ORGANIZING TO FIGHT OIL TAX

LOCAL PRODUCERS AND REFINERS TO CONTEST PROPOSED LEGISLATION.

TWO BILLS PENDING

One Would Tax Refinery Products and Other Levy On Gross Production.

A vigorous fight on two oil tax bills pending in the legislature at Austin is in prospect and local producing men are organizing today to contest both bills.

One bill would levy a two per cent tax on all oil production. The other would levy a two per cent gross receipts tax on all wholesale dealers in gasoline and refined products.

A fund of \$500 is being raised by local oil men interested in the producing end of the business, and a representative will be sent to Austin to aid in the fight on the bill.

The production tax, it is pointed out by local oil men, would add still more to a tax burden that they consider already unduly heavy—in this connection, it is shown that they are already taxed as follows:

State—Ad valorem tax on land; ad valorem tax on leases; two per cent gross receipts on all pipe lines; franchise tax of 50 cents on each \$1,000 of capital and surplus.

Federal—Fifty cents on each \$1,000 of capital and surplus; two per cent net income tax.

If, in addition, gross production is taxed two per cent and refinery products are taxed two per cent on gross receipts, the burden, local oil men point out, will be such as to seriously hamper small companies, such as operate in the Northwest Texas field, both refining and producing. The larger companies, it is claimed, would be relatively better able to meet such taxes because their proportionate overhead expense is smaller than that of the little companies.

"It would be just as fair," said one of the letters written to the Senator and Representative Greenwood, "to put a tax on the production of cotton."

Another letter on the refinery tax bill says:

"Such legislation would discourage the building of refineries and the manufacture of refined oil in this State, and particularly in the Northwest Texas field, and is unfortunate just at the time when there are a number of large oil producers and oil companies making plans to build pipe lines and large refineries in this State. When it is remembered that such plants can be put in Louisiana on the Sabine river, just across the state line, or on the Mississippi in Louisiana, and can be operated from such locations with equal economy and profit as from any location in this State, it looks like madness to pass laws which will deter the location of such plants in Texas.

"Extensive plans for contesting the passage of the bill are rapidly taking form here. Local oil men are seeking to enlist the support of all persons affected by the oil industry, from the land owners whose royalties might be reduced to the autoist who is confronted, they say, with materially advanced prices for his gasoline.

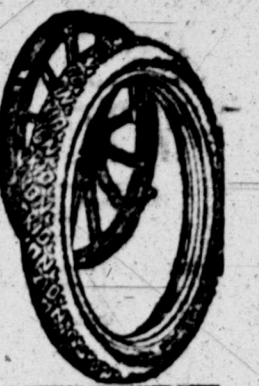

Recipe for Eggless Fruit Cake

TREE PLANTING AND OTHER CIVIC MOVES PLANNED

STEPS FOR SPRING SANITARY AND BEAUTIFICATION MEASURES TAKEN BY CIVIC LEAGUE FREE TREES AND FLOWERS.

EXPERTS TO ATTEND
Will Conduct Home Economics and Health Weeks This Spring—Discussion of Anti-Spitting Ordinance Is Held At Meeting.

Spring Civic Plans.
Feb. 19—Tree and Rose Week
March 5—Home Economics Week
March 18 (probably)—Health Week
Every Week—Clean-up Week

In a lengthy and at times heated session, the Civic League yesterday attended to its spring plans, these to include Tree and Rose Week, Home Economics Week, Health Week and a perpetual clean-up.

The heated part of the meeting arose when the league discussed the violating of the "don't spit" ordinance by the masculine public and urged that the authorities take whatever steps necessary to enforce the law. It was intimated that the strength of the law this ordinance was subject to the most gross violation. This was attributed to an oversight of public and authorities more than anything else, but the league expressed its opinion that "spitters" should "watch their step."

During Tree Week, which is to start February 19, the Civic League will urge the planting of trees, shrubs and plants and superintend the distribution of free trees, which merchants and bankers of the city have purchased by subscription. A plant exchange will be opened during this week, probably in some centrally located vacant space, where the trees can be billed in until called for, and here the people will be urged to bring their extra plants to the exchange, which merchants such for exchange or to give away to those who are not able to go to the expense of buying the plants, but desire to beautify their homes and are willing to give the plants the proper attention. The free trees will also be given under the same conditions. There have been several hundred trees bought by the banks and houses.

Home Economics Week will begin March 5, and the program will be given by home economics experts from the State University, extension departments. The programs will be held in the auditorium of the Salvation Army building, on Seventh street. The Civic League is interested in bringing this course of experts on things pertaining to better homes, better citizens and better cities to Wichita Falls.

Battle Creek authorities, lecturers and demonstrators will conduct the Health Week program, which will be held some time in March. The dates to be fixed later. These Health Week programs will consist of lectures and talks on hygiene, personal and civic sanitation and other matters in which the Civic League is interested and hopes to interest the public.

