

HOUSE STILL UNDER CALL TWO ABSENT

AFTER ALL DAY AND ALL NIGHT VIGIL, TWO MISSING MEMBERS NOT FOUND AND HOUR OF VOTE IS UNCERTAIN

SEARCH IS MADE

Absentees are Believed to Be in San Antonio—Debate on Two Amendments—Fail to Confirm Law, Hence as Regent

By Associated Press. Austin, Feb. 28.—Looked in the hall of the House most of yesterday, all last night and up to mid-afternoon today, members of the lower branch of the Legislature this noon saw little prospect of reaching a vote on the submission resolution before late tonight, perhaps not until tomorrow.

There is no word from the missing members, whose absence caused the House to be put under call. The two absentees are Representatives Nicholas of Hunt, and Martin of Gillespie. Sheriffs and chiefs of police have been ordered to arrest them when they are found. It developed during cross-questioning, in the efforts to locate the two members, that they had last been seen as they were starting for San Antonio about four o'clock in the morning.

Prohibitionists and submissionists are setting firms, and demanding the attendance of the two men before a vote is taken. No other legislation is being enacted and the House is still operating under a call. Members passed the time last night in playing dominoes and checkers, singing, gossiping, reading and to a certain extent, sleeping.

The Senate today finally adopted the House joint resolution by Miller of Dallas, proposing an amendment to the constitution to allow taking of depositions in witnesses residing outside of the state, in criminal cases, in which is involved the violation of the anti-trust laws of the state.

The Senate spent most of the morning session considering the House joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution, that persons must be naturalized citizens of the United States before they are permitted to exercise the right of franchise.

Senator Caldwell offered an amendment to the resolution, but the amendment was defeated 18 to 8. The Senate then recessed until 2:30 this afternoon. When the session resumed, consideration of the amendment was resumed.

The Senate in executive session late Tuesday night failed to confirm the appointment of Dr. H. H. Lawrence of El Paso as a member of the board of regents of the State University. The appointments of W. P. Allen and J. W. Butler were not considered yesterday. While there is opposition to them, it is not as pronounced as that which has been shown against confirmation of the appointment of Dr. Lawrence.

DEFINITE PLANS FOR WHITE WAY ARE DISCUSSED

DIRECTORS GIVE UNANIMOUS APPROVAL TO STREET LIGHTING MATTER WHICH IS TO COME BEFORE CITY COUNCIL SHORTLY

CONTEST FOR A.&M.

Secretary Johnson to Go to Austin, Federal Court Workers Thanked, Trade Excursion Indorsed, Windmill Bonus Action is Taken

Plans of the civic bureau of the Chamber of Commerce which contemplate, eventually making a white way out of the entire business section of the city and placing lights four to the block on Tenth street to the end of the street, making it the longest lighted boulevard in Texas, were discussed at the Chamber of Commerce directors meeting this morning, and will be brought before the council at an early meeting by a Chamber of Commerce committee.

For the present the plans contemplate the lighting of Ohio avenue only, probably from Ninth to Seventh. The system will be installed by the property owners, most of whom have already agreed to the expense, on condition of maintenance by the city.

The plans of the bureau as outlined by H. E. Hines chairman of the bureau, met the unanimous approval of those present. Estimates of the cost were given by F. N. Lawton who placed the probable cost at around \$1.50 per front foot to the property owners. The directors of the civic bureau, Messrs. Hines, Ward and Gardner, were authorized to select from the board of directors such other committeemen as they may wish to go with them before the council.

Among the other actions taken at this morning's meeting was the authorization extended to Secretary Johnson to go to Austin in the interest of the West Texas A. & M., a resolution of thanks to those active in securing the Federal court for Wichita Falls, a promise of cooperation with local merchants in organizing a trade excursion to Elk City on the Northwestern the latter part of next month and the appointment of a larger committee to secure the promised bonus for the Atlas-Windmill company.

