

GOVERNOR ANSWERS ATTACK UPON HIS OFFICIAL COURSE

RESOLUTION FOR PROBE DRAWS EMPHATIC DENIAL

Chief Executive Goes Before Senate When Johnson Asks For Inquiry

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Feb. 14.—Senator Johnson, of Hall county, offered in the Senate today a resolution providing for a sweeping investigation of the official acts of Governor James E. Ferguson.

"If the charges in the resolution are true," he said, "then I ought not to be governor and ought to resign. But if these charges are not true then the man who made them ought to resign from this body and acknowledge before God and man that he is not worthy to be a member of this body nor to be an American citizen."

The governor said that when he was younger, if such a charge had been made against him he would have lost his temper and held the man making the charges to account in a personal encounter.

Governor Ferguson took up the charges in order and replied to them either entering a general denial or explaining specific charges.

The governor spoke by unanimous consent of the Senate. His appearance was the signal for cheering both on the floor of the Senate and in the galleries. He was frequently applauded during his remarks.

As to the charges that his campaign expenses were paid by certain special interests, the governor declared that these charges have all been denied by the persons who made them.

Senator Parr asked the governor if he had made any agreement with the three new regents of the University looking to the dismissal of any member of the faculty.

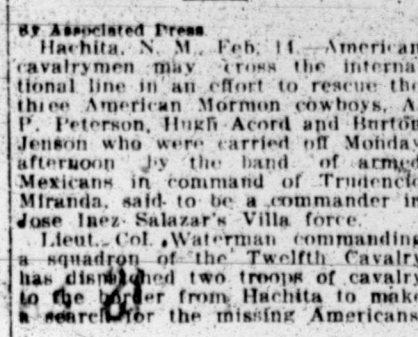

200 GERMANS GOING

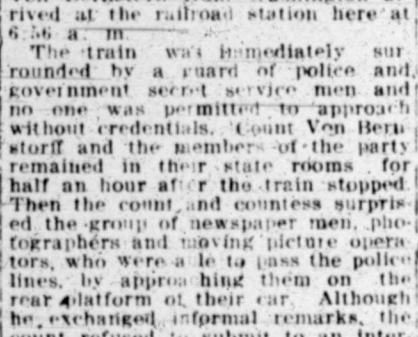
Former Ambassador Says He Will Be Subject to Governments Orders as to His Future Plans. Expects to Sail Today

By Associated Press. Hoboken, Feb. 14.—Count Johann H. Von Bernstorff with his wife and 200 German diplomatic and consular officials was safely aboard the Scandinavian liner Frederick VIII here today waiting to depart for Copenhagen on his way to Germany.

The liner was expected to get away this afternoon. The count and consular officers retired to their cabins immediately upon reaching the ship and the former sent word that he had nothing to say but "good bye" to the host of waiting newspaper men and therefore hoped that they would excuse him.

Prior to his arrival at Hoboken, however, the former ambassador outlined on various occasions to an Associated Press representative his possible future plans. "The war in Europe, the possibility of the United States being drawn into it, and the doubts he held regarding his position here," he said, "were the chief factors in his mind."

That is indefinite too. Of course, I shall go directly to Berlin as soon as I arrive in Germany. Maybe they will have decided there for me what to do and maybe the worst. It is quite probable that my official career is finished. I may retire for good.

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LYMAN M. LAW SUNK IN MEDITERRANEAN MONDAY

Crew of Nine Americans Said to Have Been Landed Safely

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 14.—The American schooner Lyman M. Law was sunk by a submarine on Monday, according to a dispatch from the Stefani Agency of Rome.

The Lyman M. Law carried a crew of nine men, in addition to her captain. All Americans and was loaded with lumber material used in this city for manufacture of lemon crates, according to the schooner's agent here.

The Lyman M. Law, Captain Chaffield, was last reported on her departure from Stockton, Maine, for Palermo, Sicily. She was owned by the Benedict-Manson Marine company of New Haven.

