NO BEARS YET BUT STILL HAS HOPES

J. W. Stringer's Quest in New Mexico Waiting For Weather to Clear Up

No bears have yet fallen before the rifle of J. W. Stringer, who is in New Mexico for the avowed purpose of hunting one. He has hopes of eating bear steak yet, according to his account of his trip, which has just reached The Times. He writes: "Feeling that some of my Wichita friends might by this time be apprehensive of my whereabouts, I will say that I left Wichita Falls on Thursday afternoon of the 24th inst. with a New Mexico friend in a Ford car loaded for bear, but on account of difficulties which I shall have to mention later on, have had no chance yet to show marksmanship. We started one night at Childress, Texas; started out next morning expecting to reach the Goodnight ranch in time to get the buffalo hunt, but on account of the obstinacy of my traveling companion, Mr. Trig, who is otherwise in every respect, very congenial, we took the wrong road and failed to get to Goodnight in time to kill the buffalo or see the Indian's arrows pierce his heart, but reached the scene in time to see him fall.

There was quite an encampment of Comanche Indians, who in a very few minutes had the animal dressed. By the help of one of our old Wichita friends, Mr. Dot Babb, who was, when a youth, captured by these same Comanche Indians, some of whom were on the ground, I was able in the scuffle to procure a chunk of the meat at the enormous price of \$1 per pound; but would have been glad to have had it at the figure that figure. Babb was acting as their interpreter.

We then pulled out for Amarillo, which we reached before dark. The next morning we headed southwest through Hereford, Bovina, Texico and Clovis and reached the home of our friend at Fortales long before night. At this place we had the buffalo meat cooked—the first I had ever eaten, and since eating that meat I have about decided to buy some Spanish grants in New Mexico and go into the buffalo business, for I believe any man who likes beef would like buffalo a great deal better. It tastes and smells a great deal more like a cow.

On the following Tuesday afternoon we pulled out in that same Ford car for Roswell, N. M., but on account of the rain we were detained by mud and water, but that little Ford swam right through the sloughs and creeks and I think Henry can now add the word "amphibious" to the name of his little machine. Right here, Mr. Editor, I want to stop long enough to ask you to please find me a buyer for my Buick and Packard cars there; I want to invest the price of them in Ford's. I am tired worrying with automobiles. We had quite a dim road to travel and when night came on we had been looking for a house for many miles, but no sign of human habitation. My friend, who was last saw the light at a house which proved to be the home of a ranchman who had vast acres of land and cattle. We proceeded to lay before him our trouble, and he said "get out and come in; we can put you up all right." We at once accepted his hospitality and camped out in the lawn at a mesquite grub pile; there we broiled our bacon, made our coffee and had plenty of onions; now that is what I call high life. The next supper was over we went into the house to survey the situation. There was a large family and they only had two rooms, so we had a lot of dignified sleep and we could not possibly figure out where we were going to sleep, and we then remembered that he had said that he could put us up, and when he said that he was looking down in the flat at a bunch of windmills, and we decided he probably meant to put us up on those windmill towers that night, so we crawled in our mechanical lizard and slid out through the mud; only had to get out and push two or three times.

We reached Roswell just at the beginning of the next day; 30 minutes after midnight, put up at the Hotel Gilder. I walked down in the lobby next morning and it was pouring down rain; feeling naturally a little homesick I asked the proprietor if he thought it was going to rain. He asked "oh, no; the sun will be shining in a few minutes." He said "this shower has already broken the record in New Mexico. Well, it has lasted for five days and nights without ceasing.

I find that the hotel has a real good roof on it, plenty of good grub and good congenial people, so have decided to take the world easy. However, when the roads dry up I expect to procure license for big game and pull out for the Capitan Mountains, and when I have gotten a nice quarter of one of these grizzly bears rolled up to take home I will then, and not till then, be willing to leave for Wichita Falls.

TRAFFIC OFFICER NAMED BY COUNCIL

Vacancy is Filled But Name Withheld to Protect Streets From House Movers

A traffic officer was appointed last night by the city council to fill the vacancy existing on the force since the resignation of Fred Smith two weeks ago. The officer's name is withheld for the present on the request of the police department, but will be announced when all arrangements have been completed.

