, with an inclined railway to the sea level. There is a system of roads, tracks, sewers, drains, etc., about the buildings, which are of reinforced concrete and hollow terracotta tile where the latter is practicable. The illuminating apparatus consists of a three-mile lamp in a third-order, double-focusing lens of 300,000 candlepower, and the range due to its elevation is 13.4 nautical miles. The metal superstructure of the tower, including the watch room, gallery, and helical bar second-order lantern, was exhibited at the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco during 1915. The fog signal, which will be placed in commission at an early date, consists of a 6-inch automatic compressed air siren in duplicate, each with a trumpet with a two-way mouth. This machinery, including the necessary air tanks and piping, was also exhibited at San Francisco. The characteristic of the light is a double white flash every 20 seconds. That of the fog signal will be a double blast of 4 seconds each every minute. This lighthouse will be one of the most important on the coast of Alaska, as it is the landfall light for vessels bound to Prince William sound or Cook inlet from either the Pacific coast of the United States or South eastern Alaska. It has been constructed by the lighthouse service directly, which has maintained a force during the past two seasons at this remote spot.

A gas, whistling and submarine bell buoy was placed off this Cape on May 14, 1916, and automatic gas light has also been maintained on an offlying rock during the construction of the lighthouse.

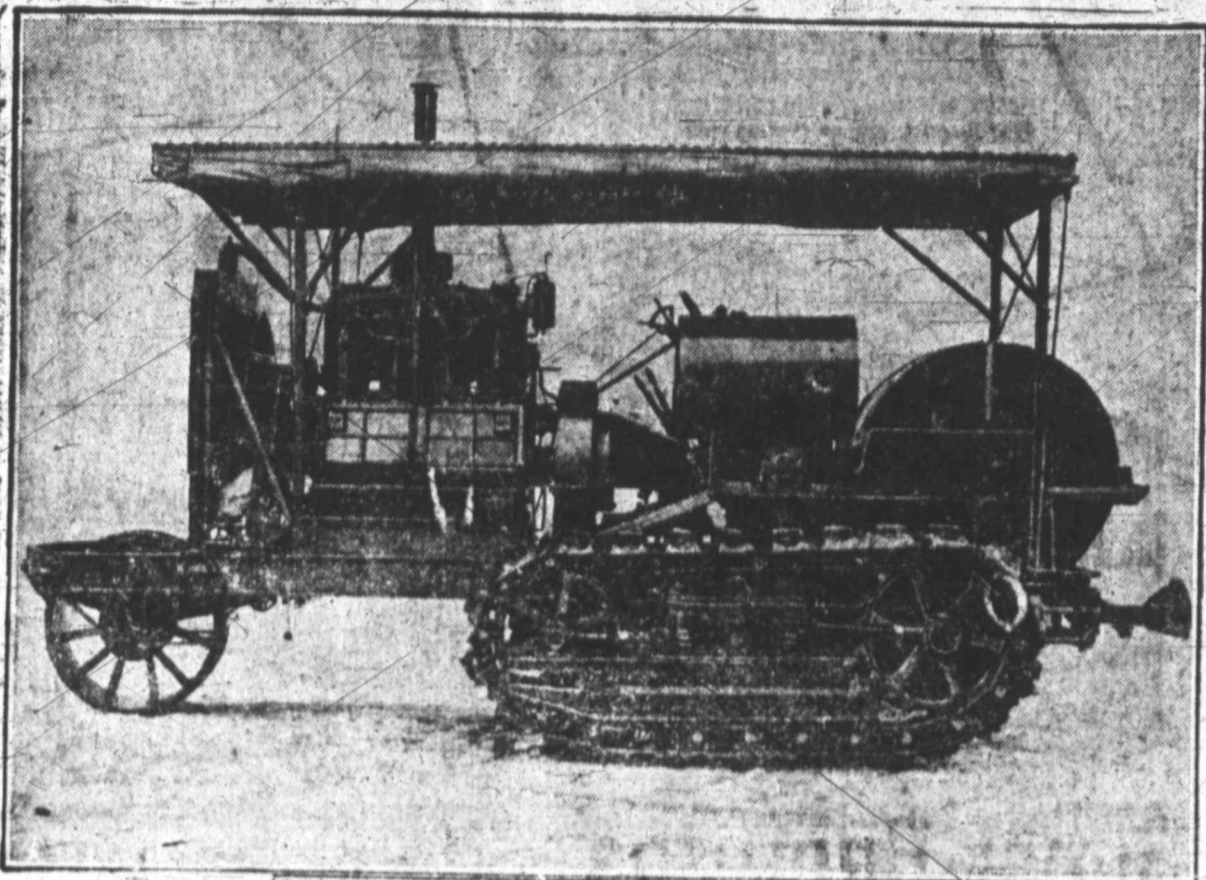

SENTENCE HYATT TO SEVERE TERM

Given Two Years By Jury for Forgery—Understood Vann Will Take Appeal.

In the 78th district court this morning sentence was pronounced on R. H. Hyatt, convicted last week of forgery and sentenced to a term of two years in the penitentiary by the jury. Hyatt was charged with forging the name of L. E. Vann, convicted last week on a similar offense and given a term of five years, will appeal his case. It is understood that Vann was charged with cashing a check signed Wichita Drilling Co. for \$46 at the Capitol Bar, the alleged offense having been committed the same night as that upon which Hyatt was convicted.
