

FERGUSON WANTS DIPPING VAT FOR MUCKRAKERS

RECEIVES OVATION WHEN HE ADDRESSES CATTLE RAISERS AT FORT WORTH—FINDS BOND OF SYMPATHY WITH CATTLEMEN.

TESTIMONY ENDED

At Request of Committee Hanger and Crane Will Argue Case—Today's Testimony of Rebuttal and Sur-Submittal Character.

Fort Worth, Texas, March 13.—The worst Governor Ferguson could find in his heart to say about the legislature in response to a real ovation from the members of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association Tuesday morning was that "he favored a dipping vat for politicians to clean themselves of some of their muckraking."

Gov. Ferguson had to hold up his hand to stop the demonstration when he was introduced by President James Callan as "one of the greatest governors Texas ever had for the benefit of school children, farmers and stockmen."

He declared "he broke away" from the investigations of the legislature to "return to the herd" and declared he expected to find a bond of sympathy with the cattlemen in that some of them probably had borrowed some money.

TESTIMONY CLOSED AT TODAY'S SESSION

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 13.—Testimony in the charges made against Governor Ferguson by Representatives Davis and Hanger before noon today and argument began this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

M. M. Crane, attorney for Representative Davis, and W. M. Hanger, attorney for the governor, will argue the case at the request of the committee. Mr. Hanger having expressed his willingness to submit the case without argument and Mr. Crane having declined to make any suggestion to the committee as to whether or not argument should be heard.

The testimony closed with Governor Ferguson absent. He was excused by the committee last night to attend the stock show at Fort Worth, after an evening several questions by members of the committee.

Rebuttal and sur-rebuttal testimony today included the examination of former State Senator T. H. McGregor, H. C. Walker, former president of the Temple State Bank, C. O. Austin, state commissioner of insurance and banking, and Chester Thrasher, president of the Citizens Bank and Trust Company of Austin. Except for the testimony of Thrasher, the evidence offered was introduced in explanation of matters previously testified to by witnesses.

BLUE WILL CHEER GRAY IN NATIONAL CAPITOL

Washington, March 13.—Arrangements are in progress for caring for 150,000 visitors to Washington during the week of June 4, when the United Confederate Veterans hold their first reunion north of the Potomac river, it was announced here last night.

Robert N. Hargrett and Harry P. Carey, in charge of the arrangements, in a statement said the reunion had assumed the character of a national event, voluntary contributions having come from persons in all parts of the country.

"The whole country has capitulated to the thinking ranks of gray," the statement said, and when the Southern veterans swing along Pennsylvania avenue, Union veterans will stand along the way and cheer them.

The gathering will not be of merely sectional interest, but of broad national significance, coming during a crisis in the nation's history. The national congress has appropriated \$2,000,000 to be contributed to the fund for the entertainment of the veterans and the postoffice department will commemorate the reunion by issuing a special cancelling stamp on all mail sent from Washington for a period before and during the meeting.

The war department will furnish hundreds of flags, tents, camp supplies and accessories, and the Red Cross will be on hand wherever needed with ambulances, doctors and nurses.

Plans are to have the veterans camp on the White House ellipse, where a Union army pitched its tents just after the close of the civil war.

REPORTS ON LIABILITY INSURANCE FOR 1916

Austin, March 13.—Forty per cent of the Texas business in writing work of compensation insurance under the Employers' Liability Act is done by the Texas Employers' Insurance association, according to a report of 1916 which has just been filed with the Department of Insurance and Banking. This report shows that during 1916 the association received \$1,775,000 in premiums with \$185,000 for 1915, or an increase of 80 per cent for 1916.

The association paid dividends to policyholders on account of 1914 operations \$8,758. The report shows that the percentage of underwriting expenses insured to premiums earned was 154 per cent.

FORT WORTH SALOON KEARS TO HAVE HEARING

Austin, Texas, March 13.—Comptroller Terrill left today for Fort Worth where he will attend a hearing of five saloon keepers charged with violation of the Sunday law, on information furnished the comptroller.

Serious Disturbances Among German Troops In Belgium Reported

By Associated Press. Amsterdam, March 13.—Disturbances among the German troops in the vicinity of Namur and Dinant are reported by the Telegraph. The paper says that only fragmentary reports of the trouble have reached Holland, but says it is known that such large numbers of soldiers have been imprisoned at Namur and Dinant on charges of insubordination in connection with the outbreak, that prisoners are crowded four or five times above their normal capacity.

Definite Instructions As to "Armed Guard" Have Been Approved

Washington, March 13.—Complete and definite instructions to the "armed guard" to be placed a board American merchant craft bound through the German submarine zone have been completed by the navy department and approved by Secretary Lansing. They will be forwarded to the navy personnel aboard the merchant craft whenever the ships are ready to sail.

