## TICK QUARANTINE SOON TO BE LIFTED

Most of Wichitz county will go above the tick quarantine line on December 1, if the expectations of those in charge of the work here are fulfilled. W. C. Hoffman, government inspector in charge of the work in this county, has recommended to the federal authorities that the long standing quarantine be lifted on the first of next month, and there is little doubt that this will be done. first of next month, and there is little doubt that this will be done.

The work of dipping the more than 43,000 head of cattle, in this county has been in progress practically all of this year, and while it is not yet finished, it has advanced far enough for the shipping restrictions imposed by the quarantine to be removed, in the opinion of Mr. Hoffman. Dipping will continue in several sections all winter and some parts of the county will still be considered as quarantined, but the great majority of the stockmen will be free to ship as they wish. The commissioners' court at its session last week elected Frank Watkins of Burkburnett inspector and the work formerly handled by several men will devolve upon him alone.

## LITTLE GINNING IN NORTHWEST TEXAS

Census Bureau's Report Indicates Most of Crop in This Section

Ginning in Northwest Texas has reached a dull season, with most of the crop already in, judging from the the crop already in, judging from the census bureau's report up to November 1, which shows a very slight in crease, in Northwest Texas counties, over the figures up to October 15.

If earlier estimates of a 5,000-bale crop in Wichita county were anywhere near accurate, a very small proportion of the crop remains to be gathered, as the total ginned up to November 1 was 4,887 bales. It is now thought that this county will produce from 5,200 to 5,300 bales. The marked disparity between the ginning figures this year and those of the same date last year, is still noted in the census report, despite the fact that last seasons crop was considerably larger than that of this year. 


