

SENATE PASSES TEXAS COMPANY MEASURE TODAY

BILL RECEIVES NINETEEN FAVORABLE VOTES, NONE AGAINST ONLY ONE IMPORTANT AMENDMENT BEING ADOPTED

OTHER LEGISLATION

New Constitutional Amendment Presented - Favorable By Committee in Senate Today

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Jan. 30.—The Texas company bill was passed finally today by the Senate by a vote of nineteen to nothing. The only material amendment adopted was one providing that the company shall not violate any provision of the anti-trust laws.

A hearing was held today by the Senate committee on commerce and manufactures on the Lattimore bill, creating a public utilities commission, but action on this bill was deferred until February 5. Mayors and other officials of a number of Texas cities were present at the hearing.

The governor today signed the Senate bill appropriating \$3,000 for the construction of a fireproof dormitory at the Prairie View normal, also approved the bill making an appropriation of \$50,000 to pay quarantine officers and guards at Brownsville and other border points.

A joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution was introduced in the Senate by Senator Smith and Clark, creating the office of insurance commissioner and making the office elective and fixing the term of the commissioner at four years.

The Senate committee on privileges and elections today reported favorably the House bill against "mooching" without adverse minority report. Mooching is defined as soliciting drinks, etc., from candidates.

POLL TAXES DRAW CLOSER TO 1916 MARK

Hopes that last year's poll tax showing would be surpassed seemed brighter at mid-afternoon today. An hour or two remaining today, and all of tomorrow, more than 2,000 receipts had been issued.

On the final day last year about 1,200 poll taxes were collected. If that performance is duplicated this year, it will bring the total up past the 4,000 mark and register the gain which is desired here.

The total up to 3:45 this afternoon was 2,019. The total for the year is estimated at \$19,000.

BANK SHORTAGE AT SWEETWATER, FILE COMPLAINT

By Associated Press. Abilene, Texas, Jan. 30.—A complaint charging embezzlement and application of funds of the First National Bank of Sweetwater was filed with United States Commissioner W. H. Girard here today against J. W. C. Holmes, former president of the bank.

The complaint was filed by F. L. Spencer, justice agent of the department of justice, district of Dallas. The bank's shortage is estimated at \$19,000.

FLATS CLOSING ORDER IS BEING PUT IN EFFECT

At least half of the women of the flats, without waiting for the closing day, have gone, according to local officers today. 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FARMERS' UNION IN CONVENTION TODAY

President Pope Urges More Hogs and Fewer Dogs—Many Matters To Come Up

By Associated Press. Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 30.—The Texas Farmers' Union is in convention here today.

President Pope of the union, who is addressing the convention, urged today that the farmers should raise more hogs and fewer dogs.

The feature of President Pope's address was the recommendation of the fixing of a 12 cent minimum on cotton in order to perpetuate the present high price of the staple.

The farmers are expected to adopt a resolution keeping a committee of the union at Austin to balance the present session of the legislature and all forthcoming sessions.

The duty of the committee would be to look after the interests of the farmers in all legislation passed.

President Pope also urged the farmers to support the proposed revision of the Texas house law which would enable the farmers of this state to receive the same benefit from the Farm Loan banks as those in other states.

The legislative committee appointed last year is expected to submit recommendations for such legislation as the farmers of Texas may need.

2 SHOWINGS OF GAS IN ARCHER COUNTY

Gulf Company Starts Another Well on the Owens Tract—U. C. V. May Lease Land.

Two wells in Archer county are today reported to be showing gas. The Southside well, where a test of the 1630-foot sand has been under way, was said this morning to be showing considerable gas, and reports of a 2nd showing at 540 feet in the Big Bluff well north of Holliday were also received.

The Gulf Production company has the rig up for its fourth well in Archer county. It is in the northwest corner of the Owens tract. This company got a dry hole in its first Archer county test in the southwest corner of the same tract last year. The Gulf has two other rigs going near Holliday.

Efforts are being made to hold a meeting of the members of the water company recently organized and W. W. Silk requests that all those interested see him at once. Lack of water continues to hamper operations and less than half the rigs are going; rigs that have not been forced to shut down are threatened with having to do so, as few have other than temporary water facilities. The water situation at Petrolia is also serious, a general shut-down being threatened.

Settings for the third week in February in the negro murder cases in connection with the killings during the holidays were made yesterday by Judge Bonner in the Thirtieth district court—special venues of 75 were ordered drawn in each case.

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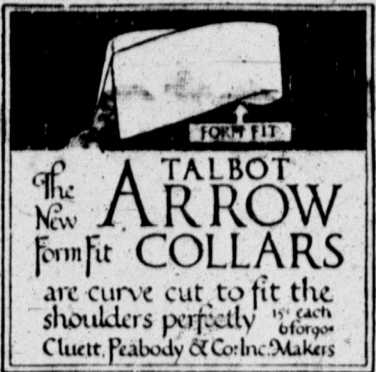

territory and decisively defeat Villa his prestige will be greatly enhanced and in the same proportion the again rising fortunes of Villa will be lowered and the bandit may be eclipsed altogether

If the Carranza government has sufficient strength and support from the people of Mexico to warrant its continued existence it will wipe out Villa and restore order in Northern Mexico.

Now that its troops are coming out of Mexico the United States will have greater freedom of action. Carranza having declined the friendly offers of the United States is to be left to his own resources. If he makes good that will be very well. If he fails he must expect no sympathy from the American government.

The Times has thought about that "bone dry" amendment supported by a number of anti prohibitionists and has become convinced the measure ought to receive the support of the prohibitionists. The only reason the "bone dry" proposal did not receive the support of genuine prohibitionists was that they feared an amendment in that form would have small chance for adoption. But their fears may not be well founded. In fact many observant prohibitionists believe that a "bone dry" amendment will have a better chance than the other. If there are members of the legislature who feel that they are bound by their instructions and their conscience to support a "bone dry" proposal, the prohibitionists ought to give them the opportunity to ease their conscience. If there is a better chance of getting a "bone dry" proposition substituted than the other, by all means all genuine prohibitionists ought to support it.

Dispatches say that the Nisley Creamery Company is planning the construction of a \$100,000 plant at Amarillo. This is another indication that the dairy industry is to become an important one in Northwest Texas and the Panhandle. Wichita county has been doing a little pioneer work in this line. The industry is now getting established here. What has been done here can be done in nearly every county in Northwest Texas. The Panhandle country offers very favorable territory for the industry. Dairying adds to diversification which is insurance against failure.

Mr. Kemp is to return to Wichita soon after noon tomorrow. Both J. D. Hoffman, owner of the patent on the mill, who is a San Antonio, and Hazlewood and Robertson of Mineral Wells, promoters and heavy stockholders in the concern will attend the meeting tomorrow afternoon.

A full sized model of the wheel and pump of the windmill which is to be manufactured at a hardware dealer's convention in Dallas last week expressed themselves enthusiastically as to the mechanical excellences of the mill. One large hardware jobber placed an order with the officials of the company for the first thousand of the mills manufactured.
