NO ODD MONEY HERE

Most of Alleged Bets Are on Even—Steven East—Much Interest in Outcome

The world's series will open Saturday afternoon in the Art-Boons building on Indiana avenue. The first game being called for 1 o'clock. Gene Liebold, who wants Boston to win, but who outside of that is strictly neutral, will do what he can to make it necessary. The special loop wire has been run into the building and all arrangements completed.

It is expected that a large crowd will be present for the game, as there is much interest in the outcome. Each play will be reported by wire, even down to each ball, and a continuous listing of Boston backers still seem to be in the majority locally, but Brooklyn men are bobbing up in unexpected places. Some of them are asked to demand odds, pointing to the ten to seven money which is offered in the east. One of the most enthusiastic Boston boosters here was asked today if he would give odds on the Red Sox. After some deliberation, he replied as follows:

No. The long distance series which is played in Wichita Falls each year is an occasion of much excitement, and this year's affair is expected to be no exception to the rule.

This is the first time that Brooklyn has ever appeared as a contender in a world's series, though not the first time that she has won a pennant. In recent years she has usually finished in second division, while the Boston Americans have been consistent first division performers.

The Boston Americans since their entry into the junior league in 1901 have won the pennant four times, not including the present season, and have competed for the world's title three times. In 1903 the team captured its first pennant and then defeated the Pittsburgh Nationals in an eight game series by five games to three. The following year the team repeated its league victory but the New York club winner of the National League pennant would not permit its players to contend for the world's championship, which action eventually led to the National Commission in the charge of the world's series. In 1913 and 1915 the Boston Americans again won the right to play in the series and defeated the Philadelphia Nationals respectively by scores of four to three, with one tie contest; and four games to one.

Although Brooklyn has figured in major league baseball for twenty-six years against Boston's fifteen, the Yankees have won both the pennants and have never played in a world's series under the modern meaning of that term. Brooklyn entered the National League in 1890 and signaled its debut by straight way capturing the flag. At the end of the season the team met the Louisville club, champions of the American Association in the world's series of those days and the contest ended in a seven game tie; each club winning three games with another tied when darkness put an end to the play. In 1899 and 1900 Brooklyn was the National League champion but as the Temple Cup series had been abandoned and the present American League established, the Superbas were unable to find opponents for a titular combat.

While Brooklyn was deprived of the opportunity to compete for the championship in past years the present series offers the club a chance to bring the National League back on an even footing with the American League in the matter of world's series won. At the present time the record shows that the junior league clubs have won six out of the eleven series played since the National Commission assumed control of the baseball classic. The score stands as follows: American League, Philadelphia Athletics 3; Boston Red Sox 2; Chicago White Sox 1; National League, Chicago Cubs 2; New York Giants, Boston Braves, and Pittsburgh one each.

UNIVERSITY CAN'T USE AUDITORIUM Big Assembly Hall Condemned By Fire Marshal—Other News From University

Austin, Texas, Oct. 6.—The big University of Texas Auditorium has been closed by President R. E. Vinson until the Board of Regents meets again, upon the recommendation of the state fire marshal who declares that the hall is "a most serious menace to the protection of life," and that the numbers of holocausts that have taken place in the past, growing out of conditions not as bad as those in the auditorium of the University of Texas, compel us to renew the recommendation made by the State Fire Insurance Board in 1913. General meetings of the twenty-three hundred students of the University will hereafter have to be held in the open air, as there is no room in the University of Texas buildings, except the auditorium, large enough to hold them. Dr. Vinson has instituted a new practice which is being met with great favor by the students. He has reserved each Saturday for Students' Day. The door of his office stands open and any student who wishes to meet the president or discuss any matter with him has free access to his office. Of course students are received at the president's office on any day, but on Saturday's Dr. Vinson reserves his entire time for them.

During the season of 1915-16, the receipts for athletic contests at the university amounted to \$43,220.93. As usual football was credited with the largest amount, there being \$39,081.07 to its credit; \$3,814.65 for baseball and small amounts from basketball, track, tennis, wrestling, etc. No branch of sport except football paid its expenses. The largest item of expense was paid out in guarantees to teams from other colleges. Other considerable items are salaries of coaches, equipment, rent of grounds, etc. There has been great increase in the number of students taking the Business Administration in the University. Although the school is only three years old, top seniors will receive the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration in June, and the undergraduate classes are so crowded with students that new sections have had to be made. The Daily Texan, published by the students of the University of Texas has the following to say about the knoekers: "Every student who has something unkind to say concerning a fellow student or a professor, or an instructor, should think for a minute and then, knowing that the other fellow has just as much on him, the word won't be uttered. Conscientious introspection is a fair warning to us to take charge of ourselves and devote less of our time to criticizing the other fellow. A knoeker never accomplishes anything." The University exhibit at the Dallas Fair will be ready for shipment from the Department of Extension slack at once and will consist only of the extension work proper, as the Domestic Economy exhibits will be in constant demand at the smaller fairs, such as San Angelo, Orange, Sherman and Tyler.

Invitations will be sent out to 15,000 alumni of the University of Texas whose addresses are known, inviting them to be present in Austin November 29 and 30 to attend the celebration attendant upon the inauguration of the University of Texas. The principal address on this occasion will be delivered by Dr. Frank I. Goodnow, President of John Hopkins University. Dr. Vinson will also speak, outlining the policies of his administration, and other addresses will be delivered by prominent alumni of the institution. On the afternoon of November 30, Thanksgiving Day, the annual game of football between the University of Texas and the A. & M. College will be played.

