CONGRESSIONAL RETURNS SHOW PANHANDLE AND NORTH-WEST FAR IN LEAD

**FIGURES COMPARED**

More Than Twice as Many Votes As in Some East and South Texas Districts

The thirteenth congressional district of Texas, which includes Northwest Texas and the Panhandle, is by far the most populous in the State. Judging from the completed returns from the November election, showing a much larger vote polled for Marvin Jones, congressman-elect, than for any other of the Texas delegation save those elected at large.

This condition is due to the rapid increase in population in Northwest Texas and the Panhandle since 1900, when the last congressional redistricting bill was passed. It may be taken as indicating the urgent need for another redistricting measure. Marvin Jones received more than twice as many votes as some congressmen in the south and east-Texas districts. Incidentally, the proportion of republican and socialist votes in this district was smaller than in most of the Texas districts.

Next to the thirteenth district comes the sixteenth in the Northwest Texas and the Panhandle since 1900, when the last congressional redistricting bill was passed. It may be taken as indicating the urgent need for another redistricting measure. Marvin Jones received more than twice as many votes as some congressmen in the south and east-Texas districts. **SCHOOL BOARD'S PLAN EXPLAINED**

JUDGE P. A. MARTIN TELLS WHY HIGHER ASSESSMENTS WILL BE SOUGHT

**CAN'T INCREASE TAX**

Urgent Need for Additional Funds Forces Board to Take Only Other Means

The conditions which confront the public schools of this city, making it necessary to increase the valuations for school tax assessments are explained by Judge P. A. Martin, a member of the school board, in a letter to The Times. This action became necessary when it was learned that the school tax amendment to the constitution, under which the city would have afforded a means of relief, had been defeated at the polls in November. Judge Martin's letter follows:

To The Times: Since we have discovered that the constitutional amendment relating to public school tax in independent districts was defeated, have noticed some discussion in your paper with reference to how our school board will manage to meet the situation which confronts us locally. This situation is probably not very generally understood and a brief statement of it may not be out of place. Our special school law provides that the board of education must accept the city valuation as to city property and the county tax assessor's valuation as to such property within the school district as lies outside of the city limits. Consequently under the present law we are unable to secure any more money for maintenance purposes than may be secured by the levy of a tax of 50c upon the city valuation as such valuation is fixed by the county and city authorities.

Now it is a well known fact that the county and city boards of valuation do not fix a tax value of more than from 50 to 60 per cent of the actual value of the property. The consequence is that this condition, together with the enormous increase of scholastic population in our city, and consequent increase of expense in conducting our schools, has made it impossible for us to run the schools longer than six or seven months per year upon the present basis. Much as the board of education would like to reduce rather than increase taxes, yet we find that we cannot run the city schools without a substantial increase of the amount of money collected for maintenance tax, and so we are now here to see where only one way open to us to get the money necessary for the maintenance of our schools—that is, by an amendment of our special independent district law authorizing the school board to create its own board of equalization and act entirely independent in this respect of the county and city boards, so we are desirous to ask our representatives in the coming legislature for such an amendment of our law. This amendment would enable our board of equalization to place a tax value upon the property within the district sufficient to meet our present needs, and it is the only way that we can see that we will ever be able to run our city schools for a full year.

It is our desire that the public be fully informed of all of the steps that we take in this matter, and it is with this view that this letter is written with request that you publish the same. Respectfully,

Force To Be Reduced Unless Business is Above Average For This Season. Two crews will probably be cut off in the next few days by the Denver power plants when their summer business takes an unexpected jump. None of the crews cut off by the Northwestern were stationed in Wichita Falls.

**PREPARING TO COMBAT PINK COTTON BOLL WORM**

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Dec. 27.—Fearing an invasion of the pink boll worm into Texas, Fred W. Davis, state commissioner of agriculture, has detailed Ed S. Ayres, chief nursery inspector, and C. J. Jones, an expert of the department, to make an investigation of this pest which is found in the Laguna district of Mexico. This worm is said to be more destructive to cotton and to other plants as well than the boll weevil. In fact, the pink worm has already appeared in limited numbers in certain border counties and Mr. Davis' purpose is to check its progress. These investigators will study its life and habits and also the best methods of destroying it. Mexican cotton fields are to be examined and a full report will be made to Commissioner Davis.

# PROGRAM OF 1917'S WORK IS ADOPTED

## FEDERAL COURT

Matters acted on at this morning's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce directors included the adoption of a constitution and by laws, the approval of the plans for the membership campaign, approval of the proposed distribution of the \$20,000 budget which will be raised, the decision to send a representative back to Washington to work on complications which have arisen in the Federal court matter...

Secretary Johnson reported that the deficit of \$172.50 existing as a result of the poultry show in December had been cleared up by the Chamber of Commerce. He also reported on his trip to Toledo, saying that Wichita Falls secured more publicity than any other city mentioned the excellent prospect of this city in securing the aviation training station which was the object of his trip to Washington...

Section 1. The purpose of this organization shall be to promote the development of the city of Wichita Falls and adjacent territory in every possible manner along with the highest and best interests of the community, and to secure the harmonious, shall be non-political in that it shall enforce no political party, faction or office seeker. It shall deal with measures rather than men.

Section 2. The amount of money subscribed to this association is optional with the member provided that not less than \$2 must be subscribed for an individual membership and not less than \$24 shall be subscribed for a business membership. No application shall be accepted for a shorter time than one year and no member may resign from the Chamber of Commerce until the full amount of the subscription shall have been paid...

Section 3. The board of directors shall meet each Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock unless otherwise ordered by the president; and may be called to meet at any time upon order of the president.

Section 4. The officers of this association, namely: President, vice president and secretary, shall be elected by the board of directors shall constitute the executive committee.

Section 5. The executive committee shall have all powers of the board of directors, when same are not in session; provided that all matters of material importance shall be subject to the approval of the board of directors. The executive committee shall meet on call of the president.

Section 6. There shall be formed from the membership as soon as possible after the annual meeting the following bureaus: Finance, industrial, traffic and transportation, mercantile, publicity, agricultural, convention and civic.

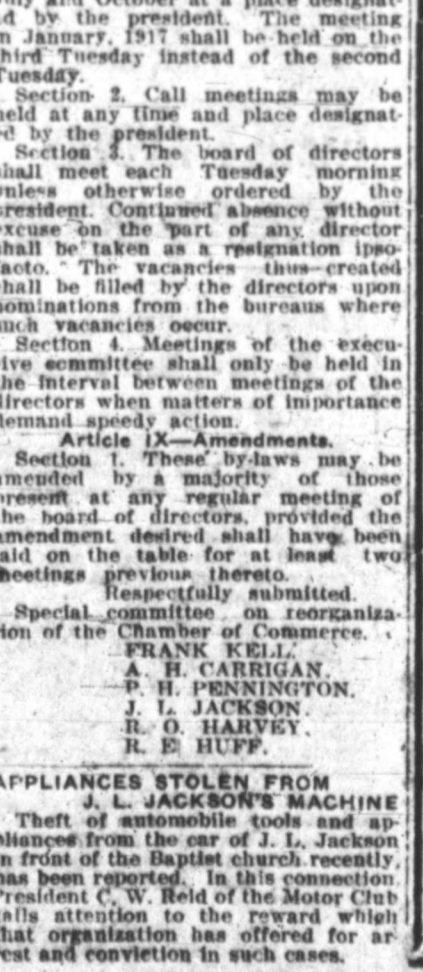
