

ALLIES REPORT FURTHER GAIN IN SOMME REGION

FRENCH PUSH THEIR WEDGE DEEPER INTO GERMAN LINES NEAR PERONNE—ROUMANIAN CLAIM PROGRESS

DOBRUDJA INVASION

Some Indications of Resistance by Rumanians to Von Mackensen's Advance—Berlin Reports Russian Repulse in Volhynia

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: Both the British and the French on the Somme front report a successful continuation of their efforts to drive the joint of the wedge created by the prolonged offensive further into the German lines.

The point at present projects across the Peronne-Banque road at Sully-Saint-Paul. East of this point the British have struck the German front here and are carrying to the Paris war office captured a system of trenches northward of it extending as far as the South.

Inmediately to the northwest at the convergence of their front with that of the French, the British have been pushing for two days at German positions near the Transloy and have reported the capture of several trenches.

Further messages from the front today said to be based on German communications celebrate the report that Captain Loeffler, the famous German aviator who last Friday when down by British aeroplanes, had been killed in an aerial engagement.

The Rumanians apparently are continuing their active resistance to the Austro-German pressure along the Moldavian and southern Transylvanian fronts. Berlin, however, reports a German success in the Rothembourg pass south of Hermannstadt, where the strongly defended heights were taken from the Rumanians by a force of more than 100,000 men.

AMERICAN CONSULS HIT BY WAR PRICES

Washington, Oct. 30.—Urgent need of financial assistance for American consular officials and clerical assistance in Europe obliged by the greatly increased cost of living since the war to pay three times or more normal peace-time prices for food and personal necessities is shown in reports received almost daily by the state department. Almost without exception these show what was regarded before the war as an attractive compensation for consular employees today is scarcely sufficient to provide food and bare necessities.

