TICK QUARANTINE SOON TO BE LIFTED

Wichita, Clay and Archer Counties Expected To Go Above Line December 1

Most of Wichita county will go above the tick quarantine line on December 1, if the expectations of those in charge of the work here are fulfilled. W. C. Hoffman, government inspector in charge of the work in this county, has recommended to the federal authorities that the long standing quarantine be lifted on the first of next month, and there is little doubt that this will be done.

The work of dipping the more than 43,000 head of cattle in this county has been in progress practically all of this year, and while it is not yet finished, it has advanced far enough for the shipping restrictions imposed by the quarantine to be removed, in the opinion of Mr. Hoffman. Dipping will continue in several sections all winter and some parts of the county will still be considered as quarantined, but the great majority of the stockmen will be free to ship as they wish. The commissioners' court at its session last week elected Frank Watkins of Burkhart inspectors and the work formerly handled by several men will devolve upon him alone.

Archer and Clay counties are expected to go "above the line" at the same time that Wichita county does. The work in those counties has been simultaneous with that in this county. Several hundred dipping vats have been used for dipping the more than 200,000 head of cattle in the three counties, the commissioners' court of the counties cooperating with the federal and state authorities in this work. The expense was burdensome upon all three counties, but it is declared to have been small when compared with the toll that the ticks were taking on the cattle they infested.

PARDON AS REWARD FOR NEGRO CONVICT

Prisoner Once Saved Life of Sheriff Hawkins When Insane Man Attacked Him

Because he saved Sheriff Hawkins from probable death at the hands of an insane man, "Blue" Williams, a negro convicted of burglary and now in the penitentiary, will probably be pardoned. He will get his pardon if Sheriff Hawkins can prevail upon Governor Ferguson to take action; the sheriff will go to Austin next week to see the chief executive relative to the pardon.

The incident in question happened some months ago, before "Blue" was sent to the penitentiary and while he was still an inmate of the county jail. The sheriff had gone into the insane ward, on some mission, when he was attacked by a white man who was incarcerated there. The county jailer floored the sheriff and was choking him vigorously when "Blue" realized what was happening and came in from the "ran" and struck the jailer over the head with a brick, who, it is said, had all but finished the sheriff.

There were other instances when "Blue" proved of service to the officers and now that he has served a few months of the sentence given him for the burglary, he is quick to store, officers feel that he is entitled to his freedom. Pardon will also be sought for a negro who was convicted of perjury in connection with a gambling charge; in this case, several other negroes who were equally guilty went unpunished, and the pardon will be sought on the ground that this particular negro should not have to suffer for the offenses of all.

EVANGELISTIC WORK OF W. C. T. U. DISCUSSED

By Associated Press. Indianapolis, Nov. 21.—Under the general topic, "The W. C. T. U. as Evangelist," the efficiency congress of the national W. C. T. U. today heard reports from superintendents of nine departments of the organization. Among them were "Sabbath Observance," by Mrs. W. C. W. of the W. C. T. U. of North Dakota and a talk on "The Sky and Underground Pilot," by Mrs. W. A. Loyne of Warren, New Hampshire, of that department of work among lumbermen and miners. "Universal Peace," by Mrs. Hannah J. Bailey, department of peace and arbitration and "Lifted Community Factors," by Mrs. Lurenda B. Smith, department of rescue work, were the subjects of other reports.

