### BECOMES PASTOR OF FIRST M. E. CHURCH



Rev. Harry F. Draper, the new pastor of the First M. E. Church of this city, comes to Wichita Falls from Fairfax, Oklahoma, where he was in charge of a church for about a year. Previous to that assignment, he was in Boston, studying and serving as associate minister for a church there. Mr. Draper spent his boyhood in Minneapolis. His first college training was received at Ohio Wesleyan University, at Delaware, Ohio where he graduated with his A. B. degree. From there he went to Boston University where he spent three years, obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology, and serving as associate minister of the People's Temple M. E. Church.

Although he assumed charge of the local church only a few days ago, Mr. Draper has already won the members of the congregation and reorganized the church activities along many lines. While his duties as pastor will claim most of his time, he hopes to be able to devote some attention to Boy Scout and Y. M. C. A. matters, in which he is deeply interested. Tonight Mr. Draper will deliver the first of a series of six sermons dealing with questions arising from the European war. The subject tonight will be "The Four Great Classes of People in the War."

### DEPARTING PASTOR WILL SAY GOOD BYE

Dr. A. S. Andrews to Preach Farewell Sermon Today—Has Added 708 to Church

Dr. A. L. Andrews, for two years pastor of the M. E. Church South of this city and transferred by order of the last conference at Greenville to Fort Worth will preach his farewell sermon to his present charge at the service at 11 this morning. His subject has been announced as "Church and Pastoral Loyalty." The presiding elder, Rev. J. Sam Barcus, will preach at night.

The new pastor, Rev. S. A. Barnes, formerly of Ervay Street Methodist Church at Dallas, will arrive in time to conduct both services this coming Sunday. Dr. Andrews and others who know the newly assigned minister give him a recommendation that argues well for the success of his pastorate here. Dr. Andrews said, "Brother Barnes is a time-man and preacher as well as he and his family will be a splendid addition to the church and social life of the city." Though rejoicing with Dr. Andrews in his promotion to larger fields of endeavor there is much regret in his church and in outside circles as well that he and his family will leave. The church has made a splendid progress under his guidance, there being a total of 708 additions to the church during his two years pastorate. The enrollment in the Sunday school is 931 with an average attendance of about 500 and the Epworth League has a mem-

bership of 78 young people with an enrollment of 98 women of the church in the Missionary Society. In a financial way the church has also prospered, the conference year closing with a clean sheet for the church, all debts paid in full. In the past year the church has raised for all purposes \$13,670.

Dr. Andrews makes his general farewell through the press in the following expression:

"I desire to express my sincere thanks to all the good people of Wichita Falls for their courtesy and kindness to myself and family. May God bless all of the people of this dear old town."