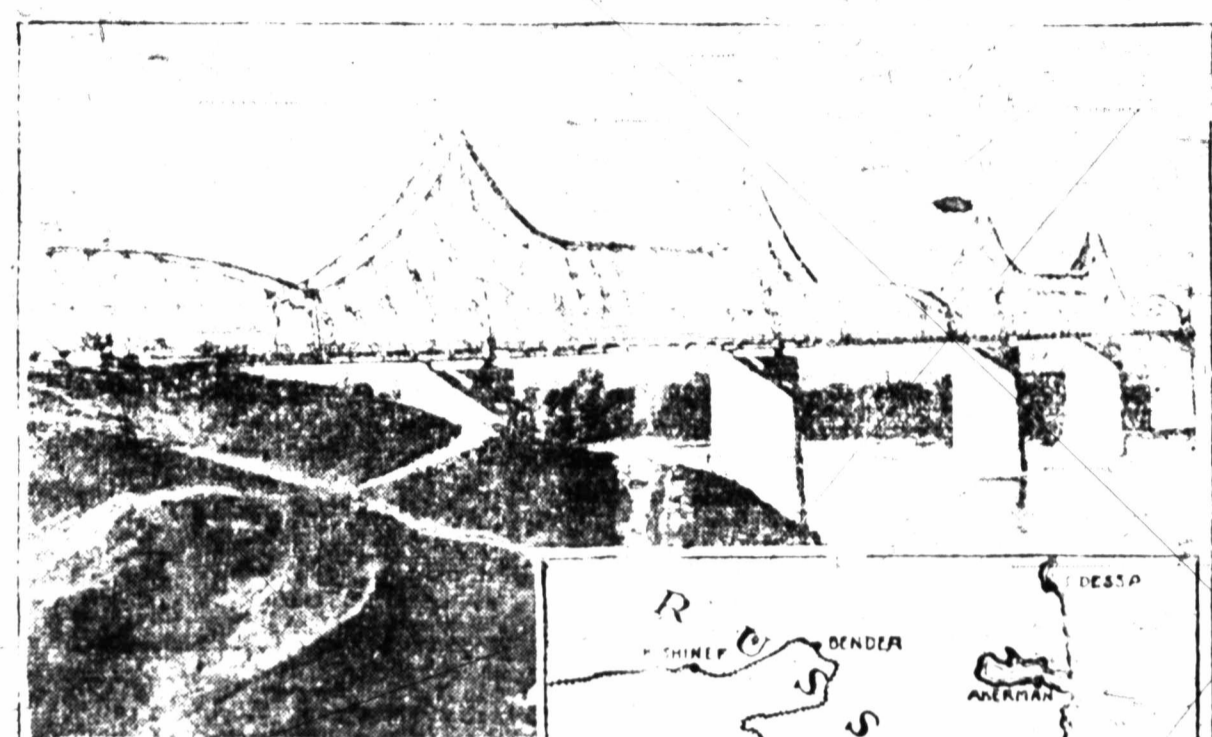

AMERICANS SUB VICTIMS; NO WARNING, SAYS REPORT

SUBMARINE ISSUE MAY BE REVIVED

SEVERAL ARE REPORTED TO BE DROWNED

FIRST REPORTS ARE NOT CONCERNING BUT CAUSE STATE DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS CONCERN

TO LEARN STATUS SECOND NEW CASE

May Result That no Pledges Were Made—Orders Sent to Gather All Available Information on Cause of Latest Disaster

Washington, Oct. 30.—The destruction of the British transport Marina by German submarine, without warning, with the possible loss of American lives, and the endangering of the lives of seven American citizens in the submarine attack on the British freighter Rowanmore, reported from Queenstown by American Consul Frost, contain possibilities of reviving the submarine issue between the United States and Germany.

Investigation, officials realize, may disclose that there has been no violation of German pledges to the United States. Nevertheless the first report, incomplete and transmitted by the American consul as "provisional" caused some uneasiness.

The report on the Marina refers to the ship as a "British horse transport." It turns out that she was a transport service of the British government. The mixed crew of British and American horse tenders, could claim none of immunity against attack that attaches to a merchant ship.

Orders were dispatched at once to gather all information to determine the status of the Marina and her crew. Although no American lives were lost in the submarine attack on the Rowanmore, and the ship altered her own status if she made an attempt to escape.

Officials were disturbed by the report that the boats were shelled after they had cleared from the abandoned ship. The facts are expected to be determined by investigation which was ordered begun at once.

Consul Frost at Queenstown reported that the information transmitted was "provisional." Investigation will be made at once to determine the status of the Marina and the nature of the attack to determine whether any American lives were lost. The United States has been advised that the following is a summary of Consul Frost's dispatch.

The British transport Marina was a mixed crew of British and American horse tenders. The ship was shelled by a German submarine on October 28. The mixed crew of British and American horse tenders, could claim none of immunity against attack that attaches to a merchant ship.

The freighter Rowanmore was bound from Baltimore to Liverpool with a mixed cargo and was attacked by the submarine on October 28. The freighter was shelled and after 30 minutes of shelling she was abandoned.

Decisions of the lower courts, which had been reversed, the plaintiff asserted, would give the railroad perpetual control of the property.

He possesses a remarkable memory and is familiar with happenings during the Hidalgo revolution for Mexican independence from Spain in 1810-1821.

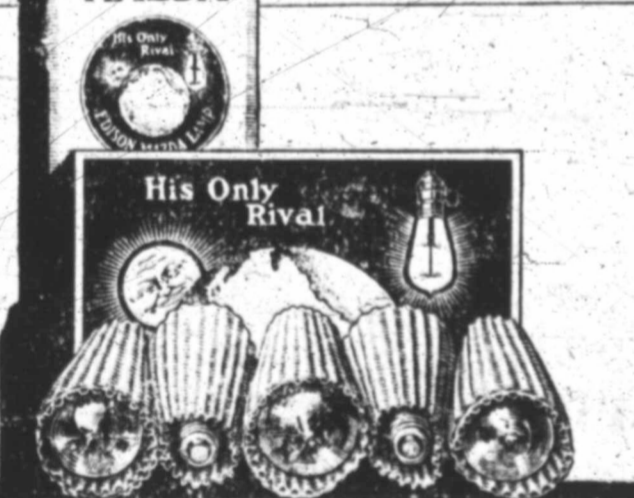

SEVERAL SERVICES HELD SUNDAY AT FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

MEETING IN THEATER

Inspiring Service For Men, Downtown Sunday Afternoon, Closing Week

Forty-three accessions to the church is the record of the Hendrick-Carter evangelist party at the First Presbyterian church, the fruits of two weeks' services being reported in this number by thirteen additions to the church yesterday morning. The evening, the beginning of the closing week of the meeting, in addition to those joining the Presbyterian church, they have been a number who have made professions of conversion at the church meetings who will join other churches.

