

LAWSON IN ROW WITH COMMITTEE

STORMY SESSION RESULTS WHEN BOSTON FINANCIER APPEARS IN LEAK INVESTIGATION BY HOUSE RULES COMMITTEE

TUMULTY DENIES

President's Secretary Issues Statement Contradicting Woods' Testimony as to His Conduct in Every Particular

By Associated Press. Washington, Jan. 8.—Thomas W. Lawson occupied much of today's session of the House rules committee hearing on the alleged stock market leak on President Wilson's peace note, with a running row with the committee, which ended in much of his statement being expunged from the record and concluded with the declaration that he could tell where the leak was, but would not.

At the outset of the hearing, Secretary Tumulty read a statement indorsed by President Wilson, that he had no knowledge whatever of the President's note before it was announced to the newspapers, and Secretary Lansing gave testimony about handling of the document after it got to the state department. Both denied they had been able to find any leak.

Lawson began his statement to the committee with general declarations which soon led to an uproar. It ended by the clerk of the committee forcing him to his chair, and the committee voting unanimously to expunge the whole exchange from the record. The stenographer had missed much of it in the confusion.

Finally, when Chairman Henry got Lawson down to a cross examination the Boston financier said in effect that he could tell, but would not, and that the committee recessed for lunch.

Lawson pacing up and down before the committee, declared that all he said in public press regarding the leak, he believed to be true. "I repeat it all now," he declared, "it is one of the commonest things in Wall street, advance information from Washington about government affairs. Affairs of such importance that they frequently affect the country's securities. I mean also leaks from the supreme court, advance information on decisions, advance information on important Senate matters, action of congressional committees, cabinet affairs and advance information direct from the white house itself."

From that he led into charges of a "premeditated, deliberately figured out, deliberately worked out, robbery of the American people through the stock gamblers."

He said he knew who was responsible for the leak and reiterated he was convinced the committee did not want an investigation. He reviewed his recent trip to Washington.

"I came to Washington," he said, "to aid in an honest investigation, only to have hell lambasted out of me as soon as Congress convened. Promptly when the Senate met, a leather-lunged, sewer-mouthed old blather-skite—"

The chairman stopped Lawson there, and then followed the row between Lawson and Representative Chipperfield which was unintelligible to the official stenographer.

Lawson loudly declared he, as an American citizen, would see to it that he got his rights.

Jerry South, clerk of the House, pulled Mr. Lawson back into his chair until order could be restored.

Webb-Kenyon Liquor Law Is Held Constitutional

Washington, Jan. 8.—The Webb-Kenyon law, designed to prevent interstate shipments of wet to dry states was today declared constitutional by the supreme court by a vote of seven to two, which also upheld the West Virginia prohibition amendment prohibiting interstate shipment of liquor for personal use, shipped by common carriers in interstate commerce.

Liquor legislation the federal Webb-Kenyon act of March 3, 1913, and West Virginia prohibition laws were brought before the supreme court in two test cases of the James Clark Distilling Co. of Cumberland, Md., against the American Express Co. and Western Maryland Railroad. Whether prohibition states, under the Webb-Kenyon law or otherwise, may prohibit shipment of liquor for personal use of citizens in dry territory was the principal question raised.

Effectual enforcement of dry legislation in prohibition states was said by prohibition advocates to depend largely upon validity of the Webb-Kenyon act, designated to give dry states the right to prevent interstate shipments from wet states. Counsel for the liquor interests contended that the Webb-Kenyon act is void if it attempts to regulate the federal right to regulate interstate commerce. They

month by the secretary of state. "This intimation was contained in a statement made to this committee by Representative Wood of Indiana, a man whom I do not know. To the best of my knowledge I have never met Mr. Wood. Certainly he made no effort to find out the truth from me before dragging my name into this affair.

"I wish to deny generally and specifically that I gave advance information to Mr. Baruch or to any body else in regard to the peace note. I did not know of the existence of this note or that this government contemplated the dispatch of such a note until after printed copies of the note had been given to representatives of the press by the state department. I was not consulted in the preparation of this note by the president or anybody else. The communications relating to the standing of the note and its dispatch were confidential between the president and the secretary of state.

"I knew nothing of them whatever, nor did any person employed in the executive office.