On complaint of City Engineer, Hincley the council decided to take steps looking toward the adoption of an ordinance regulating the moving of houses over the paved streets. Improper protection for the streets has damaged some of them to a slight extent says Mr. Hincley, and it is possible for them to be damaged to a material extent, and in some cases give no evidence of the damage for as much as six months after the house has moved over the street. Mr. Hincley was ordered in writing to Dallas, Fort Worth and other cities having ordinances regulating such operations for copies of such ordinances to guide the council in drawing a similar ordinance for this city.

The franchise to the Panhandle Refining company for their fuel oil pipeline was passed on its final hearing. The franchise granting the Northwestern the right to construct side tracks in the Barwise and Jalonick addition and along Pecan near Kentucky street was held up on the final reading and the council requested a map showing more definitely the location of the proposed tracks in order that they might be sure that a blocking of the streets would result from the construction of such tracks.

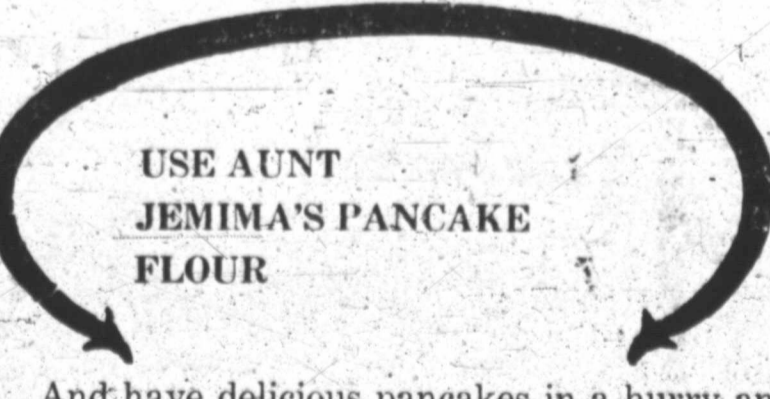

MRS. DREXEL SUES HUSBAND TO COMPEL PAYMENT OF ALLOWANCE

A writ of foreign attachment was filed in Philadelphia for Mrs. Margarita Armstrong Drexel, wife of Col. Anthony J. Drexel, residing abroad. She is suing her husband to compel him to pay her an annual allowance of \$50,000, awarded June 21 by the chancery court in London.

Under an agreement Mrs. Drexel was to hold five per cent on her husband's life, aggregating \$300,000, besides the \$50,000. Anthony J. Drexel Jr. is the husband of the former Miss Marjorie Gould, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. J. Gould.

RAPID PROGRESS IN RELIGIOUS CENSUS

Thirty or Forty Workers Employed in Enumeration—Meetings Are Held Nightly

Rev. R. C. Miller, pastor of the First Baptist Church, reports that rapid progress is being made in compiling a religious census of the city, or rather that part of it south of the Denver railroad and east of Seventh street. A thorough canvass is being made in order to ascertain who are church members, and with what church affiliated, also those not connected with any denomination. Altogether 30 or 40 have been employed in the work which is under the direction of Louis Entzminzer, superintendent of the Sunday school of the First Baptist church at Fort Worth, which is the second largest school in the United States with an average attendance of 1,500 last year. Mr. Entzminzer is said to be one of the most successful Sunday school workers in the country, in fact is considered by some to be without an equal in this special line of endeavor. He was formerly state secretary of the work in Kentucky as well as California.

In connection with the work of gathering the religious census, meetings are held each night at the First Baptist Church. At the meeting last night Mr. Entzminzer spoke on Sunday school work, delivering an address both interesting and instructive and one that will prove very helpful to those interested in this movement.

It is expected that a tabulated report of the census as compiled will be given at the meeting to be held tonight. All the workers had not reported today and an effort will be made to gather the figures not later than this evening.

In discussing the progress of the work this morning, Mr. Miller stated that he expected gratifying results from the splendid efforts of Mr. Entzminzer. He estimated that the report would show a population of 10,000 within the territory included in the canvass.

VALUABLE DATA ON FEEDING OF HOGS

Agricultural Agent Brings Interesting Record From Fair in Hall County

The value of green pasturage and further evidence that the cheapest feed carefully balanced as the more valuable in the production of pork is afforded by pictures and an affidavit shown by H. K. Short, Denver agricultural agent regarding the experience of Clyde Bray with two pigs exhibited at the Memphis fair. The two pigs, Jumbo and Jimbo, were littered several months old. Jimbo was fed on maize and water in a dry lot, while Jumbo was fed a balanced ration with green pasturage. At the time of the exhibiting Jumbo weighed the scales at 355 pounds while his brother only weighed 142 pounds.