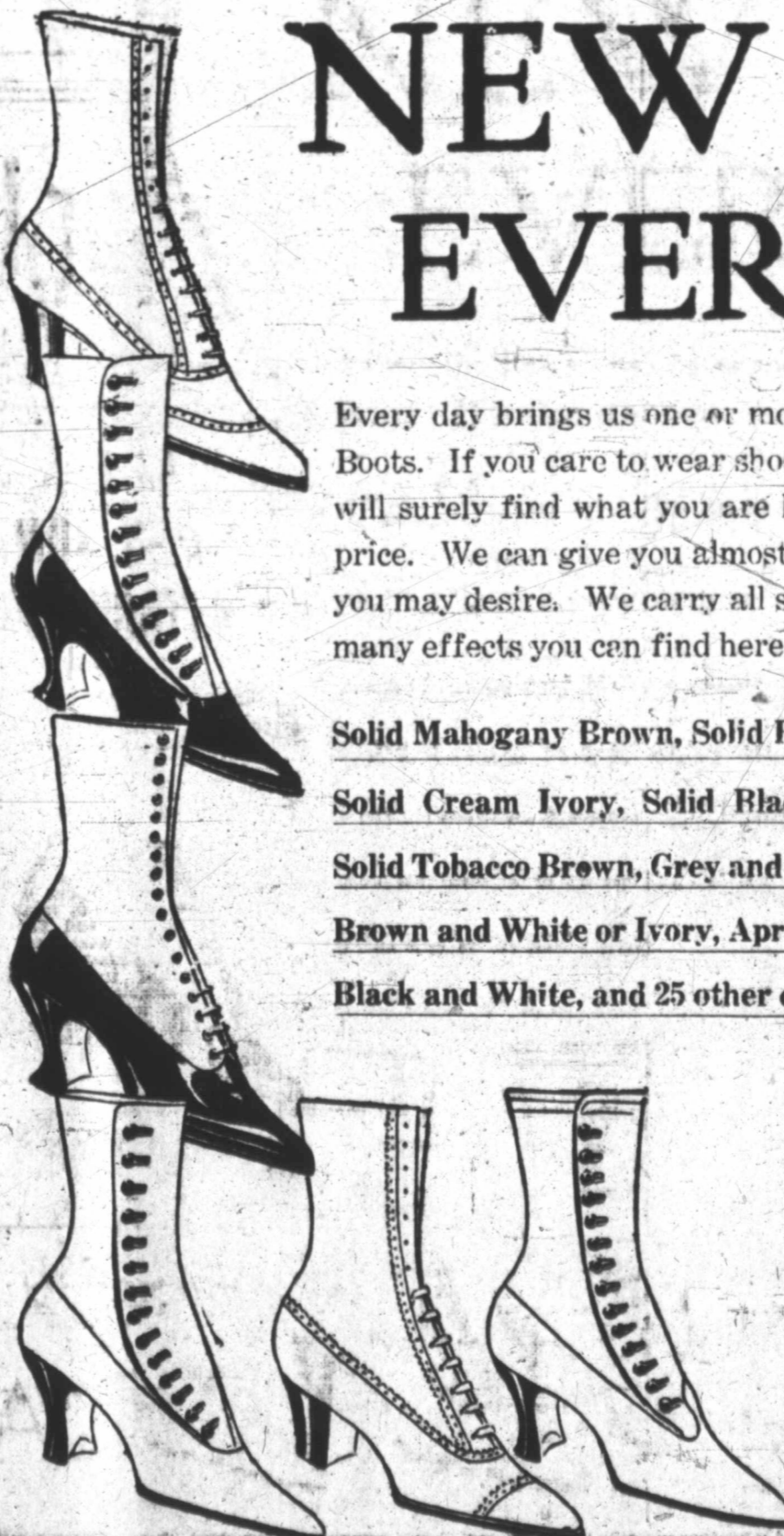

### CELEBRATION OF WILSON'S VICTORY

Democratic Donkey and Republican  
Rooster in Parade—Several Speak-  
ers are Heard.

As a fitting climax to a day of en-  
thusiastic celebration over the re-  
turn of Woodrow Wilson to the White  
House, came the big celebration and  
the long street parade, featured by

the traditional democratic donkey rid-  
ing on the float of honor and docked  
in the stars and stripes which passed  
over some of the principal downtown  
streets Friday night.  
The donkey's triumphal chariot was  
drawn through the street by 50 enthu-  
siastic Wilsonians. A long line of  
automobiles and throngs of enthusias-  
tic parties of the Democratic faith  
formed the procession. Mounted on  
the donkey's back was a magnificent  
specimen of the genus chautauque,  
whose clarion crow was expected to  
express Wichita Falls' sentiments  
in regard to the results of the elec-  
tion, but, probably being of the  
Hughes persuasion the rooster per-  
sisted in maintaining a moody sil-  
ence.

Taylor's band, which donated its  
services furnished plenty of music  
for all up to and including the donkey  
whose actions indicated that for him  
there was plenty and to spare. Such  
inspiring marching songs as "There'll  
Be a Hot Time in the Old Town To-  
night," "The Merry," "Hail, Hail, the  
King's All Here," etc., were taken up  
by the crowd and sung with a hearty  
 gusto. The procession marched from  
Seventh and Indiana to Eighth, turn-  
ing up that street to Ohio, came back  
Ohio to Seventh, and back to the  
starting point on Seventh.  
Wilson speeches were made by  
Judge R. B. Hoff, Mayor Britain,  
Judge John Kay, Judge P. Martin,  
Judge Edgar Scurry, Postmaster Ed  
Howard, T. F. Hunter and A. L.  
Lane and were widely applauded by  
the large crowd which quickly walked  
in the float which served as a speak-  
ers rostrum. The speakers empha-  
sized the greatness of the victory  
which had returned Woodrow Wilson  
to office in spite of the opposition of  
the East, Wall Street money and  
the treachery of Tammany Hall.  
The celebration was pronounced by  
old residents as the greatest since  
the return of Grover Cleveland in  
1892. The arrangements were made  
by J. B. Marlow, N. D. Monroe, J. T.  
Young and D. B. Walker, to whose  
efforts and initiative the success of  
the celebration is attributed.

