# BATTLE IN ATHENS WHEN ENTENTE TROOPS ENTER

## DRIVE FOR **BUCHAREST CONTINUING**

OUMANIAN RESISTANCE STIFF-ENS SOUTH OF CITY, BUT FUR-THER REVERSES SUFFERED ON

Constantine Surrenders Artillery Demanded—Athens Battle Is Declared Due to Misunderstanding—Several

Bucharest are developing into a great battle. Berlin announces that the first Roumanian army which had offered battle on the Argechu river, southeast of Keteshti, northwest of the Roumanian capital, has been broken through and defeated by German and Austro-Hungarian troops after a tenacious struggle. Whether this indicates the turning of the right wing of the Roumanian armies is not clear. The capture of more than 6,000 Roumanian troops and 49 cannon is announced.

The fierce attacks upon the Roumanian troops in the valley of the Argechu on the roads from Peteshti to Bucharest, compelled only a slight retirement of the defenders, according to the Russian war office announcement.

The Roumanian resistance south of Bucharest has stiffened and the villages of Tzomana and Gostinari have been recaptured from the invading force. Simultaneously the Russians have regained possession of the western part of the Tchernovoda bridge across the Danube, which had been taken by the Teutonic troops after the defeat of the Russo-Roumanian army late in October.



COUNTY NEVER GOT ITS BELL

Francis Vigo's Bequest to Indiana Community Named After Him Disregarded by His Heirs.

The phrase "the Yigo bell that was never rung por hung" refers to an incident connected with the early history of Vigo county, Indiana. That county was named in honor of Col. Francis Vigo, a man of French or Spanish birth, who came to this country before the Revolutionary wat, became a prosperous trader at St. Louis, and widely known as "the Spanish mer chant." In 1778-79 he advanced considerable money to George Rogers Clark to aid the latter in his movement to capture the Northwest territory, then held by the British. The money thus advanced was used by General Clark in procuring supplies for his campaign, and it constituted a just claim against Virginia, in whose service and behalf General Clark was acting. After the Revolutionary war this claim against Virginia held good against the United States, and was finally paid to Colonel Vigo's heirs, but not until long after his death. He died in 1836 and his will, dated December 9, 1834, contained the following provision: "Whereas, the county of Vigo has been named after me, and I feel toward it and its citizens a great many favors conferred and services renderd me, especially by the inhabitants of Terre Haute, it is my wish, will and desire, and earnest request, that if the claim aforesaid (the Virginia claim), is recovered, and the amount due me paid to my executors, they, or some of them, shall pay out of the same \$500 to the county of Vigo. to be laid out by the commissioners of D. Chamberlain of Oregon announced they were working on resolutions seeking to change the Constitution for a direct election of the Chief, Magistrate. Senator Thompson of Kansas announced he would reson of Kansas announced he would re-introduce his resolution of three years ago, touching the subject, and Representative Hill of Connecticutt made

One of the amendments in favor of the change is that it would eliminate confusion, and remove the delay in knowing who had been elected. At that, however, it is admitted there has been little inconvenience as a result of the existing system. Only twice has the election been referred to the House of Representatives. Once—during the Haynes-Tilden contest—it raised a merry row, and twice or three times election has swung on the result in a few precincts in one or two States. Those advocating the change point to the altuation in California, where there has been a threat to withhold the cer-



### WILL FIND MARKET FOR RABBIT MEAT


Department of Agriculture Would Ingrease Demand for Texas Product

Austin, Texas, Dec. 2.—The state de-partment of agriculture has decided to ake up the task of creating a general demand for rabbit meat, it becme known today. Its expected that not less than a million Texas rabbits will be shipped t onorthern and eastern mar-kets during the winter. The depart-ment believes Texas revenues will be materially increased by the traffic in jack rabbits and cotton tails. Commissioner of Agriculture Fred W. Davis, says they are quoted at a higher price than turkey or chicken in some cities.

Already the department has received arready the department has received orders for two carloads. Texas rabbits generally have been considered nuisances; as a result a bounty of five cents per head is paid for their destruction. The agricultural department thinks it will have no trouble in getting large shipments to the east, but to give impetus to its plans, intends to have a big rabbit dinner soon.


