

PREPARING TO OPPOSE VILLA

TRAFFIC ON MEXICAN CENTRAL STOPS ON ACCOUNT OF TROOP TRAIN.

TROOPS TO JUAREZ

Garrison There Being Materially Reinforced—To Also Make Move In Casas Grandes Section.

Juarez, Feb. 12.—All passenger traffic has been suspended on the Mexican Central railroad between here and Chihuahua City in order to use the passenger equipment for moving troops to Juarez and into the Casas Grandes country to oppose the advance of the Villa forces toward the border.

Another troop train arrived at 4 a. m. yesterday with 250 cavalry from the Chihuahua garrison. The strength of the local garrison to 1000 men, according to General Jose Carlos Margu.

TORPEDO PLANE AS EFFECTIVE WEAPON

BRITISH REPORT TIGRIS VICTORY

CLAIMED TO HAVE HEMMED IN LARGE FORCE OF TURKS AT KUT-EL AMARA

BATTLE AT MONASTIR

Teutonic Forces Take Offensive With Some Success—Russian Reverses Reported.

The Associated Press summarizes European war operations as follows: While the military activity along the Franco-Belgian front, where the British are fighting their way toward Bapaume has slackened somewhat there has been an increase in the operations on several of the other war fronts.

From the Tigris front in Asia there comes the official report of an important British success. The British have established a line more than three miles long across the bend of the Tigris west of Kut-el-Amara the operation resulting in the Turks there being completely hemmed in it is declared.

In Macedonia the Teutonic forces have taken the offensive in the Monastir region. Today's German army headquarters statement announces the capture of an entire hill position east of Ferovalvo in the bend of the Cerna and several camps in the rear of this point. Nearly 100 Italian were taken prisoner and five machine guns were captured.

AMERICANS CAN EAT MEAT AGAIN, NONE IN BERLIN

Meat is now so scarce in Berlin that it is never hung in windows to attract buyers. Practically all meat is sold on cards entitled each person to half a pound weekly.

The rich of course suffered comparatively little. They are still able to buy high priced poultry and turkeys, geese, and chickens are still displayed in poultry shops and labels announce that they can be purchased at \$1.20 to \$1.50 a pound.

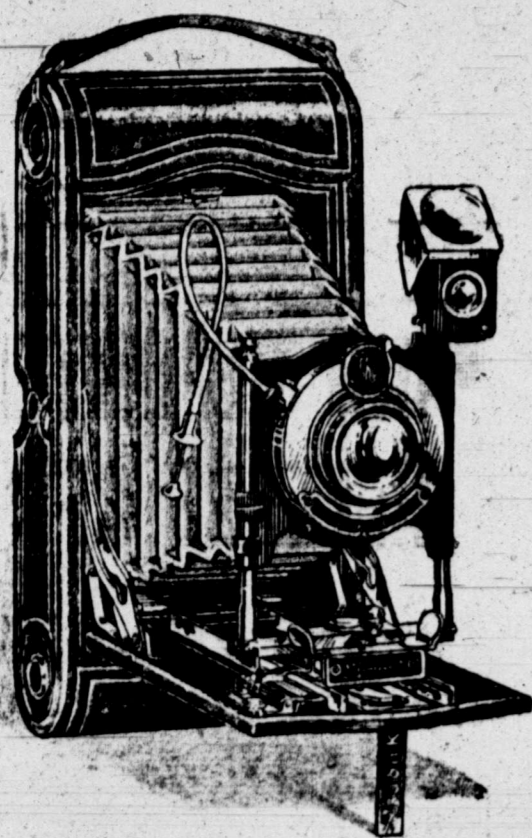

PROSPECTS FOR NEW INDUSTRIES

NUMBER OF PROPOSITIONS ARE RECEIVING CHAMBER OF COMMERCE'S ATTENTION

DIRECTORS SESSION

Short Meeting is Held Today—Effort to Land Eastern Star Home to Be Made.

Wichita Falls' excellent chances of securing the location of a large mattress factory which is already strongly organized and has ample capital with which to install a large plant was indicated by F. Johnson, secretary at this morning's meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

Other propositions for which the Chamber of Commerce is working on the present hour are: a large factory to be located in the city about 10,000 mattresses a week. A large number of men would be employed and the by products of cotton oil mills in this section would be utilized.

The moving picture studio is one maintained by one of the largest producers in the industry which is to be moved on account of bad weather at its present location.

There is little chance of either bill being vetoed if it passes both houses, according to the opinion of the directors. The Eastern Star is planning an expenditure of \$2,000 on their home, and an annual expenditure of \$15,000 for its plant.

God can't make you feel good while there is evil in your heart. If a mistake has been made it must be rectified before the blessing of God can enter your life.

God can't make you feel better than you are. He can bless, or He can curse, reward or punish.