Wichita Falls Will Be Re-  
presented.  
Texan agents for the Overland car  
are looking forward to a stunt to be  
pulled off early in December, when  
they will journey to the Overland fac-  
tory in a special train. Wichita Falls

O'DONOHUE CHOSEN BY GAS DIRECTORS

Well Known Local Oil Man to Be Manager for Fuel Development Company.

John O'Donohue, well known oil man, was yesterday elected manager of the Wichita Falls Fuel Development company, and will assume his duties shortly. He was selected from among a number who had been considered for that place, the directors taking final action late Saturday. Mr. O'Donohue is at present lease man for the Producers Oil Company, which he has been associated for several years. Previous to going with the Producers, he was with the J. M. Gasker Petroleum Company (now Gulf Production Company) and has had wide and varied experience in the oil game, so that the selection is considered a wise one. It was announced Saturday that the \$5000 subscription to the gas company fund by the light and electric companies here, which had been pending approval of the directors, had been formally ratified and the amount made a part of the subscriptions. The final approval of the Rail Brothers \$10,000 subscriptions has not yet been received. For the present at least the Wichita Falls Fuel Development Company will not incorporate, but will operate as a joint stock enterprise, according to a decision reached at a meeting of the directors in the directors' room at the City National Bank Saturday morning. After thoroughly investigating the matter the directors decided that the personal liability of stockholders could be limited in a joint stock company equally as well as by a chartered corporation, and it was decided to operate as such.

### ARCHER COUNTY MAN JAILED HERE

BROUGHT TO THIS CITY FOR SAFE  
KEEPING AFTER CITIZENS  
DEMAND ACTION

### FACES RAPE CHARGE

Transferred to Local Jail as Result of  
Attitude of Many Archer  
County Citizens

W. H. Foster aged about 50 years, was brought to Wichita Falls from Archer City early Saturday afternoon and lodged in the county jail for safety. An affidavit charging him with rape has been filed against him in Archer county.

Foster was brought here by Sheriff John Turberville and Deputy Sheriff McFall of Archer county after the attitude of some residents of Archer county had become such that this move was deemed advisable.

Foster told local officers that the charge was a frame-up, and protested his innocence. The feeling in Archer county reached the point where a number of the neighbors of the woman whom Foster is charged with assaulting held a meeting and demanded that the county officials give Foster an immediate trial. His examining trial had been set for Saturday, but he waived it, his bond being fixed at \$10,000. There is said to have been much indignation in Archer county, but the officers were not molested when they removed Foster from the jail there and brought him to this city.

The victim of the alleged assault, who resides in the southern part of Archer county, told officers that she was attacked in her home and that when she attempted to use a gun, her assailant disarmed her. She said she was dragged from the house after a struggle with the intruder.

Foster was not arrested until several days after the alleged assault and it was not until yesterday that conditions in Archer county became such that it was decided to remove him there. He will probably not be taken back to Archer county until the grand jury convenes there next spring.