In place of the plan for a Clean-up Week, followed for several years previously by having one week designated as clean-up week, the League yesterday adopted the plan offered by Dr. J. F. Reed. This will call for an inspection of the fourteen districts in to which the city is divided by the Civic League, by the chairman of the districts, accompanied by the city sanitary officer, J. A. Brown. Each property owner and householder will be asked to attend to his premises and specified days be set when the wagons of the city department will call for trash. These routes will be made periodically and by keeping all premises clean all the time there will be no need for a clean-up week.

Progress of the Junior Civic League work was reported by the committees appointed at last month's meeting for the purpose of organizing leagues in each ward-school. Two organizations were reported. The first was a school organization by the principal, C. C. Trimble, and the Travis school, which was visited by Mesdames T. B. Smock and T. T. Taylor. Mrs. E. W. Nicholson reported that the Alamo Mothers' Club would assume responsibility for the civic organization in the Alamo school, and it was announced that R. M. Johnson, principal of the Alamo school, would organize classes for a study of civics, the study to be held each Friday afternoon. The Sam Houston school also showed interest in the plan, but no definite steps towards organization have yet been taken.

Twenty-four benches will be placed in the city parks; eight to each park, and at the Tuesday afternoon meeting it was announced that a special rate will be secured by having them made now.

The time-honored enemy of the Civic League, the bag worm, was again the subject of discussion and hostilities were declared opened again. committee, Mrs. R. G. Schurrer, president of the League, and Mrs. F. B. Smock, will endeavor to destroy them. The next Thursday night and ask for their aid in fighting the pest as in previous seasons.

A nominating committee, to report at the next meeting, was appointed, consisting of Mesdames Richolt, Anderson and Zundelovitz.

Two new members, Miss Webster and Mrs. Rhodes, were taken in and in addition to urging that the present members make an effort for more new members, it was also urged that all those bearing up the month of November. This was the first meeting held in the reading room of the First Methodist church, which will henceforth be the meeting place of the League.

This is too serious a matter to handle over the telephone and must be done face to face. The writer will gladly do all in his power to help. She is some brother's daughter, sister, wife or (God forbid) mother.

But this is just treating the effect and I can't help expressing myself on what caused the trouble. It is the very plain language and handling of the unvarnished truth. Try as we may, we cannot get away from the law of cause and effect. God gave man laws to govern his life, the keeping of which would bring him the greatest happiness. He did so because God is love. He knew the breaking of these laws would bring nothing but pain and sorrow. We know it. We know it. Business Conditions Continue Fundamentally Good, Says Summary

Business activity is unaltered by numerous minor disturbances, according to the monthly trade letter of the National Bank of Commerce, which says:

Despite numerous minor disturbances, fundamental conditions remain unchanged and business activity continues without a halt. With regard to the outlook for the future we can do no better than quote from an interview given by Elbert H. Gray, Chairman of the United States Steel Corporation. Mr. Gray, whose opinion is always of the greatest importance, says: "With our wealth, our opportunities, our geographical situation, if we are a united people, free from internal antagonisms, friendly to each other and to the people of all other nations, and with reasonable co-operation between the business interests and the government, we are impregnable. We can and should continue to be the leading nation. Our future depends largely upon ourselves. The foundation for optimism as to the long future of this country is solid. No business man has many reasons to be hopeful."

We wonder if our readers are not just a little tired of the seemingly endless array of figures that fill the newspapers with regard to the foreign trade of this country. However, it is impossible to avoid quoting statistics once more, because during the year 1916 the United States made such gains as to warrant a brief reference to the situation. For example, our exports of manufacturers during 1916 were well in excess of \$2,000,000,000, while the highest export figure ever reached by Great Britain, formerly the world's largest exporter of manufacturers, was \$2,012,000,000 in 1913, the year immediately preceding the war.

During the three war years our exports of manufacturers have grown by leaps and bounds. In 1914 they were \$742,000,000 while in 1916, the figures approximate \$2,200,000,000, more than triple the record of 1914. In spite of the unexampled prosperity everywhere in evidence there never was a time in our history when so much private economy was more necessary than at present. It is only natural that the average person actively employed at good wages feels that there is no immediate call to curtail expenses. Yet waste is just as much of economic offense in times of prosperity as hard times.

The man who spends his money carelessly and lays aside a definite amount each month will not assure himself personal gain in the future but will be contributing to the welfare of the nation in conserving energy and adding to the permanent record.

Business failures during the year 1916 were 1,652 in number as compared with 2,661 in 1915 while the liabilities represented by these failures were slightly in excess of \$29,000,000 as compared with \$41,000,000 for the previous year. When all together, business in Canada started up again in 1917 in most excellent condition.

Mr. Kellard's physical equipment is well adapted to roles of this character.

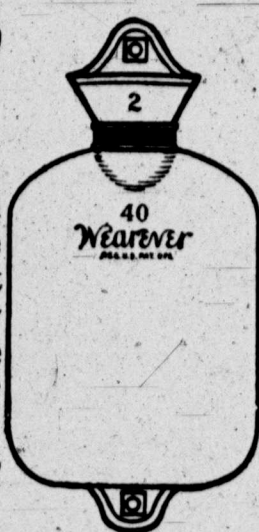
