### HOLD PARADE AND PATRIOTIC MEETING DOWNTOWN SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Both White and Negro Speakers Take Part—Patriotic Resolutions Adopted

# OFFICER BEATEN, ARREST IS MADE

H. B. HINES TAKEN INTO CUSTODY AFTER FIGHT WITH DEPUTY SHERIFF CARNES.

# BROTHER ALSO HELD

Officer Declared to Be in Serious Condition—Fight Takes Place in Hines Building.

Following a severe beating up received by Deputy Sheriff Ed Carnes in his rooms in the Hines building on Ohio, just after noon today, Sheriff George Hawkins and Deputy J. E. Glenn arrested H. B. Hines, well known Wichitan, on a charge of assault on murder.

Later Mark Hines of Petrolia, was arrested on a similar charge. Officers took an automatic pistol of a small caliber from H. B. Hines at the time of his arrest.

Deputy Carnes, who was given emergency treatment, was pronounced to be in a serious condition, his face being badly beaten, swollen and covered with blood, his eyes nearly closed, and he was coughing up blood. The physician stated that he was also injured in the intestines.

Hines bond was set at \$2,500 after a habeas corpus hearing before Judge Edgar Scurry. Sheriff Hawkins had refused to allow bond in the case.

"How much bond do you think he ought to be under, Mr. Sheriff," Judge Scurry asked. "I don't think he should be allowed any bond, the man is liable to die at any moment, and I don't think it is a bondable case," said the sheriff. Judge Scurry decided to allow bond in the case, fixing the bond of H. B. Hines and Mark Hines at the same figure, \$2,500.

T. R. Boone represented the defendants in the habeas corpus hearing. D. P. Taylor, J. L. Art, T. R. T. Orth and E. A. Dale signed the bond of H.

# Hoover's Experience In Belgium to Be Used For His Own Country



HERBERT C. HOOVER

Herbert C. Hoover, chairman of the Belgian relief commission, has been asked by the Council of National Defense to take the chairmanship of a committee on food supply and prices during the war. The council expects through this committee to coordinate the various food distributing agencies of the nation and prevent, as far as possible, speculation and other evils which would raise food prices to exorbitant levels.

"Economy in distribution, increased production and all other phases of the food problem will be covered in the work of the committee, which will seek to obtain the active co-operation of the food dealers."

Attention will be paid to the experiences of European governments in handling the food question, and it is for this reason that Mr. Hoover's service will be of value. In this committee the government is expected to have an agency admirably equipped for assuring the general control of food production and distribution should it become necessary for the government to take this out of private hands.

# ARREST GERMAN AFTER WATCHING HIM THREE YEARS

Galveston, Texas, April 16.—Captain William Othmer who was arrested yesterday at the direction of the federal authorities will be given a preliminary hearing tomorrow before United States Commissioner Walker. Captain Othmer who has been under federal authorities' surveillance for nearly three years came to Galveston a month ago from New York. The complaint alleges that he is aiding and is about to aid an enemy of the United States. He is said to be an officer in the German army.

# "HOLY ROLLERS" ARE WITNESSES TODAY

Attend Trial of One of Their Number. Case of Alleged Child Abandonment.

Much interest was being manifested in the county court this afternoon in the trial of J. H. Joiner, residing beyond the cemetery, a member of the Apostolic faith, commonly known as "Holy Rollers," on a charge of child abandonment in connection with the alleged refusal to provide proper medical attention for a child ill with pneumonia the early part of the month.

The county court forced the man to allow the child to be treated and it has recovered. Quite a number of members of the faith were in attendance at the trial, including a negro man and woman, one of whom is said to have been in the crowd found praying for the child's recovery when a physician was sent to treat it.

The testimony of the members of the faith as to their belief in the curing power of prayer was a feature of the case.

"If one of you is sick, let them pray for recovery," said one of the women on the stand quipping from the Bible. "That is what we do in case of sickness. If one is afflicted, let them sing songs. We do that quite often."

Besides the praying, an ointment is also used in treatment, according to the testimony.