Mr. Johnson, was given authority to go to Austin whenever he deemed it necessary in the interest of Wichita Falls plan for the location of the school. An active campaign is planned. A brief containing such statistical information as will be useful in pushing this city's claim for the school is being prepared, and a committee is looking for a site which would be available for the use of the school in case it should be landed here.

The trade excursion on the Northwestern will probably be held about March 29, according to the plans outlined by Mary Smith and P. H. Pennington of the mercantile bureau who have the matter in charge. The excursion will be a one day affair, and one of its incidental purposes will be the advertisement of the New York-Detroit baseball game here April 2.

In moving that the organization extend thanks to those active in securing the Federal court for Wichita Falls, Frank Kell stated that the matter had been handled throughout with a high order of business capacity. Mr. Kell included in his motion the names of Judge Edgar Scurry, Judge A. H. Carrigan, B. F. Johnson, secretary as well as four members of the Texas delegation in Congress, Senators Charles Culbertson and Morris Shepard, and Representatives John H. Stephens and John N. Garner. The motion was unanimously adopted and these gentlemen will be written a letter of thanks over the official signature of the organization.

"We have committed ourselves to raising this bonus for the windmill company and it is simply up to us to make good on it," said J. A. Kemp, when that matter was brought up this morning. "If we fail to raise the bonus we not only lose the factory, but we fall down on something which we have undertaken. These people have done their part and are anxious that we fulfill our part of the contract." The chair appointed Mr. Kemp, C. W. Reid, W. H. Ferguson and F. N. Lawton as a committee to take the matter in charge.

A request from Archer county residents through County Judge J. S. McLaughlin of Archer, P. H. Pennington of Olney for aid in improving the road between Archer City and the Wichita county line was referred to the mercantile committee composed of P. H. Pennington, Marvin Smith and J. L. Art to secure the amount asked, \$250, through private subscriptions.

A set of textbooks by which the elementary principles of fire prevention will be taught in the public schools will be taught by the Chamber of Commerce, acting on the request of Superintendent Lee Clark.

Secretary Johnson reported that the leases for space at the Union passenger station on which the Chamber of Commerce plans to erect a building for a permanent exhibit had been received from the railroad officials, but action on this matter was postponed pending the submission of plans for the building by the architects.

FRIDDY RETIRES TODAY AS GENERAL MANAGER AT MILL

The resignation of W. M. Priddy as general manager of the Wichita Mill & Elevator Company, announced several weeks ago, goes into effect tomorrow. STALK PAPER PLAN TO BE INVESTIGATED

J. A. Kemp Returns From Conference of Business Men at Dallas Tuesday

Further investigation of the cotton stalk paper factory proposition was decided upon yesterday at Dallas, when a number of Texas business men met to look into the matter. J. A. Kemp was among those present. Much interest in the matter was displayed, and there was indication of a desire on the part of those present to take hold of the proposition, but a careful study of the invention, with a view to determining its commercial practicability, will be made.

The Dallas Journal of Tuesday says: Dallas may become the center of an industry calculated to revolutionize paper making. Investigation and experiment have patented a process for manufacturing paper from cotton stalks.

It is understood that the local men are interested in the event, and are getting to watch a demonstration of the process. Mr. Hartwyler's process is said to enable the production of a good quality of paper that could be sold at seven cents a pound below the present market prices. It also would provide an excellent market for the hitherto wasted cotton stalks. In this connection, there was much talk about the cotton acreage in Dallas and surrounding counties.

What have I lost if I have lived a Christian life? Nothing, but rather I have gained inestimably because during this earthly life I have lived under the happy delusion of a future and enduring life. Suppose there is no future life, that this is all there is to human existence. Then if my delusion of Christianity has helped me any, has made me a better and given me confidence, am I not a gainer? But again, suppose these Christian men are right, that there is a God and a life eternal. Then will I not be the gainer by more than humanity can estimate? If eternity is not a delusion but a reality