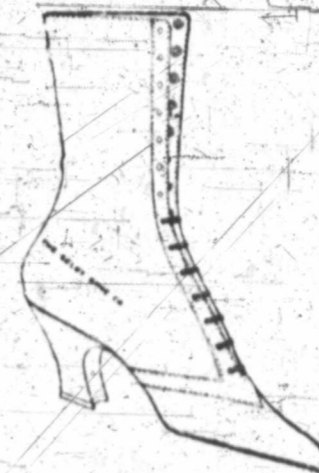

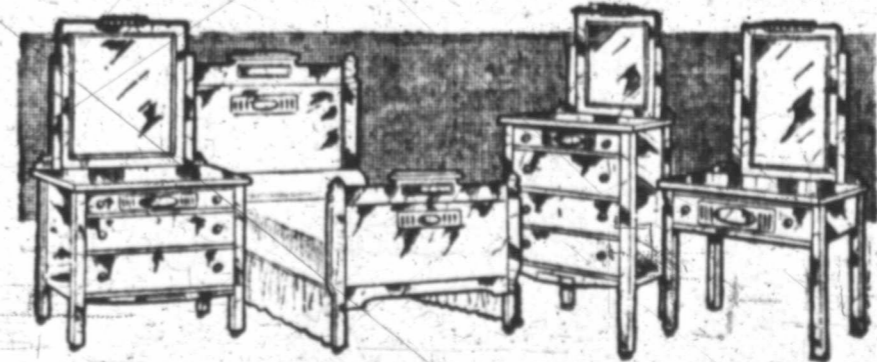
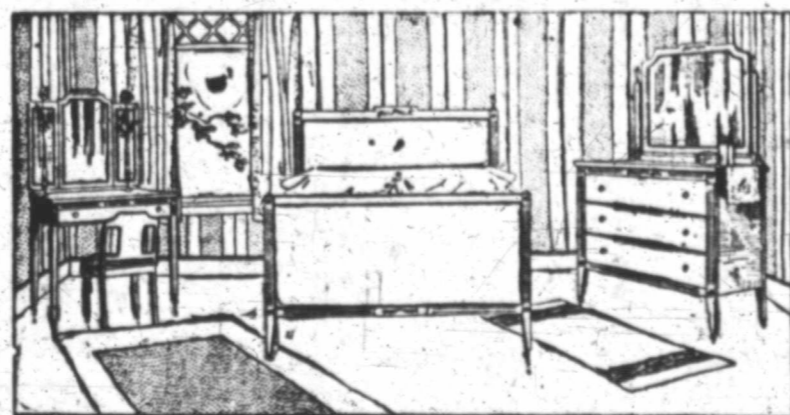

### ROAD MEETINGS HELD SATURDAY AT TWO PLACES

MOTOR CLUB DELEGATION GOES TO IOWA PARK AND BURKBURNETT AND SPEAKS TO CROWDS AT BOTH PLACES

### PROGRAM OUTLINED

Government Expert Recommends Road System of 110 Miles Which He Estimated Can Be Completed at Cost of \$700,000.

The campaign for a permanent road system in Wichita county, already inaugurated in Wichita Falls, was extended Saturday to other communities the Wichita County Motor Club holding meetings at Iowa Park and Burkburnett. An effort was made to hold a meeting at Electra, but the falling temperature and the lateness of the hour caused the workers to postpone their efforts until later.

The most interesting feature of the day's activities was the outline given by George B. Marshall, government road expert of the work that he considers necessary in this county. Mr. Marshall recommends the building of 110 miles of permanent highway in this county, at an estimated cost of \$700,000.

The system recommended by Mr. Marshall includes: From Clay county line to Wilbarzer line, through Wichita Falls, Iowa Park and Electra.

From Wichita Falls through Burkburnett to Red River.

From Iowa Park to Clara.

From Iowa Park to the Archer county line.

From Wichita Falls westward on the Seymour road.

From Wichita Falls eastward on the Petrolia road.

Two precinct committees were chosen Saturday. J. A. Watkins at Iowa Park and J. C. Hardin at Burkburnett. Both meetings were well attended and much interest was manifested. Mayor Cline presided at Burkburnett and many farmers were present both there and at Iowa Park.

A motion picture show, propitiously offered to turn his building over to the workers, but it was decided to hold the meeting there later on.

