FAIL TO PREVENT BIG LEAGUE GAME

Milwaukee Club Tries to Keep Giants and Tigers From Playing Here

An attempt made by the Milwaukee baseball club to break up the game between the New York Giants and Detroit Tigers which is to be played here Monday April 2, and substitute a game between the Milwaukee club and one of those teams has failed, and the game will be played as scheduled. The Milwaukee club informed the New York Giants that they had a contract with them exclusive of the grounds and would not give way to the New York-Detroit game. The New York officials were also informed that the Milwaukee club had a game scheduled here for the day before, and the New York-Detroit game would accordingly not draw very heavily on the following day.

The proposition for a game between Milwaukee and one of the other clubs was then made. The New York officials have been notified by Chamber of Commerce officials that Milwaukee's contract for the grounds expires Sunday April 1, this provision having been made with particular regard to the Giants-Tigers game. Tickets have been printed and will be put on sale here within the next few days. They will also be put on sale at points along all the railroad lines passing through Wichita Falls. Season tickets for the practice games between the two Milwaukee squads will also be put on sale within the next few days.

The Milwaukee squad will be divided up into two as nearly equal clubs as possible, one headed by the manager and one by the team captain. One of them will be known as the Milwaukee club and the other will be named the Wehitzans. As the competition for places will be very keen during the training season, the practice games are expected to develop some very good exhibitions of baseball.

PLANS FOR WATER LINES IN OIL FIELDS

Local Company May Put in Pumping Station on Beaver Creek, Archer Still Very Dry

While Archer county oil men are still praying for rain, active steps are being taken in other parts of the Northwest Texas field to solve the problem permanently. Plans for supplying some of the companies in the Electra field with the line from Beaver Creek are being considered, with the probability that the Wichita Falls Water Company will put in a high pressure pumping station on the creek and pump to the Electra district. There is already four inch line from the creek to the field, owned by the Texas company, and if the water company puts in its station, it is likely that this four inch line will be used as an oil line to take the production from the Cullen district, and that a new six

inch line will be laid for the water supply. The Wichita Falls Water Company is already furnishing water for the refinery at Iowa Park, pumping it about three miles, and it is supplying water for the shallow production district south of Iowa Park in which J. A. Kemp is interested. The drought of this winter has hampered operations so seriously that there is some prospect of putting in a water system that will supply the field at all times. As yet none of the oil companies in Archer county have acted definitely upon the proposition to pump water from Lake Wichita. The water company has proposed to put in the pumping station, provided the oil men will lay the pipe line. Such a line would cost \$20,000 to \$25,000, so that there is some hesitancy on the part of those interested in going ahead with it, especially as the normal rainfall furnishes water enough for the average amount of drilling. Unless it rains soon, however, it is likely that some steps along this line will be taken, in spite of the high cost of pipe, which makes the line more expensive than it would ordinarily be.



WOMEN COMING BACK INTO FLATS OFFICERS ADMIT

SHERIFF BLAMES COUNTY ATTORNEY'S DEPARTMENT—MEMBERS OF LATTER DECLARE INJUNCTION IS PROPER METHOD

ACTION IS UNLIKELY

Apparently Small Prospect of any Move to Keep District Closed. Declared Habitués Have Been Scattered Over City

Persistent reports that the flats are to be opened again by March 1 have been gaining currency with each day and such action is apparently expected by the authorities. Asked what he intended to do about it, Sheriff Hawkins this morning said: "What can I do? I closed the flats but must have the cooperation of the county attorney's office if I am to keep them out. They say they won't receive any complaints against the women, and that leaves me powerless to keep them out. Yes, I guess they will open up again if they want to."

"We didn't have anything to do with running them out, and we won't have anything to do with their coming back," was the statement of County Attorney Bruce Greenwood and Assistant County Attorney John Davenport. "Sheriff Hawkins gave his deputies, Jerrikan and Chelu instructions to close the place and keep the women away, which they did without the necessity of a single prosecution or legal process of any other kind. He can still keep them out if he wants to. We don't intend to either prosecute or persecute the women. However, we will lend all the assistance within our power to keep the women out of the business and residence sections of the city. But as for the flats, if the sheriff wants them to stay closed he has only to get any lawyer to draw up the necessary injunction, and his deputies will do the rest. He doesn't need us."

The attorneys indicated that in their opinion the flats was the best solution of this problem.

"Since the flats have been closed down the women have scattered over the business and residence sections of the city. It is true that the officers have made a number of arrests of this character, and have secured some convictions. But they have only stirred the surface. And what is more, that is all they can do. They may know where the women stay, and may themselves be certain as to what is going on, but that kind of evidence doesn't count much in getting a conviction in a court. What can they do with conditions like that? The running of the flats is after all the best, if not the only solution."

BOYS' BEAN SUPPER IS MUCH ENJOYED

Minister Gets Beamed With Bean. Tells of Value of Little Things

The bean supper which was Monday night's stunt by the Boys' Club at the high school was a lively and enjoyable affair for the three score youths in attendance. A supper of beans, pickles, wieners and crackers was served and greatly enjoyed. It was prepared by Miss Martineau and some of the boys, who were complimented on their culinary skill.

The talk by Rev. H. F. Draper on "personalities" dealt with the value of little things and the importance of paying attention to them.

Much added force was given the discussion of "little things" when a little thing in the form of a bean struck the minister on the head. He used the incident, amid much merriment, to show the great force that a little thing could have. Mr. Draper showed how the present world war started over a little thing and how little things might have a great bearing in all affairs.

NO ACTION LIKELY ON SLOT MACHINES

Matter Has Already Been Investigated By Grand Jury, Says County Attorney

No action at least for the present, will be taken by the county attorney's office against the slot machines, according to statements by County Attorney T. H. Greenwood and his assistant, John Davenport, when informed of the resolution of the Ministerial Association requesting that action be taken against the machines. ENGLISH UNIVERSITIES PLAN TO INVADE AMERICA
Associated Press Mail Correspondence.
London—English universities are preparing for a heavy invasion of American and colonial students immediately after the war. The invasion will not only be welcomed, but invited, and the government plans to give its cooperation in the establishment of a uniform system of postgraduate courses in institutions of higher education throughout the country.
Dr. H. A. L. Fisher of Education, in an appeal urging cooperation between the universities and the government, said: "Oxford is considering some new courses of advanced study especially attractive to students from the United States. There will be great practical advantage if the other British universities establish courses roughly uniform with this program."
I have recently been approached from many quarters by foreign governments which desire to ascertain what an English university is prepared to do for students of their countries after the war. I have no obvious means of shaping the course of university activity throughout the country, but I believe the universities will combine in some common scheme for attracting foreign students to advanced courses.
"Something more ought to be done to encourage the exchange of teachers between the universities in the Dominions and in the mother country. There could be a real practical advantage if the universities could come together with India and the colonies with a common scheme of interchange."

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