Other interesting pictures secured by Mr. Short at the fair are of an agricultural exhibit prepared by A. W. Reek secretary of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, which was mounted on Mr. Reed's automobile. On one of the running boards was a perfect representation of a bald-faced Hereford baby beef, the body represented by red maize, the white spots by fetterite and the hoofs by kafir corn. On the other side was a hog designed from the same materials. The models were very lifelike and Mr. Reed's work was artistic to a high degree.

ROMANIA HAS ENGLAND PEEVED HALTED ADVANCE AT WASHINGTON'S OF TEUTON ARMY SUBMARINE VIEW

MAKING EFFECTIVE STAND ON HER OWN FRONTIER, WITH ASSISTANCE OF RUSSIANS—ACTIVITY ON ALL FRONTS

FRENCH STAND FIRM NO ACTION PROBABLE

Strong German Counter Attacks on Somme Front, Paris Reports. Germans Attack in Carpathians But Results Are Not Known

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: Official German announcements report an effective stand by the Rumanians against Teutonic armies along the Transylvanian border and the sanguinary repulse by the French of heavy German assault on the new French positions in Sully-Saullière on the Somme front.

The approach of winter is accompanied by no diminution of activity. In some battle areas, indeed, efforts apparently are being redoubled. This seems notably true along the eastern front from Volhynia to Rumania, where continuous fighting is reported, with a virtual deadlock.

Further south the attempts of the central powers to drive a wedge between the Russians and Rumanians in the southern Carpathians is an uncertain stage. Berlin has reported the capture of some heights but Petrograd claims the repulse of all attacks.

The tide of battle apparently has changed along the Transylvanian border. Berlin has conceded the stiffening of the Rumanian resistance and French press advices today declare that King Ferdinand's troops are making a successful stand and at one point at least in the Frotet of Kronstadt are pushing General Von Falkenhayn's armies back.

From the Rumanian viewpoint all the military news is reassuring. It is reported that Russian troops in force are reported helping the Rumanians to defend the passes from Transylvania into their territory.

Of the Somme front, German attacks were delivered against the French lines both north and south of the Somme. Three assaults by the Germans upon the French at Sully Saullière are declared by Paris to have been repulsed with heavy losses to the Germans who also were repulsed after they had succeeded in footing in a French first line trench near Berny-en-Saparey south of the river.

On the British front in the Somme region, progress by General Haig's forces between the Albert-Bapaume road and Les Bois is reported, despite rainy weather.