The nature of the instructions will not be made public. They were first reported by news agencies and then submitted to Secretary Lansing at whose suggestion some amendments were made.

SENATE COMMITTEE SUBMISSION AGAIN APPROVES TREATY

Washington, March 13.—The Senate committee today approved a resolution providing for the submission of the treaty to the states by which the United States will pay that republic \$2,000,000 for partition of Panama. It will be presented to a vote in the present special Senate session.

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WILSON IMPROVING BUT KEPT INDOORS

Usual Tuesday Cabinet Meeting Cancelled on Account of President's Illness.

Washington, March 13.—President Wilson remained indoors today because of the cold from which he has been suffering the last week, but it was said at the white house that his condition was steadily improving. The usual Tuesday cabinet meeting was cancelled. Both Secretary Tumulty and Dr. Grayson, the president's physician, said shortly before noon that the president was improving.

Dr. Grayson said the president would be able to sit up this afternoon.

THAW ADJUDGED A LUNATIC TUESDAY

Under Pennsylvania Law He Cannot Be Requisitioned to New York.

By Associated Press. Philadelphia, Pa., March 13.—Harry K. Thaw was today adjudged a lunatic by the common pleas court of this city and, under the law, cannot be taken to New York on requisition to stand trial on charges of assassinating a Kansas City high school boy. Thaw will be kept at St. Mary's hospital here pending his removal to a Pennsylvania asylum.

The court's decision was based on a report presented today by a lunacy commission, which yesterday took the testimony of Thaw and his mother.

TRY TO REQUISITION THAW DESPITE INSANITY FINDING

By Associated Press. New York, March 13.—A decision of the common pleas court of Philadelphia declaring Harry K. Thaw insane will not deter District Attorney Swan from making a requisition to Governor Brumbaugh of Pennsylvania for extradition. The assumption that Thaw cannot be brought to New York for trial—the "dumb charge"—does not agree with two decisions of the United States supreme court, according to Assistant District Attorney Flack. The Porter-Charlton case was one instance Mr. Flack said.

THREE MINERS KILLED IN EXPLOSION TODAY

Cansburg, Penn., March 13.—Three men are known to have been killed and several others are missing as a result of an explosion today at the mines of the Henderson coal company at Hendersonville. About 200 men were at work in the mines but were rescued shortly after the blast occurred and three others removed. The cause of the explosion has not been determined.

LEGISLATURE AUTHORIZES LEASE OF IRON FURNACES

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Berlin's account of yesterday's fighting does not contain the recapitulation of the Franco-Belgian front on the south-west slope. KATY BROTHERHOOD MEN HOLDING CONFERENCE

St. Louis, March 13.—Committee chairman of the four brotherhoods of the south-western railroads will meet here today in a general conference to make recommendations for the settlement of the 8-hour day controversy. The session here will recommend a strike at this time. The meeting was attended by brotherhood officials representing the employees of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas and the Mississippi and Pacific railroads.

BROTHERHOODS WILL CO-OPERATE WITH GOVERNMENT

Washington, March 13.—The railroad brotherhoods on Monday wrote to President Wilson, it is stated authoritatively, that they would co-operate with the government in the settlement of the 8-hour day controversy. The brotherhood leaders declared that they were "hopeful" of making satisfactory adjustment of questions pending with the railroads.

LEGISLATURE FINALLY REPEALS WITNESS FEE LAW

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 13.—The legislature today finally repealed the law known as the county witness fee act. This is the law, passed during the second term of the Colquhoun administration, which provided witness fees for witnesses residing in the county in the prosecution of felony cases. Colquhoun permitted the law to stand, but vetoed the appropriation appropriation to pay witness fees. The Thirty-fourth legislature failed to either repeal the law or to make any appropriation to pay witness fees, and the law has remained in force. It becomes effective when approved by the governor. In the meantime, witness fees and claims have been accumulating until now there are over \$500,000 due such witnesses. It is said no provision is made by the present legislature to meet these claims.

## INTERVIEW WITH VICTOR MURDOCK

NOTED KANSAS INSURGENT WILL STAY IN POLITICS, BUT NOT AS PARTY MAN.

### FOR A STRONG NAVY

Says U. S. Can't Stay at Home and Do Man's Part in Work of Civilization.

Victor Murdock, just back from the Orient, but as of old, fresh, vigorous, enthusiastic, earnest, frank and forthright, gave a reporter of the Kansas City Star at Wichita Kansas the following interview last week.

"No."

