MOTOR CLUB MAY START PETITIONS

This and Other Matters Scheduled to Be Before Luncheon at Noon Tuesday

Some preparatory plans for the circulation of petitions calling for the good roads bond election will probably be outlined at the Tuesday Motor Club luncheon, according to W. M. Priddy, chairman of the entertainment committee. A discussion of the prospective good roads campaign in Wilbarger county, which if successful will mean the building of a connecting link with the Wichita county system will also probably be discussed. The Wilbarger county special road law now in the legislature, its purposes and effect will be outlined by Coun. Judge Harvey Harris, President C. W. Reid of the club will explain the report recently submitted by George D. Marshall, federal good roads expert clearing up some points about which there has been some doubt. A. S. Foville, chairman of the committee recently appointed to investigate the prices of various grades of gasoline sold here, with the results obtained from the use in motor cars, will report further on the investigations of the committee. It is promised that the program will be concluded promptly at one in order that the members will not be delayed in getting back to their businesses. An invitation to any automobile owner in the county who desires to become a member of the club attend the luncheon is extended by John W. Thomas, secretary of the club.

TO PARTICIPATE IN NEW RATE CONTEST

Reopening of Shreveport Case to Be Taken Advantage of by Social Shippers.

Plans for active participation in the fight which is to result from the reopening of the Shreveport rate case by the Interstate Commerce commission are being made by local shippers who will endeavor to see that Wichita Falls interests are less roughly treated than under the schedule which favored the first decision in this case. The Interstate commission announced its decision only a day or so ago, and it will probably be several weeks before hearings are held. In the meantime, it is probable that an organization will be effected here to make whatever steps are necessary. The matter may come before the chamber of commerce directors at their session tomorrow morning. The action of the commission at Washington is thought to have been due, in some manner at least, to the recent decision of the federal court at Chicago, which held that as between a state rate-making body and an interstate rate-making body, the state authorities had the upper hand. Should this decision be held by the supreme court, it would restore to the Texas railroad commission and similar authorities the power which earlier decisions had threatened to practically take from them.

WILBARGER COUNTY MAY HAVE ROAD BOND ELECTION

Good roads boosters of Vernon are going to take active steps toward calling for an election in that county for the purpose of connecting with the proposed Wichita county system, according to information received by W. M. Priddy and others here from friends in Vernon. The feeling which has been expressed in this city may be a factor in the decision.

RECTOR OBSERVES HIS ANNIVERSARY

Rev. F. T. Datson Preaches Sunday on Spiritual Effects of European War

How the present European conflict serving to turn men and women to God in their grief rather than estranging them was discussed in the anniversary sermon of Rev. F. T. Datson, rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd Sunday evening. Sunday Mr. Datson completed his third year of service with the church and the anniversary was made the occasion of special services both morning and evening. Mr. Datson in his evening's sermon reviewed at length G. Wells' new book, "Mr. Britling Sees it Through," story of a typical Englishman, self-centered and self-sufficient who has viewed the war in a tolerant easy-going way. The book is a war because the papers are full of it but it has never been brought home to him until his only son, Hugh, joins the army and leaves for the front. Then one day comes a messenger who gives him a telegram which divested of the official phrases resolves itself into the one word "killed." At practically the same time news comes that his former secretary, a young man, has been killed also in action. His widow is prostrated with grief, the blind unreasoning grief which denies the existence of a God or of any power for good in the universe. Mr. Britling, however, finds in his grief an incentive to turn to God, finding for the first time in his well-ordered easy-going existence a situation with which he was unable to cope by himself. He finds God and helps the rebellious young woman to a clearer and more comforting view of life. Mr. Datson interpreted the novel as also signifying the dawn of faith in the life of the author, one of the most brilliant writers of the present day and one who has been recounted an agnostic. This godly grief was contrasted with the ungodly unreasoning grief expressed by David on the death of his traitor son, Absalom, the scripture reading and text taken from the story of Absalom's revolt and death. In answer to the oft heard cry, "Why does God, if there be a God and He is a just and loving God, permit such dreadful slaughter, why does He not end the war?" Mr. Datson stated that there is but one thing in the universe that God does not control the free will of man, and so long as it is the will of some men, more powerful than the rest, that the carnage continue for personal ends the war will go on. But God is still present, a powerful friend to whom to turn in sorrow and distress and the present trouble of the nations is turning many to Him who were otherwise prone to forget him in their lighter moods. Special music by the choir featured morning and evening services, holy communion being held at 11 o'clock with a sermon on "The Blessings of Holy Communion" by Mr. Datson. L. B. Lawler of Travis street is carrying his arm in a sling as a result of being kicked by his Ford while crooking it.