A franchise granting the Wichita Falls Electric Company the right of way over the public highways of Clay county, for the construction of its power line to Henrietta was voted Monday by the commissioners court of Clay county. Material for this line is now being assembled here and work will start in the near future. F. N. Lawton of the electric company, who brought the matter before the commissioners was present when they awarded the depository bids for the ensuing two years. The successful bid paid six and a half per cent for use of the county's funds, whereas Wichita county gets less than three per cent. The difference is due, of course, to the fact that deposits such as the county would make are of less relative importance in Wichita Falls than they are in Henrietta.

### ALL OCCUPANTS OF FLATS MOVE AWAY

Threat of Injunction is Sufficient for Those Who Show Inclination to Remain

Threats of injunctions by Sheriff George Hawkins made last week served to move the last of the flats inmates and for the first time in years the flats is now deserted save for only one woman who has been sick for several weeks and her attendant. The sick woman expects to be able to move within the next few days.  
Several of the women who owned houses for a while evidenced a determination to stay in the flats, but the prospect of an injunction decided them to move. In one or two places negro women have been placed as caretakers by the proprietress and dim lights from these houses and the one in which the woman lies sick are the only ones to be seen now, where once it was almost as bright as day the whole night through. The contrast presented by the dark houses and the deserted streets is indeed a remarkable and striking one and is probably the reason for the flats the lid is clamped down tight and apparently to stay. Meanwhile, the officers have shown no disposition to relax their vigilance or content themselves with closing the reservation; numerous arrests which have followed closely on the closing of the flats serving to discourage an attempt to move into the residence or business district.

### WILL BUY AT HOME FOR TREE PLANTING

Plans For Special Week are Discussed at Civic League Meeting Monday

Home purchased and as far as possible home raised stock will be distributed by the Civic League during Tree Week, this decision being reached at a called session of the League held Monday at the First Presbyterian Church. The money subscribed by the merchants and bankers of the town for trees for free distribution will be used to buy trees from local nurseries. The agreement previously entered into with out of town concern having been called off. The exchange will be held as previously announced in the Bank-savings agency office and all having surplus plants or seeds are urged to bring them to this place where there will be Civic League members in charge between 9 in the morning and 5 in the evening. The plants and seeds may be exchanged or if the owners desire no exchange will be distributed free to those who do not feel able to purchase them. The exchange will be started February 19. The free trees purchased by the League will be needed in an adjoining vacant lot and those who intend to take these trees are urged to have holes ready prepared at home. The Civic League members will be ruined if the roots are allowed to remain uncovered more than two hours. Four plants or trees will be the limit to one person.

NEW RED RIVER BRIDGE PLANNED

ELECTRA INTERESTS WORKING ON PROPOSITION FOR TOLL STRUCTURE.

MEANS NEW OUTLET

Would Give Connection With Southwestern Oklahoma Section. Would Cost \$25,000.00

Wichita county will have another route into the rich farming section of Southwestern Oklahoma if plans being worked out by Electra people for a bridge over Red River at that point are carried through. The plans which Electra has in mind, says County Commissioner H. H. Haynes of that place, call for the organization of a company to build a toll bridge costing between \$50,000 and \$75,000 over the river north of Electra.

The bridge will be situated closely on a line between Electra and Frederick, Altus and other Oklahoma towns which can now only be reached from Electra and Vernon by a detour via the Burk Burnett bridge. The route to these places as well as Wichita Falls will be shortened materially by the new bridge and will undoubtedly be beneficial to Electra and Vernon which are now practically cut off from communication with the country beyond the river. D. T. Cross and others at Electra have been the most active in the movement and the interest being taken in the proposition by residents of Electra and nearby territory practically assures its successful consummation. The proposition, in addition to promising large benefits to Electra and the adjacent section, is undoubtedly attractive to a purely commercial standpoint, the large volume of travel which without doubt would spring up between the two sections assuring a profitable investment.

"If war comes the Jews of this country will sacrifice themselves for America," declared Henry Moskowitz, chairman of the New York civil service commission, before the National Workmen's Commission of Jews in convention in New York. The Jews the world over are patriots. Even in Russia where the Jew is denied many rights and is bitterly persecuted, the people of that race are making every sacrifice. Jews are in the trenches in France and Germany. They were among the first to respond to the call for volunteers in Great Britain. If they are thus loyal and patriotic in those countries it is to be expected that their loyalty and patriotism will be as an intense fire in America. In America a Jew has every right that any other citizen has. They are not discriminated against on account of their religion. They have as high a social position as any class of our citizenship. There is no discrimination whatever against them on account of their race. The United States is one of the few countries on the globe in which there is no discrimination against the Jew. Even in democratic France and enlightened Germany there is discrimination against the Jew. In those countries he can furnish money for the war loans and do the fighting in the trenches and the organization of the armies is such that he is almost barred from leadership, even in so subordinate a position as a captain. In America a Jew can be a captain, a colonel, a general or a commander-in-chief. There is no bar against him on account of his race; rather are his racial qualities a recommendation. Mr. Moskowitz was right. When war comes, if it must, the Jews will make every sacrifice for America.

