90 PER CENT OF CROP HERE GINNED

Estimates Vary as to Amount Still Un-sold—Sales Made in Small Lots

While estimates agree that more than 90 per cent of Wichita county's cotton crop this season has been ginned, diverse opinions are given as to the amount of the crop that has been sold. Some of those familiar with the situation declare that fully 80 per cent of the crop has already been marketed, while others declare that from a fourth to a third of the ginned crop has been stored in warehouses, awaiting still higher prices than those prevailing.

So far as can be learned, no middling cotton has sold for 20 cents here as yet. Saturday's quotation for middling was 19 3/4 cents, the highest ever known here. The record breaking prices of the past few weeks have brought comparatively little cotton into the local market and such sales as have been made have been one or two bale lots as a rule. This has caused the holder in some quarters that very little cotton remains to be sold, but others contend that a substantial proportion of the crop is still being held.

One or two rural gins in this county have closed and those that are still in operation are ginning only from five to ten bales at a time. It is estimated that 90 per cent of the crop has been through the gin and both farmers and buyers agree that this is about correct.

OLD INDIAN VILLAGE IS NOW NATIONAL PARK

Washington, Nov. 18.—The "Old Kasaan National Monument" consisting of 28 acres within the Tongass National Forest, Alaska, has just been created by presidential proclamation as a result of recommendations made by the secretary of agriculture. The tract embraces the well known abandoned Haida Indian village of Old Kasaan, situated on Prince of Wales island in southeastern Alaska, about thirty miles west of Ketchikan.

The village was abandoned by the Indians about ten years ago. Among the relics which remain there are about fifty Indian totem poles, five or six of which are classed as exceptionally good specimens. In the deserted village there are also eight large square buildings which were originally constructed according to the peculiar plan of the Haida Indians, and which it is stated by those best qualified to know, represent the best specimens of Haida architecture that now exist. The largest of these buildings is approximately 40 by 60 feet in size and is made entirely of round and carved timbers. There also remains a number of Indian graves with the typical small grave houses erected by the Alaskan Indians.

Since the village was abandoned by the Indians the buildings have been rapidly falling into a state of disrepair and decay and a certain amount of vandalism and souvenir hunters renders some form of protection essential. An examination of the area was made jointly by representatives of the forest service and of the interior department, and reports strongly urging the establishment of the National Monument were approved by the secretary of both departments. The Smithsonian institution strongly endorsed the proposition for the establishment of a National Monument. The new National Monument will be protected and administered by the forest service, as is the case with all monuments located within the national forests.

PINK BOLL WORM, MOST DESTRUCTIVE COTTON PEST, NOW THREATENS TEXAS

Washington.—The pink boll worm, the most destructive of all cotton pests, which has caused millions of dollars loss to cotton growers in Egypt, India and other cotton producing countries, has for the first time been discovered on the North American continent. The presence and probable establishment of the pest in the important cotton growing Laguna district of the State of Coahuila, Mexico, within 200 miles of the Texas-Mexico border, has been determined by specialists in the U. S. department of agriculture. Amendments to quarantine regulations have been promulgated by the secretary of agriculture seeking to prevent the worm from entering the United States and every possible step will be taken by the department to make the prohibitions effective and to safeguard the interests of the cotton producers of the United States in other ways.

The pink boll worm is a comparatively new pest, first introduced from India to Egypt about eight years ago. It has already spread to practically all cotton producing countries in the world except the United States. Recognizing the possibility of introducing the pest into this country in cotton seed, seed cotton, and cotton linters, the United States has prohibited for several years the importation of these products from all cotton producing territories, except six states of northern Mexico. For the same reason cotton lint from such countries has been admitted into the United States only in certain northern ports after fumigation. The new amendments to quarantine regulations, effective November 4, extend the prohibition against importing the pest and its eggs and larvae to all cotton producing Mexican territory, with the exception of that portion of the Imperial Valley, south of the Mexico-California line. This area is contiguous with the Imperial Valley of California, is devoted to the culture of the same kind of cotton, and is largely settled by immigrants from the valley of cotton culture in the valley and the entire separation of the Mexican portions of the area from continental Mexico by the Gulf of California and wide expanses of desert country. It is not considered necessary to change the existing regulations there by the addition of this area, since both sides of the international line, however, will be warned of the danger and it is expected naturally will refrain from the traffic in the pest, in cotton or cotton seed, and seed products from those parts of Mexico against which the quarantine has been promulgated.