CARRIED NO CONTRABAND

By Associated Press. Bangor, Maine, Feb. 14.—The schooner Lyman M. Law, reported sunk on Monday by a submarine, sailed from Penobscot Bay on January 6, with 60,000 bundles of lemon box shooks, taken on at Stockton a week earlier.

There was no contraband aboard, according to T. J. Stewart Company of this city, shipper of the cargo.

The schooner was to go direct to Palermo without touching at any other point. The cargo was valued at \$31,000 and was insured.

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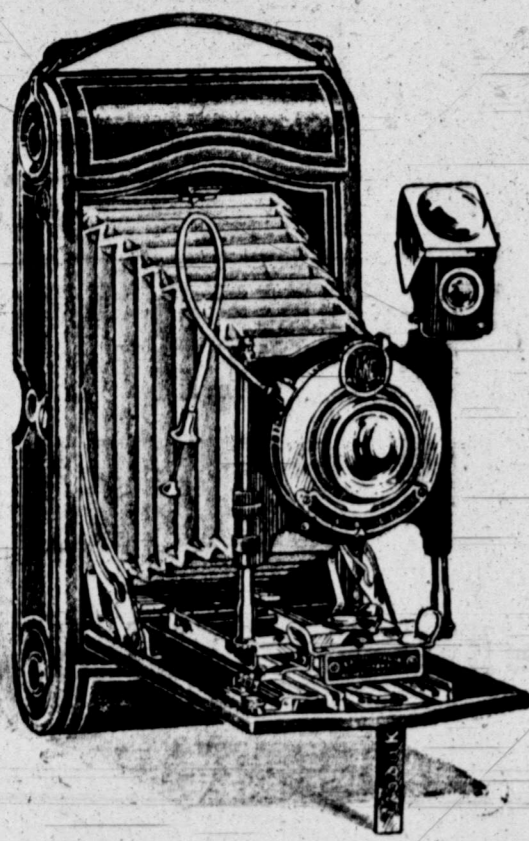

NEW FILTRATION PLANT PLANNED

WILL STRAIN WATER SUPPLY
THROUGH SAND AND GRAVEL
BEDS

MAY START SHORTLY

Expected to Result in Entirely Satisfactory Supply. Cost Will Be \$25,000

Plans for a filtration plant by means of which a new means of clearing and purifying the water supply of Wichita Falls will be adopted, are being prepared by engineers for the Wichita Falls Water Company.

It is probable that this improvement which is expected to solve the water supply troubles of this city, will be started in the near future.

The filtration system will purify the water by straining it through a four foot stratum of sand and gravel. The tanks and basins now in use at the plant will be incorporated in the filtration plant and will be adapted to the needs of the new system.

The method at present in use at the plant for clearing and purifying the water is the chlorination system, which is recognized as an effective means of ridding the water of all impurities. This system will not be entirely discarded, but the principal factor in filtration will be the sand and gravel strainer to be installed.

The water will come from the lake into settling basins and from there will pass through the filter, then into the pipes to be distributed over the city to consumers.

The efficiency of sand and gravel as a means of purification has long been recognized and it is believed that the new system will prove much more satisfactory than that in use in the past, and that it will mean an end to the occasional days when the color and appearance of the water here has not been all that particular consumers could wish.

The cost of the new system will be about \$25,000. Manager P. N. Lawton states that it is uncertain when work will start, but that the plant will probably be installed in the near future.

The installation of this system is another step forward by the electric and water supply companies here, who have been steadily building up and improving the local system. It has been made one of the biggest systems in West Texas, under the management of J. H. Thrane, superintendent, and is now in Wichita Falls and three other communities, with another soon to be added.

HONOR MEMORY OF SAINT VALENTINE BY OLD DIRECTORY

Today is Relic of Pagan Times. Arrow Pierced Hearts Are Large Part of Mails.

