

Expected to Result In Entirely Satis-actory Supply—Cost Will Be \$25,000

which a new means of clearing and purifying the water supply of Wichita Falls will be adopted, are being prepared by engineers for the Wichita Falls Water company. It is probable that this improvement which is expected to solve the water suply troubles of this city, will be started in the near future.

The filtration system will purify the

water by straining it through a four foot stratum of sand and gravel. The tanks and basins now in use at the plant will be incorporated in the fil-tration plant and will be adapted to the needs of the new system.

The method at prescut in use at the plant for clearing and purifying the water is the chloride of line system, which is recognized as an effective means of ridding the water of all impurities. This system will not be entirely discarded by the principal. be entirely discarded, but the principal factor in filtration will be the sand and gravel strainer to be installed. 