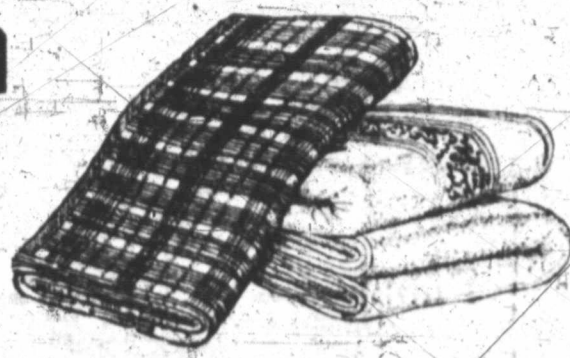

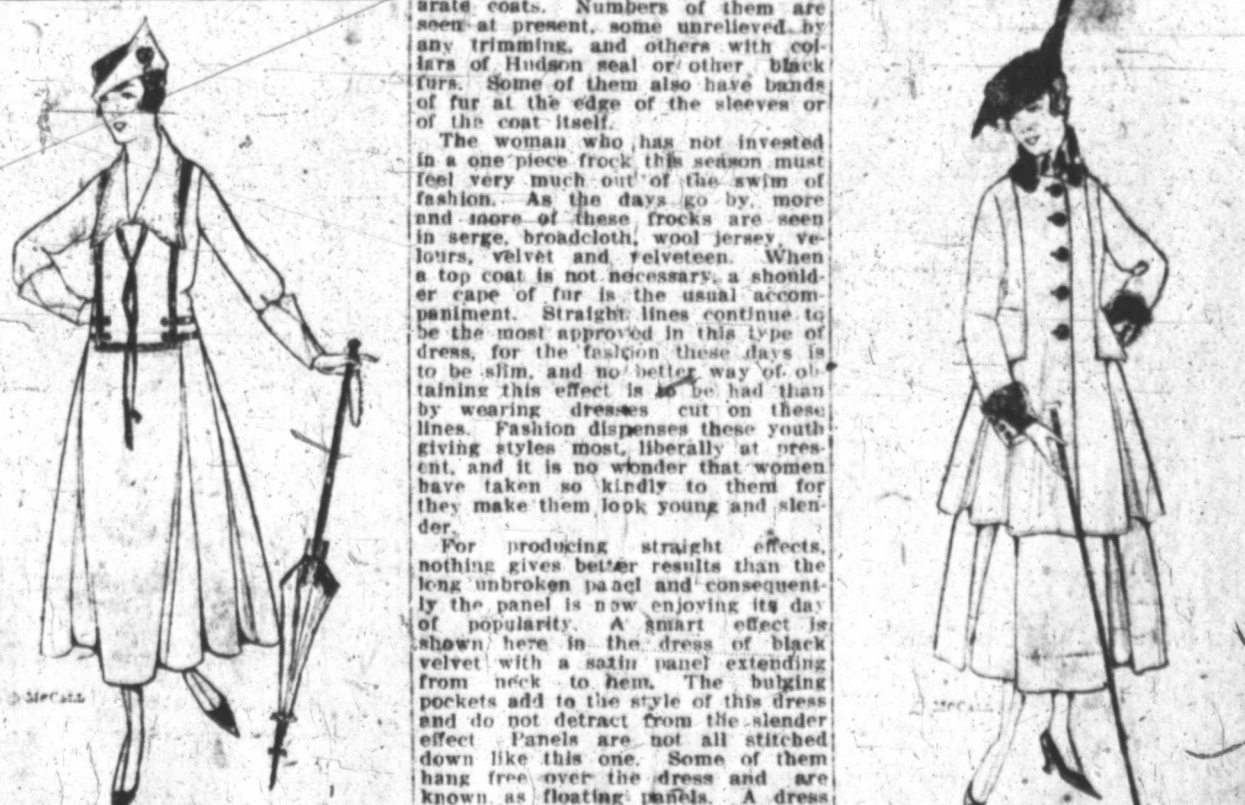

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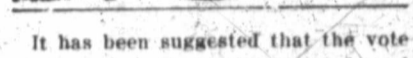

It has been suggested that the vote on the proposed bond issue for road improvements ought to be arranged for some time after heavy winter rains which make the roads almost impassable. After such a situation it argued that no man would vote against a bond issue for good roads.

Women are coming into their own in this country. Some of the largest employers of labor in the country have already placed women on the same basis of pay as men in their employ. Women's votes elected a president. A woman has been elected to congress. A girl has set a new aviation record in this country. Women in many lines of endeavor are doing the same work as men and in many instances are doing it better.

Commenting on an editorial in the New York Herald which fears the dumping of European goods into the American market after the war, the Houston Post says that this country, it is not because of what Europe sends to the United States, but because of what Europe ceases to buy. The end of the war, the Post points out, will mean the cessation of orders for munitions. Just how much else it will stop Europe from buying from America, the Post believes, will depend largely upon the ability of Europe to pay. The Post believes that some of the proportion that orders from Europe fall off domestic consumption will increase, pointing out that the excessive prices that now prevail on account of the European demand is working to lessen domestic consumption. As for dumping the Post points out, that Europe has nothing to dump. Europe is bare of cupboard and wardrobe, and with millions of her best manhood dead or crippled it will be years before her industries can be restored to enable her to compete with America in the markets of the world. The chief problem for the tariff commission to be appointed by President Wilson, the Post believes, will be in connection with the adjustment of revenue tariffs to meet the increased demand for revenues growing out of the naval and other expenditures.

HELPING THE FARMERS

A concrete example of how a commercial organization can help the farmer is furnished by Wichita Falls.

The Chamber of Commerce of this almost-as-good-as-Amarillo city was one of the first commercial organizations in the Southwest to undertake the task of assisting the farmers on a really extensive scale.

The first undertaking was the appropriation of the 75 head of high grade Holstein cows from the State of Wisconsin. This venture was financed by local banking institutions as a very liberal loan. The cows were divided into herds of five each and one herd given each family. The only requirements made by the bank was that one-half of the gross proceeds from the sale of milk and butter from the entire herd should be applied on the note. A maximum of two years time was given to complete the payments and the notes drew 5 per cent interest.