Threatened by revocation of their charters if they do and drastic penalties if they don't appear to place the railroads of Texas between the devil of Texas retributive legislation on one side and the deep blue sea of penalties of the Interstate Commerce regulation on the other. When a man or institution gets into this kind of a position he or it must have the sympathy of all citizens. There appears to be a question as to whether the Interstate Commerce Commission or the State of Texas commission has the right to name rates in certain instances, but the railroads cannot be expected to obey both when the orders of each are contrary. Until the courts of highest authority can establish jurisdiction as between the State of Texas and the Interstate Commerce commissions it is manifestly unfair for the State of Texas to take any steps toward the revocation of charters of any railroad or to throw such railroad into the hands of receivers.

WHEN MEN MOCK THE LAW.

Some months ago a Georgia sheriff was murdered and a mob promptly lynched five negroes and was preparing to lynch a sixth when officers rescued him. Subsequently this sixth negro was tried and convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment. New evidence was discovered and the case was reopened and the sixth negro acquitted. Not only was this negro acquitted but it was established beyond any doubt that the five negroes killed by the mob were entirely innocent of the crime. It developed that while the mob was killing the five negroes and attempting to kill the sixth the real murderer made his escape. He was enabled to escape through the confusion and excitement of the mob's violence. The guilty man has not been captured to this day. Thus not only were innocent lives taken, but the guilty was enabled to escape. All this leads the Houston Post to observe: "There was never a more dastardly murder than the killing of the five negroes by the Worth county mob. Very likely the mob was composed of men who regret the mistake they made, but regrets cannot alter one thing: Every one of them is as contemptible a murderer as ever dipped his hand in human blood. "The fact that their victims were negroes did not in the slightest degree mitigate the cowardliness and brutality of the assassination. They committed the crime because they were afraid. "The fact that the members of the mob were white men does not alter in the slightest degree that every one is a cowardly murderer. "The fact that they are at liberty and are probably accounted leading citizens of the community in which they reside, does not change the fact that they will continue to command the respect or, more probably, fear of officers, because of the political influence they may wield, never alters the fact. "When a mob mocks the law and takes human life it is a gang of murderers who have stabbed civilization and betrayed the State."

WICHITA FALLS IS GIVEN SPACE IN MILWAUKEE PAPERS

Pictures and descriptive matter dealing with Wichita Falls appear in the leading Milwaukee papers of Friday and Saturday in connection with the announcement that the Milwaukee team will have its spring training camp in this city. The descriptive articles tell of this city's importance as a manufacturing and oil center and also devote considerable space to Lake Wichita. Pictures of the baseball park and of the scenes around Lake Wichita are also published. The matter was furnished the Milwaukee papers by the publicity department of the Chamber of Commerce. The Milwaukee papers quote President Timme and other club officials as saying Wichita Falls is an ideal place for the training camp. Press dispatches from Milwaukee yesterday made formal announcement of the fact that the Brewers will leave for this city March 12 as previously indicated.

A. & M. CONTEST TO START IN 90 DAYS

Passage of Bill By Senate Leaves Only Signature of Governor to Make it Law

Passage by the State Senate late yesterday of the West Texas A. & M. bill leaves only the approval of Governor Ferguson to be required before the establishment of the institution is assured; the governor is said to have not committed himself definitely to the bill, but to be favorable toward it, and it is thought that he will sign the bill promptly when it reaches him.

The locating committee will start to work in 90 days or about the middle of May just what plan will be followed is not decided yet, but it is expected that the committee which is to consist of Governor Ferguson, Lieut. Gov. Hobbs, State Superintendent Doubty, Commissioner of Agriculture Davis and Speaker Fuller will visit each of the West Texas towns that is in the race, as was done in the case of the committee that located the West Texas Normal. That committee visited Wichita Falls first of all, and it is hoped that this locating board will adopt a different course, as the advantages of having the last say, rather than the first are manifest.

The vote in the Senate was 19 to 5, the opposition coming from six Texas. That the vote was not closer is said to have been due to the efforts of Senator Claude Hudspeth, a veteran in the contest, who pointed out that West Texas has always stood by every educational institution in the state and is entitled to

share of the schools. It is a noteworthy fact, in that connection that West Texas in both branches of the legislature have always been more friendly toward educational measures than have East Texans. It is expected that steps will be taken here promptly to determine whether Wichita Falls still stands about getting the A. & M. school for which she is prepared to put up a determined fight.

NO MORE SMALLPOX CASES AT PRESENT

Practically No Contagious Disease Reported Here—Several Cases Recently

Wichita Falls is now practically free from small-pox cases, after having had quite a number during the past two months, according to Dr. Mark Moore, city health officer. At present there are only one or two quarantined cases of any kind in the city, these being measles or scarlet fever. Several cases of measles have been reported within the past few weeks, and one or two of scarlet fever, though at no time has any contagious disease reached the proportions of an epidemic. The small-pox cases treated recently were of the more serious type of that disease and while no deaths resulted, some of the patients had very severe attacks. All were promptly

quarantined and some were taken to the building at the county farm provided for such cases where there was no facility for proper care and treatment in the city. The frequent changes in weather of the past few weeks have resulted in the usual influenza and a few cases of pneumonia, but at present the general health of the city is declared good.
