Berlin, Nov. 29.—The man power bill providing for compulsory service of civilians for we; purposes will be introduced in the Reichstag to morrow with a speech by Chancellor Won Bethmann-Hollweg, pointing out the necessity of this sweeping measure. The bill as introduced undoubtedly will differ considerably from the draft recently published. The principle of the measure that all able bodied males between the age of 18 or 60, not serving with the colors, are 60 not serving with the colors, are liable to labor service in the interest of the Fatherland, will be unchanged but it is uncertain just what form the control of the Reichstag over the education of the law will assume.