Third Reptile of This Variety Killed at Ninth Street Residence Thursday

## GOVERNMENT ESTIMATE TODAY PLACES YIELD AT 11,637,000 BALES

### 56.3 PER CENT 4,062,991 BALES

Normal Condition of Crop Much Below That of Many Other Years

REPORT OF BUREAU DISCLOSES THAT ALL RECORDS ARE BEING BROKEN

Announced Early Crop is Responsible and Not the Year's Production

By Associated Press. Washington, Oct. 2.—The cotton crop this year will be approximately 11,637,000 equivalent 500 pound bales, the department of agriculture announced today in its monthly forecast. That estimate was based on the condition of the crop September 25 which was 56.3 per cent of a normal compared with 61.2 per cent last month, 69.8 per cent last year and 67.2 per cent the ten-year average condition of September 25.

Washington, Oct. 2.—Ginning of the cotton crop is breaking all records, announced today by the census bureau that 4,062,991 bales had been ginned from the year's crop prior to September 25 disclosed that all former totals for ginning to that date had been exceeded, even that of 1914, when the country's largest cotton crop was grown and 3,393,752 bales were ginned to September 25. Here before the largest quantity ginned prior to September 25 was in 1911 when 3,474,594 bales were ginned.

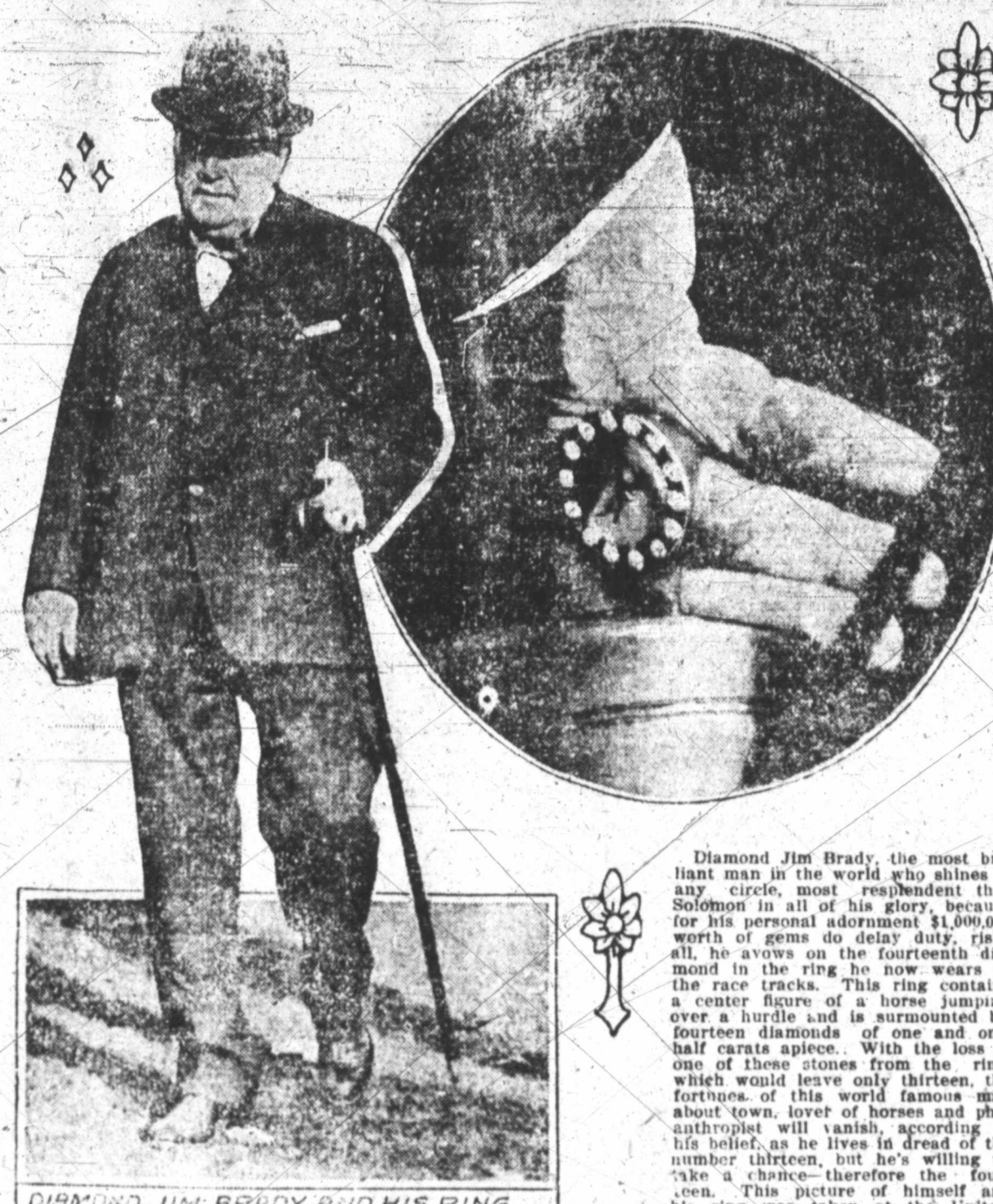
(Ginning to September 1 this year amounted to 860,812 bales and from that date to September 25 the quantity ginned was 3,212,179 bales. The extreme activity in ginning indicates that the crop this year is much earlier than in former years; but it is pointed out by officials that the quantity ginned to certain periods is no assurance of the country's total production which this year, from all indications thus far, is below the average.

Cotton of the growth of 1916 ginned prior to September 25 amounted to 4,062,991 bales, counting round and half bales, the census bureau today announced in its second ginning report of the season. That compared with 2,362,331 bales ginned prior to September 25 last year, 3,393,752 in 1914 and 3,246,655 in 1913.