CONTRASTS SHOWN BY OLD DIRECTORY

Volume Published Ten Years Ago Furnishes Interesting Reading Today

This is St. Valentine's day, the one day in all the year set apart for lovers, and arrow-pierced hearts, tender sentiments, etc. form a substantial part of the mail on this date.

St. Valentine's day comes from pagan times, it is known, but the real origin of the occasion is not clearly established. It seems most likely, however, that the name was given to a Bishop Valentine of Rome, who was canonized by the church. Tradition holds that Claudius II, emperor of Rome, issued an edict forbidding young men to marry because he thought that married life made them less willing to become soldiers. Bishop Valentine, so the story goes, aided in the resistance to this edict by performing many marriages secretly. His course has caused him to be recognized as the patron saint of lovers. It cost him his head eventually, to this belief the swains and maids of Rome, for he was beheaded by order of the emperor. That he was beheaded is a matter of history.

Even before the advent of the Christian era, an occasion was observed at this season of the year as a special time for lovers. It is supposed to mark the beginning of the spring mating season for birds and beasts, though any bird that would woo on a day like this might be considered badly off for a mate. The day is believed to have been an outgrowth of the old pagan festival of Lupercalia, February 15, when special tribute was paid by the Romans to the gods Pan and Juno. At this festival, the names of the maidens were placed in a box or vessel of some kind, and were drawn by the young men, becoming their sweethearts for a while. Perhaps in this way originated the saying that marriage is a lottery.

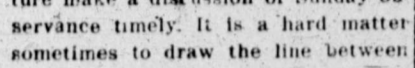

Several bills now before the legislature make a discussion of Sunday observance timely. It is a hard matter sometimes to draw the line between what should be permitted on Sunday and what should be prohibited. One day of the seven has been set apart by divine law for rest and recreation.

If the prohibition stands firm, it is believed the "bone dry" amendment will be turned into victory. The anti-fostered a "bone dry" proposal for the purpose of creating division among the pros in the lower house of the state legislature. In this they were successful. Subsequently the folks at home were heard from and it was found that sentiment had crystallized for a "bone dry" measure. The proposition is now to be reconsidered with fair prospects for its passage. A majority of the voters of Texas have by their vote asked for submission; a majority of the legislative districts have asked for it. The question ought to be submitted, and when it is submitted then it is adopted there will be no need of having the prohibition question submitted again.

PRaise FROM COL. JAMES

In a letter to his agent here Col. John C. James, of Roff, Okla., expresses his appreciation of Wichita Falls citizens, its management and of the Daily Times. Messrs. IMPEDING INDUSTRY

The oil industry is being developed in Texas upon a splendid scale. More progress is being made in this industry probably than any other in the state. New pipe lines are being laid, new refineries built and every effort being made to increase production. The oil industry already pays heavy tribute to the state in the regular taxes. An oil company is the largest tax payer in Wichita county. Oil companies pay a large percent of the local and state taxes in Wichita and a number of other counties in the state. The oil industry will continue to grow and develop if not penalized by excessive taxation or restrictive laws, and will pay more and more taxes into county and state treasuries. In this situation the effort to enact a law for apportionment tax seems ill-timed and discriminatory. The Houston Post in a recent editorial discusses some other phases of the effects of the proposed tax bill. The Post says:

Referring again to house bill 136, which proposes a tax of 2 per cent upon the gross sales of refined petroleum products, let the legislature remember that at the present time we are preparing to lay new pipe lines into Texas from the producing fields in other states. There is in contemplation at the present time the erection of all refineries on the shores of the Houston ship channel for the purpose of refining petroleum produced in other states. Cargoes of crude petroleum come to the plants on the ship channel from Mexico. If unfavorable legislation and unjust taxation do not prevent, Houston and other ports on the Texas gulf coast will become great oil concentration and refining points and Texas will have an industry that will give thousands of people employment, not only in the refining and marketing of oil,

Extensive Plans Are Under Way Following Completion of Organization on Wednesday.
