INVADERS PUSH LINES FURTHER INTO ROUMANIA

TRY TO MAKE STAND

Defenders Expected to Give Battle at Tchernavoda Where Bridge Spans Danube—Little Change in Situation on Somme

The Associated summarizes the European war operations as follows: On both the north and southern Roumanian fronts, the Russian army is rapidly flattening out the Roumanian lines and forcing them back.

Dobruja, Field Marshal von Mackensen inflicted a severe defeat upon the Russo-Roumanian flank, driving it to the Tzara Marat district some 25 miles northwest of Constantza, the Black Sea port he captured day before yesterday.

In the center, the field marshal has forced his way into Medjidie, which along the Danube he has drawn approximately near the Tchernavoda bridge-head by capturing the Danube town of Rastovoda, situated southeast of Tchernavoda. He has taken 6,000 prisoners, two cannon and 52 machine guns.

Driving home the attack on the north, General Falkenhyn reports as a result of the capture of Prodeal, ten miles south of Kronstadt on the Roumanian side, the serious deterioration of the strong resistance the Roumanians have been offering at the southern end of Rothermundt Pass on the frontier south of Hermannsburg.

On the northwestern Roumanian front the Russo-Roumanian forces appear only are holding their own. But areas reports them on the offensive in the Olt valley where several hundred prisoners and ten machine guns were captured from General Falkenhyn's report.

Virtually the entire Constanza-Tchernavoda railway line in Dobruja is now in the hands of Field Marshal von Mackensen's victorious forces. A Russian official statement today admits the evacuation of Medjidie by the Russians and Roumanians. Medjidie is approximately 20 miles inland from Constantza, the Black Sea port, and terminus of the railway, the fall of which was reported yesterday.

Medjidie, furthermore, is but little more than thirteen and a half miles from Tchernavoda where the Russo-Roumanian forces are apparently preparing to make a stand at the bridgehead protecting the town. The only bridge over the Danube between Belgrade and the sea spans this river at Tchernavoda carrying the railway line into Bucharest.

The Russo-Roumanian line runs along the heights north of Constantza and Medjidie according to the Russian announcement, the offensive forces having fallen back upon the ridge. The Somme front was little changed over night. London reports the British have fully consolidated the ground gained yesterday in the neighborhood of Guerdon and 1,000 yards of German trenches was reported. There was artillery action along the French lines in the Somme region the day before yesterday, but being the development of a spirited artillery duel south of the river in the area between Blaches and Abelincourt.

The Serbians have made new gains in their campaign for Monastir according to today's Paris report on Macedonian fighting. Stopping a German Bulgarian counter-attack in the Cerna region and then taking the offensive themselves and capturing several trenches.

EVANGELIST HOLDS SERVICES IN BANK

Large Attendance at all Presbyterian revival services Monday and Tuesday

To the accompaniment of the rattles and single of silver and gold coins in the cages of the First National Bank, religious services were held this morning by the evangelist, Rev. Dr. Hendrick, of the First Presbyterian Church, a large crowd attending and taking part.

Dr. Hendrick closed by appealing to his hearers not to turn away from Christ as the rich young man did.

"The Holy City" was the subject of Dr. Hendrick's sermon Monday night. He described it as a real city, a beautiful city, a busy city, a happy city, a well watered city and a city of reunion. Discussing the last named aspect, he expressed the belief that those who reach that city will be able to recognize their friends and loved ones, as on earth. There was one addition to the church and night requests for prayer, at the close of the sermon, Rev. A. L. Carter sang "The Holy City."

At the Floral Heights church, Rev. W. B. Fitzhugh took the benefit of the paralytic as his theme. He said that when Christ healed the paralytic who was lowered to Him from the roof while the crowd surrounded Him, there were four types of people present; first, the helpless, typified by the paralytic; second, the hinderers, represented by the crowd that prevented the paralytic reaching Jesus; third, the helpers, who lowered the paralytic from the roof; and fourth, the healer, Christ. These classes are represented in the society and church of today. There was a good attendance and much interest.

