

AUSTRIAN SUB IS BLAMED FOR CHEMING'S FATE

BOTH SHELL FIRE AND TORPEDO USED TO SINK AMERICAN VESSEL, ACCORDING TO WASHINGTON ADVICES.

NO LIVES ARE LOST

All Those on Board Are Given Opportunity to Leave Vessel—Captain Reports Disaster to New York Today.

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—Latest dispatches to the state department say the submarine which sank the American steamer Chemung on November 25 was the Austrian U-20, and that the steamer was destroyed by shell fire as well as torpedo.

AGENTS OF STEAMSHIP GET CAPTAINS REPORT

New York, Nov. 29.—A report on the torpedoing of the steamer Chemung was received here today by Harris Magill & Company, agents for the ship in a cablegram from her master, Captain Duffy, saying: "Chemung sunk by gun fire and torpedoed by Austrian submarine fourteen miles east of Cape Gata, November 25. All safe. Address care American Consul, Valencia."

CATTLE EMBARGO IS ORDERED TODAY

Texas Commission Bars Shipments From Several States on Account of Disease.

By Associated Press. Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 29.—Texas was closed today to all live stock imports from Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska and Illinois. This embargo went into effect this morning upon order of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission and will remain in force until the foot and mouth disease scare in the middle west is removed.

MAN POWER BILL TO BE OFFERED IN REICHSTAG

Berlin, Nov. 29.—The man power bill providing for compulsory service of civilians for war purposes will be introduced in the Reichstag tomorrow with a speech by Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg, pointing out the necessity of this sweeping measure. The bill as introduced undoubtedly will differ considerably from the draft recently published. The principle of the measure that all able bodied males between the age of 18 or 20, not serving with the colors, are liable to labor service in the interest of the Fatherland, will be unchanged but it is uncertain just what form the control of the Reichstag over the education of the law will assume.

SICK RATE ON BORDER SHOWS SLIGHT INCREASE

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—The sick rate among the border troops for the week ending November 25 increased slightly, according to reports to the war department. The rate was 2.5 per cent, with four deaths against 2.46 the week previous. The rate for regular troops was 2.55 per cent with two deaths, a decrease from 3.1 the previous week.

START INQUIRY ON EGG STORAGE

CHICAGO AUTHORITIES INVESTIGATING HOLDING OF LARGE SUPPLIES THERE.

WORK OF "EGG KING"

His Activities to Be Probed in Connection With High Cost of Living Inquiries.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Nov. 29.—City, state and federal officials together with members of civic, women and other organizations were working today in an attempt to find solution of the high cost of food stuffs.

It was announced that municipal inspectors had discovered in storage about 800,000 eggs of questionable quality which were tagged and marked for examination by the city chemist while more than 2,000,000 eggs were found in six cold storage houses awaiting increased prices. In addition government inspectors found thirty-six million eggs stored in another warehouse the owner of which has not been located.

Charles F. Cline, United States district attorney began an inquiry into the charges that James E. Wetz in the hold of a seventy-two million eggs in Chicago and to learn, if Mr. Wetz is not the actual owner, who is backing him in the alleged attempt to corner.

WILL TRY TO IMPROVE UPON CHICAGO DIET SQUAD

DIET SQUAD COMES WELL WITHIN LIMIT FIRST WEEK

By Associated Press. Chicago, Nov. 29.—Plainer fare will mark the menu of the diet squad at the Chicago health department during the remainder of the attempt to demonstrate how to live well at reasonable prices the second week of which began today.

John Robertson, health commissioner expressed the hope that in the final week the cost of feeding the twelve dieters might be cut to about 25 cents a day per person. Three went for the first week was 33 1/3 cents each, exclusive of allowances for fuel, light, heat, service and overhead expenses.

Only two dozen eggs were used in the first week, these costing 40 and 44 cents a dozen. Thirty-five quarts of milk at nine cents were used chiefly for cooking.

TURKEY PRICES SLUMP IN PITTSBURG TODAY

By Associated Press. Pittsburgh, Nov. 29.—With the public refusing to buy turkeys at high prices, the market here has suffered another sharp slump and prices today were as low as eighteen cents a pound for the live fowls and a large supply was on hand.

DREADNAUGHT SQUADRON OF EIGHT ASSEMBLED IN THE HUDSON RIVER



DREADNAUGHTS, LYING IN THE HUDSON

Eight dreadnaughts of the Atlantic fleet, put into port at New York so that the officers and men might witness the Army and Navy game at the Polo grounds and give the people of the city and surrounding territory a chance to see some of the navy's biggest vessels.

The fleet is in command of Admiral Henry T. Mayo, whose flagship is the oil burning superdreadnaught Pennsylvania. The flagship went to the navy yard, while the rest of the fleet proceeded to an anchorage in the North river off Ninety-sixth street.