**NEGRO TRIANGLE
 IS AIRED IN COURT**

Both Sultors of Dusky Charmer Are
 Fined—Rooming Housekeeper
 Released

In addition to succeeding in getting a \$25 fine levied on his rival in the affections of their mutual charmer, the negro who filed a complaint against said rival after a row over a negro woman at one o'clock Sunday morning, threw a similar fine for himself on a vagrancy charge after the matter was threshed out in police court before Judge Whitely this morning.

The negro who brought in the complaint to Night Chief McDonald Sunday morning, it seems, had formerly been high in the affections of the woman in the case; but since had been out of town for some time and been supplanted by another. Returning to the city he was admitted favor again and was at the woman's house at the hour mentioned when the other, as was his custom appeared at the place. After some delay over his admittance he proceeded to hit the woman with his fist whereupon the other went for the police. After giving evidence this morning, which convinced both men the woman left the court with another negro who had just been released, after an extended sojourn in the county jail.

A local rooming housekeeper, who was arrested on complaint of swindling by out of town visitors, who claimed that he had rented them two rooms for \$250 a month, and who was charged for them being a consideration in the trade, was found guilty.

"If they made that kind of a trade, he ought to beat them out of the money," said the city attorney in recommending the judgment. Another case of vagrancy against a negro resulted in a \$10 fine and one case of intoxication called for \$5 while another was dismissed on condition that the defendant leave the city.

Henry Ford is one of our foremost pacifists, but in the light of his offer to the government which is reported in today's dispatch, it must be admitted that if war is to come he will be one of the country's most ardent patriots.

The furor over the alleged leak of President Wilson's peace note appears to have been a tempest in a tea pot. If now develops that the leak came through two newspaper reporters who were without definite information and who merely made what turned out to be a correct inference. They tipped off broker friends who got the word onto the wires. That Wall Street operators gave credence to reporters' guesses and put up hundreds of thousands of dollars on these guesses is a good tribute to reportorial powers of influence. Now that these reporters have "confessed" and have uncovered the mystery of which some were trying to make a scandal, the inquiry ought to be dropped and doubtless will.

The Times does not believe the people of the country are in any temper to hear Mr. Bryan's protests against the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany. The people realize that such a step is almost certain to involve this country in war. But they are for war rather than for the complete surrender of American rights on the seas and for war rather than to see the honor of their country flouted. President Wilson has the sentiment of the country behind him almost solidly, and such discordant notes as have been sounded by Mr. Bryan and by Congressman Calloway have been lost in the voice of approval that is swelling in thunderous volume.

There is no doubt but that the American people were ready to give their approval to the severance of diplomatic relations when the Lusitania was sunk. Upon any of the succeeding violations of American rights they would have stood behind the president had he taken the fateful step. President Wilson lost in prestige rather than gained by his postponements of this action. Only the knowledge of the sincerity of his desire for peace and the hope that he might be able to bring peace to Europe caused the American people to be patient with the President's restraint. When he acted, therefore, the country was quick to respond. Mr. Bryan's protests will be sound only in their own emptiness.

**NO DEAL PENDING
 ON HUNT ELEVATOR**

Denial of Rumors Recently in Circulation Here Comes From Mr. Hunt

J. C. Hunt, Wichita Falls elevator owner and grain man who is now in California on a pleasure trip, said his family has no intention of selling or leasing his elevator or of moving to California, according to a communication received by The Times from Mr. Hunt. Mr. Hunt's communication from Long Beach, follows:

"Hearing from a number of sources, that I had decided to sellout my grain business at Wichita Falls, or intended to lease my elevator there, or that I intended to move to California, I beg to request that you state for me, that I have never offered to sell or lease, or make any other kind of disposition or division of my elevator, or grain business, and no one has authority to circulate reports contrary to these facts."

COST OF MAKING NEWSPAPERS

Many newspapers in various parts of the country have been hit so hard that they have had to suspend publication in some cities newspapers have raised the price at which they are sold from 1 cent to 2 cents, and there has been some increase in advertising rates, but there probably has not been a time in the last half century when the newspaper industry the nation over was in so bad a state financially as today. Few newspapers are making money. The vast majority are suffering heavy losses. And this at a time of colossal circulation, unprecedent advertising and the greatest general prosperity the country has known.