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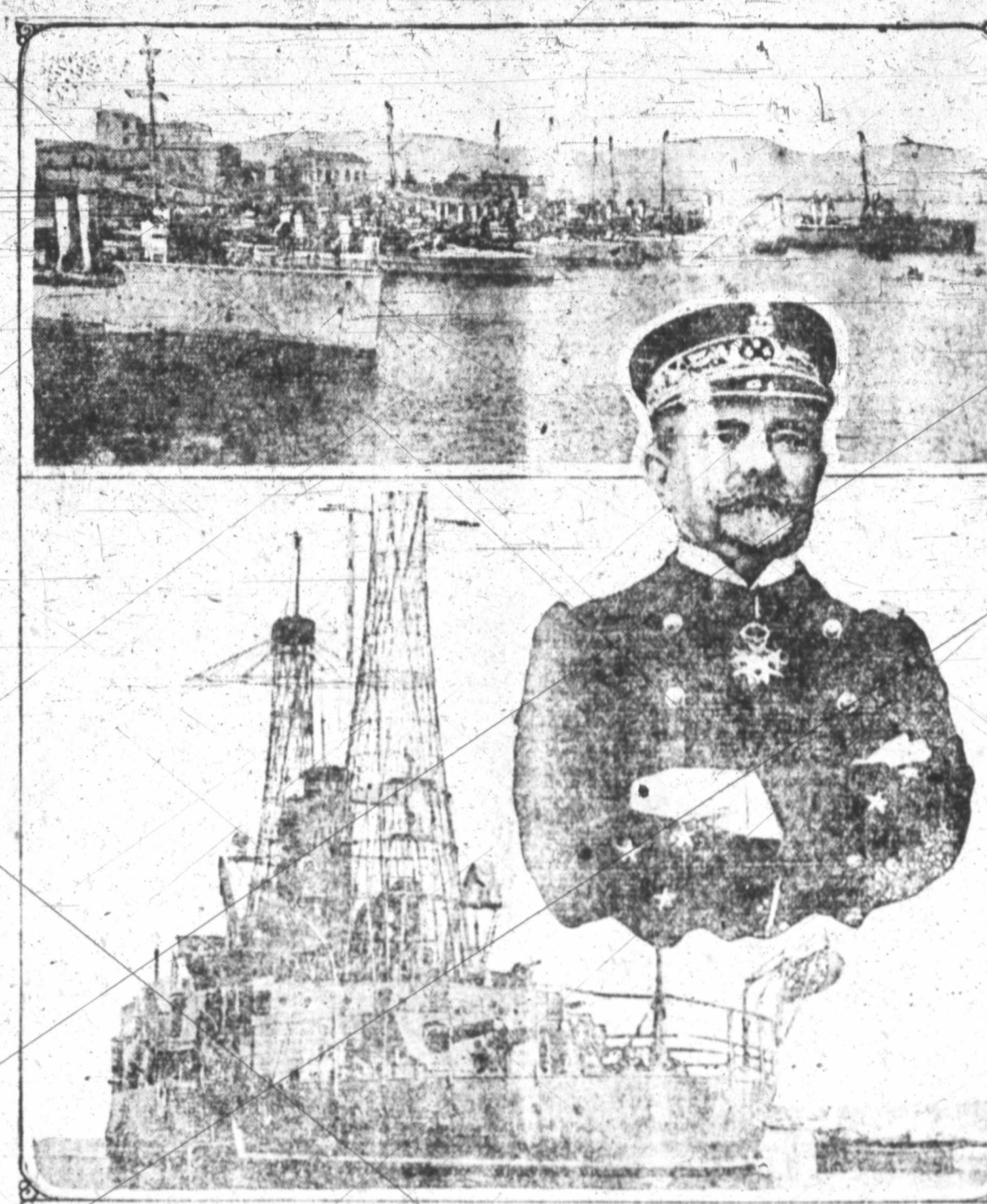
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TWO FORMER AMERICAN SHIPS IN GREEK NAVY AMONG VESSELS RECENTLY SEIZED BY ALLIES

TROPICAL STORM HITS FLORIDA AND ALABAMA

Severe Gales Blowing At Pensacola And Mobile But No News of Damage Received

New Orleans, Oct. 18.—Reports from the weather bureau and from other sources here indicated the center of the tropical hurricane which came up from the Caribbean Sea, apparently was passing inland from the Gulf of Mexico today, somewhere on the lower Alabama and west Florida coast, probably in the vicinity of Fort Morgan, Alabama and Mobile.

Mobile was cut off from wire communication with New Orleans from nine a. m. until shortly after eleven o'clock when the Postal company restored connections. A brief message from Mobile at that time said a 90-mile wind was raging but no indication of the storm's damage was given.

The wind was blowing 72 miles an hour from the northeast at Pensacola, Florida at 8:15 this morning according to a report received by the weather bureau here. The barometer showed 29.40 and a tide two feet higher than normal was running.

Fifteen minutes earlier the report stated the wind was blowing 60 miles from the east and the barometer was 29.48. A message from Mobile received here shortly after nine a. m. by the Postal Telegraph company said the wind there at that time was blowing 90 miles an hour.

An east to southeast gale was blowing 98 miles an hour at Port Morgan, Alabama, at the entrance to Mobile Bay at 6:45 a. m., according to a radio message received by the Marconi Wireless company here today. The message received by the Marconi Wireless company here today.

The report from Pensacola, together with reports from Mobile, of a 48-mile east wind and a barometer of 29.46 at 7 a. m. was considered as indicating the center of the tropical hurricane might sweep inland near Pensacola.

Efforts to reach Pensacola from New Orleans by telegraph and telephone failed this morning. The wire companies reported the storm appeared to be increasing in violence there when connection was last had.

Communication was reestablished today by the Tropical Radio company with the wireless station on Swan Island, in the Caribbean, cut off Saturday morning when the hurricane swept the island. The message stated none of the inhabitants of the island had been killed or injured, but there was considerable property damage.