The New York led the flotilla into port, and she was followed by the Texas, Oklahoma, Connecticut, Florida, Wyoming and Utah. It was expected that President Wilson would visit the ships but a cold kept him in Washington.

CONTRACTS FOR 29 SUBMARINES AWARDED TODAY

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels today awarded contracts for 27 coast defense, and two fleet submarines. Eighteen coast submarines went to the Electric Boat Company at \$67,000 each; six to the Lake Torpedo Boat Company at \$64,000 each; three went to the California Ship Building Company of Lake design at \$58,000.

One fleet submarine went to the Electric Boat Company at \$1,139,000 and the other to the Lake Company at \$1,135,000.

BERLIN REPORTS BRITISH ATTACK IN NEW SECTOR

ARTILLERY ENGAGEMENTS REPORTED ON SOMME FRONT

GREEK COUNCIL FIRMLY OPPOSES ALLIES' DEMANDS

London, Nov. 29.—The Greek crown council has voted to support the government in opposing the allies' demands for the surrender of arms and munitions, according to an Athens dispatch to Reuters dated yesterday. The dispatch says this decision was reached after a session of an hour and a half, presided over by King Constantine.

DAMAGE IS CAUSED BY EARTHQUAKE IN JAPAN

Tokyo, Nov. 29.—Considerable damage has been caused by an earthquake in middle Japan. Many houses have been destroyed in Kobe, Osaka and Kyoto. The railway station at Kyoto was damaged, several pedestrians were hurt by falling walls and roofs in that town and in Kobe.

John D. Archibald, Standard Oil Head, Undergoes Operation

Archibald, president of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey known as the "parent" of the group of companies into which the so-called "oil trust" was dissolved, was operated upon for appendicitis at his home in Tarrytown, N. Y. While the physicians expressed themselves as satisfied with his condition, they remained at his bedside. Mr. Archibald was born in Baltimore, Md., and has been connected with the Standard Oil company since 1873.

JELLOGE TO BE FIRST SEA LORD IN BRITISH NAVY

London, Nov. 29.—Rear Admiral Jarratt, commander of the British fleet, was today appointed first sea lord of the admiralty, being succeeded in command of the grand fleet by Vice Admiral Sir David Beatty, who commanded the British battle cruiser squadron in the Jutland naval battle.

GERMANY CALLS ON BELGIANS TO PAY MORE MONEY

By Associated Press. Paris, Nov. 29.—The German authorities have issued a decree imposing a further payment of ten million francs on Belgians according to a Havre dispatch from Havre. This is in addition to the existing levy of 400 million francs. The provisional councils have been convened for December 2 to approve the new imposition.

GERMANY WANTS MORE DATA UPON MARINA SINKING

By Associated Press. Berlin, Nov. 29.—The German foreign office has asked the American embassy for further details as to the place and circumstances of the British steamer Marina. It is said the information offered in the American note of inquiry is insufficient for the purposes of investigation.

WOMAN MAY BE KANSAS ELECTORAL MESSENGER

Hubert Lardner, chairman of the democratic state committee said today he was making preparations to have Mrs. R. C. Layman of Hutchinson chosen to go to Washington. Mrs. Layman is the first woman to be named as a presidential elector in the state.

PROSECUTOR TAKES STAND IN OWN TRIAL

McDaniel Tells His Own Story Regarding Murder With Which He Is Charged.

By Associated Press. St. Joseph, Mo., Nov. 29.—Prosecutor Oscar D. McDaniel took the witness stand in the criminal court here today to defend himself of the charge of having murdered Mrs. Harriet Moss McDaniel, his wife. Before a crowd that jammed the little Buchanan county court room the prosecutor made his composure apparently unbroken, told his version of the crime in low, even tones. His testimony, although probably would not be the case presented in his defense. The accused man followed his father, G. L. McDaniel and two sisters, all of whom had testified that the crime had been happily married. He sat with his hands clasped, in the midst of a tense stillness.

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GERMAN FORCES PUSH ROUMANIAN ARMY EASTWARD

SITUATION OF DEFENDERS APPEARING MORE AND MORE CRITICAL AS RUMANIAN OFFENSE CONTINUES PRESSING ONWARD.

VERY NEAR CAPITAL

One Force Only 40 Miles Away—Allies Claim Successes Near Monastir—Russians Make Several Attacks in Carpathians.

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: The situation of the Rumanian army detaching Bucharest appears increasingly critical.

Only to the northwest of the capital do the Rumanian lines seem to be holding at all firmly and even here the capture of Curtia de Arges on the Argechia river, although that point is 80 miles distant from Bucharest, seems to indicate a weakening of the Rumanian resistance.