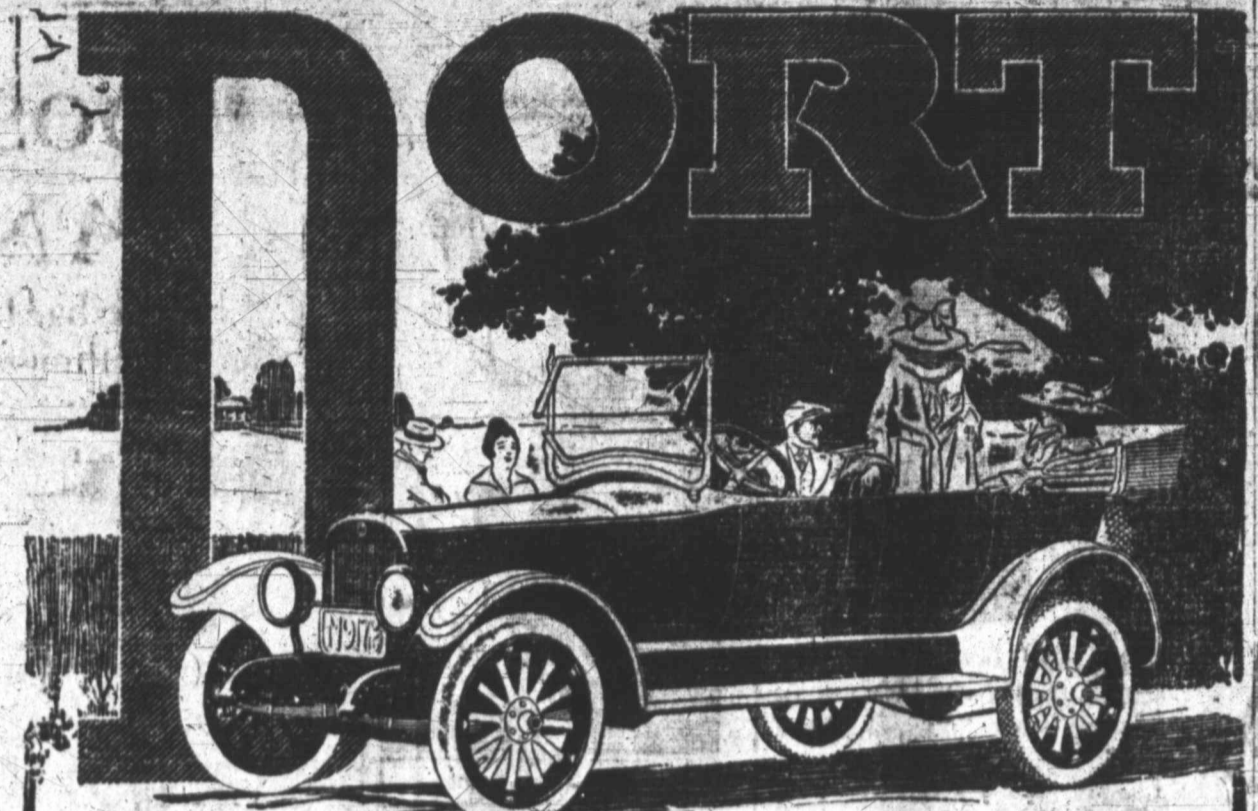
C. W. Reid, president of the Motor Club, was well pleased with the results of the day's work, he declared last night.

The first meeting of the day was held at Iowa Park where J. A. Watkins was named as the Iowa Park member of the county committee. Mr. Marshall was accompanied to that place by C. W. Reid, president of the Wichita County Automobile Club, H. F. Johnson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, B. J. Bann, Judge Scurry, County Commissioner J. F. Jackson and others.

Soon after the arrival of the Wichita Falls party a fair sized crowd of representative citizens was gathered on a street corner and Mr. Marshall was introduced and spoke on the advantages of good roads and explained in some detail the manner of issuing bonds, the assessment of taxes to refund them and other matters.

He said that the European war would be followed by a movement to the farms by many of the laborers who are now engaged in manufacturing which is stimulated by demands growing out of the war. He argued that these people would seek farms having the best advantages to offer, one of the most important of which was good roads. After speaking of the importance of improved highways he took up the matter of bond issues to build them.

He said that it was the custom in Texas in the issuance of road bonds in Texas counties for the committees of the county to nominate an

### WILL MEET MONDAY TO PLAN CEMETERY

Park Board to Employ a Landscape Architect Without Waiting to Sell Bonds

Work on the Riverside cemetery may be started even before the bonds voted for the work have been sold and money received, according to Dr. J. P. Reed, chairman of the park board, who has called a meeting of that body for Monday morning. The employment of a landscape architect to plan the work will be the most important matter to be determined at this meeting. As the city council has already expressed themselves as being agreeable to any action taken by the park board in this matter, the hands of the board are now free to proceed with the work with the utmost possible dispatch.

Charles W. Hughes, of Marshalltown, Iowa, and Dallas, Texas, a landscape architect with quite a reputation as a cemetery specialist will in all probability be the choice for this work. Mr. Hughes has designed some of the most noted cemeteries in the country having been in the business for more than thirty years. He or his representatives have been in consultation with the park board several times, and submitted tentative designs which have met with the board's entire approval. As a result of these conferences Mr. Hughes also has the advantage of being thoroughly familiar with the local situation.

Mr. Hughes' proposition calls for the submission of full plans and specifications together with the cost estimates for the work, but also that he cover the grounds in person and strike out the divisions in such a way that there can be no mistakes in carrying out the plans submitted by him. Mr. Hughes' capacity as a contractor will also aid on the contract for the work.

