





MEGARGEL MAN IS INJURED BY ENGINE

Foot is Crushed and Other Injuries Sustained in Accident Saturday

While crossing the track in front of a Fort Worth and Denver yard en-gine in the Oklahoma yards Saturday morning, G. B. Adleins of Megargel, 65 years old, fell with his right foot under the drivers: two of his toes were crushed so they had to be ampu-tated, Adkins also sustaining a slight cut on his head. According to the report of the train crew, Moreman Miller and Engineer Long, Adkins was altempting to cross the track in front of the engine, which was approaching the Park street crossing at a pace of about 5 miles an hour. Seeing that he would not be able to make it across Adfikins step-ped on to the forward foot board of the engine. Apparently becoming ex-cited, the report continues, he attempt-ed to get off, the acident resulting. The cut in the head is believed to have been made by striking against the footboard as he fell.

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The great European war has taught the astolishing adaptability of na-tional industries when properly in-ventoried and organized. It has been learned, for instance, that a dye fac-fory may be transformed within a week or ten days into a plant for the production of high explosives.

In the state of New York alone, i is said, some 35,000 firms have been inventoried. In no case, so far, has the New York board met with desinite efusal to give the desired informa

To gain preliminary information be-or the actual inventory work began, etters were addressed to 350 of the eading manufacturers. The respones showed that almost unanimous sire was expressed on the part of those business men, many of them of international rep the work.

The council itself is composed of the secretaries of war, navy, interior, agriculture, commerce and labor, be-ing supplemented by an advisory coming supplemented by an advisory com-mission of seven civilians. It was giv-en an appropriation of \$200,000 at the last session of Congress to carry on its work. The advisory commission has divided its work into the follow-ing committees: Transportation and communication; munitions, manufac-turing, including standardization and industrial relations; science and re-search, including engineering and edu-cational; supplies, including food, clothing, etc.; raw materials, minerals and metals; labor, including conserva-tion of health and welfare of workers, and medicine, including general saniand medicine, including general sani-sation. Much work already has been accomplished by the council which will be invaluable to the country at most a mo

He has already shown how well qualified he is as a destroyer, in the millions of dollars lost in the destruction of munition plants and other establishments engaged in turning out war orders in this country, since the great war began in 1915. This type of war agent would, undoubtedly, put forth his best efforts in the destruction of oil refineries. He would fire tanks and burn lease properties. In order to protect such properties large expense would be incurred in maintaining guards. The long trains of tank cars on the railroads could not all be protected and there would be immense losses as a consequence. Pipe lines would be cut and their contents fired.

If the United States became involved in a war there would be a great demand for men to fill the regiments. The workers in the oil fields would enlist in large numbers. Labor would become scarcer and more costly. THE TREE

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Many probable happenings can be cited to show that war would be of great detriment to the oil trade, yet these seem to be not sufficiently formidable to produce any feeling of pessimism on the part of oil men. The French peasant got his by the terrible French revolution, and his brother across the Rhine had first to al document, and a bloodless revolution took place. He was an autoerat—he could do such a thing. Yes, but con-sider deeply the moral courage that it took to overturn an institution of cen-turies' duration in the face of strenu-ous palace opposition and more than covert grand ducal threats—by the simple stroke of a pen. Surpassingly great, monstrously small, exquisitely bruital, tenderly mer-ciful, have been the Romanoffs that are dead and buried.