STORM SENDS JULY COTTON TO 19 CENTS

New Orleans, Oct. 18.—The most sensational advance of the season in cotton occurred around the opening of the market today as the result of the rumor that the tropical hurricane had struck into the cotton region near Mobile. Prices were lifted 65 to 80 points, nearly \$4.50 a bale on the strongest months. The July option went to 19.17 a pound, the highest price ever recorded on the local future contracts board.

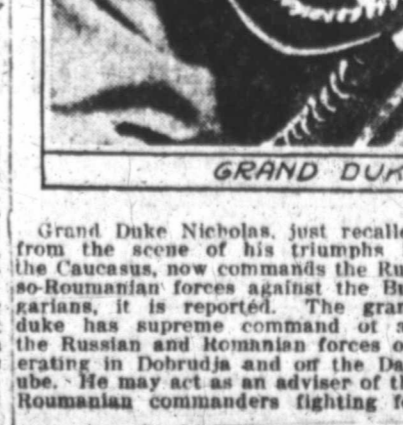

CITES ALTERNATIVES

By Associated Press. Long Branch, N. J., Oct. 14.—In a speech before a large delegation of Pennsylvania Democrats who came here with banners flying, President Wilson today said that while he is for peace, "America is always ready to fight for things that are American."

The president discussed what he declared was the attitude toward war and peace of different elements of the republican party. "I understand that from the leaders of the republican party that nothing has been done right," he said, "they do not venture to say that is, the republicans do not venture to say that we wanted anything but peace, but they would have preferred some other way, not disclosed, of obtaining peace. The silent part intimates that we wanted peace, but wanted another kind of peace."

Mr. Wilson reiterated previous declarations that it is almost impossible to do anything in the field of foreign affairs, because foreign nations have been led to believe that a dominant element in the republican party is in favor of drawing the United States into the European war and they have been told with abundant evidence that the republican party will enter upon a policy of exploitation of our neighbors in Mexico.

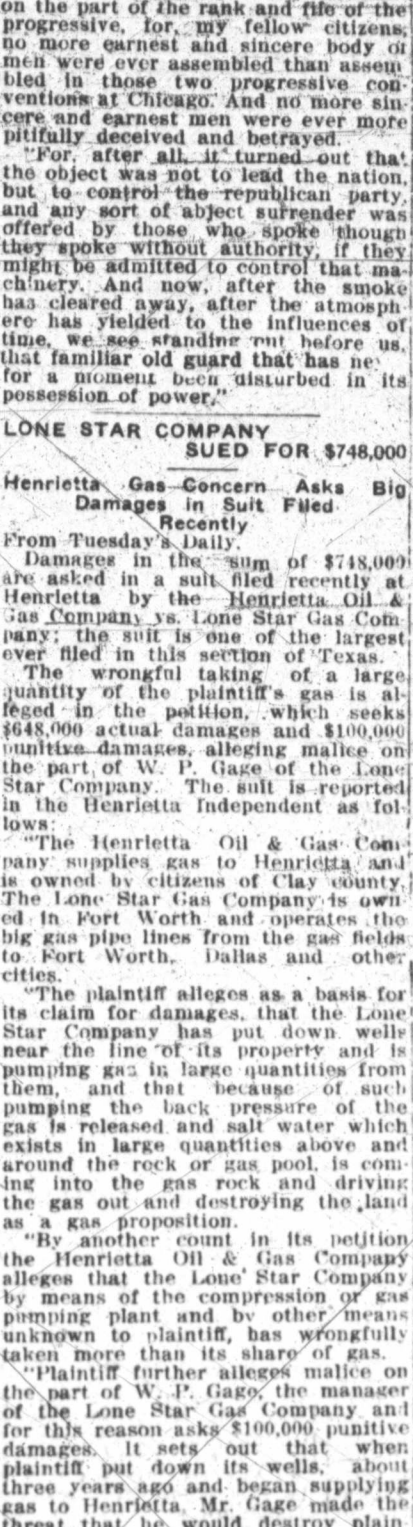

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ROOSEVELT AND EIGHT HOUR LAW

FORMER PRESIDENT CRITICIZES WILSON'S LABOR RECORD AT WILKES-BARRE

By Associated Press. Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 14.—President Wilson's action in securing the passage of the eight hour day came in for extended criticism tonight in an address by former President Roosevelt, who compared Wilson's course with that of the speaker of the house, as president in the war labor strike. Mr. Roosevelt reviewed labor reforms of the president in an effort to show that Mr. Wilson had not always been as friendly to labor as he seemed at present, and he criticized the chief executive sharply for giving in to the demands of the railroad men.