On the southwest the peril is imminent, with the enveloping movement of the central powers placing their forces within 40 miles of the capital. News dispatches have reported the Rumanian government and diplomatic officials leaving Bucharest for Jassy, 200 miles northeast of Bucharest, the capital near the Russian frontier.

The rapid progress made by General Von Falkenhausen's armies moving east in Romania has been made possible by the operations of the Danube forces under Von Mackensen. Flanked out of the Alt Danube position by the crossing of the river at Semlitsa, the Rumanian line along the Vedeza running diagonally northwest from the Danube has been broken and an advance formation of German troops which would quickly compel a Rumanian retreat.

It still remains to be developed whether the process of flanking the Rumanians out of their positions is to be continued by other crossings of the Danube still farther east. The southern bank of the river is held by Teuton troops to a point beyond Tcheranofa.

The retreat of the Rumanians toward the nearer defenses of Bucharest is a precipitate one as indicated by today's German official statement which demands the speedy retirement of the Rumanian forces along the entire Wallachian front. Possibly as a diversion in aid of the Rumanians the Russians have taken the offensive near Kiriliba, on the Golden Vistritza, in the Carpathians northwest of the Rumanian frontier.

Attacks here, Petrograd reported, stemmed the ridges of heights east and south of Kiriliba and the capture of more than 700 prisoners. Berlin declares the Russian attacks delivered at many points in the Carpathians and on the Moldavian front resulted in only local successes.

With the exception of the Rumanian front, none is more active at present than the Macedonian. Whatever may have been the result of the recent heavy fighting there regarding which German and entente accounts disagree the allied armies do not appear to have slackened the force of their offensive in the Monastir region.

WANTS RED CROSS TO LEAVE SERBIA

Request of Austria-Hungary Causes Much Surprise—No Explanation Given.

By Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—Austria-Hungary has asked the American Red Cross to discontinue relief work in Belgrade and other parts of northern Serbia, when supplies on hand have been distributed. The suggestion reached here today through Ambassador Penfield at Vienna. The Austrian government expressed the deepest gratitude to the Red Cross for what has been done and gave no reason for asking its discontinuance. Red Cross officials here, surprised at the request, say that the work virtually is at a standstill because of the impossibility of procuring supplies since Rumania has entered the war.

OATH REFUSED BY ILLINOIS TROOPS

Majority of Members of One Battalion Decline To Enter Federal Service.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Nov. 29.—A majority of the members of the second battalion, Second Infantry Illinois National Guard recently returned from border duty refused to take the oath and enter the federal service under the Hay-Chamberlain law. Three of the members of the regiment, all privates were taken into military custody for urging their comrades to refuse to take the oath. No charges have been preferred against them yet, however.

POULTRY SHOW IN FULL SWING, MANY ENTRIES

CHICKEN ARISTOCRACY OF TEXAS AND OKLAHOMA GATHERED HERE FOR THIRD ANNUAL EXHIBIT OF ASSOCIATION.

NO CESSATION IN RAILROAD BUSINESS

Much Cotton and Wheat Remains To Be Moved on Northwestern. Still Need Cars

With the advent of what is usually the dull season for railroads the press of business on the Northwestern threatens to compel them to put on an extra crew or two in the near future, according to C. W. Barr, chief dispatcher. Only about three-fifths of the cotton has been moved out of their territory, and the traffic in that commodity is unusually heavy for this season of the year. Yesterday 1116 bales of cotton moved over the Northwestern. Large quantities of wheat still remain in their territory awaiting removal. Today's movement in wheat amounted to 50 cars and it is estimated that 100 cars of wheat is now stored in the elevators on the line waiting cars to move them. An estimated total of 600 cars of wheat is still in that territory. Unusually heavy if also the description given by the livestock movement on this line.

Cars with which to handle this business are still presenting some what of a problem to Northwestern officials. Much of the business, it is admitted, would possibly have moved out earlier had there been cars to handle it, but even with a normal supply of cars the unprecedented business enjoyed by the line this year would have left a surplus which would employ them during the unusually dull season which prevails from a short time before the Christmas holidays until after the first of the year. Northwestern officials figure that they will be lucky to get the business on hand cleaned up before the heavy spring traffic begins.

On the Denver the business has shown a tendency to drop off slightly. Practically all of the cotton and grain raised along this line has been moved and the cattle traffic, which has been and still is very brisk is expected to slacken up about the middle of the coming month. Inbound movements of lumber and coal have to a large extent offset the closing of the wheat and cotton movements however, and it has not been found necessary to cut off any crews on this line. On the Valley, where the situation is about that on the Denver, a heavy movement of immigrants and their supplies to the Spur district has hastened the business of the line.