"I have had no correspondence written or telegraphic, with Mr. Baruch or anyone representing him in this matter.

"I have had no telephone talks with Mr. Baruch or anybody representing him regarding this matter. I have not talked with him, or anybody representing him, or anybody publicly or privately regarding this matter.

"Apparently the only intimations made against me in this connection were of Mr. Baruch at the Bull Moose hotel, at or about the time of the preparation of the president's resignation that the European belligerents were in a state of armistice. I have never breakfasted, lunch, dinner or taken any meals with Mr. Baruch. I have not seen him only at several lunquets, and at large dinners, with many other persons were present. I have never discussed any other peace or other note other than that of Mr. Baruch or any other persons engaged in the purchase and sale of securities of any kind in the stock market.

"While this is a complete denial of the only insinuations which have been made I wish to go further and say that I have never engaged in stock market sales or purchases, either through brokers, friends or agents.

"I discussed the present note with no one, first because my only private correspondence is through my private use of official information and secondly, specifically, because as I have stated, I had not seen the president in preparation or even contemplated the preparation of such a note.

"As I have already said in a public statement, I have frequently requested the president to keep me free from any knowledge of the pending international moves so that I might not be embarrassed by requests for information from the newspaper correspondents who attend to me in my office constantly for such information. The insinuations which have been made, whether conveyed in political matter or merely through my machine, are wholly false and without the faintest basis. I have not at any time since acting as Mr. Wilson's secretary first when he was governor of New Jersey and later since he became president, been interested in any stock transactions of any kind or given any information to any other persons upon which my character or sales might be made. I wish to make this statement as sweeping as complete as I know how I am still waiting for Mr. Wood's charges or sales might be made. PLAN PIPE LINE CONNECTIONS IN ARCHER COUNTY

PANHANDLE REFINERY GETS PANTHER PRODUCTION AND PREPARES TO HANDLE IT—MAY BUILD ALL WAY TO PLANT

2 MORE GOOD FLOWS

Prospects Continue to Improve on Panther No. 2—Sixty-Six Put on Pump—Expected Oil Price Advance Comes Today

Construction of a pipe line, which if sufficient production is developed in Archer county, will eventually extend to the refinery in this city, will begin shortly by the Panhandle Refining company, which has closed a contract for the production of the Panther Oil company. With the Panther No. 2 having made two flows, aggregating 250 barrels within the last 48 hours, the prospects for a big well there are improving hourly. All tanks at the well is full, the shut-off is running over, and additional tanks are being taken to the scene today.

This news, coupled with that from the Sixty-six well, which was put on the pump Sunday afternoon and which is steadily putting oil into the tanks, gives a still more optimistic hue to Archer county operations. One evidence of the view that oil men take of conditions there is furnished by the fact that Messrs. Harvey, Gardner and McAllister \$10,000 for a 40-acre block near the Panther, the offer has not yet been accepted.

The belief prevails among the local oil men that Panther No. 2 will be good for 200 barrels or more daily more conservative estimates place the production at 100 barrels, at least. Houston parties who were here recently gave out a report, published in the Dallas News of Sunday, that the well was making 175 barrels of rich green oil, and while this estimate may be accurate as to the amount of production, the oil is not essentially different from that produced throughout the Northwest Texas field.

Considerable water is appearing in the Sixty-six well but percentage of oil, starting at ten per cent, is steadily increasing as the water is pumped out, and was nearly 20 per cent today, according to reports. In this respect the performance of the well is similar to that of Panther No. 1.

The Panther company will probably drill the Sixty-six and a location will be made early this week for No. 3, though the location has not yet been determined. The closing of the deal with the Panhandle refinery for the Panther's production is a victory for the local community, as it has had strenuous competition from the big pipe line concerns, some of which are understood to have offered premiums above the market price.

For the present, the Panhandle will construct a two-inch line extending direct from the Panther field to the refinery. The pipeline project, which will be a two-inch line, will be constructed on the far western shore of the lake. In this way, the Panhandle will be in position to handle whatever production is developed in any part of Archer county.

The officials of the Panther Company will perhaps in a position to get more for their oil by selling production to one of the larger companies, but that the home concern should have preference and acted accordingly.

Will Leave For Washington Tonight in Interest of Federal Court Measure
