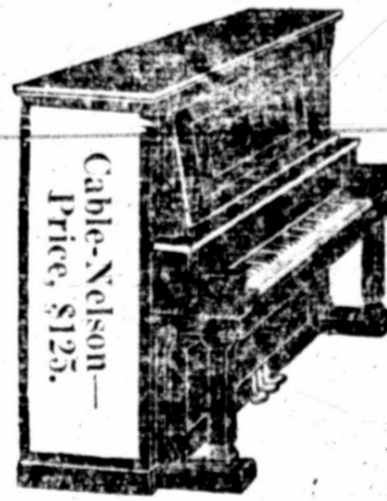

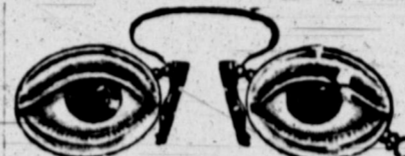

ENCOURAGING CROP REPORTS ARE RECEIVED

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Feb. 23. Reports received from the U. S. Department of Agriculture from its field agents are to the effect that the recent freezing weather did comparatively little damage throughout the state, with the exception of the lower Rio Grande valley country. In that section, much damage resulted to garden truck products, the reports show. In the Panhandle the damage is very slight to small grain. Stock went through the freeze without any material loss to stockmen in the western portion of Texas, the field agents report that the prospects of a large small grain crop are excellent. Excessive rains are reported in various portions of East Texas.

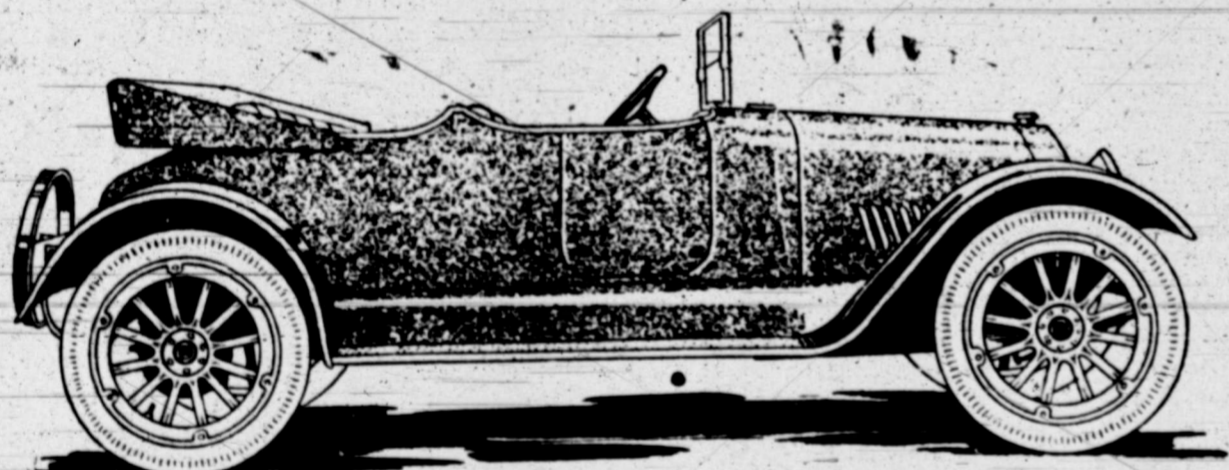

ELECT DR. CROSS AS PASTOR HERE

FIRST CHRISTIAN CONGREGATION UNANIMOUSLY ACCEPTS COMMITTEE'S REPORT

HAS NOTABLE RECORD

Evangelist, Musician, Athlete and Author—To Assume Duties Here at Once

Dr. Percy G. Cross, evangelist, musician and author is now the pastor of the First Christian Church, which has been without a pastor since the first of the year when Rev. P. F. Walters left to accept the pastorate of the First Christian Church of Hopkinsville, Kentucky. The unanimous recommendation of the officers of the church that Dr. Cross be called to the church ministry was unanimously accepted by the congregation at a meeting following the Sunday morning service, the call to go into effect immediately.

Dr. Cross will continue the meeting as long as interest continues. For three weeks or more in April he will be out of town, holding a meeting at Lynchburg, Va., an engagement which he entered into before coming here. Other engagements have been cancelled so that Dr. Cross can give his undivided time and attention to the ministry of the First Christian Church. It is interesting to note in this connection that Rev. N. F. Gratton now pastor of the First Presbyterian Church gave up the evangelical work to accept his present pastorate so Wichita Falls has two evangelist ministers.

In Dr. Cross the First Christian Church will have a many sided minister as well as a well rounded man. In the realm of the church he stands high with experience, which it is not given many ministers of the gospel to acquire who are far more advanced in years than Dr. Cross. His past pastorate was at Hot Springs, Ark., from 1911 to 1914. He has pastored the church at Searcy, Ark., and has been pastor of the Little Rock, Ark., as well as of several other churches in the South. As an evangelist he has established a name and reputation throughout the South and East.