The preliminary survey will be finished by the time the bonds have been

drawn up in legal form, sold and the money received, but in case it is finished much earlier or a delay in selling the bonds occurs the board may borrow the money on the strength of the bond issue and go ahead with the work, as every day of this season of the year is particularly valuable for work of this kind, and it is especially important that none of this time be lost.

### DEFENSE NOW PRESENTING EVIDENCE IN WATSON CASE

By Associated Press. Waco, Texas, Nov. 11.—The defense today began the introduction of testimony in the T. R. Watson case. An attempt on the part of counsel for the defense to present voluminous evidence as to the peaceful reputation of the defendant failed, the state admitting that no question relative to his conduct prior to the killing would be raised. Witnesses for the defense testified that Watson was depressed before the killing of John S. Patterson but stated on cross-examination that they believed he knew right from wrong.

advisory committee, of from five to seven, who sit with the commissioners court and advise concerning the issuance and sale of bonds, the spending of the money and other matters. He said that this was done not because of any lack of confidence in the boards of commissioners but that the latter might have the advice and counsel of the best business men and financiers of their counties. In counties where such advisory committees had not been named, he said, the commissioners themselves in a number of instances had asked for their appointment.

He estimated that there were about 600 miles of public highways in Wichita county on which from \$50,000 to \$60,000 annually was being expended. He said that with this number of miles of highways it was impossible to make any permanent improvements with the funds available. A bond issue, he declared, was the feasible method of providing for their improvement. He outlined a system of improved highways for the county which would require a bond issue estimated at \$700,000. This system embraces an improved highway from the Wilbarzer county line through Electra, Iowa Park and Wichita Falls to the Clay county line, another from Electra through Clara to Burkburnett and from Burkburnett to Red River, a third from Burkburnett to Wichita Falls, and others from Iowa Park to Clara, from Iowa Park south to the Archer county line, from Wichita Falls west on the Seymour road about eleven miles, and on the Petrolia road about four miles from Wichita Falls.

Mr. Marshall said that from his investigations he believed that such a system of improved highways would serve for fully 85 per cent of the travel of the county. A \$700,000 bond issue, he estimated, on the present assessed valuation in the county, would require a tax of 22 cents on the hundred dollars, for the first year and that the average tax for the forty years the bonds would run would not be over 14 cents. Three thousand dollars, he estimated as the average assessed valuation for the property owners in the county. This would mean an average tax of one dollar a year. He mentioned communities in the state which had been glad to pay taxes as high as 30 cents on the hundred dollar valuation for good roads and had found such an investment highly profitable.

He pointed out that with a highway system such as he had outlined once built would permit the improvement of the lateral or feed lines of highway in the county which now receive little attention from the ordinary revenues of the county. He expressed a belief that there is material in the county which can be used as the base for surface structure. He said that most of the grading necessary is already done.

Following Mr. Marshall's address, Mr. Reid introduced Judge Scurry who explained the plan of organization for the county with a local chairman in each community. J. F. Boyd was named as temporary chairman and a motion that Iowa Park proceed with the selection of its committee was adopted. Upon a ballot, J.

A. Watkins was chosen committee man and A. C. Golden, secretary.

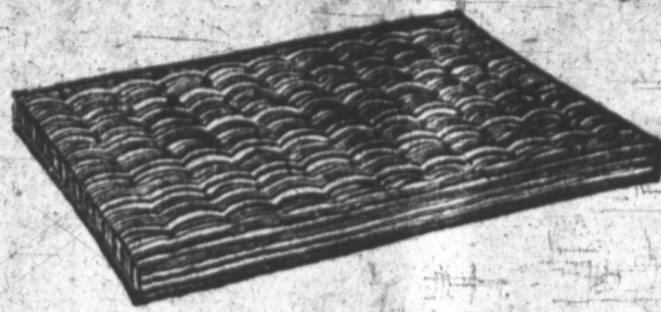

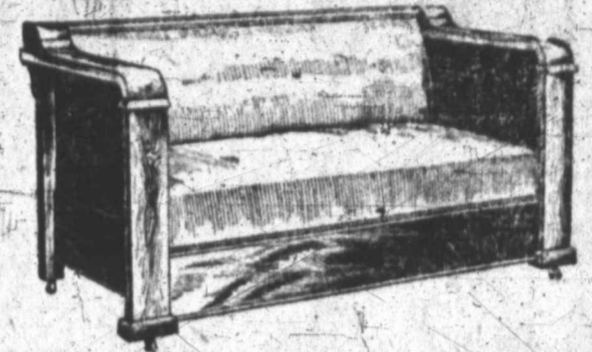

### NEW YORK PAPERS BRING SMILES HERE

Tell of "Sweeping Victory For Hughes" in Wednesday's Issues—Roosevelt's Statement