"Most assuredly not."

"Under no circumstances."

"Yes, You bet."

"There you have Victor's answer to the four principal questions that Kansas has been wanting to ask him since a certain convention blew up in Chicago last June.

"Are you going back to the Republican party?"

"Have you joined the Democratic party?"

"Will you run for Congress again from your old district?"

"Do you intend to take any further interest in politics?"

"I expect to be in politics all my life," said Mr. Murdock, "because the things that I want to see brought about in this country are political questions."

"But I expect the remaining years of my activity to be spent as a free man. A man must be free to do his best fighting. You can't fight with your hands tied. And if you fight your best it must be for the things you believe in with all your heart, not the things that make up some particular party platform."

"I still stand with all my might and soul for the program of human well fare for which the Progressive party stood. My trip to China and my other trip to England and France during the past year have given me a yet broader view of Americanism."

"The United States has spent all its life growing up, and it has been rather indifferent about it. But now that it has grown up it must take its place in the world's activities, and the world's affairs. It must take a man's part, too."

"We must understand that a part of our development must be to take our own foreign trade, and they have done it single handed. We haven't helped them any."

"Americans in China, Clear Out and Alert."

"You ought to see the American business representatives in China. It would do your heart good. They are the younger set, clean-cut, strong, alert, efficient. The first thing they do when they land in the heart of China is to run up the Stars and Stripes and then they go out to find a buyer for their goods."

"But the flag first, with them. The United States must get behind these missionaries of its commercial life, as it gets behind its religious missionaries. And the American missionary by the way, is the greatest institution in China. The Christian religion and the idea of democracy are being hooked up together in China."

"The United States must extend its trade overseas. It can't stay at home and do a man's part in world civilization."

"But, wouldn't this trade get us into danger? The theory of the tariff is that the United States should not protect its citizens who go abroad for business reasons?"

"There was a danger shade of red in the familiar red top of the Wichita insurgent; there was a swift flash from the eye, and there was an ex-prosion."

"I know," he said, "and that is not. The United States must be prepared to send its trade into every nation. It must, above all, find it."

## URGES DESTRUCTION OF THE STABLE FLY

Menace to Health, Says Expert—Carries Anthrax and Blood Poison to Humans

Jacques W. Redway, F. R. G. S., of Mount Vernon, N. Y., contributes to the Medical Times an article on "The Menace of the Biting Stable Fly," in which he urges the extermination of the pest. He names some of the diseases the transmission of which is almost certainly due to this insect, and suggests measures that should be taken to exterminate it or keep its numbers to an irreducible minimum.

Two animals—the original rat and the biting stable fly—are menaces to humanity, and should be exterminated wherever and whenever found," he asserts. "Whether or not the one is a medium whereby bubonic plague is communicated and the other a means of spreading infantile paralysis, are questions and problems for the bacteriologist, and not for the layman, to discuss. Their crime and offense against humanity is broader."

"Of the dozen or more species of flies that infest houses, the biting stable fly is neither more nor less than a pest. It is more than a pest; it is a menace to health. It carries anthrax and blood poison to humans."

"The term 'stable fly' is something of a misnomer for the biting member of the family biting stable flies are its preferred habitat. It infests stables because of the presence of rotting straw. A few years ago rotting heaps of straw manure were allowed to accumulate in a vacant lot next to a public school for a week or more. There was no trouble then. A warm of biting stable flies invaded the school building, and there was trouble in the school."

## ELECTRIC COMPANY

WILL BE BIDDER

Would Materially Reduce Installation Cost of Lighting System if Given Contract.

An offer from the Texas Power and Light company to furnish free the magnetic luminous arcs to be mounted on the ornamental standards in the proposed system of downtown street illumination has been received by E. F. Johnson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce from E. G. Slaughter, vice president and general manager for the light company.

The offer is conditioned on the city entering into a contract for the maintenance to run as long as the contract for the other street lights will run seven years more. The furnishing of the arcs will save the property owners signing up an average of \$40 a piece, something in the aggregate of \$3,000 for the whole system.

The company also intends to send one of its engineers to make the preliminary survey and prepare for the property owners an exact statement of what the cost would be. The light company will be one of the bidders for the installation of the system, being anxious to get the contract for the installation of the system on account being in position to maintain the system after its installation.