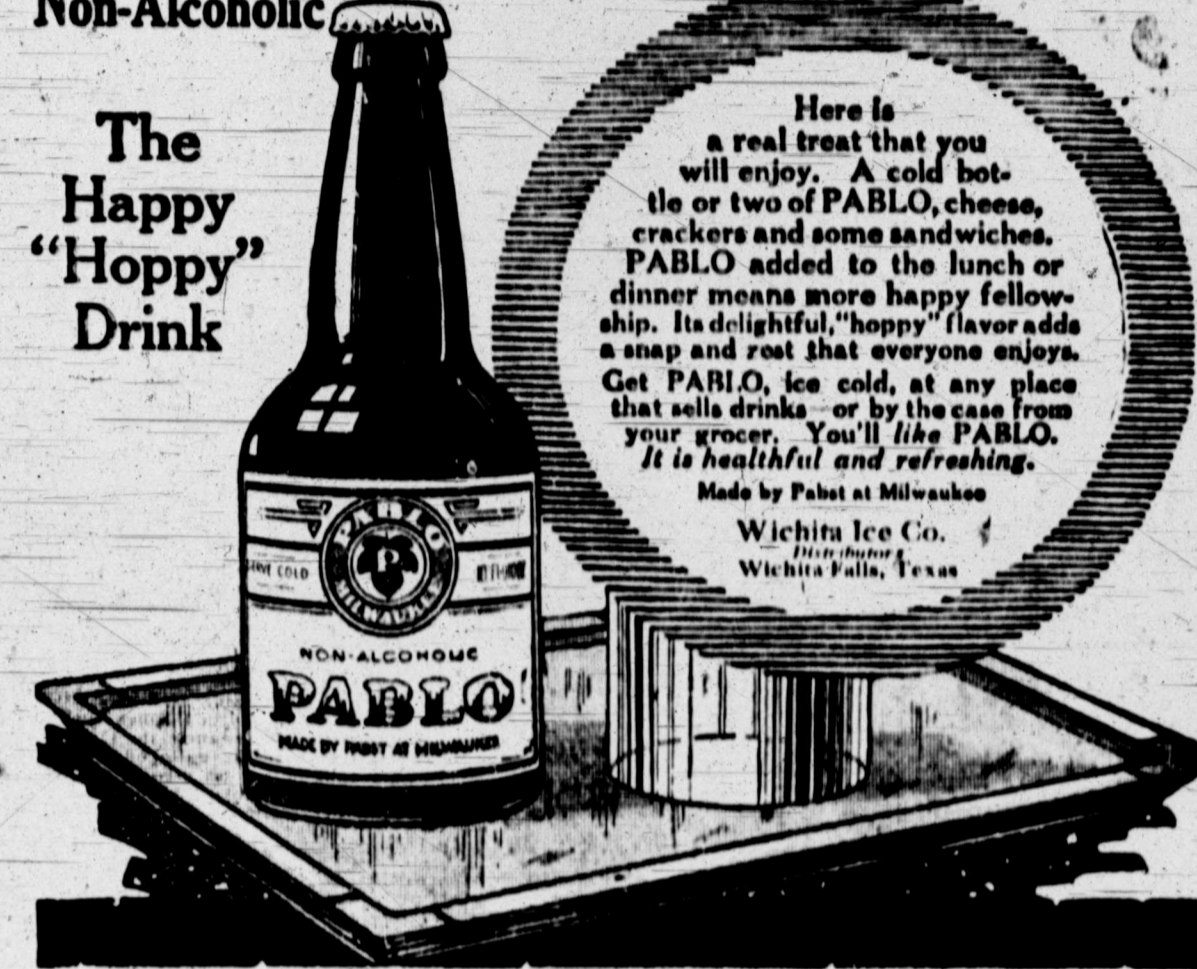
# LOCAL PRICES FOR WHEAT GO STILL HIGHER TODAY

MORE SUBJECTS AT SPECIAL SESSION

Oil Tax Bills Are Among Those Expected to Be Submitted By Governor.

Austin, Texas, April 16.—Although the special session of the Thirty-fifth legislature, which is to convene Wednesday is called by Governor Ferguson primarily for the purpose of considering and passing the general appropriation bills for the support of the state government for the next two fiscal years, it is generally conceded that the governor will submit from time to time quite a number of other propositions for the consideration of the lawmakers during the 30 days of the extra session.

It is understood the governor will insist on considerable progress being made on the money bills, before he presents other subjects. The appropriations committees of the House and Senate are now in session going over the estimates submitted by heads of departments, educational and eleemosynary institutions, and as a result expect to have the bills ready for introduction immediately after convening there will be no organization of the legislature, consequently much time will be saved in that direction.

From present indications the appropriation bill carried in the bills which will reach close to \$20,000,000 which will be an increase of approximately \$5,000,000 over the amount appropriated for the two past fiscal years. No joint resolutions proposing amendments to the state constitution can be considered during the special session, but it is understood that another effort is to be made to have adopted a concurrent resolution proposing a constitutional convention despite the veto by the governor of the McNeelus resolution on this subject.

Such a resolution could be adopted by a two-thirds vote of each branch of the legislature. There probably will be no liquor legislation attempted as the governor has already indicated he will veto any such legislation.

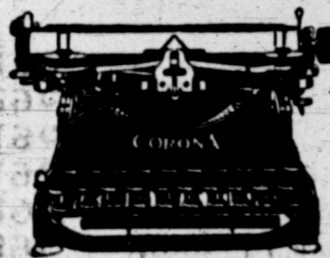
