ENGLAND WANTS FARMERS FROM UNITED STATES



## J. B. MARLOW'S SON IS BADLY BURNED

Explosion of Gasoline Results in Injuries Which May Result Fatally

As a result of lighting a match to a small discarded oil can while playing in the back yard of his home late yesterday afternoon, J. B. Marlow, the six-year-old son of J. B. Marlow, is in a critical condition from burns inflicted by the oil can exploding.

The child was alone in the back yard at the time of the explosion. After piling up some trash, including the oil can which contained a small amount of gasoline, he set fire to it. Immediately the oil caught fire and the can exploded, catching the child's clothing. The father and mother heard the explosion and rushed to the child's assistance, but not before the child's clothing was enveloped in flames. The father seized the child, threw a cloth around him and then rolled him on the ground and in that manner finally succeeded in extinguishing the flames but not before the child was severely if not fatally burned and the father and mother painfully burned about the hands and face.

The child is being attended by a physician from Fort Worth but there is said to be only a fighting chance for his recovery.

ELEVEN HELD UP BY TWO ROBBERS

WHOLESALE METHODS ADOPTED BY MASKED MEN NEAR DENVER CHUTE.
OVER \$100 OBTAINED
One Man Holds Group With Automatic While Other Goes Through Pockets.

On land where the wheat crop has been killed by the dry weather and freezes, plant cow peas or beans, is the suggestion of A. O. Norris of Graham, who read an editorial in Tuesday's Times, discussing the matter of planting wheat land to other crops. Mr. Norris says that several men of his acquaintance did this several years ago when beans and cow peas were selling for less than half what they are now selling for, and made more money than if they had harvested a fair wheat yield. They made a great deal more, he says, than their neighbors who planted their fields in cotton. The suggestion seems to be well worth considering. There will not be the need for cotton that there is for foodstuffs, which are certain to command higher prices than ever paid before. Beans and cow peas will yield well on much of the land in this section. The failure of the wheat crop would be unfortunate, to say the least, but it will not be disastrous if the land can be turned to other crops, especially food crops of some sort. As The Times pointed out Tuesday, this is a matter in which the government's agents and the Chamber of Commerce and other organizations of like character might well interest themselves.

Wichita Falls got in its bid too late for one of the civilian training camps for Texas, authorized at the last session of congress. A reader of The Times has suggested, however, that it is quite likely provision would be made at the coming session of congress for such a training camp at Wichita Falls, if the men of Wichita Falls and surrounding territory would take the step of enrolling their names as desiring to take the training here. It is the reader's idea that the Chamber of Commerce or some other organization could announce that it would record the names of such applicants and when a satisfactory number had been received to lay the matter before the proper authorities and ask for the establishment of a camp here. This ought to be done in time for congress to make an appropriation. Doubtless, the war department would be glad to furnish officers for the military training within the next few months and, if the men of Wichita Falls really desire such training, doubtless, a way to give it to them will be provided.

IS INVESTIGATING SEINING OF TANK

Fish Taken From Iowa Park Tank—Another Party Obtains Permission.
Efforts to obtain evidence sufficient to justify prosecution are being made by County Attorney Bruce Greenwood against a party of Wichitans who last week were alleged to have seined the Denver tank at Iowa Park without permission taking a large number of black bass and other game fish therefrom. The seining of a private tank for the game fish is punishable by a fine of between \$25 and \$100, or confinement in jail for a term between 20 and 60 days.

EXPECT TEXAS FARMERS TO BORROW \$1,000,000

(Houston Post)
That the Houston federal land bank will have made loans aggregating \$10,000,000 within a year was predicted by M. H. Gossard, president of the institution of this district, who has just returned from a conference of the presidents of the 12 federal land banks with Secretary McAdoo and members of the farm loan board. The interest rate would prove a great boon to farmers of Texas, he declared. Judge Gossard, who expressed gratification over the fact that the board has fixed a flat rate of 5 per cent applying to all parts of the United States. The conference which he attended passed a resolution requesting congress to increase the limit of the loans permitted for individual borrowers from \$10,000 to \$25,000, and he expressed the hope that the special session of congress soon to convene would make this a law. Judge Gossard pointed out that money may be borrowed under the farm loan act against homesteads of 200 acres or less to cover the purchase price or to cover the cost of improvements on the mortgaged land, this explanation being made to clear up the confusion regarding the application of the act in Texas because of the Texas homestead law. He explained further that under the Texas law it would not be possible for farmers to borrow under the farm loan act to pay for fertilizer or live stock, or to pay existing indebtedness, except as this indebtedness represents purchase price. To borrow from the federal land banks farmers are required to organize themselves into groups containing at least 10 farmer borrowers and each group asking for at least \$20,000 of loans. The Houston federal land bank is now prepared to furnish a blank form of articles of association to make the organization of these groups simple and easy. Farmers are permitted to borrow up to 50 per cent of the appraised value of the land, plus 20 per cent

As the men did not apply for passports here, it is supposed that they had them when they arrived, and after swimming the river were allowed to proceed by the Mexican authorities.

**FAMOUS STARS  
WILL APPEAR IN  
MONDAY'S GAME**

COMING OF GIANTS AND TIGERS  
WILL BRING NOTED PLAYERS  
TO THIS CITY—ANCIENT RIVALRY  
TO BE DISPLAYED.

**COBB AND CRAWFORD**

Kauff, Thorpe and Many Others Ex-  
pected to Be in Lineup, With Mc-  
Graw and Jennings in Command of  
Teams.