The meetings are to continue only one week, according to the announcements made yesterday. Today there will be only one service at 3 p. m. The remainder of the week the usual morning service and afternoon service will be continued. The closing of the meeting will be announced from day to day. Wednesday a factory service will be held at the glass factory, probably the last meeting to be held in the factories.

Dr. Hendrick has announced his text for the night services as follows: Monday, "The Great Magnet," Tuesday, "Excuses," Wednesday, "Lifted From the Pit," Thursday, "The Broad Way," Friday, "Doing Truly Right." On Sunday morning his subject will be "Arise, Let Us Go Hence," and the closing sermon will be on "The Passing Harvest." There were four services during Sunday, commencing with a special Decision Day sermon for the children of the Sunday school, taking the place of the Sunday school lesson. Dr. Hendrick prepared an illustrated sermon especially adapted to the younger hearers and so urgent was the appeal made by the preacher and his assistants, all (Carter) and Dale, that fifteen members of the Sunday school presented themselves for church membership at this time.

The great lesson drawn from life of Pharaoh was Dr. Hendrick's theme for the eleven o'clock service. "Elisha's Life: the successful life brings success, poppets to notice," said Dr. Hendrick. He gave these points, which he said modern Christians who are anxious to make a success in every way would do well to follow.

First, he said, Elisha was evidently a success in his life work when God selected him to be the busy, active, successful men and women who are chosen to serve in the kingdom of the Lord.

Second, Elisha was a man of prompt decision and action. God has no place for weak, indecisive creatures, nor for the world.

Elisha paid attention to the little duties of life. When called by God to follow Elijah he went busily about closing up his little business affairs, bidding farewell to his family, and his duties are not to be despised. It will do well to remember that

"God in his plan has no use for those who waver," the speaker continued, "and as the fourth admirable attribute of Elisha, steadfastness of purpose. The three other points were: high aim and ambition, highest training and strong faith in God.

What was said to be the most successful meeting of the revival was the men's service conducted Saturday afternoon at the Empress theatre. One man made a profession and several others manifested a deep interest. Dr. Hendrick was in the city on Saturday, taking two incidents in the life of the ancient Hebrew king.

The revival which has been conducted in connection with the First church services in the Florat Heights Missions by Rev. W. B. Fitzhugh of Fort Worth, came to a close last night. Mr. Fitzhugh has, with the assistance of the pastor, Rev. W. H. Haggard, worked up an unusual amount of interest in the meeting and he has been greeted nightly by packed houses. There are no more additions have been made to the church through this meeting.

The many arguments and questions which doubters present in regard to the deity of Jesus were all answered and answered conclusively by Dr. Hendrick in his night sermon.

"There is no way to get rid of Jesus and there is no way to get rid of the resurrection," said Dr. Hendrick. "Everywhere we are confronted with evidence that he was a reality, and that he rose. History everywhere is full of Christ in the year A. D. 1916, we are bearing testimony to the fact of Jesus having lived. The risen Christ is prophecy fulfilled, and ever more, He is man's hope, the hope of the world."

"There are some," he continued, "who would doubt the fact of Jesus having lived, but the testimony of dead and gone people, but who is there who doubts that America was discovered? There are none who do not celebrate the Fourth of July as the glorious day of the independence of this country, but there is no one living today who has any one who fought in the war which gained our independence."

Dr. Hendrick continued speaking of the faith and hope of Christians in a future life as a favorite subject, through much suffering and tribulation. "Our hope," he said, "is all founded on the Christ triumphant over his enemies and risen from the dead and gloriously God that history and all else points to the great truth of His resurrection. And now Christ has risen from the dead and become the first fruits of them that sleep."

Special music was a feature of all the services and for tonight's service special music treats are provided. Mr. Haven and C. J. Tompkins have special instrumental music at the Sunday morning service and Sunday night. Dr. Hendrick and Mr. Carter sang duet. Mr. Carter also sang by special request solo numbers.

HOSTILE AND NEUTRAL SEA VICTIMS COMPARED statistics from the beginning of the number of hostile and neutral ships sunk by the central powers, says the Lokal Anzeiger, "according to official statistics from the beginning of the war until October 12, 1,253 hostile ships of 2,609,601 tons were sunk, but only 200 neutral ships of 276,528 tons were sunk for carrying contraband of war. The neutral tonnage is only ten per cent of the hostile tonnage. The sinking of neutral ships especially Norwegian, will cease as soon as the latter stops carrying contraband."