Dr. Cross is a fellow of Christ's College, London, an alumnus of Pennsylvania University, holds a Master's Degree from Johnson Bible School of Tennessee, did special work in the Western Institute at Chicago, and studied in the Northwestern Medical Institute in Chicago, intending at that time to become a medical missionary. He also studied in the old Kentucky University.

Dr. Cross is an officer in the reserve corps of the United States and for three years was captain-in-command of the Arkansas National Guard Second Regiment. Seven years study under the leading musicians of this country and five years in England have made the new pastor of the First Christian Church at Wichita Falls a musician of no mean ability, he being versed in instrumental and vocal music as well. In various of the universities and schools which he attended he was leader of the glee clubs and other organizations of similar nature being soloist also.

Two athletic records in the half and mile track are held by Dr. Cross who was very much of an athlete. His time is two that for the half and four forty for the mile. During his university days he made the record made his way by coaching and was a crack basketball and baseball player as well as a track athlete. He has made the football team and his interest in days has found expression in his work with the Y. M. C. A. and with the Boy Scouts, he having been Y. M. C. A. secretary for some time before entering the ministry, both in San Antonio and Chicago. In 1910 he had the crack Scout team of Arkansas at Little Rock. He is much interested in the Y. M. C. A. movement for Wichita Falls and in the Boy Scout activities as well.

Dr. Cross is a thirty-second degree Mason and a thirty-third degree Master-Mason—honors possible to one man. He belongs to no other fraternal order.

The European War, its causes, Sarajevo and Lesson, is the title of Dr. Cross' book on the world war published last year. This book will be on sale tonight after the services at the church. Several other books on various church topics may come from Dr. Cross' pen shortly.

Baptismal services will follow tonight's revival sermon at the First Christian Church, there being a half dozen to receive the rites. During the past eight days when Dr. Cross has extended the invitation there have been 22 additions to the church. Tonight's subject will be "Where Shall We Put the Emphasis?" Sunday congregations were usually large, there being 700 or 800 present to hear Dr. Cross' sermon on "The Fall of Babylon" with its application to modern times. Special music by J. W. Bradley, assisted by the choir, made the service effective. Sunday morning also there was a large crowd present, the sermon subject being "Manifesting the Life of Jesus."

SWEDISH PREMIER DENIES DISCRIMINATION CHARGE

By Associated Press. London, Feb. 26.—During a discussion in the Swedish parliament on submarine warfare and war insurance, as reported by Reuters, "Baron Adelsward, former minister of finance, questioned Premier Hammarskjöld in regard to the action of the war insurance committee in refusing to issue policies on cargo ships bound for Great Britain and France.

The premier replied that such policies had been granted until the estimated risk reached the limit set and that the committee had accepted a large number of risks, and February 26, in the case of cargoes of foodstuffs, coal, or other articles of vital importance. Furthermore all vessels in foreign ports bound for Sweden were admitted for the return voyage. The premier repudiated the insinuation that Sweden was showing more regard for one belligerent than the other.

The condition of the highways through this county is said to be particularly bad at present and it is imperative that some work be done on them before the starting of the tourist season, now only a few weeks off.

If the highways are neglected this year, it is stated, tourists will spread an impression of the condition of roads through this section which will take several years to overcome even with the construction of the proposed system of permanent, hard surfaced roads.

The plans at present embrace a tour of the highways being within this county with mass meetings held at each town for the purpose of urging along the route to improve the roads and exert their concerted influence on their respective commissioners to secure work on the highways. The Motor Club will also probably contribute or raise financial aid for the improvement of the highways.

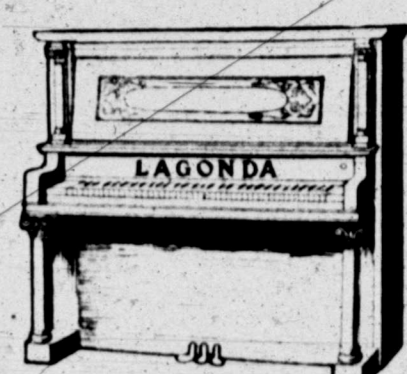

LEASE FILED TODAY

Will Operate on F. W. Huseman Survey, With Option of Purchasing Land

A mineral lease covering the rights to prospect and mine for copper and other minerals was filed in the county clerk's office today by F. W. Huseman and C. Montgomery, Jr. for the farm of J. L. Schnakenberg, north-west of Burk Burnett. The property is about 150 acres and is located on the Huseman survey. A clause in the agreement calls for the payment of \$10,000 for a complete lease. The royalty is 25 cents per point for copper and ten percent for silver and other minerals found in paying quantities. The oil and gas rights are reserved by owners of the land. An option for the purchase of the property exclusive of oil and gas rights for \$22,000 at any time is contained in the instrument. Discovery of minerals in paying quantities perverts the lease.