A game between two of the strong-  
est, if not the very strongest, teams in  
baseball, tending under the leader-  
ship of the craftiest managers con-  
nected with the great national pastime,  
is the treat in store for local fans  
when the New York Giants and De-  
troit Tigers go together at Lake Wichi-  
ta Monday afternoon. It would in-  
deed take a hardy critic to dispute  
the possibility that the two clubs who  
will appear here at that time will be  
representatives of their respective  
leagues in the World's Championship  
series this fall.

Indeed, these training season games  
partake of the nature of a world's  
series in itself, and for this reason  
the interest in the games is not con-  
fined to the thousands who will see  
the exhibition at Wichita Falls, or  
at the other places where they will be  
staged, but is truly of a nation-wide  
character.

The Giants, powerful, speedy, brainy  
and imbued with the indomitable fight-  
ing spirit of their famous leader, John  
McGraw, are the almost unanimous  
pick of baseball dopsters as the class  
of the National league.

The Tigers, probably the most pow-  
erful on the offensive in either league,  
dashing, energetic, plentifully supplied  
with baseball brains, combined with  
a high order of speed, will, with even  
a mediocre brand of pitching, be the  
most dangerous combination in the  
junior league. Even with the imita-  
tion pitching they have been supplied  
with during the last few weeks, this  
wonderful combination, exciting  
admiration from both friend and foe,  
has stayed in the pennant fight until  
the last days of the race. With a  
strengthened flanking corps this spring  
their fiery leader, Hughey Jennings,  
hopes to lead them to a world's cham-  
pionship, his lifelong ambition.

Probably no two clubs in baseball  
could be brought together which would  
bring more famous players into action  
than these two clubs. Of course, of  
these, the first is Ty Cobb, the incom-  
parable, undisciplined as the greatest  
player that ever wore spikes. Cobb's  
recent arrival at the training camp  
of the Bengals was timed especially  
with regard to the present trip. To  
see Cobb, Crawford and Veach in ac-  
tion, the heaviest hitting outfield in  
the game, would in itself be worth a  
trip of miles to see.

It will probably be the last oppor-  
tunity Northwest Texas and Oklahoma  
fans will have of seeing "Wahoo Sam"  
don the spangles, the old war-horse  
being practically through. His par-  
ticipation in Monday's game will be  
probably of only a few rounds stand-  
ing. The famous outfield will see him  
little if any more as a regular. He'll  
man being groomed for the middle gar-  
den and Cobb being shifted to Craw-  
ford's place in right.

Another famous player with the Ti-  
gers will be Owen Bush, the peer of  
American league shortstops, and prob-  
ably the best lead off man in the  
game. Likewise can be mentioned  
Sugar Stanage and Turk Spencer, the  
water out of the hole show and for-  
gotten until last year, when he staged  
a remarkable comeback and but for  
an accident, which removed him from  
the game at a crucial time, would  
have saved Detroit a pennant and  
probably a championship.

The Giants will also be able to  
bring on the field their share of the  
stars—Helen Zimmerman, the fiery  
tempered umpire-bater, Buck Herzog,  
Fred Fletcher and Walter Holke, the  
latter a sensation at the initial sack  
with the Giants last season and des-  
tined to be one of the great players of  
the game. This infield is regarded  
as probably the greatest in the game  
and enabled McGraw's club to make  
the spurt which, if the season had  
lasted a few days longer, would have  
meant the championship. The season  
was more than half gone before Mc-  
Graw's club was gotten together.

Dave Robertson, in the McGraw out-  
field, for years has set the pace for  
National league hitters, and is destined  
to take a prominent part in Monday's  
game.

Not the least of Monday's attrac-  
tions will be the appearance of Jim  
Thorpe, probably the greatest athlete  
the world has ever seen. Thorpe will  
be a utility outfielder with McGraw's  
crew. Last year his work in the Amer-  
ican association was such that Mc-  
Graw recalled him to the Giants, and  
he will probably be carried as a utility  
player with the Giants through the  
coming season.

Benny Kauff, the former Red star,  
who last year modestly admitted that  
he was a greater ball player than Ty  
Cobb and attracted wide notice in the  
baseball world thereby, will be an-  
other attraction.

No less an attraction than the op-  
portunity of watching the play of the  
two clubs will be that of seeing the  
two famous managers on campaign.  
McGraw recently signed on again for  
a term of five years with New York  
at a figure said to be \$50,000 a year,  
the greatest salary received by any-  
one connected with the game. Few  
fans will deny, however, that if any  
man ever earned that figure, it is  
McGraw. That worthy is now open-  
ing his fifteenth campaign in charge  
of the New York club, during which  
time he has won a world's champion-  
ship from the Philadelphia Athletics  
in 1905, and a handful of National  
league flags. When he went to New  
York in 1902, that club was a rather  
consistent second division aggregation,  
a position which it has never occupied  
but one season since coming under  
his leadership.

Equally as successful has been his  
friend, Hughey Jennings, manager of  
the Tigers. The Bengals were rather  
a weak-kneed aggregation before Jen-  
nings took charge some dozen, more  
or less, years ago. Since then there  
have been the first to be reckoned  
with by any club having pretensions  
to the title. Three American league pen-  
nants have gone to Detroit since Jen-  
nings took charge of that club. He,  
with his fiery, but less skillful, and  
"F.K. Yahr," the one of the  
unique figures of fandom. Although  
not specified in the contract, it is not  
improbable that the Tigers' loss may  
get into action on the coaching line.