Services will be held at the Floral Heights church at 3:45 and 7:30 p. m. daily. At the afternoon service Dr. Hendrick or some other member of the party will speak and at the evening service, Mr. Fitzhugh will speak.

Three bridges were contemplated when the bond election was called, but at the foot of Grand street in Wichita Falls to replace the structure washed away by the flood of June, 1915, another on the Wichita River south of Electra and the third below Iowa Park.

HENRIETTA TERM OF COURT BEGINS

Fry-Forgery Cases on Criminal Docket - Grand Jury is Empanelled Monday

The 30th district court convened Monday at Henrietta, with a heavy docket ahead. The criminal matters to come before the grand jury included one murder case and a few of lesser importance. The grand jury was empanelled by Judge Bonner Monday afternoon and proceeded to work at once.

Among the cases on the criminal docket are some of the forgery charges against E. W. Fry, former county judge of Young county. It is understood that an effort will be made to try one of these cases at the present term. Some important civil suits are also to be tried. Among these is the case of the Henrietta Oil & Gas Company vs. Lone Star Gas Company, for damages aggregating about \$700,000.

One of the criminal cases on the docket is that of H. Lott, charged with murder by abortion, and to be tried in Clay county on a change of venue from Potter county. The case of Sterling White, charged with murder, is still on the Clay county docket. White was granted a second trial by the higher court but broke out several months ago and has not been recaptured. He was charged with murder in connection with the killing of a young woman near Byers about four years ago.

District court will remain in session at Henrietta until the second Monday in December, when it will convene in Wichita Falls for the December term.

SAYS GREEKS OWE MUCH TO ENTENTE

Writer Denies That Nation is Not Indebted to Them - History is Recalled

The great majority of the people of Greece consider that nation indebted to the entente allies, and an article which appeared recently in The Times, quoting a local Greek to the effect that such was not the case is "called" by Daniel Pavlantonis, a local Greek, who has written to The Times, explaining the attitude of the Greek people. His letter follows: "I read carefully your article under the title, 'How local Greeks view the crisis' that appeared a few days ago in your paper, and I was asked by some Greek business men of this city to act as their medium to express their opinion. I was astonished by the statement made that there is nothing whatever to indicate that Greece is under obligations to the allies.

"The Greek people are naturally grateful. Can they ever forget the sacrifice of blood the French made for them, when during our war for independence, 14,000 soldiers from glorious France landed at Mesolonghi under Colonel Fabien to fight elbow by elbow with the Greek insurgents, to ride with him and to die for Greece? And where is the ungrateful Greek who would forget Lord Byron's self-devotion and his immortal love for the Hellenes, and those Franco-Anglo-Russian sailors who died at the naval battle of Navarino, which closed in our country a treaty recognizing Greek independence? A hundred examples of this kind can be cited.

A little knowledge of the political history of Greece and her financial standing would not permit a statement such as the one in that article. King Constantine is pro-German and as a constitutional country we respect the constitution. He closed the constitution and presented himself as a dictator. But there is the savior of Greece, Mr. Venizelos. He raised his voice and the people enrolled to save Greece and formed the National Defense Government; he could not see why a whole army division had to surrender to the orders from Athens; Bulgaria, with ammunition and equipment worth millions of dollars. And what about the sacrifice of thousands of soldiers to conquer that territory during the Balkan wars? A voice of agony, backed by the magnificent word Liberty was raised by the fathers, mothers, wives, brothers, sisters and schoolboys of those beloved ones who have their best drop of blood for the glory of the country, and now their graves are trod upon by our incomparable enemy, Bulgaria. A silent but imposing protest is coming from their tombs, while they hear the lamentations and cries of the Greek women and children massacred and violated by the barbarians. That is what made Mr. Venizelos ring the alarm of 'Fatherland in danger.' His only aim is, with the help of God, and thousands of volunteers, to drive them back from our frontier. This movement is backed by thousands of Greeks living outside of Greece living outside of Greece. In New York City