To safeguard against loss in any way the farmers who received the cow's organized a mutual insurance association which was to run for six months following receipt of the cattle. The six months has expired and finds only one cow lost. This loss was merged among all of the owners with entire satisfaction. Every man who received cows under this plan has already paid at least one-third of the cost and will soon be able to complete the payments. Lots were drawn when the cattle were received so that the distribution

might be satisfactory to all concerned. The herds were arranged on a near equal in value as possible and were numbered to correspond to the tickets which were drawn from a hat.

Recently the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce received from the First National Bank \$1,000.00 to be used as a permanent fund for the benefit of the boys and girls of that section. The money will first be spent for registered boys which will be given out. These boys and girls will sign notes for the pig and will be given twelve months to repay the loan with interest at the rate of 8 per cent. When the money is repaid it will be spent for poultry or calves as the boys and girls choose. This plan will teach the beneficiaries the fundamental principles of business and will teach the beneficiaries the fundamental principles of business and will ultimately reach every worthy boy and girl in the vicinity of Wichita Falls. The Government Demonstration Agent will aid in handling the entire proposition.—Amarillo Panhandle.

The brewers of the county are said to be behind a movement to have congress coin a seven and half cent piece. If such a coin gets into circulation the price of a glass of beer will go up fifty per cent. This will be a heavy item in the added cost of living for some Wichita Falls citizens.

We must spread our butter a little thinner. The butter dealers of Kansas City have stated that the price of butter will be "painfully high" unless the demand is lessened. Some grocers there are asking fifty cents a pound for butter. A fortune awaits the man who will invent a butter spreader which can regulate the spread of butter as thin as the price is high. In the meantime those Wichita county farmers who are starting holstein, Jersey and guernsey herds are viewing the mounting cost of living with entire equanimity.

Former Candidate Hughes is reported to have written out a telegram of congratulations to President Wilson and to have left it with Chairman Wilcox of the republican national committee, to send when all hope was gone that a recount of the vote would change the result of the election. Mr. Hughes, it is said, would have sent his congratulatory telegram long ago but for the advice of Mr. Wilcox. A graceful acknowledgment of defeat from Mr. Hughes could not have been out of place. In post campaign affairs as well as in pre-election matters Judge Hughes appears to have been badly advised. He has probably done things that he felt he ought not to do simply because others whom he felt ought to know best advised him to do.

PLAN AFFILIATION WITH FEDERATION

Railroad Brotherhoods Will Probably Unite With Other Labor Body Shortly

The Associated Press. Baltimore, Nov. 21.—Affiliation of the members of the American Federation of Labor and the four big railroad brotherhoods for effecting the general betterment of labor was argued today before the federation convention by the brotherhood heads and President Samuel Gompers. Delegates who crowded the hall, cheered all of the speakers.

"We must hang together or we will hang separately," W. G. Lee, speaker for the railroad brotherhood and head of the railway trainmen, declared. "It is a great comfort to know," President Gompers said, "that the time is not far distant when the great brotherhoods will be part of the American Federation of Labor. It took more courage for President Wilson to write across the front pages of the newspapers of this country than it would have taken for him to have written that this country was at war with Mexico," Mr. Lee said.

New York, Nov. 21.—January cotton eased off from 21.12 to 20.85 and May from 21.42 to 21.15 shortly after the opening of the market today. Later January sold off to 20.55 and May to 20.91 or 46 to 49 points under last night's closing figures. Range of 20 to 23 points followed during the day. Cotton closed steady, December 20.52; January 20.64; March 20.84; May 21.02; July 21.01; October 18.82.

INMATES AT HOME FOR AGED HELP ARMENIANS

New York, Nov. 21.—Denying themselves weekly shaves and all allowances, aged inmates of New York City's Home for the Aged and Infirm on Blackwell's Island have given a large sum of money to help Armenian relief. These old men and women, many of them crippled and almost every one of them beyond sixty, in one week of self-denial or hard work collected \$27 as a contribution to the work of the American committee for Armenian and Syrian relief.

The voluntary gift of the inmates was the first ever made by the Home for the Aged and Infirm. The homeless men and women hearing of the plight of almost a million starving Armenian women and children in Turkey at once decided to make practical their sympathy with the homeless across the ocean.

To do this a woman who forty years ago was the most famous Topsy of the American stage, seventy years old now and enfeebled by drugs, gave a fourth of her meagre allowance. An invalid who for seven years had been confined to bed, gave all the money that she had in a quarter. One paralytic woman with only one arm washed for other women in the ward and gave her earnings, twenty-five cents to swell the contribution.