While the wheat crop has been practically moved, it is expected that the recent downward tendency of the market will scrape the bins and create a slight boom in this movement on all the lines passing through this place in the next few days. The cattle quarantine is expected to halt the movement on Kansas City to some extent, but a picking up in the Fort Worthward movement is expected to practically offset this.

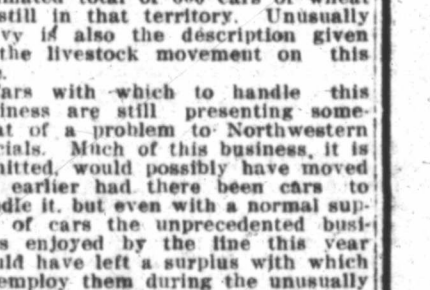

HOW THANKSGIVING WILL BE OBSERVED

Special Services Tomorrow Morning—Various Features Planned For Day

"With prayer the festival was opened, which continued three days and on each day there was a service of prayer in the morning, which continued to the noon hour. And there was a feast in the public house of venison, deer and other wild game, which a company of four men did all in preparation for the harvest festival. And the great king Massasoit with ninety of his braves were with us and them we did entertain for three days. And there were songs and a great rejoicing until we did have a bounteous harvest and that of the company we were none ill. And we did give thanksgiving."

So wrote Edward Winslow of Plymouth Colony, one of the pilgrims in 1623, the early part of November to friends in England. And thus was the first Thanksgiving described. For years this custom was celebrated in New England and gradually spread throughout the entire thirteen colonies and later through the United States. Thanksgiving Day in Wichita Falls will open as did that first Thanksgiving century ago, with prayer, the special union Thanksgiving service being set for 10:30 in the morning at the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Harry Draper, S. T. B., to deliver the sermon. Then comes the Thanksgiving feast. And there will be no lack of Thanksgiving feasting for every one in Wichita Falls this year. In numerous families the occasion will be made one of joyful homecoming of students not too far away, and of sons and daughters in other towns. Those who are unfortunate in having no home of their own will not suffer as the boarding houses and cafes are planning real, sure enough Thanksgiving dinners for the day. Holiday hours will be observed at the postoffice and practically all the stores and business houses will close. Football and social festivities of various kinds have been planned as features for the day.

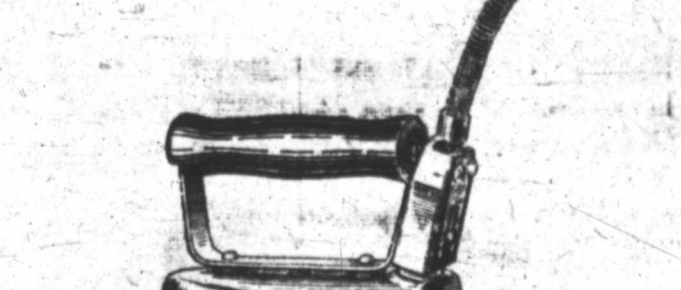

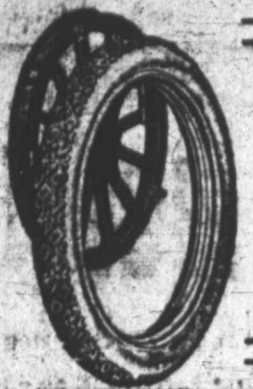

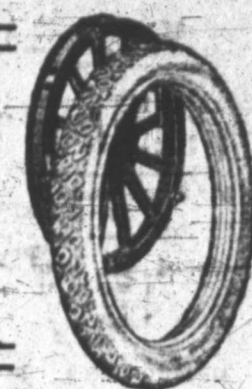

TO USE TESTIMONY WHEN WITNESS DIES

Unique Proceeding is Filed in District Court Against Benefit Association

Application to perpetuate the testimony of a man who, though now living, will be dead when the testimony is used, was the unusual feature of a suit recently filed in the 75th district court. There is no record of any similar proceeding in any Texas court.

The action was made necessary by the fact that the husband of the plaintiff in the case is suffering from tuberculosis and is not expected to live very long. He was a member of a mutual benefit association and was recently notified by its secretary that his membership had lapsed and that in case of his death his family would receive none of the benefits provided for members. Accordingly, his wife has filed suit to perpetuate her testimony so that it may be used after his death, when, as she expects, she will find it necessary to sue the benefit association to collect the policy. The testimony to be taken in the form of written interrogatories and answers will be used after the witness has gone beyond the jurisdiction of earthly courts.

The policy of the member was lapsed on account of his alleged failure to pay assessments which were due. He claims that he received no notice of these assessments and that he would have paid them had he been notified. The case is unique in the annals of Texas jurisprudence and will no doubt be followed with interest by the legal fraternity. Nelson & Hunter are attorneys for the plaintiff.