As to continental Mexico, however, involving the five States of Nuevo Leon, Coahuila, Durango, Chihuahua and Tamaulipas, the discovery in Mexico by the Laguna district makes it absolutely imperative that further movement of cotton seed and hulled seed be stopped. This has been effected by the order issued by the secretary of agriculture, revoking the amendments to the cotton seed quarantine which permitted such movement of seed from these states. The control of the movement of lint cotton from these states of northern Mexico has been effected by a revision of quarantine regulations which will

POKER GAME RAID RESULTS IN FINES

Five Found By Officers—Three Young Hibobs Also in Police Court Today

Five well-known young men captured in a raid of a card game in the business section last night by Officers Pitcher and Burns this morning entered pleas of guilty to gaming, using assumed names for the occasion. The fines were \$10 a throw.

Three young men who have run afoul of trouble after breaking away from home ties at an unusually early age figured in this morning's session. Bowen was responsible for the cases against two of them, brothers whose people are sheep herders in New Mexico, and whose wanderings led them to the most light area of this city via the cotton fields of Oklahoma. One dog was the only fatality resulting from their Saturday night spree, but a term in jail was given them that they might reflect less serious trouble result from a second attempt. OPEN INQUIRY ON RAIL PROBLEMS AT WASHINGTON

ard and measure of valuation, others content themselves simply with the logical valuation of the actual property within the boundaries of the state.
Representatives of the Texas railway commission appeared at the hearing. Members of the Texas commission say they do not subscribe to the view of commodities, nor do they favor the making of freight rates along so-called scientific basis. They express belief, however, that the question of rate making should be left to the state commissions created for that purpose.
Although the investigation was authorized before the threatened strike by the Texas commission, the investigation will go into the questions which came up at that time, such as regulation of wages by interstate commerce commission and legislation to prevent a similar situation.
Questions which the investigators will take up in the hearing on the transportation problem and the inquiry will have a potent influence in Congress on the subject of government ownership.
At the hearing it is expected that all the leading railroads, telegraph, telephone and wireless concerns, and express companies, as well as economists, leaders of labor and agriculture, shippers and bankers will be heard.
The committee is required to report to Congress by January 8, and an effort may be made to put through legislation before the session ends on March 4, after which the administration will not have its present majority in the house.
The resolution for the investigation came at the conclusion of many months of effort on the part of the railroads and others interested in questions affecting them, to have a comprehensive inquiry into all phases of government control.
President Wilson in his address to Congress in December, 1915, called attention to the need in this language: "The transportation problem is an exceedingly serious and pressing one in this country. There has from time to time of late been reason to fear that our railroads would not much longer be able to cope with it successfully, as at present equipped and organized. It is suggested that it would be wise to provide for a commission of inquiry to ascertain by a thorough canvass of the whole question whether our laws at present in force and administered as a service to the public might be in the solution of the problem."
It is obviously a problem that lies at the very foundation of our efficiency as a people. Such an inquiry ought to draw out every circumstance and opinion which bears on the matter, and need to know all sides of the matter if we mean to do anything in the field of federal legislation. No one, I am sure, would so take any backward step. The regulation of the railroads of the country by federal commission has had admirable results and has fully justified the hopes and expectations of those by whom the policy of regulation was originally proposed. 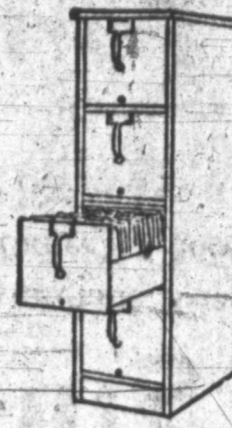