"Sweeping Victory for Hughes" was the eight column head-line in the New York World of last Wednesday, copies of which were received here late Friday. Other New York papers of the same date also bantered the election of Hughes, their reports varying from declarations of a landslide to the conservative statement that Hughes had a majority in the electoral college.

The papers were the source of some silent joy on the part of Wichitans who saw them and who of course knew that the head-lines had been discredited many hours since. The fact that the New York papers gave Wilson only Colorado and the southern states, was also the cause for some smiles.

Perhaps the most enjoyable reading to be found in the Golden publications was a statement from Roosevelt, which appeared in the World, as follows:

"When informed of the lead of Charles E. Hughes over President Wilson, according to the returns up to 9:45 tonight, Colonel Roosevelt issued the following statement: 'I am doubly thankful, as an American, for the election of Mr. Hughes. It is a vindication of our national honor.

"Because of some charges that have been made, I wish to state now

that I will not under any circumstances make any recommendations to Mr. Hughes with reference to appointments or to his legislative policy. Wichitans who read the statement agreed that it certainly was kind of Mr. Roosevelt. The papers recorded the fact that Mr. Hughes declined to comment upon the returns. 'McCormick still hopes for success' a small headline, was the only cheerful note from a democratic standpoint.

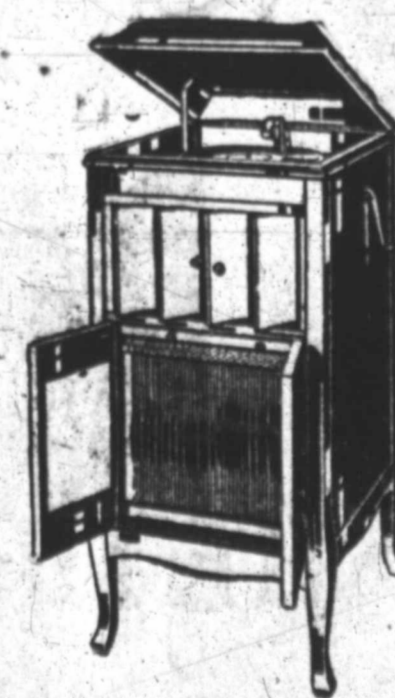

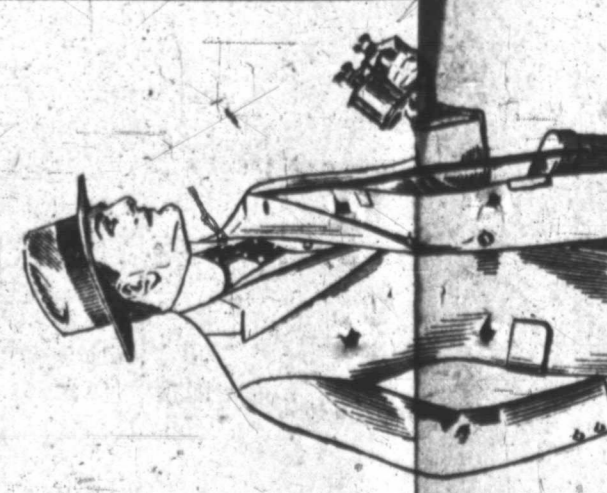

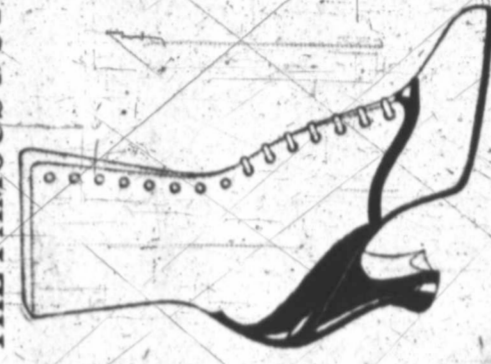