Mr. Roosevelt avowed his own friendship for the cause of labor and said he had always stood for the demands of laboring men when "they were right."

Mr. Roosevelt reviewed the details of the coal strike and the refusal of the "big" operators to arbitrate, threatening a "lock-out" of the entire country, with winter approaching, making prompt action imperative.

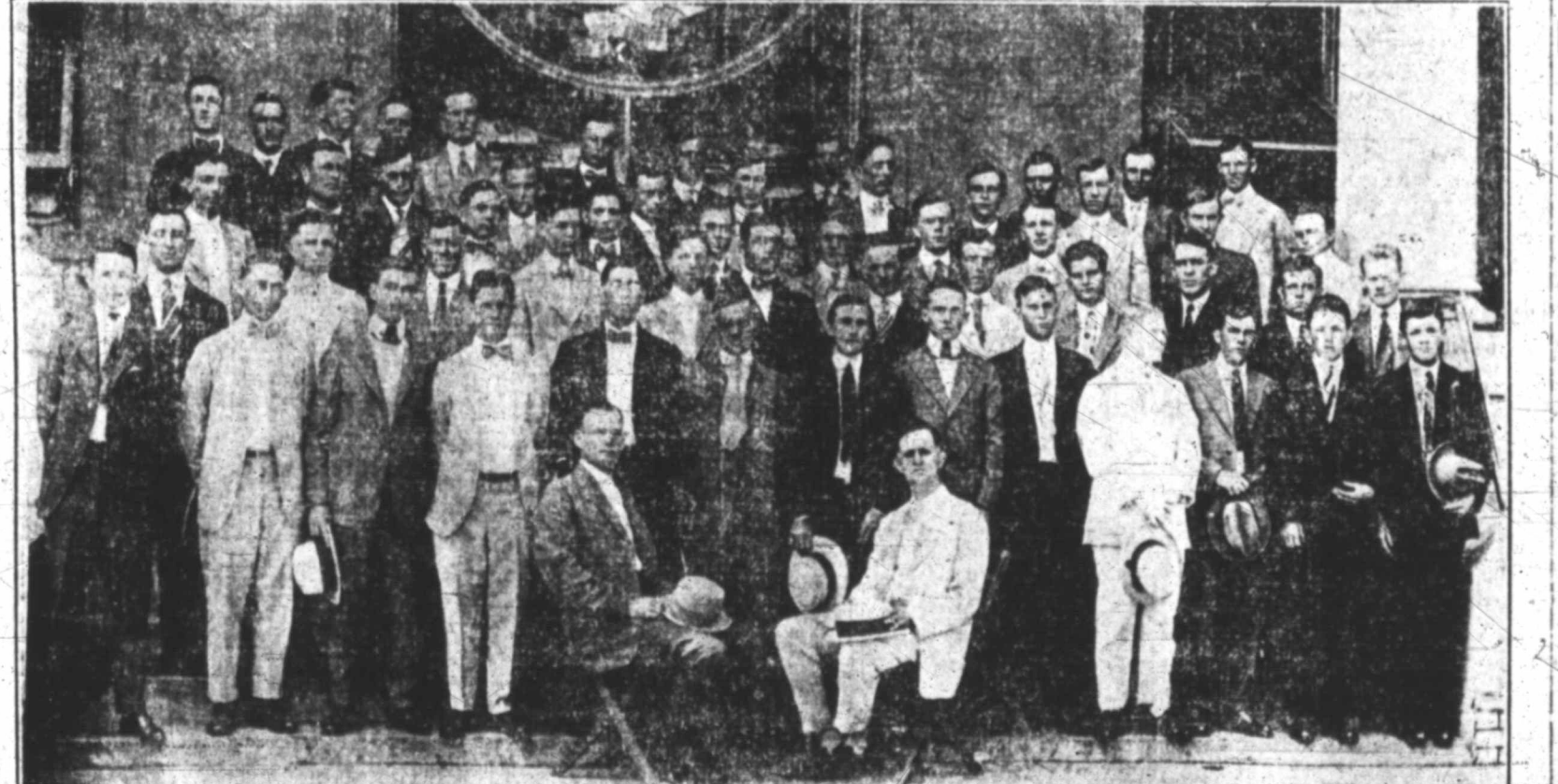