50 BARREL WELL ON ELECTRA OIL LOT

(Electra News)

Don't be like the farmer who said "Gosh, there ain't no such animal as a well on a small tract of land because that is the thing that has just been done in the Electra field. J. H. Howell started a well February 13 on two lots 20x20 feet each, making a tract 20x40 feet of

800 square feet of land in the Texas Electric Oil and Gas Company's subdivision on the J. T. Ganger land east of the city and on March 3 he completed the well at a depth of 161 feet with an initial production of about 100 barrels. Three wells each producing from 25 to 40 barrels have been finished this week on the Texas Electric Oil proposition and two new locations have been made in the immediate vicinity of these wells and the contractors are now rigging up preparatory to actual drilling. Several of the electric business men have joined forces and are putting a well down on two lots, the contract being let to Mook Drilling Company who drilled in the forty barrel well this week for J. H. Howell.

FRANCE ORGANIZING TO COMBAT TUBERCULOSIS

Paris, France is already organizing to combat the spread of tuberculosis since the war among men who have been weakened by the hardships of an unending struggle. There are at present 100,000 men in the army attacked by this disease, of whom about 80,000 have been sent back to their homes. At least another 100,000 will come back from German prison camps with the same ill, and a great chain of national sanitarians is proposed to deal with the plague. Two and a half million francs have already been subscribed and a program of work has been drawn up which will involve the expenditure of many millions more.

In 1915 a yearly credit was opened by the government which assures tuberculosis soldiers a certain amount of assistance during the war, and at present the administration has in hand four million francs for this purpose. There is also an arrangement which allows a tuberculosis soldier to have three months' treatment in a civil sanatorium at the expense of the state before he is discharged from the army. Before the war tuberculosis caused ten per cent of the deaths in France, but has just been done in the Electra field. J. H. Whatever may be said of the present Texas Legislature, one thing may be said down to its everlasting credit, the fact that the members stayed on the job for two dollars per day. The makers of the constitution of Texas contemplated that with two-dollar-a-day sessions in prospect, the lawmakers would buckle down to business hard enough in the first sixty days to get through, but legislature after legislature has wriggled out of this by adjourning in the face of unpassed appropriation bills and other unfinished business, forcing the governor to call them in special session at five dollars per day. It is something of a sacrifice for even a legislator to work for only two dollars per day.

The first news that Americans will have in connection with the arming of American ships, will be when some liner clashes with a submarine. Up to that point, secrecy is essential, and while there is no censorship in this country, as the term applies in Europe, neither the newspapers nor the public will complain if the details of the arming of the ships are withheld. If the Germans stick to their announced intentions with regard to these armed ships, there will be news quick enough.

The next few weeks should witness developments of a big sort in the European war zones. The allies have not tried to keep it a secret that they are going to undertake, not merely one "push," but several, simultaneously. Germany's plans are being kept quiet, but there are reasons for believing that instead of supinely waiting for an entente offensive, she will force the fighting in an effort to disarrange the allies' plans. With the coming of warm weather in France and Russia all the war elements that have been tied up by the winter snows and freezes can be brought into use. Some war prophets believe that the allied offensive will be on all the fronts at the same time—Belgium, France, Italy, Rumania, Macedonia, Galicia, Poland and Mesopotamia, and that the entire weight of the entente arms will be brought to bear on the Central Powers, with naval actions in conjunction. War prophets have been so often discredited that their guesses are not overly valuable, but there is little reason to doubt that some big fighting is in immediate prospect.

PANHANDLE COUNTIES ARE IMPROVING COLORADO ROUTE Panhandle counties have much road improving work under way and in prospect along the Colorado-to-Gulf highway, according to the Amarillo News, which says: It will be interesting to those who are concerned in the future development of the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway, that practically every county along the line is working for road betterment. Potter county has some of the best roadway in the State of Texas on the Colorado-to-Gulf and will continue its work. At this time the gang is engaged between the city and the Canadian River to the north. Already there is a model road on the north side of the river, extending to the county line. On this side, or the south side of the river, there is much of high grade work and this will be continued according to the present plan into the city limits. Armstrong county is doing a great deal in grading and draining and will have, when the present work is fully settled, a long stretch of surpassingly good roads. This county is designing to continue the work until every road within the confines of that political subdivision of the Panhandle is in excellent shape. The greater part of the present progress work is on the Colorado-to-Gulf road. Donley county is at present expending \$75,000 on road betterment, and a considerable portion of this sum is being placed on the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway. This county will continue its work and to make of the Colorado-to-Gulf, which there becomes a link in the proposed Ozark Trail. In this way there will be a double service for the highway. Hall county, it is learned, joining Childrens, has on at present a campaign well calculated to make of the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway one of the greatest in the entire southwest. All of the immediate need repairs are to be viewed in the light of emergencies and remedied without loss of time. Officers of the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway, recently visiting in Amarillo declare that there is now no doubt that the roads will be in excellent condition for the summer travel to the altitudes. Every county west city is joining in this work.
