PITTSBURGH MAN RESCUE EXPERT KILLED TRYING TO REACH MEN IMPRISONED.

President and Bryan Meet at Pittsburg and Ex-Secretary Joins Party on Ride After Almost Getting Left

Pittabusgh, Oct. 20.—A man, carrying a long bladed knife and a bottle of liquid, jumped upon the running board of President Wilson's car while the chief executive was taking a ride over the city today.

secret service men promptly knockchased the president's conveyance for a block before he was arrested by local detectives.

The president's hat had blown of and the car was stopped while a sec-ret service man ran to recover it. Before the machine started again, the man jumped upon the running board.

The prisoner gave the name of Richard Collon, aged 22, a Pittsburg machinist. On his way to the police station, he told the police that he was not at all satisfied with President Wilson's conduct in the European war. In the bag he carried a knife with a blade five inches long and a bottle of liqu which the police are endeavoring to analyze. Also in the hag were several wood chisels.

The president and W. J. Bryan met here today for the first time in many months. Mr. Wilson stopped at Pitts burg for an hour and a half on the way home.

burg for an hour and a half on his way home from Chicago, where he spoke yesterday and Mr. Bryan was here en route to speak in the dis-triet of Representative W. W. Bailey of Johnstown.






